

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FOCUS ON THE FRATERNITY

One of the joys of serving as Grand President is welcoming new chapters into our fraternity. During the past few months I had the privilege of attending installation ceremonies for three new chapters. Nu Xi at the University of Missouri-Kansas City, Nu Omicron at Our Lady of Holy Cross College, and Nu Pi at Kennesaw State College are all fine additions to our fraternal family. Our new Brothers are to be commended for their hard work and dedication.


Expansion of Delta Sigma Pi to additional college campuses continues to be a priority item as we plan for the next millennium. In addition to our three new chapters, we currently have 14 colonies across the nation. These groups are at various stages in the colonization process, which leads to their installation as a collegiate chapter. We anticipate installing a significant number during the coming year.

Our success in expansion has been, and will continue to be, contingent upon a number of factors; first, is the ability to identify potential expansion locations and secure permission to begin the colonization process; second, is the support of current Deltasigs who volunteer their

time and efforts throughout the process; third, are the efforts of the students themselves; fourth, is the support of the college's administration and faculty; and fifth, is the monitoring and support provided by our staff.

We have been quite successful in securing permission to begin colonization efforts on campuses that have been targeted for expansion. Much of this success is due to the benefits we offer students and schools, as well as the excellent reputation our existing chapters have established on their own campuses. Given the established communication channels among most business school deans, maintaining that reputation continues to be critical to our success.

Establishing new chapters through our colonization process is very labor-intensive. It requires the time and efforts of many individuals. The minimum standards our procedures demand require significant planning and implementation on the part of colony members. These standards are similar to those we expect our active collegiate chapters to maintain on a recurring basis.

While the colony members themselves must take the initiative, we have found that the guidance, support, and dedication of numerous volunteers and staff are often critical keys that distinguish success from failure. In addition, the on-campus support and encouragement provided by faculty and administration is crucial. The fraternity owes a debt of gratitude to these individuals for their efforts.

Continuous, planned and sustainable growth is the hallmark of any successful member-based organization. Delta Sigma Pi is no exception As an international fraternity, we must continue to recruit and install new chapters, just as our existing collegiate and alumni chapters must recruit new members.

As a Deltasig you can play a valuable role in our recruiting and expansion efforts. There are many opportunities (with varying levels of commitment) for interested members to be involved in this aspect of fraternity operations. Grand President Randy L. Hultz then presented the charge and charter to Chapter President Eric W. Chelline, and Director of Chapter Services Dale M. Clark presented Fraternal Greetings from chapters and Brothers across the country

The University of Missour Kansas City was spawned by city built at the origin of the Oregon and Santa Fe trails. These roadways to the West began at Old Westport, just few miles from the present campus. In the 1890's, talk of founding a university in Kan City became an increasing pa of the city's sense of growth but it was not until the 1920 that talk turned to action who the Chamber of Commerce appointed a committee to consider the possibility of a university.

Finally, in 1929, the charter for the University of Kansas City was granted. In 1933 the University of Kansas City announced that classes would begin. Impetus for growth we provided by the affiliation of several professional schools with the university, which added to the prestige already established by a strong Collegof Arts and Sciences.

On July 25, 1963, the University of Kansas City became part of the University of Missouri System. The university's name was chang in 1963, and the campus has experienced unparalleled growth since then. Enrollment has more than doubled, reach

Cross College in
New Orleans,
Louisiana, is the
home of Nu Omicron
Chapter of Delta
Sigma Pi, the
fraternity's 236th
collegiate chapter, and the 11th
in the state of Louisiana. During
the installation on May 7, 1994,
48 collegians, six Faculty
Members, and two Honorary
Members joined the ranks of
our Brotherhood.

In 1851, the Sisters of Marianites began to build the Immaculate Conception Industrial School to instruct orphan girls. This parent school of Our Lady of Holy Cross was dedicated in 1866. To prepare teachers for the many schools the Marianites opened in Southern Louisiana, the Louisiana State Board of Education granted the Marianites the right to open a Normal School in 1916 which functioned as Holy Cross Normal. In 1938, the Louisiana State Department of Education approved a program which would lead to the conferring of the Bachelor of Arts Degree.

In the spring of 1960, the college moved to its new quarters and changed its name to Our Lady of Holy Cross College and, in 1967, the first

men were admitted. The degree program has now expanded to include Business Administration, Humanities, Natural Sciences, Nursing, Social Sciences, and graduate studies in Education and Marriage and Family Therapy.

The Division of Business and Economics was established in 1976. Originally, degrees were offered in accounting and general business administration but, over the years, management and marketing degrees have been added to the curriculum.

In 1989, a group of business students at Our Lady of Holy Cross College organized and formed the Business Leadership Association known on campus as B.L.A. The purpose of B.L.A. was to form a group specifically for business majors in order to represent the Division of Business and Economics at collegiate events, sponsor social gatherings and community service projects, establish long lasting friendships between fellow business students, and to sponsor and promote activities that would enhance the professional development of the business students.

The officers of the Business Leadership Association recognized the need to affiliate with an international fraternal organization and found a close match to their own purpose with the International Fraternity of Delta Sigma Pi. Steps were taken to colonize and the Business Leadership Association became Beta Lambda Alpha Colony of Delta Sigma Pi in November of 1991.

Deltasigs from throughout the Southern Province, and nationwide, gathered in New Orleans, Louisiana, on May 7, 1994, for the installation of Nu Omicron Chapter at Our Lady of Holy Cross College. Members of the installation team included Grand President Randy L. Hultz, Southern Provincial Vice President Elizabeth M. Keith, Gulf South Regional Director Sherry G. Flood, Executive Director Michael J. Mazur and Brothers from Delta Nu Chapter at Loyola University, Epsilon Nu Chapter at the University of New Orleans and Eta Upsilon Chapter at the University of West Florida.



On October 9, 1963, the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia voted to locate a junior college in Cobb County. The college was scheduled to open in the fall of 1966, but a series of labor disputes plagued construction and temporary arrangements were made to accommodate the 1,014 students who had registered. In January of 1967, they moved into the permanent quarters at Kennesaw Junior College.

On April 14, 1977, the Regents approved a proposal to convert to a four-year liberal arts college and the word "junior" was taken out of the name. In 1983, the college's division of study was reorganized into four schools. One of these was The School of Business.

In 1988, Kennesaw College added the word "state" to its name to better define itself as a four-year, public institution. Kennesaw State College's graduate program offerings have grown dramatically during the past few years and over 12,000 students are currently enrolled.

The Michael J. Coles School of Business Administration is one of four academic schools at Kennesaw State College. The School was created in 1983, and now has the largest enrollment of the four schools. Over 3,000 of the more than 12,000


students at Kennesaw State
College are business majors.
The School is organized into
five departments; Accounting,
Decision Science and Business
Law, Economics and Finance,
Management and Entrepreneurship, and Marketing and
Professional Sales. During
1993, two more degree programs became available: the
master of accounting and the
MBA for experienced professionals.

Kappa Sigma Chi Colony came into being in October of 1992. In May of 1992, past Director of Chapter Services C. Dean Ferguson and past Southeastern Regional Director John A. Watton visited with Dean Timothy S. Mescon to investigate the possibility of starting a chapter of Delta Sigma Pi on the Kennesaw State College campus. Permission to start recruiting was given for the upcoming fall quarter. In September of 1992, invitations for a recruiting event were sent to students of the School of Business and members of the Atlanta Alumni Chapter were in attendance to help with recruiting efforts. During October the group conducted an organizational meeting and submitted their formal intent to petition Delta Sigma Pi for a chapter charter. Director of Chapter Services Dale M. Clark visited the colony on October 20, 1992, and provided ideas on recruit-

Chapter Consultant James E. Leingang visited the group on January 20-21, 1993, and met with officers individually. Two members of the colony attended Grand Chapter Congress in Anaheim, California, and in September of 1993, Chapter Consultant Kathleen R. Dinius visited the colony for a consultation on all operations.
