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# Six Degrees of Delta Sigma Pi

ersonal networks can be very powerful and we are supposedly all connected to each other through a short string of people we know. In this article, I am going to emphasize and elaborate, with some personal examples, on the power of

the Delta Sigma Pi network.

Once initiated, a brother is a brother, yet this means different things to different people throughout their life. I invite you to take a short walk through my life and see how the Delta Sigma Pi network has enriched me personally, professionally, and materially.

#### Personal Enrichment: The College Experience

College is fun, exciting and a wonderful experience. College is also expensive, stressful and an overwhelming experience. The needs of balancing studying time, family responsibilities and potentially a job, produces stress, anxiety and blood-shot eyes. Huge doses of caffeine and those extra checks from parents can only help so much. What truly got me through college were the skills I learned in the Gamma Omega Chapter at Arizona State. While my coursework was important, the chapter taught me time management, teamwork, goal setting, and leadership. These are the skills most needed and desirable in the working world. The personal enrichment came not by simply learning these skills, but learning them with my brothers. By working in a friendship-filled chapter, I was able to learn and practice these skills in a supportive environment. Sure, I experienced drama and anxiety, but by sharing the burden with my brothers, and being able to ask them for advice and support, the problems were never insurmountable.

#### Professional Enrichment: Newly Graduated

After graduation, and some years of work, I was baffled and confused. I thought to myself, "How could this be? I've been working for five (or so) years now and I'm not a CEO. I don't have an expense account or my own assistant. I must have skipped a step somewhere."

No, I hadn't done anything wrong, but I was frustrated with the slow, although normal progression of my professional life. I didn't know what to do. I thought that perhaps an MBA was a good choice, but I needed some advice. I turned to my Delta Sigma Pi network for the answer. I contacted the Central Office, purchased an alumni directory and began a huge letter writing campaign. The response rate I received was excellent and I had the opportunity to speak to several people of significant authority in the business world. Some of the Deltasigs I contacted were: Karen Hendricks, a former Senior Vice President for the Dial Corporation and CEO of Baldwin Piano; Eduardo Aguirre, then a bank president, and now Ambassador to the Kingdom of Spain and the Principality of Andorra; and Victor Kiam, the CEO and Chairman of the Board of Remington Corporation. These three recognized leaders in their respective fields provided me great advice and insight. Who gets corporate CEOs to return their calls? Why, brothers in Delta Sigma Pi, that's who!

# Material Enrichment: An Established Professional

After completing my MBA and demonstrating success in the fields of IT and management consulting, I got the house bug. I'd put off a house purchase, because, basically, I lived in paradise (otherwise known as the Belmont Shore area in Long Beach, Calif.). Unfortunately, living in paradise made house buying expensive. The typical house was \$400,000

for approximately 1000 square feet. One could find a deal for \$350,000— that is, if you had your own gun, bulletproof vest and didn't mind crack dealers for neighbors! In the summer of 2003, I set a goal of being a homeowner before the end of the year, but was having no luck. In the first week of November, I called Larry, a friend and brother, in Arizona. I related my challenge to him and asked if he knew of anybody who could help me buy an investment property in Arizona, a place less burdened with fantasy house prices. "Of course—Billy!" was his immediate reply. Billy, also a brother, and I had met years prior. He had 15+ years of experience in real estate and owned several investment properties himself. I called Billy, explained my intent and he was receptive to the idea. I called him on a Monday, submitted an offer a couple of days later, and on Saturday my offer was accepted. Twentyfour days later, I was the full owner and was reviewing the application of a potential renter. I'd not seen the house when I purchased it, and as of right now, the house has appreciated roughly 100%.

As you see, the power of networking is incredibly valuable. Our Delta Sigma Pi experience has, continues to, and will continue to enrich us in many ways. Take advantage of the power of networking and utilize Delta Sigma Pi for the richness of its membership of professional, ethical and success-minded brothers. # The History of Delta Sigma Pi: 1947 to 1959 – Post War to Rock 'n Roll

This is Part 7 of a 10-part Centennial Series, begun in the July '04 issue.

1947 was a special year for Delta Sigma Pi. Rationing had ended and wartime travel restrictions lifted. In 1943 and 1945, the Grand Council (Board of Directors) had meetings in Chicago that were considered to be Grand Chapter Congresses due to travel restrictions. But now the Fraternity was free to gather in Congress (during the war years there could not be gatherings or conventions of 50 or more people). The city of Minneapolis was chosen for the first post-war Grand Chapter Congress and over 125 brothers attended.

Of the many decisions made at this Congress, a few stand out. A new position of Assistant Grand Secretary-Treasurer had been added and Brother James D. Thomson, *Northwestern-Chicago*, had been hired. Gig Wright was getting older and plans needed to be





made for the day in which Gig would choose to retire. This would still be some time off in the future.

Even though the Life Membership Program began in 1930, at the start of the Great Depression, by 1947 the National Endowment Fund had grown to over \$50,000 (from 1600 life members). The National Endowment Fund was the recipient of all proceeds from the sales of life memberships (which were originally priced at \$35). Collegiate discounts were approved in 1947 to make the purchase by collegians easier.

The NEF could also be used for student loans, chapter house loans, and was available to the National Fraternity if necessary. In fact, however, Gig Wright had been so skillful in protecting all the assets of the Fraternity throughout the entire war that by war's end the Fraternity was in relatively good shape, financially speaking.

#### A Ground-Breaking 1949 Congress

Baltimore was chosen as host city for the 1949 Grand Chapter Congress. This proved to be the first of several Congresses that took up the discussion of some heavy topics. The first was the removal of the "Selective Membership" requirements from our constitution and bylaws. This was a very emotional topic for collegians and alumni alike. Some preferred to refer to these membership requirements as "restrictive membership" requirements. You had your choice

of terms. Basically, Fraternity membership rules stated that only "males of Caucasian race, of Christian faith" were eligible to join Delta Sigma Pi. This issue came to the forefront in 1949 because some schools threatened to throw chapters off campus, or refused to allow new chapters to be installed, if we didn't remove the "selective membership" requirements.

These membership requirements had been in force since the 1920s, and were not considered to be improper or wrong by a large segment of the Fraternity membership during the 30 years prior to this Congress. In fact, a large segment of the U.S. population did not consider these race or creed restrictions to be wrong or improper in other areas of society. Today, it is hard for us to understand how such rules could have been approved here, in America. But in those years in which these rules were in force, there was sufficient support that kept them from being removed. Many argued we had the basic right to choose whomever we accepted as our brother. Nonetheless, the "selective membership" requirements were removed from the national bylaws and constitution. But the issue was far from resolved.

Also of significance at this Congress was the change to the "Preamble," or statement of purpose of Delta Sigma Pi. This was the first, and so far only, time the original wording of the purpose has been changed. The words "and social activity" were added. The reason for this (since no one in the brotherhood needed the clarification!) is that many schools were beginning to refer to Delta Sigma Pi as an honorary or recognition fraternity, not a true fraternity which we were and remain today.

Other items started or approved at this Congress included a new headquar-

ters building fund, a testimonial of appreciation certificate for alumni (approved by the Grand Council), a retirement fund for Gig Wright, and the approval of the 'Deltasig of the Year' award. In addition, a committee was set up of Boston area alumni to look into the possibility of an educational foundation being established. When little came of this committee, Gig Wright asked Grand President W. C. Sehm to appoint Bostonian Walton Juengst, New York, as the committee chairman. He did, and things quickly began to happen. The end result, the Delta Sigma Pi Educational Foundation, would come into being in 1953.

#### **Hazing is Discussed**

The 1951 Grand Chapter Congress was held in Dallas. The Korean War was about a year old, but as this "Police Action" would not attain the size of World War II, its impact on Delta Sigma Pi would be relatively minimal. There would be no rationing or travel restrictions. One of the main discussion issues of this Congress was hazing. Fraternities were beginning to take a stand on the

issue, hoping to ban the tradition of physical hazing. But many fraternities, including our own, were luke-warm when it came to mental hazing. Coupled with this was the continued effort to change the traditional "hell week" to a more purposeful "help week." For many Deltasig chapters, a change went from having a "hell week" to a "hell night." The issue of hazing would be debated well into the 1980s, and remains a challenge today.

In 1953, the Korean War came to an end and Deltasigs would gather in Denver for the next Congress. The Delta Sigma Pi Educational Foundation conducted its first meeting in conjunction with the Grand Chapter Congress, a tradition that was maintained all through its history, and now has become the tradition of the Board of Trustees of the Delta Sigma Pi Leadership Foundation. The building fund for a new Fraternity headquarters had reached more than \$6,000. Locations were being considered including Evanston, Illinois and Oxford, Ohio. Gig Wright formally announced his desire to retire.

# A Legend Retires and the Central Office Moves

In a report to the 1953 Grand Chapter Congress, Past Grand President Allen L. Fowler noted, in part, the following: "For some years your Grand Council has thought about and discussed the possibility and the practicality of creating an educational foundation which could take over, and perhaps enlarge upon, some of the activities now being carried on by the Fraternity. The original thinking was to the effect that we should turn over the assets of our National Endowment Fund to this new Foundation, and that, upon payment of the \$50 life membership fee, a brother would automatically become a member of the Foundation. This was on the assumption that certain activities of Delta Sigma Pi, such as the alumni placing service, the publication of The DELTASIG, the biennial survey, scholarship keys, and chapter and student loans could be taken over by the new Educational Foundation."

After discussions with the U.S. Treasury Department, it was determined much of the original thinking would have to be scrapped, and there would have to be a "complete technical divorcement" of the Foundation management from that of the Fraternity. Such were the rules governing educational foundations in the 1950s. This led to the further discussions that \$50 (in 1950s valuation) was not a large enough amount to charge for a life membership considering the things that the Fraternity had hoped the Foundation could do. Once the life membership amount had been paid it was feared there may be no incentive for a brother to continue giving over the years. In the end, it was decided the National Endowment Fund of Delta Sigma Pi would not be transferred to the new Educational Foundation. The only area of "overlapping" purposes was in the area of student loans, which the National Endowment Fund could also make, but this was not considered to be a problem.

Detroit was the host city for the 1955 Grand Chapter Congress. Gig Wright, who had devoted so much of his life to the development of the Fraternity over a 35 year period, would soon retire. The new Central Office building would be dedicated to Brother Wright for his

extraordinary service. Also discussed at this Congress was the establishment of an alumni chapter franchise fee, an alumni chapter ritual, and the creation of a uniform alumni chapter membership card.

The Golden Anniversary of Delta Sigma Pi was celebrated in New York City at the Grand Chapter Congress. On May 18, 1957, the new Central Office building was officially dedicated to Gig Wright.

In 1959, the Grand Chapter Congress was held in Cincinnati. Grand Secretary-Treasurer James D. Thomson reported that the new building in Oxford, Ohio was working out just fine, in spite of almost nothing being ready upon their arrival in 1956. Hazing is still an issue. But the "Selective Membership" requirement is working out.

#### Jennifer Smith Braves the Bulls in Pamplona!



For many brave souls looking to experience an incredible adrenaline rush, The Festival of San Fermin in Pamplona, Spain is home to one of the world's most exciting and dangerous traditions. A seven day celebration, the festival Fermin is known for its infamous and equally dangerous tradition of the running of the bulls. For Jennifer Smith, *Miami-Florida*, the tradition was something she always wanted to partake in, and was on the agenda for her and three friends during their vacation throughout Spain.

Brother Smith and three friends planned a two-week trip to Spain, with stops ranging from Barcelona to Seville, with a stop in Pamplona, home of the Festival of San Fermin. After arriving in Pamplona the first morning of the festival, Smith and her traveling companions lined up at 6:00 AM and awaited their chance to participate in this age-old tradition. At 8:00 AM, a missile was launched to announce the corral gates had opened and the bulls were making their way to the 3,000 anxious runners. For Smith, the run started no different than for most participants, a fast run through the streets of Pamplona with many a bull whizzing by. After several bulls passed, and many of the runners had dispersed, Jennifer believed herself to be in the clear, "We knew the bulls had made their way through to the bullring, yet we didn't expect to see the two bulls behind us who were separated from the

pack." She and her friend attempted to run and in the process became separated. "My friend fell as we were running, and covered her head to keep safe. I kept running and tried to climb onto the bars of a nearby window, but it was too late," said Smith. At that moment, an aggravated bull charged, and gored Jennifer in her left leg.

The next thing Smith remembers is waking up in a Spanish hospital surrounded by family. After suffering a deep leg wound and brain injuries, what started off as a relaxing vacation soon took a serious turn. After nearly a month in the hospital fighting off an infection in her leg and recovering from brain swelling and bleeding, Smith was on her way to making a full recovery, and was able to return home. Footage of Smith's experience in Pamplona made it back to the United States, and led Jennifer to another unique experience, albeit one slightly more enjoyable.

"A friend of mine was attending *The Late Show with David Letterman*, and was asked if he knew of anyone who might have anything interesting for their audience show and tell segment," said Smith. After being contacted by the staff at the show, Brother Smith was invited to come share her story live on the show. "I was excited to meet Dave and tell him my story, but I knew he had a reputation for being very quick witted. When he asked if I traveled into the city by bridge or tunnel, I just said 'bus,' I was so nervous." Smith was able to both share her story and the video footage with the studio audience and viewers at home. After being asked to reflect on her experience in Pamplona, she told Letterman, "Looking back, it was an exciting experience, but I wouldn't do it again!"

#### Todd Graver Aids in Katrina Evacuation

The New Orleans area experienced some close calls in the years before Hurricane Katrina struck, giving many a false sense of security in late August 2005. But Todd Graver, *Nicholls State*, was prepared. As human resources manager for the New Orleans-based Freeport-McMoRan Services Company, Graver was in charge of the firm's evacuation and recovery from the massive storm.

Brother Graver said his company had a disaster recovery plan and two prior evacuations in 2004 and 2005 (hurricanes Dennis and Ivan respectively) gave them chances to improve on their plan before Hurricane Katrina hit. Even with prior experience and preparation, he said the days following the hurricane were still a nightmare come true. "The day after the hurricane hit, we met with company executives and sent out immediate emergency aid to all employees in the affected area. In all, of our 180 employees, 14 had homes totaled, many others experienced damage and only 38 were unaffected," Todd said. For Todd, the hardest part of the ordeal was the lack of communications in the first few days.

"Cell phones and land lines did not work and you could not find out what happened to family and friends. The only communication that worked was text messaging from a cell phone," he replied. Hurricane Katrina taught him that, like any situation brothers may encounter in their job, there is always room for improvement and to follow your plans because when things start to happen, it is too hard to think of everything. Todd said lessons learned in Deltasig helped him through this ordeal. "I think the most important thing I learned was building relationships and gaining a consensus. That is something you need to do in the business world every day, and it's something we did in planning and implementing events like our projects and fundraisers for hurricane relief," he explained. His focus now is on preparing for the 2006 hurricane season.



# Jared Katz in the Business of Lasagna Chips

he year was 1988. Lainie Katz, who for years had made lasagna chips for her family and friends, decided to start a small business to sell her tasty treats. Fast forward to 2006 where A&J Snack Foods, Inc., has begun to take off—albeit under different management. Lainie's son Jared Katz, *New Orleans*, picked up the idea in 2003 after a long layoff.

This business wasn't Jared's first venture. After graduating with a degree in financial economics from Tulane in 1993, Brother Katz immediately pursued graduate school at New Orleans. After realizing that wasn't for him, Jared traveled to Israel for three years. When he returned, he took a short-lived position on Wall Street—just as the post-9/11 recession reached its height.

"My wife asked me, 'What are you going to do now?'" Katz recalled. Nothing was opening on Wall Street. Academia had already proven unsuccessful. But almost like a light bulb switching on, Jared, now 35, remembered his mother's attempt at manufacturing.

"She had no idea what was involved going into manufacturing, so after a year she closed shop," Katz said. "There were

many mistakes made," including equipment, packaging, marketing, location and other factors. So when Brother Katz made up his mind to go into the snack food business, he did his homework. "The toughest part is you have to teach yourself how to do everything," Katz said, "from fixing linear form and seal machines, to replacing broken bearings. Half the time I was asking myself, "This is what I went to graduate school for?"

Katz faced numerous other challenges, including securing a sensible location, purchasing the right factory equipment, establishing relationships with suppliers, and hiring affordable, reliable labor. He also fell victim to an out-of-state web developer who took his money and ran. "If you think starting a manufacturing venture from scratch is difficult, multiply it by a million," Katz said.

After fixing several production issues in 2005, the hard work and countless hours of research began to pay off for the Brooklyn, N.Y.-based company. In addition to featuring the products at trade shows in San Francisco, Chicago and New York this year, Katz recently found distributors and retailers interested in the lasagna chips. "We're getting an unbelievable response," Katz

said. "I don't want to shoot myself in the foot by mentioning names, but we should be in stores all over the country within the next year." Beyond attaining wider distribution, Katz has further plans for A&J Snack Foods. "Right now we have four flavors in two sizes," Katz said. "We want to exhaust the pasta chip idea, with more colors, seasonings, and other variations."

Brother Katz is a great example of having patience to find his place, which he truly thought was on Wall Street. But even more than that, he had the right background for it. As for his collegiate years in Deltasig, he recalls pledging, golfing, and "all the good times spent together" with his brothers. As his chapter's treasurer, he took the initiative to switch from recording transactions on paper to using Quicken, which has helped him in using QuickBooks today. "The motivation and ability to take on a leadership position carries you throughout life. When you want to accomplish something or improve upon something in business, you have to stay focused and communicate your goals." Katz said. "This was the major lesson I took with me from Delta Sigma Pi."

Ultimately, Katz believes that people want to see the results of their job. For him, it's all worthwhile when he sees the product shipping out and on shelves in stores, or when he hears from a satisfied customer. "That's closure," Katz said. "Every day is closure."

# 1975— A Historic Year for Deltasig as Women Officially Join the Brotherhood

merica's Foremost Business Fraternity for Men and Women Pursuing Careers in Business. This phrase has not always defined our Fraternity. In fact, it took almost 60 years since our founding, along with major changes in our nation and influential leaders within our organization, for any adjustment to be made.

Since our founding in 1907, Delta Sigma Pi has experienced and celebrated many firsts: the first issue of the magazine in 1912, the first Biennial Survey in 1926, the first Grand Chapter Congress in 1914, and many others. It is important to recognize that each event is responsible for shaping the Fraternity into the successful, well-established organization it is today. However, it was not until the 1970s that this ground-breaking transformation occurred, changing the image of the Fraternity, as well as bringing new meaning to the term "brother."

Following the relatively quiet 50s and 60s came the everchanging 70s, where national and universal issues affected the way Deltasig functioned. First was the Vietnam War, where the most intense years heavily affected college campuses. Most fraternities were considered "establishments" and, combined with social upheaval in campus life caused by the war, produced an obvious decrease in Deltasig's membership.

Second, the implementation of Title IX of the Higher Education Act. It was found that not only collegiate athletics, but college-based professional fraternities, sororities, and other organizations discriminated via single-sex membership requirements.

This led to the third and most pressing issue for Delta Sigma Pi in the 1970s—the debate over co-educational membership. Beginning in 1973, there were several attempts to amend the constitution to allow female members in the Fraternity, all of which failed. It was not until the 1975 Grand Chapter Congress that the Board of Directors used their emergency powers to authorize all chapters of Delta Sigma Pi to initiate any qualified female business student into the Fraternity. From that day forward, "brother" took on a whole new meaning. The act of the board was officially ratified by the Grand Chapter Congress at the Lake of the Ozarks (Missouri) Congress in 1975.

### **Blazing the Trail**

Former Executive Director Charles Farrar stated in his memoirs that Dr. Kathryn Duffy, Nevada-Reno, was the first female member of the Fraternity. According to Brother Farrar, she was the chapter advisor when the chapter was installed and continued in that role until her retirement. There are other claims to "first female," as other women were initiated at various chapters during this period—some openly, but more via initials and such to disguise the gender. While the title to "first" is debatable, Brother Duffy (now deceased) and her peers will forever be recognized as truly historic pledges.

Laurie Gail Senko was one of the first women to be initiated into Gamma Omega Chapter at Arizona State. During her chapter's 50th Anniversary banquet in 2001. Senko recalled several fond memories as one of the first females in Deltasig. A highlight was seeing fellow Gamma Omega Linda Kay Vawter receive her Silver Helmet-she and Laurie were the first female brothers to be awarded this honor.

Senko said overall reaction to her chapter's female brothers was very positive. She says the male members treated them much like little sisters, or daughters by the older members. She shares, "There were a few chapters across the country who did not initiate women for many years and a few chapters who ended up having their charter revoked due to their lack of acceptance of women (and other violations). Some brothers were openly hostile to women, but most were not. It didn't take long for them to realize that women are hard workers and good at organizing events, and they appreciated our help with the many projects that a pledge class and chapter must accomplish in order to achieve their operating goals."

Women were quickly elected to positions of leadership within the chapters and Gamma Omega elected their first female president in 1977. Senko recalls, "After a few years, the number of female members grew and we made up nearly half our chapter before we knew it! At my first Grand Chapter Congress (Toronto in 1977), I recall a quarter of the brothers in attendance being female. By the Atlanta Congress in 1979, our numbers had increased substantially and now women represent at least half of the chapter!"

Having attended 13 Grand Chapter Congresses, Brother Senko has seen and been involved in many important decisions affecting the functionality of the Fraternity. One event she recalls vividly was the debate over what to call the new female members. Tradition was important to Deltasig, but the male members wanted to be sensitive to the feelings and opinions of the female members. With a compelling speech by Gamma Omega's first female president (and Congress delegate) Jan Garland, the other delegates realized each member was equal, whether male or female, and tradition should be upheld. It was at the Toronto Congress in 1977 that it was ruled the official term for all members of Deltasig would remain "brother."

Brother Senko expressed her support for this important decision stating "the meaning of brother refers to a common bond, a sense of brotherhood, and a closeness that I feel toward each of our brothers."

#### **Assuming Leadership Positions**

Theresa Drew, Northern Arizona, was the first woman to serve on the Executive Committee and Board of Directors after being selected as the Undergraduate of the Year (now referred to as Collegian of the Year) in 1979. She, like Brother Senko, was also one of her chapter's first female initiates. Says Drew, "It was probably more of an adjustment for the male members of the Executive Committee than for me, but it was also interesting since I was the youngest member

of the group, having just graduated. I found others to be extremely receptive and very accepting of me and my ideas. A year later, Marilyn (Doskey) Franson was selected as Undergraduate of the Year and so there were two of us serving on Executive Committee at the same time." Brother Drew went on to serve as district director and treasurer of the Phoenix-Thunderbird Alumni Chapter and a Trustee of the Leadership Foundation. She still keeps in touch with several of the brothers who served with her on the Executive Committee. "I still feel that experience not only was a tremendous learning experience for me very early in my career, but has also provided me with life-long friendships with brothers Past Grand President Mike Mallonee, Frank Busch, Past Grand President Bill Tatum and others," says Drew.

In 2001, **Kathy Jahnke**, *Northern Illinois*, made Deltasig history as the first female Grand President. She shares her thoughts on her election—and reaction from male brothers:

"When I was initiated in 1980, many chapters were already co-ed. My first exposure to the fact that Deltasig had been an all-male organization was at my first Grand Chapter in 1981. I realized two things at that convention. First, that some male brothers were not supportive of women in Delta Sigma Pi, although I felt most of the conversations were playful banter, and second, that I wanted to be the first female Grand President.

Little did I know at that time that it would actually take another 20 years for Delta Sigma Pi to have any female candidates for Grand President and elect a female to the position. It took 25 years from the time Delta Sigma Pi initiated its first woman to elect its first female Grand

President—and that Grand President was me.

Many people ask if the road was tough, or if men in the Fraternity did not support me or the idea of a woman as Grand President. To be honest, by the time I was elected Grand President the Fraternity was fully integrated with all coed chapters. Any alumni that were not supportive of female brothers had already disassociated themselves from our organization.

At the 2001 Grand Chapter I was elected Grand President. Many collegians were not even aware a woman had never been Grand President until then. Many chapters already had female leaders and Deltasig already had many women serving as elected leaders. In fact, when I ran for Grand President, my opponent (Beth Keith, *Bowling Green State*) was also a woman so the Fraternity was going to get a woman Grand President one way or the other. I do believe the Fraternity was more excited about the historical fact that a woman was going to be the next Grand President, rather than worry about whether a woman could do the job.

One of my first memories as Grand President that let me know things might be somewhat different was when I presented Bob Hughes, *Pennsylvania*, the 2001 Lifetime Achievement Award. Bob had received many awards over the years, but this presentation was different for him. I gave him the congratulatory Fraternity handshake and he, in turn, thanked me with a kiss. His comment to the crowd was that was the first time he kissed the Grand President upon receiving an award!"

Female brothers certainly have left their mark on the Fraternity and continue to do so. From compelling speeches by Jan Garland in support of equality between male and female members, Theresa Drew becoming the first female member to serve on Executive Committee, women in top leadership roles, and half the attendees of each Grand Chapter Congress being female members, it's clear we've come a long way. These examples serve as reminders of just how far women have come, the goals accomplished, and the endless possibilities for future Deltasig generations.



# Welcome Chapters #259 and #260, **Ohio Dominican and Francis Marion!**

Early this year, 63 charter members were initiated in two new chapter installations. Ohio Dominican in Columbus, Ohio, January 21 and Francis Marion in Florence, S.C., February 11, bring our total number of charters granted, since our founding in 1907, to 260. Both groups were fortunate to have Deltasig alumni members employed on the faculty who served as advisors during the colony efforts.

#### Ohio Dominican Joins the Brotherhood

In November 2002, Brother John Grant, Eastern Illinois, and several students from Ohio Dominican formed a colony after visiting the Central Office. The university had no Greek life, making Deltasig the first to establish a group on campus.

Ohio Dominican is a Catholic university, established in 1911 as a college for women by the Dominican Sisters of St. Mary of the Springs. The college became coeducational in 1964. It is still a small university with under 3000 students and currently undergoing a growth plan to reach 3700 students. About 90% of the business students participate in internship programs in the Columbus area.

During the development process, Omicron Delta Upsilon Colony conducted 14 professional events and eight service events. Topics ranged from hosting an interior design speaker to a Japanese market simulation to touring the Better Business Bureau. The Ronald McDonald House, tax services for elderly, and fifth grade children and hospitalized children all benefited from various projects.

Twenty-seven students and one faculty member joined Dr. Grant to be installed as the Omicron Tau Chapter. Over 15 national officers and Golden Council members attended the event, which was also Grand President Mitch Simmons'

first installation as Grand President. The group was pledged by District Director Suzanne Swire, with chapter members from Ohio, Ohio State, and Dayton assisting.

A formal black and white themed banquet, emceed by Greater Allegheny Regional Vice President Wayne Lauer, was held at the Columbus Airport Marriott. In addition to the charter, presentations of the chapter gavel and scholarship key plaque were made by Northeastern Provincial Vice President Onuka Ibe and Leadership Foundation Trustee Claire Moomjian respectively. Following greeting and adjournment by Director of Chapter and Expansion Services Dale Clark, many parents and friends joined in the celebration with dancing.

#### Francis Marion Follows Three Weeks Later

On February 11, Francis Marion was the site for chartering the Omicron Upsilon chapter with the initiation of 31 students and four faculty. That group was started by marketing professor Mary Dittman, Nevada-Reno. A colony was officially recognized in February 2004.

Their professional program included such events as parliamentary procedure training, stock investment, a web design workshop, presentations on body language, behavior, and professional dress, and a tour of ACS Technology. They began a tutoring program at the Boys and Girls Club and adopted a highway for their ongoing service projects in addition to staffing election polls and ushering for Connections to Success events.

There are close to 4000 students at Francis Marion with just over 800 of them in business. The School of Business was one of the original departments when the college was founded. Both undergraduate and graduate programs are AACSB accredited.

hat makes a good leader? Organizational theorists have advanced countless theories of leadership over the years. **E-Enthusiastic.** A good leader is usually buoyant. He/she builds a sense of excitement, adventure even, among those they lead.

**F-Frank.** A leader is candid, honest and "above board"—always. They are quick to offer sincere praise to others. And quick to offer honest, firm criticism, along with a willingness to help, when things go wrong.

**G–Grateful**. Leaders know they can't accomplish what needs to be done by themselves. They are always eager to show thanks for the efforts of co-workers and staff.

**H–Humble**. However successful a leader may appear, he/she knows much of their success and good fortune is due to those around them. He/she is always generous in the credit they give others.

**L–Listener**. A leader listens. He/she knows that they learn only through others, and are always anxious to hear what they're thinking and feeling.

**M–Masterful.** A good leader is a good strategist. He/she knows how to systematically deploy physical and human resources to get the best results for all.

**N-Neighborly**. A leader acts as a good neighbor to others. They're willing to work with others in a genuine spirit of cooperation—and eager to engage in joint projects and undertakings.

**O–Organized.** A true leader knows how to keep their desk, agenda, and mind clear. They are able to keep tasks and responsibilities in proper order and devote just the right amount of attention to each.

**P-Persistent**. Things may not always happen quite the way a leader wants. But they exhibit tenacity and keep people moving toward important goals—even when they seem elusive.

**Q-Quiet.** A leader doesn't need to be the center of attention. He/she is usually willing to let others take center stage and bask in the limelight.

**R–Relaxed.** A leader knows how to enjoy life on and off the job. And he/she knows how to build and maintain a comfortable, but goal-oriented atmosphere in the workplace.

**S–Sensitive**. A good leader is acutely conscious of the thoughts, concerns and fears of others—and accommodates them in their conversations and actions.

**T–Thoughtful.** A leader is always thinking—about competitors, about new business strategies, about new work methods, about the future. And they inspire forward-looking thinking in others as well.

**Y–Young at Heart.** A leader possesses an ever-present willingness to learn new things, to explore, to test. And while they want to put new ideas to use, they aren't afraid to fall once in a while.

**Z–Zestful**. There's an exuberance, even a child-like eagerness in the heart and soul of a true leader. They happily anticipate the start of each new day and challenge, and are quick to infect others with the same upbeat spirit.
