As the Regional Vice President of the Gateway Region, it is an honor to recommend to the Board of Directors the chartering of the Sigma Tau Chi Colony Chapter at St. Louis University. Their petition covers various things, but I prefer to focus on their character, something we deem important in Delta Sigma Pi.

As a group, they signed a Letter of Intent in April 2003 to start a colony chapter. Even with the summer break shortly thereafter, they were organized at the start of the fall semester. One member, Jordan Koene even made the effort to visit the Central Office during the summer break. He and several other members were instrumental in getting the chapter going. As an alumni brother of Delta Sigma Pi (SMSU chapter – KO402), as president of the St. Louis Alumni Chapter, as Co-District Director for the Sigma Tau Chi colony at Saint Louis University, and as a graduate of Saint Louis University (MBA 2001), I would like to recommend the re-activation of the Beta Sigma Chapter of Delta Sigma Pi at Saint Louis University (SLU).

Exciting things are happening on campus at Saint Louis University and specifically within the Cook School of Business. Recently the business school more than doubled their square footage with the opening of Cook Hall in the fall of 2000. A History of Saint Louis University

Saint Louis University traces its history to the opening of St. Louis College in November 1818 in a private residence near the Mississippi River in St. Louis. The idea to establish a college in St. Louis originated with the Reverend Louis William Du Bourg, Catholic Bishop of Louisiana. Du Bourg, a friend of Archbishop John Carroll, the first Catholic Bishop in the United States, had served as president of Georgetown College from 1796 to 1798. Du Bourg was consecrated Bishop of Louisiana in 1815, then quickly decided to make St. Louis, not New Orleans, the headquarters of his diocese and to build both a cathedral and a college in frontier St. Louis.

In 1826, the Society of Jesus (the Jesuits) accepted Bishop Du Bourg's invitation to assume control of the struggling St. Louis College. The group of 12 Jesuits who had arrived in St. Louis in May 1823 were operating a seminary as well as a school for Native American boys in Florissant, Missouri, a few miles to the northwest of the College. In November 1829 St. Louis College began that year under Jesuit administration with Father Peter J. Verhaegen, S.J., becoming the school's first Jesuit president. Saint Louis University received a formal charter from the State of Missouri in 1832 making it the oldest University west of the Mississippi River. Saint Louis University became the second university operated by the Jesuits in America (Georgetown College opened in 1789). Even in 1829, the Jesuits operated hundreds of schools in dozens of countries all around the world. The overarching purpose of Jesuit education is to teach young people how to become practical, socially responsible, humanistic and spiritual human beings. This value-centered approach to education still drives Saint Louis University as it approaches the new century.

When St. Louis College opened in 1829 under Jesuit sponsorship, it had moved from its original location near the riverfront to a new site at Washington Avenue and Ninth Street, approximately one mile to the northwest. At the time, this area was on the outskirts of the city of St. Louis, at the edge of the wilderness. (Today, this location is the site of the St. Louis Convention Center, adjacent to the TWA Dome.) The University's entire "plant" consisted of a single brick building situated slightly west of Ninth Street and facing south towards Washington Avenue.

Less than 25 years after its founding, Saint Louis University had opened both law and medical programs. As early as 1835, Father Peter J. Verhaegen, the University's president, was discussing with several prominent St. Louis physicians the possibility of forming a medical department for Saint Louis University. This possibility became a reality when the medical department of the University presented its first formal lecture in March, 1842. The following year the medical department graduated six students.

In 1867, Saint Louis University officials purchased land at the intersection of Grand Avenue and Lindell Boulevard. At the time, this property was still rather rural with groves of trees and fields more common than homes and buildings. The University was anticipating the day when it would have to move from its Ninth and Washington campus because the encroachment of businesses and factories in the area was creating an environment not conducive to study and learning. Construction began on the new University building in 1886, and the building formally opened on July 31, 1888, the feast of St. Ignatius Loyola, the founder of the Society Jesus.





Saint Louis University always has maintained an extremely close relationship with the city of St. Louis. From its earliest days as a 19th century frontier college and virtually the only source of instruction for the young men of St. Louis, to the late 20th century and the age of the modern university, Saint Louis University has been an important partner in the growth and development of St. Louis. As the decades of the 20th century passed, St. Louis, like most large American cities, struggled with the numerous issues associated with urban decline. These issues included lost population, lower tax revenues, fewer jobs, and deteriorating housing.

Saint Louis University was among the earliest American colleges and universities to offer its students an opportunity to study abroad when it expanded its "campus" across the Atlantic Ocean by opening a college program in Madrid, Spain, in 1969. Originally, Saint Louis University's program was designed primarily for junior year American college students who wished to improve their Spanish language skills or who were pursuing careers in international business or relations.

Over time, the program was expanded to include Spanish and other European students, and the course offerings grew into a well-rounded college curricula. In addition, Spanish students at the Madrid campus came to the St. Louis campus to take courses. Today, Saint Louis University in Madrid is recognized as the premier international university in Spain. It has received official status from the Consejeria de Educacion y Cultura, Spain's higher education authority, making it the first such American institution to be so recognized. Of the nearly 500 students enrolled at the Madrid campus, approximately 60 percent are now Spanish nationals.

Today, as Saint Louis University approaches the conclusion of its second century, the University's faculty, staff and students remain committed to the ideals of education, service and leadership in the Catholic and Jesuit tradition that they have upheld since 1818. Father Lawrence Biondi, the current President, has articulated his vision "to establish and maintain Saint Louis University as the finest Catholic university in the United States." Thanks to dynamic and re-invigorated academic programs, the construction of state-of-the-art facilities and a continued dedication to the greater community, Saint Louis University is surely on its way to turning Father Biondi's vision into reality.

The Campus of Saint Louis University



John Cook School of Business

Davis-Shaughnessy Hall was constructed in 1931, with a total renovation in 1982-83. It provides classrooms ranging in size from 25 to 110 seats, easily accommodating business classes which have an average size of 30 students. Classrooms are fully equipped for computer-aided instruction.

Major gifts from alumnus John Cook paved the way for a \$15 million building expansion, the John and Lucy Cook Hall, which opened in Fall 2000. The \$15 million expansion project doubles the size of the business school, and is very student -focused, with study and lounge areas, a café and facilities for special programs. In addition, the new classrooms are equipped with state-of-the-art technology.

Also housed in the Business School are two computer labs. All computers in these labs are linked by a Novell local area network (LAN). The labs are used for classroom teaching and as a general purpose lab, and are newly renovated and equipped with leading-edge technology.

Individuals graduating from John Cook School of Business will receive a degree of a Bachelors of Science in Business Administration with a concentration of one of the following: accounting, comprehensive business, decision sciences, economics, engineering management, entrepreneurship, finance, human resource management, international business, management, management information systems, and marketing.

Through its Career Resources Center, the Business School offers a for-credit internship program designed to provide students with work experiences which complement and strengthen their academic program. Each semester, students gain firsthand exposure to the daily responsibilities of a professional position in business. In addition, a satellite office of the University Career Center is located in the Career Resources Center, that provides a variety of services and materials to assist students in their career decisions and search.

Graduates of the Business School have been placed in a variety of positions and companies including A.G. Edwards & Sons, American Youth Foundation, Anheuser-Busch, AT&T, Blue Cross Blue Shield, Daimler-Chrysler, Deloitte & Touche LLP, Edward Jones, Ernst & Young LLP, Famous-Barr, Federal Reserve, FDIC, IBM, Jesuit Volunteer Corps, KPMG Peat Marwich LLP, Maritz, May Company, U.S. Bank, Monsanto, NationsBank, PricewaterhouseCoopers LLP, Ralcorp Holdings, SBC, St. Louis Cardinals, The Boeing Company, Volkswagen Credit, and the Weil Group.

Saint Louis University has earned recognition as a school that promotes character development (The Templeton Guide: Colleges that Encourage Character Development). By integrating the strong traditions of Jesuit education with the fundamentals of leadership, SLU strives to develop leaders who demonstrate competence, conscience and commitment. The Service Leadership Certificate Program is designed to begin at the freshman/sophomore level, with students who seek opportunities for leadership. Students complete a rigorous and enriching program of service-learning which emphasizes service to the community as a vital component of leadership. The requirements for the certificate are 15 hours of coursework, 300 hours of community service and a Personal Leadership Portfolio.

The coursework requirement can be fulfilled through the normal business degree requirements. Students will be assigned to one or more community agencies to serve the poor and marginalized of society. Throughout the service-learning experience, students will develop a Personal Leadership Portfolio which will formally document their experiences.

Degrees Offered From the John Cook School of Business

Bachelor Degree in Accounting - 120 hours

The Department of Accounting offers the Bachelor of Science in Business Administration degree with a concentration in Accounting. The concentration requires 18 hours of accounting course work in addition to the Business Core (42 hours) and the Arts & Sciences requirements (54 hours). Two additional elective courses must also be taken.

Bachelor Degree in Accounting - 150 hours

The 150 hour requirement to sit for the CPA exam may also be met by students completing a double concentration at the undergraduate level. This option may be desirable for students who can receive financial aid only at the undergraduate level. In addition, this option may appeal to students who come into their college careers with hours of college credit earned while still in high school. The accounting major also makes a tremendous combination with either MIS or Finance. Students may also be interested in combining Accounting with either Marketing or Management. In any event, students must have **27 hours of accounting** beyond the principles courses to qualify to sit for the CPA exam.

Students may select these electives from the list of courses for the Master of Accounting program. In order for students to take these courses they must meet certain conditions. Students may receive credit for only 1 internship with the bachelor degree.

The Department of Accounting offers the Bachelor of Science in Business Administration degree with a concentration in Accounting. The concentration requires 18 hours of accounting course work in addition to the Business Core (42 hours) and the Arts & Sciences Requirements (54 hours). Two additional elective courses must also be taken.

B.S.B.A. Economics Concentration

The Bachelor of Science in Business Administration (B.S.B.A.) with a concentration in Economics through the John Cook School of Business requires 15 hours of coursework in addition to the Business Core.

Undergraduate Engineering Management Concentration

The Engineering Management concentration is a B.S.B.A. degree offered in conjunction with Parks College. With the Engineering Management concentration, students will combine technical knowledge of products and production systems with the study of business management. Students in this program will study business theory and practice along with the study of science, mathematics, and engineering. Graduates of this program will be able to build successful careers in business where technical knowledge is highly valued.

Undergraduate Entrepreneurship Concentration

Along with meeting the requirements for the B.S.B.A. degree, the Entrepreneurship concentration requires twenty-seven (27) hours in addition to the Business Core.

Undergraduate Finance Concentration

The Finance Concentration requires eighteen (18) hours in addition to the Business Core.

Undergraduate Human Resource Management Concentration

Along with meeting the requirements for the B.S.B.A. degree, the Human Resource Management concentration requires eighteen (18) hours in addition to the Business Core.

Undergraduate Concentration in International Business

Students of international business learn about the impact and implementation of international business practices in the modern marketplace. Our economy today is increasingly global in nature. Students examine how differences in language, communication, social interaction, work attitudes, relationships, economics, politics, pace of life and social structures affect global commerce.

The Department of International Business offers the Bachelor of Science in Business Administration degree with a concentration in international business.

Fifteen (15) hours from at least three areas in addition to the Business Core, and twelve (12) foreign language credit hours.

Undergraduate Management Concentration

Along with meeting the requirements for the B.S.B.A. degree, the Management concentration requires eighteen (18) hours in addition to the Business Core.

Undergraduate MIS Concentration

Students must complete 18 credit hours in MIS in addition to MISB 200 and the Business Core, in order to be eligible to graduate with a concentration in MIS.

Undergraduate Marketing Concentration

Along with meeting the requirements for the B.S.B.A. degree, eighteen (18) hours of course work, in addition to the Business Core, are required for a concentration in Marketing. The program of study involves 9 hours of required course work, and 9 hours of electives.



History of the Sigma Tau Chi Colony

The origins of the Beta Sigma Chapter and the Sigma Tau Chi Colony can be traced back to around the beginning of the 1910's. It began as the Mercury Club, a professional Commerce Society during the time when classes at the Saint Louis University School of Commerce were only taught at night. The Mercury Club eventually evolved into Phi Sigma Eta, a local Professional Fraternity. Phi Sigma Eta was founded on March 16, 1924. The Fraternity was planning to expand to other schools when World War II ended those dreams. In 1945, members of Phi Sigma Eta made contact with Delta Sigma Pi, and on June 1, 1946 was installed as the Beta Sigma Chapter of Delta Sigma Pi.

In 1968, the Beta Sigma Chapter of Delta Sigma Pi at Saint Louis University went inactive. While there was no long a Beta Sigma Chapter, many of the alumni keep in touch with each other and often gathered together to reminisce about their years in Delta Sigma Pi. One such of these events was the Beta Sigma Reunion that was held in 2002. Many of the alumni felt that it was a shame that the chapter went inactive, and that steps should be taken to reactive it. This was the beginning of what was to be the Sigma Tau Chi Colony.

Cliff Reilly, the Regional Vice President for the Gateway Region, took on the task of investigating the possibilities of reactivating the Beta Sigma Chapter. On April 23, 2003, a meeting was held at Saint Louis University in the John Cook School of Business to gauge the interest of the students in bringing the fraternity back to campus. The turnout at the meeting was encouraging, and it was decided to continue. A second interest meeting was held on May 2, 2003, where elections were held for the positions of President and Senior Vice President, which were filled by Jennifer Cohen and Jordan Koene, respectively. A letter of intent was signed that day, and sent to the Central Office the next day.

Just because it was summer break did not mean that no work occurred on furthering the colony effort. Plans were being made for recruiting events once class started again in the fall. Many of the colony members joined with the St. Louis Alumni Chapter to help out with a refreshment booth at Fair St. Louis during the Fourth of July weekend. Also, one colony member, Jordan Koene, took time out of his break to visit the Central Office and learn more about the fraternity. Soon, the first days of classes were upon the members of the colony.

The plans made over summer break became a reality, with posters and flyers going up around the John Cook School of Business. Also, a Welcome Back Barbecue was held with other student organizations in the Business School to promote the colony. On September 10, 2003, elections were held for many of the open positions,

which were filled by the following: Vice President – Professional Activities, Jimmy Bussey; Vice President – Community Service, Matthew Hudson; Vice President – Finance, Edward Miranda; Vice President – Alumni Relations, Meghan Sullivan; Vice President – Chapter Operations, Jennifer Keith; and Chancellor, Kevin Antes. Work was begun on organizing the first professional and community service activities for the colony.

During the next few months, many decisions were made concerning the future of the colony. It was decided by the Executive Committee that the colony would strive to submit a Petition for Chapter Charter by the end of the year. This would mean the colony would have to meet all the petition requirements by the end of February, a difficult task to complete, but the colony was motivated and up to the challenge.

As the semester progressed, the colony organized more professional speakers and community service activities. Two colony members, Meghan Sullivan and Eric Fuller, participated in the St. Louis Alumni Chapter Career Prep day. Later that evening, Brother Virginia Gillespy, a graduate student attending Saint Louis University and helping the colony, attended the St. Louis Alumni Chapter's 30th Anniversary Party. Also, more open positions were filled by the dedicated members of the colony; Melissa Steber became the Chairperson of the Social Committee, Teresa Smith became the Recording Secretary, Stephanie Morris became the Historian, and Mark Cepnio became the Chairperson of the Public Relations and Recruiting Committee. As the semester wound to a close, elections were held to fill two positions that were opening due to members studying aboard: Senior Vice President and Vice President – Chapter Operations. These positions were filled by Stephanie Morris and Teresa Smith, respectively. By the end of the fall semester, the colony had achieved more than half of the requirements for the petition.

The winter break was once again used to plan recruiting events for the beginning of the spring semester. Unfortunately, during the first few weeks of class, St. Louis experienced bouts of severe weather, and several events planned off campus were canceled. However, this did not stop the colony from having success in recruiting more members. By the end of the recruiting events, the colony had well over 30 members regularly attending the colony meetings.

As the semester continued, the colony was becoming surer of being able to meet the petition deadline. More professional and community service activities were scheduled, such as a tour of the Anheuser-Busch Brewery, and a trivia night for the faculty and students of the Business School. Five members of the colony attended the LEAD Provincial Conference in Houston, Jimmy Bussey, Matthew Hudson, Edward Miranda, Courtney Sauget, and Teresa Smith. Also, more vacant positions were filled, Bridget Davenport became the new Recording Secretary, Christopher Duncan became

the new Historian, and Courtney Sauget was elected as the Vice-President of Scholarships and Awards.

On February 25, 2004, all requirements for a Chapter Charter had been met, and the official letter of petition to the Board of Directors of Delta Sigma Pi was read and signed at that night's colony meeting. The colony had achieved its goal of submitting the petition to the Central Office within one year of being recognized as a colony.





Membership According to Concentration




