




It is a pleasure to serve the fraternity as your new Grand President for the next two years. In these two years our goal shall be to continue to expand the services we offer to our collegiate and alumni brothers and to achieve continued prosperity and growth within our fraternity.

We are beginning many new and exciting programs this fall, and in this issue of The DELTASIG, as in upcoming issues, we will be highlighting these new programs for you.

In this issue I would like to speak specifically about involvement in our fraternity on a national level. This is an area often overlooked by our collegiate and alumni brothers alike! Our goal in the next two years is to expand our national committee network to 5% of our total membership; this would represent over 1000 brothers! In upcoming issues of The DELTASIG, I will be highlighting our aggressive fundraising efforts, and also saluting the many Deltasig entrepreneurs in our collegiate and alumni chapters.







Elected at the Grand Chapter Congress to lead the fraternity during the next two years, introducing the Executive Committee and Board of Directors.

The final Business Session of each Grand Chapter Congress is devoted to the election of the Board of Directors who will lead Delta Sigma Pi for the subsequent biennium. The elections conducted during the 35th Grand Chapter Congress filled the positions of Grand President, Director of Alumni Activities, Provincial Vice Presidents and Regional Directors. In all, 17 Regional Directors, four Provincial Vice Presidents, one Director of Alumni Activities and one Grand President, were elected to serve for the 1985-87 biennium.

The National Executive Committee, the basic policy making body of the fraternity with powers delegated to it by the Board of Directors and the National Constitution and Bylaws, was also elected directly by the Grand Chapter. Serving on the National Executive Committee for the next two years are Grand President John V. Henik, Past Grand President Richard J. Parnitzke, Director of Alumni Activities Joe S. Loomis, Collegian of the Year-1984 Dwayne A. Hoffpaur, Collegian of the Year-1985 Karen K. Gratz, Northern Provincial Vice President Thomas E. Sheely, Southern Provincial Vice President Charles F. Eaton, Jr., Mid-American Provincial Vice President Randy L. Hultz and Western Provincial Vice President William W. Tatum, Jr.

The Board of Directors now consists of those members mentioned above serving on the National Executive Committee and Eastern Regional Director Marc A. Robbins, Mideastern Regional Director Michael N. Wilson, East Central Re-

cific Regional Director William R. Kinsella, and Western Regional Director Claire S. Roberts.

JOHN V. HENIK

Elected for the first time as Grand President and leading the Executive Committee and Board of Directors for the next two years is John V. Henik. Initiated in 1977 by Theta Psi Chapter at Indiana University-Northwest in Gary, Indiana, John served as Historian and Vice President for Professional Activities. He has served as a District Director in the East Central Region, as Central Regional Director and as the Mid-American Provincial Vice President for the last two years. In addition, he has served as Chairman of the Committee on Leadership Development and has participated on other national committees. He is currently affiliated with the Dallas, Houston and Chicago Alumni Chapters.



Deltasigs celebrated Brotherhood from the Heart of Texas as over 800 gathered together in Dallas, Texas


A new record in Deltasig history was set at The Sheraton Central Hotel & Towers in Dallas, Texas, from August 18-22, 1985, as the largest number of attendees since the founding of the fraternity gathered for the 35th Grand Chapter Congress. A total of 803 members, spouses and guests participated in this event with the theme "Brotherhood from the Heart". The fraternalism was strong as first time convention participants formed many new friendships with Deltasigs from throughout the nation and frequent convention attendees renewed those special friendships developed over the years.

Most attendees arrived on Sunday, August 18, as Registration began that morning and continued throughout the day. That evening all participants had an opportunity to meet the National Officers and Staff during the Grand President's Reception and Dance. The dress for the evening was Western and cowboy and cowgirl hats, boots and Western shirts abounded.

The Opening Business Session of the 35th Grand Chapter Congress



The spirit of Aggieland

*Delta Sigma Pi comes to Texas A&M as the
fraternity installs its newest chapter,
Lambda Nu*

Texas A & M University has a proud heritage dating back to the founding of the institution in 1876. On April 20, 1985, 53 students at Texas A & M University began a new tradition in Aggieland; the students established a chapter of Delta Sigma Pi on their campus. Lambda Nu Chapter was established with great fanfare as Brothers from across the state of Texas and across the country gathered in College Station, Texas, for the installation of the fraternity's 211th collegiate chapter.

For many years, fraternities were forbidden from being established on the Texas A & M campus. Only recently has the campus become available to fraternities or sororities of any type. The original effort to establish a chapter at Texas A & M University began in 1948 when then Executive Director H. G. Wright approached the administration of the school in an effort to form a chapter. University regulations would not permit the establishment of a Delta Sigma Pi Chapter at that

time. In 1984, six Brothers of Delta Sigma Pi began studies at Texas A & M University. These six Brothers, combined with the efforts of Dr. L. Murphy Smith, were to form the backbone for the establishment of Lambda Nu Chapter.

Director of Chapter Services C. Dean Ferguson visited the Texas A & M campus in early October of 1984 and met with Associate Dean John Dinkel of the College of Business Administration and with Brothers Gregg Bartolo, Kyle Toigo, and L. Murphy Smith. Dean Dinkel provided his support for a recruiting effort and four short days later, a recruiting table was established at Texas A & M University. With little advance publicity, over 40 students attended the recruiting table to learn more about Delta Sigma Pi. An organizational meeting was conducted in late October by Gulf Western Regional Director Leon S. Niles and District Fred C.

Lipsey and officers were elected shortly thereafter. Officers were elected for Alpha Gamma Sigma Colony at Texas A & M University in late October. These officers were to develop a program of professional and community service activities, fund raising projects, and recruiting events that would propel the colony toward its goal of achieving a charter in Delta Sigma Pi. A letter of intent was submitted to The Central Office in mid-November and this was followed by a roster of members and bylaws.



Brother Mazur then called the Roll of the Grand Chapter and a total of 169 delegates representing 131 Collegiate Chapters and 38 Alumni Chapters were officially seated and franchised.




GAMMA OMICRON ALUMNUS NAMED ASSISTANT TO THE DEAN


