

SUBJECT: Transfer of Chi Chapter to Johns Hopkins University

For your information, the School of Business Administration of the University of Maryland has been absorbed by Johns Hopkins University, effective at the opening of the college courses next fall.

Johns Hopkins has not absorbed the entire University of Maryland but just the School of Business Administration. Both Johns Hopkins and Maryland have offered courses in Commerce and both have had fairly large registration, but it has been felt by the uniting of both departments far greater service could be rendered to the prospective students.

This means, therefore, after the close of the present college year, our Chi Chapter will go out of business as far as the University of Maryland is concerned. However, practically all of the students now attending the School of Business Administration of the University of Maryland will transfer to Johns Hopkins in the fall and at a regular meeting of Chi Chapter held February 5th, a motion was unanimously passed that Chi Chapter petition the Board of Directors to transfer their charter from the University of Maryland to Johns Hopkins University as of October 1st, 1926.

There is nothing contained in our laws to cover such an emergency and in discussing the matter, Brother Fackler and myself feel if the Board can grant charters, they certainly have the power to change their location or revoke charters for good cause. This is rather an unusual situation and while it may happen again, we can provide for it in the future by adding a section to our constitution and by-laws at the Madison Convention that will cover such emergencies. In the meantime, however, action should be taken regarding this particular situation as Chi Chapter must give notice to their present landlord on July 1st as to whether or not they will remain in their chapter house. In fact, they propose purchasing their chapter house, but, of course, if there would be any legal difficulty in regard to transferring the chapter to Johns Hopkins, they would like to know of it this spring.

Johns Hopkins is a university of very high standing and the location of our Chi Chapter at Johns Hopkins instead of Maryland would in no way detract from the prestige of Delta Sigma Pi. In fact, it would probably add to their prestige. Chi Chapter is extremely active and will carry on in the new location equally as well as they have at Maryland.

We request, therefore, your vote on the approval of the transfer of our Chi Chapter from the University of Maryland to Johns Hopkins University effective October 1st, 1926.

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
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

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I --- NAME.

The name of this organization shall be Adelphon Kuklos, Alpha Kappa Chapter.

ARTICLE II -- OBJECTS.

The objects of this organization are: To aid our School of Commerce in every possible way in its endeavor to establish a thorough course in business economics and business ethics; to foster a closer affiliation between the commercial world and the students of our school; to conduct such research and give such practice that will aid their advancement in the commercial world; to make a study of current civic and commercial problems and keep in touch with same, by having weekly meetings or luncheons. On such occasions learned men, familiar with the problems of the day, will address us; to establish and maintain a library of business economics; to promote a spirit of good fellowship and brotherly love among the student body.

ARTICLE III -- OFFICERS.

The officers of this organization shall be: a President; a 1st Vice President; a 2nd Vice President; a Secretary; a Treasurer; and a Sergeant-at-Arms.

ARTICLE IV -- MEMBERSHIP.

Section I. Active membership in the organization shall be composed of male undergraduate students of the School of Commerce, University of Maryland, who have entered as regular or special students, and who possess the following qualifications: 18 years of age, high scholarship as shown by results attained in at least one semester's examination, irreproachable character, and an acceptance of the Holy Bible as tests for his religious faith. Such an applicant should also pay in advance one month's dues of two dollars with the understanding that he will pay the initiation fees as prescribed in Article V.

Section II. The total active undergraduate membership shall be limited to 48 members, 12 of whom are elected each year unless a larger quota is needed to fill vacancies caused by resignation, expulsion or death. Members shall be elected on the first regular meeting in March of each year.

Section III. Upon graduation, active members automatically pass into the class of graduate members. Such members may be unlimited in numbers and are entitled to all privileges indefinitely, except to the election of office. They shall be required to pay annual dues of \$10 for 10 years when they will be considered Life Members.

Section IV. Honorary members may consist of members of the Faculty who have been duly proposed and elected at any regular meeting. Such are not eligible for office and are not required to pay dues.

Section V. (a) Any officer may be expelled by a two-thirds majority at any regular meeting, for absenting himself from three consecutive meetings.

(b) Any member may be reported for expulsion who fails to pay his dues when due and absenting himself from three regular consecutive meetings.

ARTICLE V -- DUES & INITIATION FEE.

There will be a monthly dues of \$2 payable on the 1st day of each month, until the organization is granted a charter by the Delta Sigma Pi, when an initiation fee of \$25 and that portion of dues still due for the remainder of the semester will be assessed.

ARTICLE VI -- SPECIAL COMMITTEES.

Upon action of the members, special committees may be appointed at any time to consider or act upon special matters and to report to the club. Unless otherwise provided, they shall be appointed by the President or President pro-tem.

ARTICLE VII -- ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

The officers shall be elected by ballot annually at the regular meeting of May each year and shall hold office for one year, or until their successors are qualified. Such officers shall hold office until the following September when they will be duly installed.

ARTICLE VIII -- DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

Section I. The President: The President shall preside at all regular and special meetings of this organization and perform all the duties of a presiding officer; he shall conduct the routine of the organization as prescribed in Section III of the By-Laws, without any deviations. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for. He shall be a member ex-officio of all committees. He shall audit and attest all Vouchers and checks for the disbursement of money.

Section II. The 1st Vice-President: The 1st Vice-President shall preside at the meetings, special or regular of this organization whenever the President is absent or when requested by the President to do so. When so presiding, he shall perform all the duties of the President.

Section III. The 2nd Vice-President: The 2nd Vice-President shall act as master of ceremonies at the initiation of candidates and have charge of all work of installation and things pertaining thereto.

Section IV. The Secretary: The Secretary shall attend to correspondence, keep the minutes of all meetings of this organization, and record all its proceedings. He shall have charge of the constitution and by-laws and shall be responsible for the valuables laid away in the archives of the organization.

Section V. The Treasurer: The Treasurer shall have charge of all monies belonging to the organization; he shall collect all dues and all monies due the organization. He shall pay out monies for vouchers when presented and signed, duly audited and attested by the President. He shall deposit the monies in a bank authorized by resolution, and render a Treasurer's Report at the last meeting of each month. He shall have charge of all property, real and personal, belonging to the organization. He shall present all bills to the organization for payment on the first regular meeting after receipt of bill.

Section VI. The Sergeant-at-Arms: The Sergeant-at-Arms shall preserve order in the meeting room, shall attend the door as a sentinel and allow no one to enter who is not so entitled. He shall have charge of, under the direction of the Treasurer, of all rituals, altars and other things employed in the initiation of candidates or installation of officers.

ARTICLE IX -- MEETINGS.

Regular meetings of the organization shall be the 1st Thursday in each month. Special meetings may be called by the President or President pro-tem upon written notice given four days in advance. Sufficient members to fill the five chairs may constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE X -- COLORS, FLOWER, and MOTTO.

Section I. The fraternity colors shall be those of the State of Maryland - Gold and black.

Section II. The fraternity flower shall be the State flower - Black Eye Susan.

Section III. The Fraternity motto shall be - Latin words, "One for all - All for one."

ARTICLE XI -- AMENDMENTS.

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any regular meeting, but no amendment shall be entertained unless it shall have been proposed in writing, signed by three members in good standing, at the last previous regular meeting.

-- BY - LAWS --

1. Each officer shall have charge of the books and papers appertaining to his office, and upon the expiration of his term shall turn over such books and papers to his successor.
2. The hour of meeting shall be 8 p.m.
3. The order of business at each regular meeting shall be as follows:
 1. Calling the Roll
 2. Reading and Adoption of the Minutes
 3. Reports of Officers
 4. Reports of Standing Committees
 5. Reports of Special Committees
 6. Unfinished Business
 7. New Business

At any special meeting, the special business for which the meeting is convened shall be taken up immediately after the Roll Call.

4. These By-Laws may be amended at any regular meeting by a two-thirds vote at any Regular or Special Meeting. When the Special Business is accomplished, the By-Laws shall immediately be in full force again.

Do you solemnly promise and swear to join the National Fraternity of the Delta Sigma Pi, when this organization is admitted as a member thereof?

Having sworn to all the above obligations, kiss the Holy Book and forget not that which you have pledged.
