

Dear Brothers:

It began for me on September 21st in Toledo, Ohio at the East Central, Central and Huron "Tri-Regional". Two months later, I have been fortunate to have attended seven Regional Conferences covering eleven different regions, traveled over 20,000 air miles, consumed over 25 airline meals, moderated over 20 seminars, presented seven Fraternity awards, participated in the initiation of one honorary member and a joint initiation for six chapters and met nearly 1,000 Deltasig collegians and alumni across the country. The efforts of our Leadership Fund Trustees were also well rewarded during this regional season. As the Leadership Fund enters its second Annual Campaign, your response has been extremely encouraging. Thank you to all who have contributed or pledged in these past two months. I want to especially recognize the District Directors in attendance at the Gulf Western/Southwestern "Texas" Regional and South Pacific Regional who have each pledged to the next level of giving and to complete that pledge by the Grand Chapter Congress in Washington, D.C.

I would also like to recognize the chapters of the Eastern Region who, under the leadership of Regional Director Nick Steinkrauss, are establishing an endowed Deltasig scholarship within the Leadership Fund. Our thanks to these and all the supporters of our efforts to enhance the financial stability of our Fraternity.



The Chapters Speak

The year has started off with a bang in the North! After the August Executive Committee Meeting in Miami, we had the fewest number of troubled chapters in three years. Also, the general health of the Province, as measured by CEI, is very good.

Again, the East Central Region was named Most Outstanding Region. We also took home a number of other national awards; Boston Alumni Chapter was named Outstanding Alumni Chapter, Alpha Kappa Chapter at SUNY-Buffalo received the National Service Award, Alpha Pi Chapter at Indiana University was named Most Improved Chapter.

Immediately following the Executive Committee meeting, many of our Northern Province Brothers sailed the deep blue sea to the Bahamas for the first annual Alumni Fling. Everyone that went came back with stories of fun and frivolity. Needless to say, there will be another fling in 1992. (The Grand Chapter Congress will be in Washington, DC in 1991, and will serve as our gathering place for alumni.)

Of course, the big events in the fall are always the Regional Conferences. Having had the opportunity to attend the Officer Training Schools (OTiS) during the summer months, many of our chapter officers were well prepared to begin the year. The Regional Conferences got the rest of us going.

The East Central, Central and Huron Regions all met together in September for a Tri-Regional Conference. Mr. Rawley is the Assistant to the Chairman of the Hershey Foods Corporation. Mr. Rawley is responsible for strategic planning for Hershey. He acted as keynote speaker for the Conference speaking on personal planning and goal setting.

The final Regional Conference of the season is the Mid-Eastern Regional which was held in State College, Pennsylvania. As usual, everyone had a great time.

The other very impressive area of operation in this Province is expansion. We were fortunate to welcome Mu Xi Chapter at LaRoche College in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania into our Brotherhood on April 28, 1990. In addition, we are reactivating Epsilon Omicron Chapter at Western Michigan University in Kalamazoo, Michigan. We also have numerous other candidates including our colony at Penn State-Behrend in Erie, Pennsylvania.

We are very fortunate to have Past Grand President Richard J. Parnitzke in our Province. Brother Parnitzke is spearheading a major expansion/ reactivation effort in the upstate New York area. There are a number of schools that have been approached and several who have given permission for us to recruit. While these efforts are just beginning, I think that we already owe Brother Parnitzke a debt of gratitude.

We are having a great time in the North! I am blessed with tremendous people and great chapters. Everywhere I look, I see something good happening. To my Brothers in this Province, keep up the good work. Hold your heads up high for your successes and accomplishments. I am very proud of you! 

Capitalizing on Brotherhood

Washington, D.C., our Nation's Capital, will become the center of attention for Delta Sigma Pi and for Deltasigs worldwide as it hosts the Grand Chapter Congress, August 13-18, 1991.





This 38th gathering of The Grand Chapter marks a dramatic change in convention scheduling and programming for Delta Sigma Pi. Many details about the many exciting convention events will be published in the Spring, 1991 issue of THE DELTASIG. In this issue, preliminary information is provided for your initial planning purposes and there is a wealth of information about Washington.

Washington history began some 200 years ago in 1790 when Congress determined it as the site of the capital of the United States of America. From the beginning, it was planned as a grand city by French engineer Pierre L'Enfant and today, a walk along The Mall, the grand promenade of the capital, provides clear testimony of the quality of the cityscape.

The number one industry of Washington is, of course, government. Its influence is pervasive as evidenced by the seemingly countless governmental buildings. The second largest industry is tourism and this city is a delight for all. Over twenty million visitors from all over the world come to Washington each year. The many buildings, monuments, museums, galleries and other attractions are, for the most part, free of admission charges making for a wealth of experiences at little or no cost.

The Mall, a two mile long open green and reflecting pools, serves as the focal point of the city. Along this expanse are gleaming marble, columned buildings that clearly signify that this is the seat of power in this nation. At one end is The Capitol located on a hill that L'Enfant described as "a pedestal waiting for a monument." In this vicinity are a number of other interesting buildings including; the Supreme Court Building, the Library of Congress, and the Botanic Gardens.

At the opposite end of The Mall can be found the colossal Lincoln Memorial, the moving Vietnam Veterans Memorial, the stunning Washington Monument and the Jefferson Memorial which dominates the south bank of the Tidal Basin.

Along the central area of The Mall are the Smithsonian Museums. The average visitor to the Smithsonian can spend days among the various exhibits in order to begin to see just a small portion of the 75 million items in its collection. The major museums include: the National Museum of Natural History with its impressive displays of dinosaurs and other animals to the spectacular 44.5 karat Hope Diamond; the National Museum of American History with its displays of American commerce and industry as well as the gallery of the Inaugural Ball gowns of the first ladies; the National Air and Space Museum which is the most visited of all with its displays of Lindbergh's Spirit of St. Louis to actual space orbiters, and the Freer Gallery of Art as well as the National Portrait Gallery and the National Museum of American Art.

Of course, no visit would be complete without seeing The White House, home of President and Mrs. Bush and Millie. Tours of The White House are available on a limited basis and VIP tours are available by writing your Congressman in advance of your visit.

A sobering yet impressive site to visit is Arlington National Cemetery located a short distance over the Potomac River in Virginia. It is the final resting place of thousands of members of the military. The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier with its impressive hourly changing of the guard ceremony and the John F. Kennedy gravesite with its Eternal Flame are among the most visited areas within the cemetery. Also in Northern Virginia are historic Alexandria and Mount Vernon, the home of our first President, George Washington.

Washington is more than just a city of government, politics and monuments. It is a vibrant city with charming and historic neighborhoods. Perhaps the most widely known of them is Georgetown, home of Georgetown University and Mu Chapter. It is an area of restored Colonial period homes; a center of superb shopping at its many shops and unique boutiques, and a thriving area of nightlife with its endless array of restaurants and nightclubs. Collegiate members will especially enjoy this area but it offers something for everyone!

Adams Morgan is another popular spot with its countless ethnic restaurants and grocery stores, street vendors and colorful festivals. It offers many enjoyable nightspots and a variety of new experiences with dining at reasonable prices. Nearby Dupont Circle is alive with numerous art galleries, outdoor restaurants, elegant Victorian homes and many specialty shops.

Woodley Park is a residential area along Connecticut Avenue with beautiful shaded street and rolling hills. It begins with Rock Creek Park on its southern border and is spread among block after block of restaurants, numerous sidewalk cafes, foreign embassies and art-deco buildings and specialty shops. It provides the perfect setting for the National Zoo, home of the famous Chinese Pandas. Woodley Park is also the setting for our convention headquarters, The Omni Shoreham Hotel.

The Omni Shoreham is an expansive facility which, in its sixty year history, has served as the site for numerous Inaugural Balls and has housed many notables from all walks of life including foreign dignitaries, Presidents and entertainers. It has a long history of quality service in a stately atmosphere.

Upon entering the hotel, one is immediately impressed with the expansive lobby area. The Garden Court offers a large open gathering spot with cocktail service. Both the east and west corridors provide easy access to either of the elevator banks and meeting wings. Monique, the hotel restaurant, is open for breakfast, lunch and dinner and offers a unique dining atmosphere with its multi-colored marble decor.

With nearly 800 rooms and its extensive meeting space, The Shoreham provides the perfect setting for the convention. Having undergone extensive renovation, the hotel offers exquisite guest rooms, a large outdoor pool, lighted tennis courts, a basketball court, a scenic jogging course through Rock Creek Park and a new health club facility.

The winning combination of Washington and The Omni Shoreham Hotel will make for an historic and enjoyable convention for all Deltasigs and their families and friends. In the Spring, 1991 issue of THE DELTASIG, a complete convention guide will appear. This guide will provide

Introducing Your Staff at The Central Office

FROM OXFORD

Situated adjacent to the Miami campus, the building of The Central Office was completed in 1956, and since that time Delta Sigma Pi has grown from 94 chapters to 225 chapters. This dramatic increase in the size of our fraternity has led to many changes at The Central Office in an effort to keep pace with the level of service that our membership has come to expect. Delta Sigma Pi has dedicated itself to offering the best Central Office operation in the fraternity world. Its hiring of a full time Executive Director, Director of Administrative Services, Director of Alumni Development, Director of Chapter Services, two Chapter Consultants and seven full time administrative staff persons back up that commitment. The Central Office has grown to include 13 full time employees and one of the most attractive national fraternity headquarters building in the world. Delta Sigma Pi remains a progressive and dynamic fraternity whose attributes are reflected in the national headquarters, The Central Office.

The Central Office

The Central Office of Delta Sigma Pi is located in the small college town of Oxford, Ohio, roughly 35 miles northwest of Cincinnati in southwestern Ohio. The area surrounding The Central Office is primarily rural, but the town itself serves as the home of Miami University.

It has been a little more than four years since we last presented The Central Office staff to you in The DELTA-SIG Magazine, so we wanted to reintroduce you to many of the people who work at your fraternity's headquarters. There have been several personnel changes and changes in responsibilities in the staff at The Central Office, so this introduction should bring you up to date about the people who work for you.

Since the doors of The Central Office opened in Oxford on September 1, 1956, many men and women have

dedicated part or all of their careers to the service of Delta Sigma Pi at The Central Office. For some, working at The Central Office has been just the start of a career that has taken them to other parts of the country. For these people, working at The Central Office may have just been a one or two year stop in their lives filled with unforgettable memories about working for our fraternity. For others, Oxford has become a permanent home, even after leaving the employment of the fraternity at The Central Office. Still for others, working at The Central Office has served to provide the opportunity, over several years of employment, to develop a professional foundation which has continued elsewhere in the business world. In all cases, working for the national headquarters of Delta Sigma Pi has provided the past and present employees of The Central Office with

many exciting, challenging, rewarding, and sometimes frustrating moments which cannot be experienced in any other line of work.

The members of The Central Office staff are employees of the fraternity. National officers of the fraternity including members of the Board of Directors and District Directors, are employed in diverse occupations throughout the country and devote their volunteer time to perform work for Delta Sigma Pi.

Now, lets meet the members of The Central Office staff in Oxford...

Executive Director Michael J. Mazur, Jr., is the chief operating officer of the fraternity and is responsible for the operations of The Central Office and for the administration of the national programs of our fraternity. His duties are widely diverse and include personnel, convention and meeting planning,



financial administration and public relations. In addition, he is the editor of The DELTASIG Magazine and other official publications of the national fraternity. He represents the fraternity in several fraternal and professional organizations including the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business, the College Fraternity Editors Association and the American Society of Association Executives. He is also the fraternity's emissary to the Professional Fraternity Association. Mike is an initiate of Kappa Chapter at Georgia State University and prior to joining the staff in June, 1981, was employed as an accountant and auditor for several companies in the southeast. He served Delta Sigma Pi as a District Director, Southeastern Regional Director and as a member of the National Executive Committee and the Board of Directors before moving to Oxford. Mike resides


near Oxford, Ohio.
