





The University of Southern Mississippi History

The University of Southern Mississippi was established by an act of the Legislature approved on March 30, 1910, by Governor Edmund F. Noel. Its first name was the Mississippi Normal College, and its original purpose was to train teachers for the rural schools of Mississippi. The act of March 30, 1910, did not provide any state money for the building of Mississippi Normal College but did allow local governments to bid for its location by offering land for a site and money for constructing buildings. On September 16, 1910, the Board of Trustees accepted the bid of Hattiesburg and Forrest County to supply \$250,000 and a free site. That site was west of the city in cutover timberland with great pine stumps everywhere. Contracts were to clear the land and to build buildings. Five still-existing buildings are College Hall, Forrest County Hall, Hattiesburg Hall, the Industrial Cottage (now the Honor House), and the President's Home (now the Alumni House). A temporary wooden Dining Hall and other necessary improvements were barely finished when Mississippi Normal College opened on the rainy morning of September 18, 1912, with a president, a faculty of eighteen, and a student body of 200. On October 17, 1911, Joseph Anderson Cook, Superintendent of Schools, Columbus, Mississippi, was elected president. The

University of Southern Mississippi has had only seven presidents since its founding. The Board of Trustees elected Claude Bennett president effective October 10, 1928. On April 23, 1933, the Board of Trustees elected Dr. Jennings Burton George as the third president, effective July 1, 1933. On June 13, 1945, the Board of Trustees elected Dr. Robert Cecil Cook as the fourth president and



he officially assumed office on July 1, 1945. On October 21, 1954, President Cook submitted his resignation. He served until December 31, 1954, and Dr. Richard Aubrey McLemore became acting president on January 1,

1955. The Board of Trustees, on May 19, 1955, elected Dr. William David McCain as the fifth president. He officially assumed office on August 1, 1955, and retired as of June 30, 1975. Dr. Aubrey Keith Lucas became the sixth president of the University on July 1, 1975. Dr. Horace Weldon Fleming became the seventh president on January 1, 1997. On March 7, 1924, the Legislature changed the name of Mississippi Normal College to State Teachers College. On February 8, 1940, the Legislature changed the name to Mississippi Southern College. On February 27, 1962, the Legislature changed the name to The University of Southern Mississippi. Mississippi Normal College did not grant degrees in its early years but awarded certificates for the completion of certain specified courses of study. On April 8, 1922, the Legislature authorized the

awarding of the Bachelor of Science degree. The Board of Trustees authorized the Bachelor of Music degree on June 19, 1934. The first Bachelor of Arts degree was awarded on August 20, 1940. On May 26, 1947, the Board of Trustees authorized the initiation of graduate work and the awarding of the Master of Arts degree. In the years since 1947, the University's graduate programs have developed logically to meet the needs for professional competence beyond the academic measure of the baccalaureate degree. Doctoral programs were first authorized by the Board of Trustees on May 20, 1959. USM became a comprehensive university in 1962; the administrative structure now includes a president, a provost, six vice presidents dean of the Graduate School, and deans of nine colleges: The Arts, Business Administration, Education and Psychology, Health and Human Sciences, Liberal Arts, Science and Technology, Honors, International and Continuing Education, and Nursing.

The University of Southern Mississippi Today

The 1,090-acre wooded campus is in Hattiesburg, named America's Most Liveable Small City by the U.S. Conference of Mayors. The city is the educational and medical hub of south Mississippi's Pine Belt region, with a population in the greater area of nearly 70,000. Hattiesburg is 90 miles south of the state capital at Jackson, 75 miles north of the Gulf Coast, and 105 miles northeast of New Orleans, Louisiana. A regional campus, USM Gulf Coast is based at Long Beach on the Mississippi Gulf Coast with other teaching centers at

the Jackson County Center (Gautier) and the Keesler Center in Biloxi. In addition, USM administers the Gulf Coast Research Laboratory in Ocean Springs; the J. L. Scott Marine Education Center and Aquarium in Biloxi; and the



Center for Ocean and Atmospheric Modeling and the Center for Marine Science at the Stennis Space Center in Hancock County. USM is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. Its

programs are fully accredited by more than 30 national accrediting agencies.

The on-campus enrollment in Fall 1998-99 is 12,896 on the Hattiesburg campus: 10,815 undergraduates and 2,081 graduate students. Enrollment at the Gulf Coast campuses is 1,637. Students come from 81 Mississippi counties, 47 states, and 60 foreign countries. The University offers 90 bachelor's degree programs. The Graduate School has 61 master's degree programs, 2 specialist's degree programs, and 19 doctoral degree programs. During the 1997-98 fiscal year, 3,293 degrees were awarded: 2,236 received the bachelor's, 915 the master's, 29 specialist's, and 113 the doctoral degree. The University numbers 611 fulltime faculty members, including 476 who hold a doctoral degree. There are 95 part-time faculty members, with 79 holding a doctorate. USM's student-faculty ratio is 19:1. Library functions are organized into three major units: the


Joseph Cook Memorial Library, the William David McCain Library and Archives, and the Cox Library at the Gulf Park campus. The holdings of the Cook Library include more than 1.8 million volumes of books, bound journals, government documents, and microforms. The library subscribes to more than 5,000 periodicals. The McCain Library houses special collections and University archives. The Cox Library provides access to some 60,000 items and 400 journal subscriptions. A former library entity once known as the Teaching Learning Resource Center is now the Instructional Resources branch of USM's Office of Technology Resources and offers a selection of more than 13,000 audio-visual items. The USM College of The Arts presents more than 300 performances and other arts events each year, many of them free of charge. Faculty, students, and visiting performers offer art exhibits at the Woods Art Gallery, concerts, and recitals in Marsh Hall and the Mannoni Performing Arts Center, and theatrical productions in the Mannoni Performing Arts Center and the Martha R. Tatum Theatre. The University operates on the semester system with the fall semester beginning in late August and ending before Christmas. The spring semester begins in January and ends in May. There are 10 weeks in the regular summer session, and a number of courses are offered in a variety of accelerated terms in the summer. The University is a member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) at the Division I-A Level and of Conference USA. The Golden Eagles field teams in 16 intercollegiate sports: football, basketball, baseball, tennis, golf, indoor and outdoor track, and cross-country for men; tennis, basketball, cross-country, volleyball, golf, soccer, and

indoor and outdoor track for women. Athletic facilities include Roberts Stadium (capacity of 33,000), Reed Green Coliseum (seats more than 8,000), and Pete Taylor Baseball Park. An 18-hole golf course and 16 tennis courts are available for intercollegiate competition and student recreation. The Payne Center, a new excellent fitness facility, is home to recreational sports and fitness programs that serve alumni, students, faculty/staff, and the community. The University has 13 residence halls with a capacity of 3,400 students. There are 15 fraternities, 11 with houses, and 11 sororities, primarily housed in the Panhellenic Residence Hall(Wilber Hall). There are 296 apartment units for students with families.

The College of Business Administration

Degree Programs **Degrees to suit your career needs.**

The Southern Miss general core gives students a well-rounded liberal arts education. Their critical thinking, communication, and analytical skills are greatly enhanced through rigorous program requirements. Because of the standardization in the college core, students can explore every facet of the business field before deciding on their major area. Students begin taking their



specialized areas in their junior and senior years after finding the right career for them.

All undergraduates in the college pursue a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration regardless of their major. Because of the common

college core, students have a minor in Business Administration automatically built into their degree; thus the special degree title. The major areas provide the special focus to suit whatever career choice students' desire. Many students also will combine two areas of special interest in business and pursue a double major. A double major can easily be achieved with an additional 24 hours in most cases. Academic records and advisement files are maintained in the Undergraduate Academic Services Office in Joseph Greene Hall Room 110. For

any assistance on degree progress or degree applications, you may contact an adviser in Undergraduate Academics Services, JGH 110.

Undergraduate

The College of Business Administration offers one baccalaureate degree (Bachelor of Science in Business Administration) for all eight of its majors. Majors available in the college include accounting, business administration, economics, finance, international business, management, management information systems, and marketing. To complete a BSBA degree, students must complete 128 semester hours. To meet AACSB standards, 50 percent of the courses required are non-business courses, which give business students a well-rounded background. Since the curriculum is standardized in the University and college cores, the freshmen and sophomores take the same basic courses regardless of their intended major. Final decisions on specific majors can be made as late as the beginning of the junior year without delaying graduation or losing credit hours. Students are encouraged to complete the "foundation courses" as soon as possible to ensure they have the basics needed to succeed in any business major. Academic records and advisement files are maintained in the Undergraduate Academic Services Office in Joseph Greene Hall Room 110. For any assistance on degree progress or degree applications, you may contact an adviser in JGH 110.

Graduate

The graduate programs in management and accountancy include the Master of Business Administration (MBA), the Master of Business Administration (MBA/Gulf Coast), and the Master of Professional Accountancy (MPA). MBA and MBA/GC course work focuses on developing a general management perspective. The MPA program focuses on developing a sound conceptual understanding of business activities, as well as providing technical competence in accounting. Masters-level course work is conducted by a select group of designated graduate faculty who, in addition to their instructional competencies, are recognized for research and writing contributions in their respective disciplines, as well as their consulting experience. The graduate curriculum sharpens critical-thinking skills and continually reinforces the importance of strategic planning. There is a heavy emphasis on written and oral presentations throughout the curricula, which will develop skills to write and speak concisely and effectively. Additionally, ample use of the case method encourages discussion and exchange of ideas and information. All business programs have been accredited by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB).

Admission Criteria for New Southern Miss Students


Admission criteria for entering freshmen and transfer students are the same for any new student entering the university. Upon entering Southern Miss, students are required to attend a university-wide orientation where course schedules are

arranged and students are registered for their first semester at Southern Miss. Prior to this orientation, the advisers in the College of Business Administration prefer to discuss schedules on an individual basis with the students to make the orientation day run more smoothly. 
Admission Criteria for Current Southern Miss Students

History of Alpha Delta Omega Colony

The University of Southern Mississippi had a lost chapter of Delta Sigma Pi named Gamma Tau. Many of the alumni of the Gamma Tau Chapter wanted to get Delta Sigma Pi back on campus at the University of Southern Mississippi. One alumnus in particular, **William Tatum** spoke with **Bill Gunther**, the Dean of the College of Business Administration, about bringing the chapter back. With his approval, on January 25, 2001, **Erica Verderico** from the Central Office of Delta Sigma Pi came to the University of Southern Mississippi to establish the chapter that had been lost. The meeting took place in Joseph Green Hall, room 106 at 7:00 p.m. There were eighteen present at the first informational meeting. Erica Verderico presided over the meeting and helped to elect officers. The members chose the name Alpha Delta Omega because Alpha means the beginning, and Omega the end, with Delta, meaning change, in the middle. The inaugural executive committee was as follows: **Chad Langley**, President; **Peepsie Butler**, Senior Vice President; **Celeste Eubanks**, Vice President for Professional Activities; **Jessica Murphy**, Vice President of Colony Operations, **Muhammad Farhan Aziz**, Chancellor; **Katrina Harley**, Vice President of Finance; **Karen Evans**, Historian; **Cassandra Redmond**, Secretary, **Chad Cornett**, Vice President of Alumnae Relations. In the beginning, the officers and members did not have a very good grasp of what to do. The Colony was extremely fortunate to have the expertise of Past Grand President **William Tatum**. Bill, as we know him, taught us how to recruit and gave us ideas of fundraisers. He was one of our biggest influences on how to conduct our colony.

Each semester played out better than the previous one, with the third semester of existence by far the most constructive and unifying. The colony was offered a chance to attend the **42nd Grand Chapter Congress** in Buffalo, New York. Member **Stephen Stamboulieh** attended as the colony's delegate. During congress, many friends and contacts were made that would help launch the colony to new heights. After Congress, **Gregory Smith, Celeste Eubanks, Muhammad Aziz, Shamekia Wyatt** and **Denise Miller** attended LEAD school in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. After this trip, the colony became energized with the stories and tales of brotherhood at this event. Along with this trip came the strong support from **Dale Clark**. We continued to interact more with other Deltasigs. Many of us went to the Founder's Day banquet that Eta Upsilon hosted. The members that went came back with even more drive with wanting to make the Colony a Chapter. Even though the colony members had the drive, they were lacking in numbers. It was difficult for the members that did not attend LEAD School or Congress to feel the drive that the attending members felt. This was soon changed with the visit of **Dale Clark**, the Director of Chapter and Expansion Services. Dale came to confirm that the Colony was on its way to becoming a chapter. He taught us how to be effective recruiters, and he helped more than double our membership numbers. In our third semester, we have had some professional speakers come from very different businesses. One of our speakers was **Diane Wagner** from Career Planning & Placement. She spoke about career fairs and how to market yourself to employers. We also listened to
