The History of Nebraska

History of Nebraska

1948 -1994

Although there was only a slight increase in the state's population in the Fifties, the decline in farm population was more than offset by the increase in urban population. Between 1940 and 1960, total urban population increased by almost 50 percent. Omaha's population increased by 30.3 percent, Lincoln's by 56.7 percent. Smaller and medium size cities also grew at a healthy growth rate. Entering into the Fifties, Nebraska was lacking in providing its people's needs for adequate highway and school facilities. This was not uncommon in other states at this time.

Manufacturing as part of Nebraska's economy also increased considerably during this time in the early Sixties. Other important industries growing during this time were printing and publishing, machinery, electrical equipment, stone and clay products, furniture and fixtures, and lumber products. Today, Nebraska is home to various corporate headquarters, some of which are: Union Pacific Railroad, ConAgra Foods and Valmont Industries.

To Build new railroads and highways, Nebraska began to receive funds through taxes and federal aid. The passage of the Federal-Aid Highway Act of 1956 provided federal aid at a 90 to 10 ratio for construction of the Interstate Highway System. The first contract was let in June of 1957, and by 1965, 127 miles of the Interstate Highway (I-80) had been built. Today over 400 miles of I-80 stretches East to West across the state of Nebraska.

With the development of new industry throughout the state came the need to train young Nebraskans in various technical fields. To achieve this goal, Nebraska developed a system of technical community colleges. The first such school began in 1966 in Hastings. Funding was provided by the passage of

legislation to create a regional tax. In 1971 the legislature created a new statewide system of locally governed technical community colleges to combine with already existing two-year community junior colleges. This legislation resulted in six new technical community colleges being built across the state. These schools are in addition to the four-year state colleges which are located in Lincoln, Omaha, Kearney, and Wayne. Also, there are numerous private colleges which have been developed.

Nebraska is a land of contrasts. High plains and foothills characterize the West, sand hills the center and rolling prairies the East. Icy blizzards are common in the winter, but summers are normally hot and humid. By eastern standards, the state is dry, and yet it sits over the High Plains Aquifer, one of the largest areas of underground water in the world.

Nebraska can boast of unique places to visit: The State Capitol, the world famous private charity Boys Town, the consistently successful University of Nebraska at Lincoln football team, and the Sand Hills, one of the largest areas of sand dunes in North America.

Frugal, hard-working, independent sometimes to the point of stubbornness, Nebraskans are astonishing people. Their ethnic backgrounds are varied, their geographical surroundings diverse. They have a common history of sharing the land. Wherever they live, on farms or ranches, small towns or cities, Nebraskans feel a close kinship with the soil and the fruitfulness thereof.

History of Omaha

1948 - 1994

Since the mid-twentieth century, Omaha has expanded its horizons beyond the limitations of the original boundaries of the city. However, the values of a quality life still remain in this large town. The Omaha metropolitan area has tripled in population to over six hundred thousand since 1948. The geographic area has also tripled, matching the population increase. Although Omaha has grown so quickly, it is still referred as “the twenty - minute city” because transportation from one side of town to the other only takes twenty minutes.

The downtown area has seen tremendous modifications in the last 45 years. Changes have ranged from the building of the Woodmen Tower, the tallest building in Nebraska, to the redevelopment of the river-front property, courtesy of ConAgra and Union Pacific, to the restoration of the Central Park-Old Market area. To get to the downtown area in 1948, Dodge Street was the most recommended route. Over four decades later, an eight-lane interstate runs from the western part of town through downtown and across the Missouri river.

From a business stand-point, many still think of Omaha as being an agricultural center. Many years ago this was true. But the closing of the stockyards, the world’s second largest at the time, signaled that changes were about to take place. Omaha became very attractive to large firms for reasons such as its low cost of living and friendly citizens. Omaha has lured such corporations as ConAgra, America’s largest meat and poultry company, Peter Kiewit Sons’ a world player in construction, and Mutual of Omaha, an internationally acclaimed insurance company. Four Fortune 500 companies are headquartered in Omaha; more than in larger cities such as Denver, Phoenix, Memphis, Miami, or San Diego. Omaha’s largest business success is that of Warren Buffett, founder and CEO of Berkshire Hathaway, every financial guru’s guru.

One of Omaha's best qualities is that of its caring people. This is typified by the creation of Boys Town. Father Flanagan's dream of home for wayward boys was extended to include girls in 1979. Other community based groups that enhance the quality of life in Omaha include the United way of the Midlands, Special Olympics, St. Joseph-Boys Town Mental Health Research Hospital, and Mad Dads, the nationally known organization that helps fight gang violence and helps promote social equality and education.

In the last 45 years, no area has blossomed more than the recreational activities that Omaha now presents. The internationally renowned Henry Doorly Zoo, a 130-acre park housing over 2,000 species of mammals, birds, reptiles, and fish, is among Omaha's greatest assets. The zoo also includes the recently finished 60,000 square-foot indoor tropical rain forest, the Lied Jungle. Other attractions that have been developed since 1948 are the Ak-Sar-Ben race Track, Rosenblatt Stadium, home to the ever-popular College World Series, the Joslyn Art Museum, the restored Orpheum Theater which reopened in 1975, home to the famous Omaha Symphony Orchestra, and the Omaha Community Playhouse. Omaha is very attached to and supportive of its three minor league sports, the Omaha Lancers (hockey), Omaha Racers (basketball), and the Omaha Royals (baseball). All three have brought championships home in the last three years.

Omaha Maintains its traditional values while it grows. However, the new opportunities that go along with this change will enhance the people of the "River City."

History of the University of Nebraska At Omaha

1948-1993

The University was founded in 1908, where it was located at 24th and Pratt street in northeast Omaha. It was later moved to 60th and Dodge in 1936. Currently, there are over 16,000 students enrolled at the University of Nebraska at Omaha (UNO). It is the second largest campus of higher education in the state of Nebraska. Moreover, UNO is part of the University of Nebraska system, which also includes the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, The University of Nebraska at Kearney, The University of Nebraska Medical Center.

Consisting of more than 400 faculty members, UNO offers 133 baccalaureate degree programs and 61 advanced degree programs. Undergraduate programs are offered in the following colleges: Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Continuing Studies, Education, Fine Arts and Public Affairs, and Community Service. In addition, programs are also offered in the colleges of Human Resources and Family Sciences, Engineering and Technology, and Agriculture but are administered by the University of Nebraska - Lincoln.

Resting on 88.5 acres of land, UNO is surrounded by beautiful parks and residential neighborhoods. The University is located in the heart of the City and can easily be accessed by three of Omaha's main arteries: Dodge Street, 72nd Street, and 60th Street; they are all connected to the interstate system circling the Omaha area as well.




The University of Nebraska At Omaha Buildings



Field House



The next building that was constructed was the Field House, which officially opened February 23, 1950 with the occasion of the basketball game with Creighton University. This first game in the Field House marked a significant step in the growth of the University; it is considered one of the most outstanding events in the history of UNO. A special dedicatory exercise was performed during half-time. An adjacent football field was also constructed during this time.


Engineering



The Engineering Building, formerly the Applied Arts Building, has been on campus since 1960. It was carefully planned in a practical manner to permit the Engineering Department to do a competent job in the four-year preparation of Industrial Engineers as well as providing a sound two-year basic engineering program for those who want to transfer to other engineering schools for completion of electrical, civil, chemical or other advanced engineering degrees. Last March, the University of Nebraska Board of Regents approved the Program Statement for a \$285,000 addition to the UNO Engineering Building. The 3,800 square-foot addition to the southern portion of the building will be funded by UNL. It will be used for laboratory research in structural materials and component testing.



Milo Bail Student Center



Strauss Performing Arts Center




The Strauss Performing Arts Center, the music building, was opened in 1974. This is where the department of music resides.

UNO Restored Homes



They were all purchased within a 10-year period and were considered to be temporary but are still being used today.


Health, Physical Education and Recreation



Durham Science Center



In 1985, the Durham Science Center took over the western edge of the UNO campus. The total cost of this awesome, three-story structure was \$14.5 million. Special features include a multi-level atrium, a domed planetarium, and a roof-top observatory. The Center was designed to facilitate the Departments of Physics(first floor), Chemistry (third floor), and the Math/Computer Science and Geography/Geology(second floor). The building contains offices, laboratory space, and general-use classrooms that have the capacity to accommodate up to 900 students.

The Fine Arts Building, which was completed October 8, 1992, is the newest addition to the campus of the University of Nebraska at Omaha. Housed within the building are the six major units of the College of Fine Arts, which include the Departments of Art and Dramatic Arts, the UNO Art Gallery, Fine Arts Press, Writer's Workshop, and the college administrative offices. The gallery is distinguished by its asymmetrical forms, granite finish, and gable roofs.


Peter Kiewit Conference Center



Off-campus UNO facilities include the Peter Kiewit Conference Center, which is located downtown. It was opened in 1979 but is not solely owned by UNO. The University only occupies half of the building. A quarter is owned by Metro Tech Community College and the full top floor of the building is reserved for state offices. It houses the College of Continuing Studies which offers credit and non-credit courses for the University.



Aerial View








The college of Business at the University of Nebraska at Omaha has expanded to become an outstanding university that is well recognized by business professionals in the area.

The Gamma Eta Chapter was chartered at the University of Nebraska at Omaha (UNO) 23 April 1949. From 1970 to 1973 the chapter offered the Wane M. Higley Scholarships. However, the chapter became inactive in 1982.

In 1992, Norman Kromberg and Jeanette Medewitz Diamond discussed the reactivation of the Gamma Eta Chapter at UNO. The College of Business Administration Dean, Dr. Trussell, confirmed his support at that time.

In January of 1992 many events occurred. A faculty reception was held to build support and gather suggestions. In addition, class announcements were made and two recruiting programs were held. At that time a reactivation plan was drawn up.

In February of 1992 an organization meeting was held at which the officers were elected and the Nu Gamma Eta Colony began to hold weekly business and executive meetings.
