At the 45th Grand Chapter Congress in Orlando, I promised when I was elected Grand President, I would promote four elements during the biennium: enthusiasm, energy, empowerment and elevation.

With the excitement of the election of a new national leadership team, we all inevitably were thinking about the direction of the Fraternity for the next biennium. We had the added excitement of the upcoming Delta Sigma Pi Centennial Celebration.

Needless to say, we were all stunned by the surreal scenes of the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina, which struck the Gulf Coast of Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama, and the impact it had on New Orleans—one of the architectural and historical gems of America. That terrible storm was followed very shortly by an equally devastating Hurricane Rita, which struck southwestern Louisiana and eastern Texas.

Hurricane Katrina struck especially close to home for me, as I grew up about seventy-five miles north of New Orleans, and most of my family still lives there. Fortunately for my family, the storm veered slightly to the east. While they experienced strong hurricane force winds and copious amounts of rain, and the requisite loss of power and water for two weeks, they were the lucky ones.

Thousands of people on the Gulf Coast are still suffering and need help. Deltasigs were displaced, and (as I write this) two of our chapters, Delta Nu at Loyola-New Orleans, and Nu Omicron at Our Lady of Holy Cross, are closed at least for the fall term—possibly longer.

Many chapters concentrated their community service efforts to aid hurricane victims. On October 16, I participated in one of the largest and most successful fundraising efforts. The West

Palm Beach Alumni Chapter sponsored a Halloween Themed Movie Matinee and Haunted Mansion, raising several thousand dollars for hurricane relief.

It has been humbling to see the outreach of many brothers who have come to the aid of others in need. I encourage all Deltasigs, both collegiate and alumni, to continue your generous giving to those in need. Service is one of the core values of our brotherhood, and now, more than ever, people need our help.

The 46th Grand Chapter Congress is scheduled to be held at the Hyatt Regency Hotel New Orleans, August 22-26, 2007. Despite the catastrophic damage and aftermath of Hurricane Katrina, we still hope to celebrate in true New Orleans style with our biggest and best Congress ever! The Board of Directors and staff are working overtime to make sure this event is truly memorable.

The entire national leadership team recently met at the Central Office in Oxford, Ohio, for a weekend planning and education retreat. We spent many hours reviewing the previous strategic initiatives and developing a new annual plan and long-term objectives for Delta Sigma Pi.

The objectives for this biennium will revolve around the five standing committees: Professional Development, Community Service, Scholastic Development and Awards, Alumni Development, and Organizational Development.

The History of Delta Sigma Pi: 1930 to 1939



he 1920s saw unprecedented economic growth in the United States, although this growth was by no means felt everywhere, and by everyone. Many, however, thought these good times would last forever. After all, this was the United States, the land of limitless opportunity! But as memories are usually short, no one was thinking that a depression was around the corner, even though we had had a number of depressions earlier in our history. And no one, no one, thought a depression could be as bad as the Great Depression of the 1930s.

The term "Roaring Twenties" aptly describes the overall economy of the 1920s, but by the end of the decade signs were beginning to indicate problems were just over the horizon. These signs of things to come included stock prices that in many cases were far greater than normally supportable by either earnings or dividends. Americans were borrowing money at unprecedented levels (in fact, by the end of the 1920s most Americans had no savings). The Federal Reserve, established in 1913 to help provide a safer and more stable monetary system, began raising its lending rates in 1928 to slow the economy. Then there was Black Tuesday, the Stock Market crash of October 29, 1929 that wiped out the savings of rich and poor alike.

As the U.S. economy began a downward spiral, no one could predict when bottom would be reached. The downward economic spiral continued until 1933 when the economy once again began to expand. But in 1937, this expansion halted and it seemed to many as though the depression lasted forever. Even the massive new federal programs



that were part of President Franklin Delano Roosevelt's "New Deal" could not break the depression, which was as much a mental condition in the 1930s as it was an economic condition. It would take a war to end the Great Depression. But America was in the middle of a great pacifist movement in the 1930s, so it would take some great event, some terrible act to move the nation to war, and that great and terrible act came on December 7, 1941.

This was the state of things for Delta Sigma Pi in the 1930s. As part of the country, the culture, and the politics of the United States, we always have been and always will be impacted by the times in which we live. So, how was Delta Sigma Pi affected by the Great Depression? As a business, Delta Sigma Pi was impacted in much the same fashion as any other business or family. Chapter finances (both local and Grand Chapter) tightened when membership decreased as a result of fewer men being able to go to college. It should be noted that it would be many more years before the GI Bill would come into being with its massive college program. In fact, 49% of college enrollment in 1947 was made up of veterans! But in the 1930s many who desired to go to college could not-often for no other reason than having to stay at home to help support their family.

The notion of snobbery that fraternities and sororities have often been accused of stems from the idea that its members usually came from well-to-do families. The Great Depression caused a change in the social status of many and would have an impact on who would join the better "houses." Many chapters who had houses during the 1930s had to struggle to keep from losing those houses. Sometimes they did the unthinkable and took in boarders during the summer months to raise additional funds. While houses were usually owned by house corporations controlled by alumni, most chapter members would consider their chapter and their house to be a single entity. This usually made the problem of one the problem of the other. This fact alone would almost guarantee Deltasig houses would all but disappear by the 1990s. But in pre-World War II days, most Deltasig chapters either had houses or dreamed of having a house.

The Fraternity had installed over 50 chapters by 1929, half of those during the four-year Grand Presidency of "Gig" Wright in the first half of the 1920s. However, only eight additional chapters were installed in the entire decade of the 1930s, and only two during World War II. In spite of the Great Depression, the Fraternity tried to operate as close to normal as possible. Grand Chapter Congresses, although shorter than Congresses of today, were still held. Provincial Conferences, the forerunner to Regional Conferences, were also held. (Provinces were later renamed Regions.) The DELTASIG magazine was still published and new programs begun.

Great Depression or not, our Fraternity continued to operate. Collegiate chapters often had to scale

back their programs. The Central Office, under the skillful hand of its Grand Secretary-Treasurer Gig Wright, kept operating expenses to a minimum. Since the National Endowment Fund had been started at such an inauspicious time, there was very little in the form of an endowment to make any difference on national finances. And with so few Life Memberships being sold, as well as conceptual shortcomings of the program, it would be decades before annual membership sales would be in the hundreds, or the fund balance would reach a significant level.

The Chapter Efficiency Index is Depression-era another Great program-today it is maintained on computer with point requests submitted online. But when the program began in 1931, all point requests were submitted on paper by mail, except for the Chicago chapters who often just walked over to the Central Office to deliver by hand. This program was originally introduced as a contest among chapters, as well as a management and effectiveness tool by the chapter and national officers. The latter is still the purpose of this program today. The old 100,000 point system has since been replaced with a 100 point system, in addition to numerous other changes that have been made over the decades.

1932 was the Silver Anniversary of Delta Sigma Pi. The Fraternity had actually been founded during the 1907-08 depression, and was now to celebrate its 25th Anniversary during another. The desire to celebrate our founding was strong as 37 banquets were held around the country, attended by nearly 25 percent of the total number of initiates at that time. The Alpha Chapter celebration was attended by three of the four Founders (Harold V. Jacobs, Alfred Moysello, and Alex Makay) where they

were presented with Life Memberships. Founder Henry Albert Tienken could not attend as he was in South America at the time.

In 1933, the eves of the world were upon Chicago. Chicago was host of the 1933 World's Fair, called "A Century of Progress

Exposition." In addi-

tion, Chicago was the host to the 11th Grand Chapter Congress. This "joint" scheduling helped to boost Congress attendance to over 300. (Incidentally, while this was not the first Grand Chapter Congress to be held in Chicago, it can be considered the last one to be held there. The 1942 and 1945 Congresses in Chicago were largely National Executive Committee meetings due to the large number of board members serving in the armed forces.)

Throughout the Great Depression, the Fraternity continued to issue The DELTASIG magazine. Only during the Second World War was the distribution and content temporarily changed. Another Great Depression-era program was kicked off in the November 1935 issue of the magazine—the Alumni Placing Service. This national program was an early attempt at networking, and heavily relied on local committees all over the country.

While the content of the magazine over the decades has mostly remained consistent, it is interesting to note that

very little

is mentioned in the magazine about the Great Depression. This must have been intentional. But one can wonder-did Deltasig college graduates fair better in their job search? Throughout the 1920s, 1930s and post World War II period, The DELTASIG was also available in hard cover editions. Many brothers and chapter houses acquired these now scarce, and musty treasures. As the Great Depression wore on, its impact on the Fraternity deepened. By 1937, the Fraternity had installed some 60 chapters, but many had become inactive or were struggling to survive. The situation would not change until 1941 when America would go to war and American business would flex its muscle to become the "arsenal of democracy."

When the Centennial Series continues...the War years. The chapters and the Central Office all but shut down. The future of Delta Sigma Pi rests on victory!

Pennsylvania Students **Assist Tsunami Victims**

This past May, 16 Penn students and two faculty members spent two weeks in Sri Lanka. Projects included rebuilding homes, visiting orphans and donating supplies to people affected by the December tsunami. Brother Sumit Kadakia, then Vice President-Chapter Operations, organized the trip. He was inspired after watching the news coverage of the disaster's aftermath. "I thought that if I was in a position all of a sudden to make a difference, then I should take every opportunity that I can," Kadakia said.

The group of volunteers, composed mostly of Deltasigs, raised a



substantial portion of the trip's funding (more than \$36,000) by selling tsunami-relief bracelets and soliciting donations from their hometowns and from other sources.

The students partnered with the Association for Lighting a Candle, a Sri Lankan organization created in 1995 and dedicated to alleviating poverty in the country. They spent the first few days of their trip helping with the construction of a 19home development in the town of Wadduwa. They dug holes for septic systems and sanded and painted window and door frames. Later, the group visited a home in Hambantota for children orphaned by the tsunami. They also got to assist in evaluating how children's relief funding was being spent.

Finally, after days of volunteer work, the students got to enjoy the sights and sounds of Sri Lanka, even getting to meet former President Bill Clinton, who was there representing the United Nations. —Sumit Kadakia





(from the August 7 meeting at Grand Chapter Congress):

- Major revisions to the complete Individual Discipline Policy
- Regional/Provincial awards selection deadline moved to June 30. July 24 is the national selection deadline.
- Provincial committee chairs were added to respective national committees—except for Scholastic Development and Awards Committee.
- Reinforced policies requiring that every pledge receive a current pledge manual
- Spring financial statements and budgets for CEI are now due June 15.
- Colonies now required to pay initiation fees and badge lease at the time of petitioning, rather than at installation.
- Minimum collegiate chapter membership noted as 20 in policies (paralleling bylaw language).
- Chapters with Big Brothers now required to name them within 10 days of pledging.
- Voting language and eligibility for Provincials and Grand Chapter Congress clarified.

Leadership Foundation Minutes in Seconds

(from the August 9 meeting at Grand Chapter Congress):

- New named funds were approved including: Clyde Kitchens Leadership Fund, Charles Farrar Fund, North Central Province Fund, and the Skip and Lois Loomis Western Province Fund. Gifts may be made to these funds to help bring them to full endowment (Clyde Kitchens Leadership Fund already fully endowed).
- The National Collegian of the Year (beginning with the 2006 winner) will receive a \$5,000 scholarship for remaining undergraduate or graduate studies. They have five years to use this scholarship. Bill Daniels, who founded cable TV in the West, donated a sum of money to improve the business curriculum. The college was recently named among the top five for ethical standards.

Zeta Chapter at Northwestern Evanston

The Zeta Chapter at Northwestern-Evanston was first chartered on November 14, 1920 and initiated 722 men until its closure in 1967 when business was phased out. A colony of economics students began reactivation efforts in spring 2003. Reactivation ceremonies included 28 students and one faculty member.

Northwestern-Evanston was founded in 1851. The town of Evanston was named after university founder John Evans. The current economics department, along with the Kellogg Graduate School of Management, serves as hosts for the new chapter.

Participating in the ceremonies were then Grand President Kathy Jahnke, then North Central Provincial Vice President Pete Bjelan, Great Lakes Regional Vice President John Juat, current Grand President Mitch Simmons, then Vice President-Organizational Development Claire Roberts, Past Grand President John Henik, Southeastern Regional Vice President Karon Drewniak, then Allegheny Regional Vice President Barbara Balcita, Golden Council member Steve Black, and Director of Chapter and Expansion Services Dale Clark.

Eta Tau Chapter at McNeese State

This chapter was originally chartered May 3, 1969 and initiated 387 members until its closure in 1992. The Dean, faculty, and alumni recruited students to begin a colony in fall 2004 who moved swiftly in meeting charter requirements. The new chapter was reactivated with 26 students and two faculty members.

During the reactivation banquet, Lake Charles Mayor Randy Roach issued a proclamation recognizing the newly reactivated chapter. Eta Tau sponsors were also recognized, including major contributor Philip Tavor of Lake Charles Toyota.

McNeese State was founded in 1939 as a junior college, under the division of Louisiana State. In 1950, it became a 4year institution and separated from Louisiana State. The College of Business has over 1200 students and supports three centers: Center for Economic Development Information Services, the Real Estate Institute, and the Small Business Development Center.

Then Grand President Kathy Jahnke also conducted this ceremony—held just two weeks prior to Grand Chapter Congress.
