#### Dear Brother:

During a recent Mass service at my church, a dozen or so teenagers took part in a brief but moving ceremony. They publicly proclaimed to the congregation their desire to receive confirmation and pledged their commitment to study and prepare until the Bishop found them to be ready. (Confirmation is the spiritual "coming of age" for a young adult in the Catholic faith). It was a very impressive ceremony and not all that easy for an average twelve or thirteen year old to do. Afterward I asked my wife "Did we have to do that when we were confirmed?" "No, dear," she replied "It was different in our day".

Now mind you, "our day" was not that many years ago but it did bring to mind how things can change. As I thought about that ceremony, I also recalled how much the performance of the Mass service itself has changed. The Mass was said in Latin, the priest performed the service facing away from the people and the congregation traditionally didn't participate at all. Today, the Mass is said in the congregation's local language, the priest faces the people so they can see what he's doing and the congregation actively participates in many parts of the service. What remarkable changes in just over 25 years or so, especially when you consider they were made by a worldwide organization, with several hundred million members, a large bureaucracy and close to 2,000 years of tradition.

As I thought about some of these changes, especially this brand new approach to confirmation-well, at least brand new to me-I began to wonder if this was really the Church I had grown up with and believed in. But as I looked carefully at these changes, at these new traditions, I could see that the essential teachings and message of the Church are still the same now as then. What has changed is the approach to delivering the message. Saying the Mass in English just seems to make more sense in the U.S. than saying it in Latin. Educating young adults before confirming them in their faith hopefully will make them stronger and more active in their church as they mature and bring forward the next generation. While these new traditions may take a little getting used to, they really aren't a threat to me or the Church and will only help in the long term to build a better and stronger Church.

Tradition. Just saying the word can evoke a powerful emotional response from many people; it reminds us of the way things used to be, of the way we were. Traditions can be a powerful force to join people of different generations and different backgrounds. This is true whether the organization is worldwide, with several hundred million members, a large bureaucracy and close to 2,000 years of history, or it is national, with 150,000 members, a medium bureaucracy and 85 years of history, traditions are important. They can be a positive, motivational force; a means to inspire loyalty and enthusiasm to the organization.

But sometimes we get so caught up in tradition, in the fact that something has always been done in this way or that, that the tradition becomes an end in itself. Whether it's in our business, our Frater-

nity or our chapter, we should keep on asking "Why are we doing things the way we are"? If the answer is something like "We don't know" or "It's always been done that way" then perhaps the tradition is in need of overhaul or replacement. If the answer to the "why" question doesn't make sense, then we need to ask "Should we keep on doing it that way we've been doing it?" "What are the alternatives?" For example, "Why do we want to have 100 collegiate members in our chapter?", "Why do we perform initiation practices not in our Ritual?" "Why do we always have the same professional speakers?" This applies at the Fraternity level as well. For example, "Why does the Executive Committee need to hold conference calls in between meetings?" "Why does this magazine have to look the way it does?" "Why do we have to pay Fraternity dues?" "Why do we need a Risk Management Policy". I'm sure that there are hundreds of similar questions that can be asked at all levels of the Fraternity and your chapter. Whether caused by external forces, or led by internal forces, our methods and practices need to be continually reviewed and asked "why"? Now I realize that this can become a nuisance, sort of like when my four year old constantly asks why about everything. But just like she learns from the answers, so too we learn from the answer to the "why" question. We learn, we grow, we improve ourselves and our organization. We make sure that our traditions serve us, not the other way around.



At the afternoon session, nominations for fraternity volunteer officers will be made and various official reports will be delivered. Later in the afternoon and at the evening session, legislation amending the Bylaws and the Ritual will be considered by the delegates.


#### FRIDAY



October 23rd and 24th, 1993 Chicago, Illinois Officer Training Schools are designed to help fraternity and chapter officers develop and enhance their chapters individually and the fraternity as a whole.

The first Officer Training School in 1993 will be conducted in Anaheim, California as a part of the 39th Grand Chapter Congress. The Officer Training School in Anaheim will offer only topics of interest to collegiate chapter officers. Four additional Training Schools are scheduled for the fall of 1993 and these four schools will offer topics for both collegiate members and volunteer fraternity officials.

Who should attend an Officer Training School? It's really quite simple: all current collegiate chapter officers whether a veteran or newly elected; any collegiate members who aspire to become an officer; alumni Brothers who have an interest in learning the skills to become an effective volunteer fraternity officer; and all current volunteer fraternity officers including District Directors and Regional Directors.

The Benefits of Attending an OTiS are many. For Chapter Officers, you will discover new ideas for enhanced chapter programs. You will be provided with an opportunity to interact with fellow officers for the sharing of solutions to common problems. Additionally, you will be able to enhance your problem solving skills through role playing exercises, and acquire valuable skills in effective chapter management.

On the collegiate level, sessions are planned on Saturday for the specific areas of recruiting, member education and finances. Sessions on general chapter management skills that apply to all operational areas will also be offered. Each moment of the day is designed to develop and enhance the skills and knowledge needed by chapter leaders to provide the best chapter experience for themselves and their fellow members.

For volunteers, you will learn about the duties of a District Director, Regional Director, and even of the Grand President. For volunteer fraternity officials, an abundance of materials designed to broaden their leadership skills will be provided. Educational sessions are scheduled for Sunday at each of the four Officer Training Schools scheduled in October. Volunteers are elected to lead the fraternity and their information needs are especially important to Delta Sigma Pi. The more highly skilled and trained are the volunteers; the stronger the organization.

For everyone, the Officer Training School provides an excellent opportunity to meet and get to know the volunteer and staff leaders of the fraternity, and learn how these Brothers can help you.

Not only will you broaden your knowledge of Delta Sigma Pi on a fraternity-wide basis, but you will also maximize your potential as a fraternity leader.

Registrations are now being accepted for the Officer Training School in Anaheim, California scheduled on August 17, 1993. Brothers may register for this Training School when they register for the Grand Chapter Congress. Registration forms for the remaining four schools will be mailed to all collegiate chapter officers and fraternity officials during the summer months.

The advance registration fee for attending any of the four 1993 Officer Training Schools in October will be \$ 20.00 per attendee (\$ 25.00 on site). This fee includes all printed materials used in the Officer Training School program and a copy of the Training School Workbook. Meals and accommodations are not included as a part of the registration fees.

# Mu Chi Chapter

Installed at the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs

On the morning of January 23, 1993, representatives from collegiate chapters in the Western Province gathered along with national officers for the installation ceremonies of the fraternity's 232nd and newest collegiate chapter as Mu Chi Chapter at the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs, Colorado. This is the fifth chapter established in the state of Colorado and is a part of the Intermountain Region in the Western Province. Grand President William R. Kinsella, Western Provincial Vice President Paul J. P. Garcia, Intermountain Regional Director Joseph L. Goldblatt, Director of Chapter Services Dale M. Clark, Tracy L. Jackson and other members of the Alpha Rho Chapter at the University of Colorado-Boulder, Zeta Kappa Chapter at Western State College and Mu Rho Chapter at Colorado State University comprised the installation team for Mu Chi Chapter which resulted in the initiation of 47 charter members.

Following the installation of the chapter, a reception and banquet was held at the Marriott Hotel in Colorado Springs. Intermountain Regional Director Joseph L. Goldblatt served as Toastmaster for the ceremony. The Invocation was given by Mu Chi Chapter members Mary Haerkorn and Tanya Harrison, and Greetings were extended from Faculty Advisor Thomas J. Zuirlein. A history of the College of Business was presented by Chancellor Dwayne C. Nuzum. Mu Chi Chapter Historian Patricia Haas and Mu Chi Chapter member Chris Richards presented the his-

tory of Chi Chi Chi Colony which became Mu Chi Chapter.

Grand President William R. Kinsella then presented the charge and charter to Chapter President John F. Ryan and Director of Chapter Services Dale M. Clark presented Fraternal Greetings from chapters and members across the country welcoming Mu Chi Chapter.

After determining that there was a need for a fraternity to be organized on the campus of the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs, John Ryan, Jeff Chandler, and Alex Lefur requested information from several organizations in November of 1991. They concluded that Delta Sigma Pi would provide the best opportunity for the professional association between students and the community.

In December, Western Provincial Vice President Paul J. P. Garcia and Richard Blevins, a District Director from the South Pacific Region, visited the campus to discuss Delta Sigma Pi with interested students. After this initial contact, a group of interested students decided to begin the Chi Chi Chi Colony. Additional materials were sent to these students and organizational meetings were held throughout the winter break to study the material and laws of Delta Sigma Pi.

On January 23, 1992 a letter was received at The Central Office from Dean James T. Rothe authorizing the establishment of a chapter of Delta Sigma Pi on the campus of the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs. A letter of intent was received from the students on January 30, 1992. The first colony meeting was also held on this date with 31 business students in attendance. The colony held 13 business meetings and 10 executive committee meetings throughout the spring and summer semesters.

On February 24, 1992, The Central Office received a roster of members, minutes from past meetings, and a list of officers. On February 27, 1992 the colony held their first professional speaker, Jena Herman from the Better Business Bureau. By March, the colony had elected 10 officers, established six committees, and were developing bylaws and a calendar of activities. Individual officer packets were sent to the officers.

In April, 1992 Scott Dinius, District Director for Iota Lambda Chapter at Indiana-Purdue University, visited Chi Chi Chi Colony while on a trip to Colorado. He answered questions on different topics, especially recruiting, and encouraged as many members as possible to attend the Officer Training School during the summer.

On May 2, 1992 the colony participated in its first community service event and adopted a 2 1/2 mile stretch of road near the university to clean up trash on the right of ways. Member teams also participated in the Adopt-A-Park Program, sponsored by the Parks and Recreation Department.

In September, 1992 Chapter Consultant Carla S. May visited Chi Chi Chi Colony. She attended an executive committee meeting and a chapter business meeting and answered questions about the pledge program and the expectations of each of them. She stressed the importance of learning fraternal history.

A calendar or activities, outlining events planned through January of 1993 was submitted in October, 1992. Bylaws were received at The Central Office on November 2, 1992, and in November, 1992 their petition for a chapter charter was ap-

proved by our Board of Directors.

The University of Colorado at Colorado Spring was originally established as the Colorado Springs Extension Center, administered by the University of Colorado at Boulder, and was housed at various temporary downtown locations in its early years. In 1964, the Cragmor Foundation gifted 82.5 acres of land at the foot of Austin Bluffes in northeast Colorado Springs to the University of Colorado, which is the current location of the university. In the 1970's, a separate library facility, sciences building, and the first phase of the student center were constructed. With further land donations, the campus area grew to the present 420 acres. The most recent phase of construction included the Engineering Building and expansion of the University Center. Plans for the expansion of the graduate programs and construction of a research park and residential housing are underway.

The university is one of four campuses

in the University of Colorado system, and its standards and course offerings are closely coordinated with that system. The university is a commuter institution offering divisions in the College of Letters, Arts and Sciences, College of Engineering and Applied Science, Education, Graduate School of Business Administration and Graduate School of Public Affairs.

The University of Colorado at Colorado Springs received NCA accreditation and full university status in 1972. A year-round instructional program consisting of a 16-week spring and fall semester and an 8-week summer semester are operated at this campus. The university celebrated its 25th anniversary in 1991 with a student body of 6,000 students. In its 25-year history 9,582 students have graduated from the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs.

The College of Business was established at the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs in 1965 and is the only business college in Southern Colorado with American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business accreditation, and is one of about 300 nationwide with AACSB accreditation for its MBA program. Majors in the undergraduate program include Accounting, Finance, Information systems, Information Systems/Accounting, Organizational Management, Marketing, Personnel-Human Resources Management, Production/Operations Management, Public Agency Administration, and Small Business Management. MBA degrees are also offered in all of the above areas. Approximately 625 students are currently enrolled in the College of Business.





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# Delta Sigma Pi Career Achievement Award

Recently, at a special recognition luncheon, William R. (W.R.) Howell, Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer of J.C. Penney Company, Inc., was presented with the Deltasig Career Achievement Award. Instituted three years ago, Brother Howell is the first recipient of this recognition.

A native of Claremore, Oklahoma, Brother Howell was initiated by the Beta Epsilon Chapter at the University of Oklahoma in 1956 and graduated in 1958 with a B.B.A. in Business Management. He also holds an Honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree from Saint Peter's College in Jersey City, New Jersey.

Howell has been with J.C. Penney for his entire professional life. He began in 1958 as a management trainee in Tulsa, Oklahoma and held a variety of store management positions in Norman and Oklahoma City. In 1971 he was transferred to the New York Headquarters as small stores coordinator in regional operations. During the 1970's and early 1980's, he was promoted to a variety of positions and, in 1983, was named chairman of the board and CEO.

Brother Howell led the associates of J.C. Penney through a major change when the corporate headquarters was moved from New York to Dallas, Texas. During December, 1992, over 3,300 associates of J.C.
