SECTION III. UNIVERSITY HISTORY

FOUNDING & MAJOR DEVELOPMENT

The Founding

The state of Wisconsin started the University of Wisconsin-Madison in 1848, mainly because of its proximity to the state capitol. With only a few buildings and a much smaller plot of land, the school rose from its humble beginnings into the internationally renowned university it is today. Now, the campus contains twenty different individual schools and 135 undergraduate majors for students to choose from.

With almost 30,000 undergraduates, the large campus is ultimately made smaller through campus involvement. Students are passionate about their participation on campus, as is displayed by the student activism that the UW-Madison is known for. Participating in the Big Ten Conference, athletic fervor is also seen throughout the school. The University of Wisconsin's undergraduate program is consistently ranked among the top in both the nation and worldwide, and the school has become known as a "Public Ivy," since it is regarded as highly prestigious public university.

Major Development and Growth

The University of Wisconsin-Madison was the first university in what is now known as the University of Wisconsin System. Since 1848, ten other schools have joined the elite university. The UW System created schools in Eau Claire, Green Bay, La Crosse, Oshkosh, Parkside, Platteville, River Falls, Stevens Point, Stout, Superior, and Whitewater.

Still the most popular and populous, the University of Wisconsin-Madison has had plenty of growth over the years. Women were finally admitted to the university in 1863, and a graduate school was established in 1904. Due to student activism, the UW-Madison Arboretum was opened in 1934. Its goal was to restore lost landscapes in the city of Madison, which it continues to do to this day.

Recently, the second student union, Union South, was demolished. In its place will be the new Union South, a state of the art recreational, dining and academic facility. The university intends for it to be completed by the spring of 2011.



BETA EPSILON MU SECTION IV: SCHOOL OF BUSINESS

SCHOOL OF BUSINESS HISTORY

In 1900, The University of Wisconsin became one of the first five universities to have a university-based commerce/business program in the country. The School of business has not only kept up with technology but has been a leading participant. In 1994, the business school became the first to use videoconferencing for student interviews with off-site recruiters. The School of Business continues to update their programs to remain modern, relevant and exciting for its students. For example, in 1999 it became the first school in the country to have a program that focused exclusively on practical training in corporate finance. Also, in 2003 it became the university-based center to train MBAs exclusively in product management.

The University of Wisconsin School of Business has assisted its students in keeping up with changing times by building a new state-of-the-art facility named Grainger Hall. This new building is a 260,000 square foot structure, which includes thirty classrooms, three high-tech auditoriums with multi-media and broadcast capabilities, eight computer labs, videoconference facilities and a 30,000 square foot library. The faculty earns national recognition for their excellence in their field and research. For instance, Jan Heide has been identified as one of the most highly cited researchers in the field of marketing, and Larry Rittenberg has been named one of the nation's 100 most influential people in finance.

The student opportunities are endless at the School of Business. With more than thirty business organizations, twenty semester-long study abroad programs, and strong case competitions, the school takes involvement seriously. These great attributes have been the reason for so many top rankings. Wisconsin's undergraduate business program was ranked 12th in the most recent U.S. News & World Report rankings. Real Estate was ranked second, and Insurance/ Risk Management was ranked third. In all, six programs were ranked in the top 20. The MBA program was ranked 29th by U.S. News & World Report.

The success of the School of Business stems from a strong mission, vision and values. The mission of the School of Business at the University of Wisconsin-Madison is to create, integrate, transfer and apply knowledge relevant to business. They carry out this mission through five core activities: research, undergraduate education, graduate education, executive education, and service. The vision of the School of Business is to be internationally renowned for knowledge creation and for expertise concentrated around selected career specializations in which they provide transforming educational experiences by integrating theory, application, and practitioner networks. Values shared by the entire school include continuous improvement of programs and students, a culture of intellectual curiosity, high integrity and ethics in the conduct of our own work and in our curriculum, creation and support of an educational environment that recognizes the value and potential of each individual and the value of a diverse learning community, pursuit of opportunities for faculty, staff and students to serve our community. The University of Wisconsin School of Business has consistently been an establishment of excellence and continues the tradition through the quality of its students and faculty alike.

SECTION V. COLONY DEVELOPMENT

Establishing the Colony

Beta Epsilon Mu began when a faculty member, Management Professor Loren Kuzahara, realized that there was no active chapter of Delta Sigma Pi at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He contacted Central Office, and in October 2008, Brother Andrew Ochoa and Brother Kimberly Ward, made a trip up to Madison to make a presentation to interested students about what the fraternity was. Less than a month later, a committee was established to attempt to reactivate the Psi Chapter at the UW. This committee was called the Reactivation and Planning Committee, and it consisted of eight people. These future brothers included Rachel Brecher, Cody Candee, David Haerterich, Scott Peiser, Lisa Rosenblum, Andy Sepiol, Eric Stupnitsky and Ada Sze.

Growth

In the winter of 2009, Beta Epsilon Mu began its first official semester as a colony. Recruiting with no prior events to talk about to potential members, the colony ended with an official membership total of 22, a 300% increase from the start of the semester. The first order of business was to elect the rest of the executive committee. After that, the semester consisted of several professional, community service and social events. These events included a Microsoft Excel instructional workshop, Relay for Life, and trips to the local comedy club. The colony began the semester with zero funds and ended with around \$200 and pending grants of over \$1000. In April of 2009, the executive committee began plans for what would become a monumental semester for the colony in the fall.

In September of 2009, the fall recruiting rush began with a bang. Within a short two weeks, the colony tripled membership once again to more than 60 members. In terms of finances, since January 2009, Beta Epsilon Mu raised over \$7500 by November 2009.

Development as a Student Organization

The colony gained the attention of the Wisconsin School of Business from the very beginning. With the help of two faculty advisors and various others, the colony was able to solidify its role at the school. Partnerships with other student organizations at the university helped spread the word of Delta Sigma Pi and created positive relationships with other groups. In the fall semester, the colony's identity began to take shape with participation at student organization fairs, weekly and bi-weekly meetings, and an efficient communication and attendance policy system.

PROFESSIONAL ACTIVITIES - KPMG SPEAKER EVENT

KPMG Speaker Event March 04, 2009

The members of the Beta Epsilon Mu colony hosted a professional event featuring a speaker from KPMG.

The presentation was made up of the top ten things that college students can do in order to better brand themselves in the business world. The presentation lasted a little over an hour. Advice included how to write professional emails, how to make initial contact, and what to do when preparing for interviews. After the presentation, several questions were asked specifically about what a person should do in an interview or what a person should leave on or off a resume. In the end, the speaker gave the colony valuable advice that many members had never heard of before. Several of the colony members at the time were freshmen who had not had much, if any, experience with how to act and present themselves in the business world.



Lunch and Learn: Resume and Cover Letter Writing Workshop (Presented by Emily Bradley, Human Resource Associate for First Business Bank) September 16, 2009

The members of Beta Epsilon Mu attended the first professional event of the semester. Presented by a human resources associate at First Business Bank, It was aimed at teaching students skills when writing a resume or cover letter.

Kelly Cuene, one of the colony's advisors, is also assistant director of career services at the University of Wisconsin-Madison's Business School BCC (Business Career Center), so the event was co-sponsored with this organization.

When students arrived at the event, there was a buffet-style lunch that included pizza, vegetables and juice. Once everyone settled down, Ms. Bradley began her presentation by introducing herself and giving a brief opening of First Business Bank. Next, she proceeded to talk in detail about resumes, then cover letters.

The presentation was very interactive; Ms. Bradley incorporated student participation via trivia questions and entertaining caricatures related to the topic at hand. She also used sample resumes to clarify and highlight her main points.

When describing resumes, she talked about the two types (functional and chronological), action verbs to help formulate job descriptions, the reference page, as well as additional tips to make your resume stand out as successful and unique. She concluded this portion of the workshop by reminding students that although having a fantastic resume shows great knowledge and qualification, it only gets "your foot in the door"; it's your interviewing skills rather than just your resume that employers will assess when considering hiring.

When explaining the cover letter, Ms. Bradley described the two types (application and letter of inquiry), gave some reasons why recruiters ask for cover letters, explained the basics of one, its format, paragraph breakdown, as well as some extra tips and hints. She concluded by reiterating that your interview skills are more important that any resume or cover letter to get a job; however the cover letter is the key to getting your resume read, and consequently being offered an interview.

Overall, Emily Bradley was an articulate speaker who demonstrated knowledge of the topics she discussed. Her presentation on resume and cover letter writing was interesting, interactive, entertaining, detailed, and certainly informative. The date for the event also happened to precede the Business School's Career Fair, which made the presentation ever more helpful to all who attended.

The event was open to the entire campus of University of Wisconsin-Madison; Beta Epsilon Mu had 20 of our members attend among a total of 30 students present. This was the first professional event of the semester, and overall the Executive Committee was very happy to have over 30% of our members attend.

Business Etiquette Tips

(Presented by Susan Richardson, Etiquette Consultant for Etiquette Essentials, LLC)

September 21, 2009

The members of Beta Epsilon Mu attended a professional event that focused on giving tips about various topics related to formal interaction in the business world.

This event was presented by Susan Richardson, an etiquette consultant for Etiquette Essentials, LLC. It was co-sponsored with Delta Sigma Pi and the Business Career Center.

In the competitive business world today, having an impressive GPA and resume are not enough to land you a job. In fact, most companies agree that the resume and cover letters are simply instruments that attract attention; it is in the interview that you can fully sell yourself to the employer... with the appropriate business etiquette of course.

One-on-one sit down interviews in a bleak office are not the only option for employers to test their potential students. Dining interviews and phone interviews are becoming increasingly popular. A dining interview may particularly make an applicant nervous, because a more personal side is displayed. Indeed, Susan Richardson recommends not scrutinizing the menu, for this may put your decision-making skills in question. Furthermore, taking small bites will encourage your ability to answer more questions & remain focused on the purpose of the meal.

In terms of phone conversations and etiquette, the most important tip colony members picked up from Richardson's presentation was to smile. This may sound impractical because the person on the other line can't see you, but it will make your voice and attitude sound more engaging to the listener.

No matter the setting, form the moment you enter a room, it is human nature for people to immediately make impressions. A firm handshake, maintenance of eye contact, appropriate physical appearance and confident body language are the primary factors in making a positive first impression.

Finally, one particularly noteworthy etiquette tip is the importance of hand-written thank you notes. I have observed the value of this both through Richardson's presentation and in real world experience as well. A thank you note on its own sent within days of the encounter demonstrates a high level of personal gratitude and acknowledgement for the other person's time. Further, a hand-written note shows further personal engagement and appreciation.

Richardson concluded with a demonstration of appropriate wardrobe material for men and women with real "models." This made the experience interactive. The etiquette consultant's presentation on business etiquette tips overall was extremely informative and touched on all of the most important guidelines for potential employees.


Members of the Beta Epsilon Mu colony attended a date auction co-sponsored with Sigma lota Epsilon, another business club on campus.

JESSICA MCKERNAN




