He was so impressed with the leadership of Stacia Bivens, Louisville, he asked her to lead the efforts to bring a chapter to the university. Stacia enlisted the assistance of Kelsev Kennedy and Rachael Bivens, both

Louisville, to register as a student organization, secure Brandi as their advisor and set up a fundraiser, all before the first informational meeting.

With the help of local chapter Kappa Psi at Bellarmine and DD Billy Markowitz (a founding member of Ohio Dominican), the Louisville Colony excelled at recruiting and their service and professional programs. amma Mu Chapter returned Uto Tulane University in New Orleans 51 years after the chapter became inactive. Through an informational meeting with Gulf South RVP Susan Lackey and Director of Chapter and Expansion Services Dale Clark, Danielle Levy and Gabby Rigol, both Tulane, gained interest in forming a Delta Sigma Pi colony. They would soon spearhead the recruitment process securing a large group of interested members very early in the process. Their motivation came from the knowledge that there was a chapter on campus previously and their own will to succeed.

The colony's professional and community service programming included many events pertinent to the members. To assist with the renewed support of New Orleans to rebuild the community after Hurricane Katrina, Tulane Colony members participated in a kickball tournament to raise funds for local disabled children. Members also volunteered at a local rehab center and at a community event hosted by Mercy Endeavors.

Tulane Colony also held a creative professional event where they streamed the TED Talk "Your Body Language Shapes Who You Are" by Amy Cuddy. This was a very helpful event for the newly established organization because they learned about first impressions and how one's posture impacts perceived confidence and attentiveness. Members then held a group discussion on how they could incorporate what they learned into their professional and personal lives. The colony also hosted engaging presentations from the CEOs of both NOLA Brewing and Entergy New Orleans.

Gamma Mu Chapter's reactivation on April 25 was not only a special day for alumni because it was National Alumni Day, but it also brought Delta Sigma Pi's active chapter count to an all-time high— 216. Welcome back, Gamma Mu, and thank you for helping to achieve this! ▲

Delta Sigma Pi Leadership Foundation By Anne Strychalski

he roots of the Leadership Foundation extend back to 1945, when the Grand Council (today's Board of Directors) gave considerable thought to the possibility and practicality of creating an educational foundation. For 70 years since then, the mission to support Delta Sigma Pi members and encourage scholastic development has



not wavered. Through the creation of the Educational Foundation, then the Leadership Fund, and ultimately the merging of those entities to form the Leadership Foundation, Deltasigs have had 70 years of support for leadership, personal, and professional development and academic achievement.

Creating the Educational Foundation was the first step in developing what we now know as the Leadership Foundation. A committee created the structure and purpose, which was approved by the Grand Council, and then proposed bylaws and the organizational setup in August 1952. The Delta Sigma Pi Educational Foundation was incorporated for nonprofit on March 11, 1953. Establishment of the Educational Foundation finally allowed the Fraternity to expand into areas of scholarship and research.

In 1978, the Fraternity Board of Directors created an additional tax-exempt arm, the Leadership Fund, to raise money for educational programs of the Fraternity that had evolved over time. It would eventually become apparent that a merging of the resources of the Foundation and Fund would best benefit our members. In 1993, they joined to form the current Delta Sigma Pi Leadership Foundation, which is also a not-for-profit organization, providing tax deductions for donors.

The mission of the merged organization as stated today is, "The Delta Sigma Pi Leadership Foundation exists to generate and provide financial support for Delta Sigma Pi Fraternity's educational and charitable programs, which assist members to achieve individual and professional excellence within the business community." With the ongoing support of brothers and friends of Delta Sigma Pi, the Leadership Foundation will continue to grow, prosper, and support Delta Sigma Pi and its members for years to come!

As a separate entity operating as a 501(c)(3) charitable organization, the Leadership Foundation has played and continues to play an important role in the lives of thousands of future leaders. Each year, the Leadership Foundation promotes the development of business leaders by providing nearly \$70,000 in grants for conferences and schools that help collegiate and alumni members develop personally and professionally. To further their mission, the Foundation also awards academic scholarships to Deltasigs, now totaling in excess of \$80,000 annually. Thank you to all supporters and donors to Delta Sigma Pi-past, present and future. Our success and longevity would not be possible without you. 🔺

Foundation Programs and Milestones

- Grand President's Circle (1995-2014): 6,761 members committed to annually give throughout their lifetime.
- 2007 Centennial Society (2003-2008): 211 members each gave \$2,007 in unrestricted gifts to commemorate our Centennial.
- 10K Club (2003-2012): 51 members gave \$10,000 in unrestricted gifts. A special designation of 10K Club Centennial Founder was given to 17 early donors who also included a memento in the time capsule.

Each event successfully kicked off Friday night with a networking event, trivia night or dance. Then each Saturday morning began with a keynote kick-off and networking to set the tone for the day.

The Northeastern LEAD had the highest attendance with 426 registrants. Kurt Yerak, ERC, opened this event speaking about leadership and teamwork. Over the next three weeks, Mitch Matthews provided the keynote address for the North Central, South Central and Western LEAD Provincial Conferences and Council Meetings. Southern PVP Janene Markuske led a team building activity in Birmingham.

LEAD events are about more than learning; they are also an opportunity to recognize brothers for their accomplishments and contributions to the Fraternity and Leadership Foundation.

Chapter, regional and provincial Collegians of the Year were presented at all LEADs while Chad Robinson, *St. Cloud State*, was crowned the 2015 National Collegian of the Year. Donors reaching milestones were also shown recognition and gratitude for their support of the Foundation.

Also for supporting the Foundation, the honor of Buck\$ 4 Brotherhood Legacy Chapter was given to 113 chapters. For their dedication to leading by example with integrity, 18 Certified Deltasig Leaders were honored.

The North Central Provincial Council moved a recommendation to amend our bylaws to add a national Alumni Chapter Committee and a proposal to amend Delta Sigma Pi Ritual. Both proposals will be voted on by the Grand Chapter at Congress in August.

Pop tabs were donated at all LEADs to support one of our national service initiatives, Ronald McDonald House Charities. However the service didn't stop there. T-shirt sales in Iowa benefited the American Cancer Society, brothers in Columbus wrote valentines for troops, and in Portland the donations from the Penny War supported the National MS Society.

Timothy D. Gover to be honored at Grand Chapter Congress

Tim Gover, *Southern Methodist*, will be honored at the Grand Chapter Congress banquet with the 2015 Lifetime Achievement Award for his life-long support of Delta Sigma Pi. Brother Gover has held numerous offices, and with his time and talent has supported the Fraternity, Leadership Foundation and academic world.

Brother Gover was initiated into Beta Phi Chapter at Southern Methodist in December 1958. When he became a professor of finance at Eastern Illinois in 1963, he helped charter Epsilon Omega Chapter and continued to serve as Chapter Advisor until 1985. During that time, he also served as District Director for Southern Illinois from 1966 until 1982. Tim continued to support the Fraternity by later serving on the National Board of Directors and was elected into the Golden Council in 1982. He reached his Silver Helmet for 25 years of service in 1984 and his Golden Helmet in 2009. Brother Gover also served as an officer and director of the former Delta Sigma Pi Educational Foundation and recently served on the Leadership Foundation's Gifts and Solicitations committee. Along with his service, he is a continual donor to the Leadership Foundation. In 2007, Brother

Gover earned the Entrepreneur Award for over \$10,000 in donations.

Professionally, Brother Gover was a finance professor at Eastern Illinois for 32 years and served as Director of First Federal Savings and Loan in Mattoon, Illinois for over 35 years. Now retired, he is the longtime mayor of Mattoon. In addition to supporting Delta Sigma Pi, for 34 years he has been a member of the Charleston Rotary Club and served as District Governor in 1995. Tim also served 11 years as president for Coles County Council on Aging where he was involved with the planning, fundraising and construction of their Life Span Center. Recently, he also served five years as a member of the Board of Eastern Illinois University Foundation and for 13 years he served on the Board of the Lincoln/Sargent Farm Foundation

working with the Lincoln Log Cabin Historic Site.

Tim also supports the legacy of Delta Sigma Pi—his son Ed, *Illinois-Urbana*, brother Bob, *Eastern Illinois*, and cousin Tom, *Eastern Illinois*, are also Deltasigs. His late wife, Marilyn, and daughter in-law Bonnie, attended Grand Chapter Congress as Pink Poodles, of which Marilyn was elected S.G.B. in 1977. When Tim's granddaughter Lainey, *Baylor*, was initiated in 2013, she became the third generation of the Gover family to be affiliated with Delta Sigma Pi. ▲

At the tender age of 91, longtime business professor, corporate consultant and high-octane Deltasig H. Nicholas Windeshausen, Ph.D., continues to run circles around the Energizer Bunny. So what's the key to this upbeat nonagenarian's impressive longevity?

It's simple, says the laughter-loving "Nic," who was presented with the Delta Sigma Pi Lifetime Achievement Award in 2011. "Work every day on a volunteer service project you care deeply about – and don't die young!"

Guam, Easter Sunday, 1945 – It's nearly midnight. Nothing moving. A bit of moonlight glimmers on the wet leaves of the rain-soaked jungle, then it dims as the clouds roll back in.

He's walking guard duty tonight. He's a U.S. Navy medic, trained to care for American battlefield casualties in the Pacific.

Along with hundreds of Navy Seabees, Nic Windeshausen and his fellow sailors have spent the past several months building a military hospital on the island. Tomorrow they will begin receiving some of the 38,000 wounded from the titanic struggle for Okinawa – the key battle that will turn the tide against the Japanese.

He's just a kid from small-town Osmond, Nebraska, population 783, and still in his early twenties.

Tonight he's a kid in a wet rubber poncho, with a loaded M-1 slung over one shoulder. He's walking guard duty in the rain.

He volunteered for this – and that word will remain important to him during the next seven decades of his remarkable life: *volunteer*.

He's scared, though. In the past few months, on recently captured Guam the remaining Japanese soldiers have grown increasingly desperate. They know the end is near.

The Americans and their Allies have thrown immense resources into the battle for Okinawa. And when it falls, the Allies will be able to use it as a staging area for the approaching invasion of the nearby Japanese mainland. But it won't be easy.



On Guam, where Nic and his buddies have been working 16 hours a day to build the combat hospital, there are still hundreds of fanatical Japanese soldiers hiding in the jungle. Almost daily, they attack the American invaders in suicidal ground assaults designed to slow down the American war machine. These sudden banzai charges come unexpectedly, and they are terrifying.

And he's wondering, are the banzai soldiers out there right now, silently attaching their bayonets on the other side of the tree line and preparing to die?

Windeshausen, the kid from Osmond, checks the clip on his M-1. Another hour or so and his relief will arrive – another sailor clad in a rubber poncho, with another rifle slung over one shoulder. In a few days, if

he survives, Nic will begin treating the wounded from Okinawa at the brand-new hospital on Guam.

They are the lucky ones of course. More than 14,000 American soldiers – mostly Army and Marines – will die in the three-month struggle (April-June, 1945) to capture the island from the Japanese. Sixty years later, Nic will remember the men who came to his Navy hospital on Guam.

"They kept coming in," he will tell you quietly. "Individuals who were missing arms, and individuals who were missing legs. I don't like to think about it." That was his life in 1945, as a volunteer.

"I got through it," he says quietly. "I prayed a lot."

Have you ever heard American folk singer Tom Roth run through his popular ballad, *My Favorite Little Town*? While strolling through the tranquil streets of Osmond, the high-spirited Roth tells the story of a tranquil village in northeastern Nebraska during the era when Nic grew up there.

My favorite little town,

Just a few miles west

Of where 81 and 20 intersect . . .

Perched on the broad right shoulder of the Cornhusker State, Osmond is the kind of small-town setting that produced millions of Americans like Nic Windeshausen (the German name is pronounced as *WIND-iss-howz-en*).

Roth says as much in the song, as he describes hot summer afternoons when the kids all swam in the nearby Elkhorn River and then recalls the quarter his parents gave him each Saturday morning. He had 25 cents of his own to spend as he liked at the downtown general store!

"We lived on the edge of town," says Nic, who was born in Osmond in May of 1923, "and throughout my childhood we had outdoor plumbing. We heated the house with a cook-stove in the kitchen, and that got us through some very cold Nebraska winters."

The second-oldest child in a family that included 11 kids, Windeshausen learned early about the importance of *volunteering*. At the local St. Mary's Catholic grade school, the nuns taught him the lesson that has ruled his life: *Love thy neighbor*.

"My grandmother lived alone in town after my grandfather died," he recalled during a recent interview. "Well, my mom didn't want her to be alone in the evenings, so as a teenager I stayed with her every night for about five years, until I joined the Navy after the start of the war."

For the eager adolescent, caring for Grandma was the beginning of a way of life. During the more than *60 years* in which he's been an ardent Deltasig, Windeshausen has worked on dozens of public service projects. That includes everything from feeding the hungry and sheltering the homeless, to teaching troubled adolescents how to become selfsufficient adults and helping raise millions of dollars for national community programs run by United Way. He worked on several United Way campaigns with the "devoted and dedicated" parents of a young man named Bill Gates, Jr.

Of course, Nic also spent nearly 40 years teaching young people how to succeed in the world of commerce – first as a youthful business administration instructor at Nebraska-Lincoln (1955-62) and then for 30 years as a professor of marketing and management at Cal State-Sacramento College of Business Administration.

In his long and varied teaching career, Windeshausen

has been a marketing professor, a marketing department chairman, an associate dean of business administration and a retired professor emeritus. Along the way, he created six different endowed scholarships that have so far helped pay expenses for 115 in-need college students.

And there's more. On numerous occasions, Nic also worked as a highly effective consultant to more than a dozen trend-setting national corporations. He's served as a pro bono management and best-practices advisor to U.S. Peace Corps programs in Brazil and the Philippines, along with the Mid-West Marketing Association.

Oh and let's not forget that Nic Windeshausen also found the energy and the initiative required to launch the Epsilon Phi Chapter of Delta Sigma Pi at Cal State-Sacramento. As you might expect, he's still furiously active as a member there today. During his more than five decades as a relentless advocate for the nation's leading business fraternity, he has served as a chapter

president, District Director in the then Mid-American and Western Provinces, Director of Education for Business on the national board, Chairman of Editorial Advisory Board, Golden Council member and Delta Sigma Pi Educational Foundation member.

Pretty impressive, right?

But the long list of Nic Windeshausen volunteercredits doesn't stop with the numerous educational and community service projects he's run as a Deltasig.

No way. Have you heard about his decades of service with the Big Brothers/Big Sisters program for

disadvantaged kids? How about his longtime advocacy (and trash collecting) with the American River Clean-up and his work with the Teenage Pregnancy and Parenting Program in the Sacramento area? And did you know that Nic has spent several years feeding hungry folks at Sacramento Loaves and Fishes while also serving on the board and raising funds for the Stanford Home for Children?

As a business professor, Nic helped to groom hundreds of students who went on to become successful corporate executives and entrepreneurs. Vision Service Plan of California executive Ric Steere, who studied under Windeshausen at Cal State says, "For me, he was the professor who made the difference!"

While raising two daughters and advising daily on the care and grooming of his three grandkids, Nic somehow found the time – and the energy – to keep on as one of the most dedicated volunteers in the modern history of the Golden State. His beloved wife of more than 60 years, the late Joyce Pilger, died in 2008.

He has contributed frequently to various programs at Nebraska's Wayne State College through their foundation – and has served on its board for 20 years, while missing only two meetings. In honor of that performance, the college awarded him an honorary doctorate in 2015.

Even today, at the ripe old age of 91, he still gets a "terrific charge" twice a week as a prayerful volunteer for the Catholic Legion of Mary delivering Holy Communion to dozens of elderly shut-ins.

But when you ask Nic Windeshausen why he loves to work on volunteer projects – for Delta Sigma Pi and half a dozen other public-service groups, these days – he'll tell you that serving his neighbors has always been the most joyful and rewarding thing he does.

"I've had a wonderful life," he'll explain with a quiet smile, "and working as a volunteer has always been a privilege. A lot of people ask me why I do so much volunteering, but the truth is that I've always gotten back much more than I gave!" ▲

Your "Moment of Truth"

Deltasigs are well familiar with our Ritual and the goals each member should strive to achieve.

Are you making the world a better place?

When your Moment of Truth happens, how will you respond?

My point of making the world a better place through your Moment of Truth, could not have been made any clearer than an incident involving ESPN reporter, Britt McHenry and her berating of a towing company employee over having her car towed. The very reaction at the point when a person is faced with an issue is the "Moment of Truth"--the moment when one's true colors are revealed. How one deals with a situation at that very moment could be the foundation of one's reputation.

McHenry is caught on film saying, "I'm in the news sweetheart, I will &\$%# sue this place." And she continued with statements like, "I could be a college dropout and do the same thing?" and "I'm on television and you're in a %\$#@ trailer, honey." McHenry's popularity and her hostile reaction caused the video to go viral.

Although she apologized on Twitter, it was too late. She failed her Moment of Truth and her reputation was immediately impacted as social media blew up, the press has had a field day and articles about her past surfaced.

Have you ever been to a restaurant and received a cold meal or the wrong order? How did you respond? How did the server respond when he/she was informed

of your issue? Have you ever been upset with poor service or voiced a complaint to a customer representative? service How did they respond at the very moment you voiced it? If the waiter rolled their eyes, if the customer service representative argued with you, that is the failure of their Moment of Truth. In regards to the ESPN reporter scolding the parking attendant, we could all agree that



she failed her Moment of Truth and is now facing the consequences from public backlash and even ESPN.

The importance of good customer service

A number of years ago, I read a book written by Jan Carlzon, the former president and CEO of Scandinavian Airlines (SAS), titled *Moments of Truth*. In the book, Carlzon defines the Moment of Truth in business as "anytime a customer comes into contact with any aspect of a business, however remote, is an opportunity to form an impression."

Jan Carlzon revolutionized the airline industry through an unrelenting focus on customer service quality. Within the first year of taking over, SAS launched an on-going training program called Putting People First. The program was focused on delegating responsibility away from management and allowing customer-facing staff to make decisions to resolve any issues on the spot. Jan Carlzon said at the time, "Problems are solved on the spot, as soon as they arise. No front-line employee has to wait for a supervisor's permission."

Nowadays, we call these "touchpoints". From this simple concept, Jan Carlzon took an airline that was failing and turned it around to be one of the most respected airlines in the industry.

The Ritz-Carlton Hotel is another firm known for great customer service. Their motto "We are Ladies and Gentlemen serving Ladies and Gentlemen" is completely focused on managing touchpoints and creating "customer wow". They teach their employees

about the Moment of Truth, the first impression made when an issue, complaint or challenge is voiced.

Both of these firms identify their touchpoints as the first moment a client interacts with a person. In this example, this would include the reservation process, curbside baggage checkin, ticket counter interactions, interaction with a flight attendant or the moment a hotel guest asks a question. Notice that all of these touchpoints are controlled by people. These are the points of contact that customers and clients have directly with a person in their organization.

In fact, a recent study by Monster.com showed that customer service skills ranked among the top ten traits employers look for in new hires.

Using touchpoints to manage interactions, first impressions or reactions

You should aim managing your first impressions and touch points at creating a "wow" moment for the people in which you interact with every day. No one can control how you respond or react to a situation... except you. Let me rephrase that. You are the only one that can control how *you* react to a situation.

Moments of Truth can come in many forms. How do you react to a final exam or a project deadline? Do you let your nerves get the best of you or do you study and bring confidence to the classroom? Moments of Truth occur during the first interview or during a job search, at networking events or when faced with difficult decisions such as deciding to take steps to break out of your comfort zone and register for leadership development programs such as Succeed Faster, a program I co-founded a few years ago.

Your communication style is key to landing the positive first impression. One of the best pieces of advice I received in my early twenties was the importance of *being present* in the conversation. Sometimes, we need to get out of our communication comfort zone! Face-to-face interaction is the key to building meaningful relationships. I know we are all busy and it is easy to be distracted by all of the noise in our lives. We are all plugged in and sometimes forget the strongest bonds are formed in person, not online. No matter how much you have going on in your life, when your Moment of Truth comes, stop.... and be present to the conversation.

Take the next two weeks and concentrate on the impression you are leaving and your reactions to situations. Pick one reputation trait that you would like

to leave on people and try to show that trait in each interaction. This will train the mind to have a different automatic response when faced with your Moment of Truth. If you want to be known for your customer service, make sure people experience that service. If you want to be known for your ambition, volunteer for the next big project and knock it out of the park. Remember, you are the only person that can control your response, reaction or your own productivity.

Once you learn how to control your reactions and start managing your Moments of Truth, people will take notice, your reputation and brand will begin to develop and doors will begin to open. You will notice an increased level of energy, self-esteem, relationships and overall productivity.

Keep in mind that your reaction, either positive or negative, will form a lasting impression. Keep an eye out for your next opportunity or Moment of Truth and make it count!







Congratulations to the 2015 Collegians of the Year!

n 2015, the Collegian of the Year (COY) program saw 118 chapter COYs apply for the coveted title of National Collegian of the Year. Chad Robinson, St. Cloud State, earned this honor by exemplifying the values inherent in Delta Sigma Pi's Ritual and perpetuating the ideals as set forth in the Purpose of the Fraternity. This award was established more than 40 years ago and the aspiration for this honor remains undiminished.

To be named national COY, a collegian must first be nominated by his/her chapter. Regional COYs are then chosen from that pool by committees for each of the 31 regions. Each Provincial Scholastic Development and Awards Committee then selects a provincial COY from the remaining pool and these five become eligible for the national COY award as chosen by the national committee.

The 31 members who were selected after being nominated as the chapter COY were rewarded for their dedication to the Fraternity through support from the Leadership Foundation. The Foundation awards scholarships and recognition totaling in excess of \$18,000 annually to these members. This is made possible by the National COY Scholarship endowed by Sidney "Sparky" and Ruth "Buttercup" Sparks. Throughout the years, the scholarship grew through a re-endowment, a generous Living Legacy gift made by Sparky and more support from Buttercup. Today this fund supports the COY program at the regional, provincial and national levels. The regional level is also funded through the Clyde Kitchens/Thoben Elrod endowment.

As the applicants were reviewed, the following criteria were considered in order of importance: Fraternity involvement; attendance at inter-chapter Fraternity events including but not limited to Grand Chapter

Congress, LEAD Schools and LEAD Provincial Conferences, regional initiations, chapter installations, etc.; essay outlining goals if selected as National Collegian of the Year; degree of leadership exhibited in Delta Sigma Pi; university/community involvement and leadership; scholastic aptitude/GPA; additional essays required by the application and letters of recommendation. Other criteria considered include: ability to represent the Fraternity on the National Board of Directors, leadership ability, dependability, responsibility, honesty, integrity and sincerity, moral character, personality and professional attitude.
