



HISTORY OF OKLAHOMA

Oklahoma is doubly blessed by its location and its resources. It is a varied and interesting geographical area and has attracted many settlers from the East.

Early Indian culture, as evidenced in the Indian mounds of Oklahoma, had been established in part of the land long before the white settlers came to the territory. In 1541, Coronado, a Spanish explorer, with his band of white men, is said to have visited Oklahoma. In 1719, La Salle, a Frenchman, explored south of the Oklahoma River. French traders were active in Oklahoma and nearby. In 1796, the Americans made the first permanent settlement of what is now Oklahoma.

Thus, Oklahoma, the forty-ninth state of the Union, is both one of the newest and at the same time one of the oldest states.

In 1803, the United States acquired all of Oklahoma excepting the northeastern part of the Louisiana Purchase. During the next fifty years many military expeditions were sent into the area. Forts were built and military posts were established. Fort Gibson and Fort Towson were established in 1816. In 1824 Fort Cobb, in 1841 Fort Hall and in 1850 Fort Reno were built to control the Indian tribes who were being placed on reservations. The military history of Oklahoma is rich, romantic and essential. Fort Reno is well known and is an active military school of the United States Army. Fort Gibson has been preserved by the Oklahoma Historical Society as a place of interest and education to Oklahomans and visitors alike.

HISTORY OF OKLAHOMA

Oklahoma is doubly blessed with the traditions and progress of two varied and interesting groups--the Red Men and the vigorous pioneer settlers from the East.

Early Indian cultures, as evidenced in the Indian mounds at Spiro, had been established as part of the land long before the first white traders came to the territory. In 1540, Coronado, a Spanish explorer, was the first white man to visit Oklahoma. In 1710, La Harpe, a Frenchman, explored southeastern Oklahoma. From that time, French traders were active in Oklahoma; and finally in 1796, the Chouteaus made the first permanent settlement at what is now Salina.

Thus, Oklahoma, the forty-sixth state in the Union, is both one of the newest and at the same time one of the oldest states.

In 1803, the United States acquired all of Oklahoma excepting the Panhandle as part of the Louisiana Purchase. During the next fifty years many official explorers came into this area. Forts were built and military trails were established. Fort Gibson and Fort Towson were established in 1824. In 1859 Fort Cobb, in 1869 Fort Sill and in 1874 Fort Reno were built to control the Plains Indians who were soon to be placed on reservations. The military history of Oklahoma is rich, romantic and colorful. Fort Sill is still used and is the prime artillery school of the United States Army. Fort Gibson has been restored by the Oklahoma Historical Society as a point of historical interest to Oklahomans and visitors alike.

When the Indians east of the Mississippi River were moved because of the force of a growing white population, the United States government set aside an area west of that river as Indian lands. Between 1817 and 1842 the Five Civilized Tribes--Cherokee, Choctaw, Chickasaw, Creek and Seminole--were settled in the area that is now Oklahoma.

These Tribes had organized governments, held slaves, farmed, hunted, traded and lived in an orderly manner. Schools supported by tribal funds, missionary enterprise, and the federal government were numerous.

Much of western Oklahoma--truly the last great frontier--was opened to white settlement by the "Runs". The first of these was at high noon, April 22, 1889, when 2 million acres of unassigned land in the central part of the state were opened. Other land openings were held in Oklahoma as late as August 16, 1901.

In the Runs, prospective settlers lined up around the borders of the territory and at a given signal by soldiers, actually ran, rode and walked to the area they wished to claim. Staking a claim often involved making an agreement, peaceful or otherwise, with others who thought they had reached the location first.

In the course of these unusual land openings, many towns actually sprang up overnight, and Oklahoma's reputation for spirited fast growth was begun.

The creation of the Oklahoma Territory adjacent to their land foretold the end of the Five Civilized Tribes as independent nations. The Dawes Commission worked with the Indians in allotting land and preparing Indian Territory to be combined with Oklahoma Territory as a new state. Under the Enabling Act of 1906, delegates from both sections met at Guthrie to write the Constitution.

Oklahoma became a State in 1907 by an act of Congress under Theodore Roosevelt. At that time, Oklahoma had a population of 1,414,177. The state capitol was still located at Guthrie, but in 1910 after much rivalry it was moved to Oklahoma City.

The first great surge of oil development occurred just before statehood and called for the investment of enormous amounts of capital in leases, drilling, storage, gathering lines, shipping facilities and refining. By the time the first governor was elected, the state had seen 5,000 oil wells drilled.

As early as 1940, oil production had passed the 3 billion gallon mark, and today Oklahoma oil is known throughout the world for both its quality and quantity. Natural gas is also produced in these oil fields with production valued at as much as 43 million dollars in a single year.


In recent years agriculture has taken a prime place due to the varied soil and climate. Oklahoma ranks first in the nation in the production of broomcorn and mung beans; and among the top few in producing wheat, alfalfa seed, grain sorghums and pecans. It is also high above national

averages in its crops of cotton, corn and oats. All crops combined gave the state a farm income of nearly 3/4 billion dollars in 1950.

Since cattle trail days the beef industry has been important to Oklahoma. Long Horns have given way to the finest of heavy beef cattle as shown by sale at auction in 1944 of an Oklahoma Hereford Bull for \$38,000, one of the highest prices in cattle history. Ranching has diversified now to include sheep raising; turkey production (fifth in the nation); large pork production; and poultry and dairy farming, both of which pass 50 million dollars in volume annually.

Mineral wealth in Oklahoma includes 16 of the world's 20 most important raw minerals. Among these are some of the world's richest asphalt areas and large deposits of coal, gypsum, and limestone. The state ranks first in the nation in production of zinc and chat.

Oklahoma's moderate year-round climate, natural resources, fine labor force and abundance of power generated by its great dams and hydroelectric systems as well as privately owned public-utility sources have brought many great manufacturing and industrial plants to the state. Refineries, flour mills, textile plants, glass factories and many other industries complete a diversified range of American business.



OKLAHOMA CITY

Oklahoma City, capital of Oklahoma, is located in the north-central part of the state, eight miles northwest of the District of Columbia. The population of Oklahoma City is 475,000. The city was founded on April 22, 1890, and was the first city to be built on the rolling prairie along the banks of the North Canadian River. Before 1890 there were several small towns in the District, but they had been abandoned by 1890.


OKLAHOMA CITY

Oklahoma City, capital of Oklahoma, is located in the center of the great eight-state Southwest--the fastest growing area in the United States. The beginning of Oklahoma City is unique in American history. Between noon and sundown on April 22, 1889, a city of 10,000 persons sprang into being on the rolling prairie along the banks of the North Canadian River. Before night these persons, from every state in the Union, had banded together to form the new city government.

Today, 66 years since its founding, metropolitan Oklahoma City has an estimated population of 400,000 and is still growing. It is the chief market for the state's vast livestock industry and a major processing point for both livestock and agriculture products. It is Oklahoma's jobbing center, handling over 40 per cent of the state's wholesaling business.

Oklahoma City is essentially one of individual homes, although there are large apartment-house sections. The newer districts are laid out with winding streets and artistic landscaping. Streets are tree lined and every home, from modest bungalow to pretentious slateroofed mansion, has some lawn about it.

In Oklahoma City the climate is pleasant, the educational facilities are excellent, the cost of living is moderate, sanitation and health guarding provisions are of the best, parks are numerous and utilities and public services have kept abreast of the rapid expansion of the city.



HISTORY OF OKLAHOMA CITY UNIVERSITY

Like the eminent state in which it has grown, Oklahoma City University has progressed to its present reputable position because of the planning, labor and prayers of its founders and administrators. It has seen the picturesque and turbulent era of the pioneers, missionaries and Boomers. From its parentage, which was a blending of Oklahoma and Texas, the University has grown from a crude frontier birth into a cultural and scholastic center.

The story of Oklahoma City University is in two parts. The first tells of the rise of Methodism in Oklahoma and the establishment of the first missions during the early half of the last century. Dates of the first Methodist missions in Oklahoma are not positive; but it is known that as early as 1840, missionaries were working among the Indians of eastern Oklahoma. In log cabins, sod houses and perhaps even in the crude tepees of the tribesmen, these missionaries braved the dangers of the frontier to bring to the Red Man and to the scattered white families the fundamentals of religious education. These early Methodist missions constitute one part of the tradition behind the institution known today as Oklahoma City University.

In 1889, the academic family tree of the University took root in Fort Worth, Texas. The history of the struggling young college is not now clear, but after a few years the school was chartered as Fort Worth University and kept that name until 1911, when it was moved to Guthrie, Oklahoma, and took the name of Oklahoma Methodist University.

However, this was not the actual beginning of the University's history. In 1904, the Oklahoma Methodist Episcopal Church established a college in Oklahoma City under the name of Epworth University. The campus of that school was located in what is now the 1900 block on North Douglas street. This college operated until 1911 when it also merged with Oklahoma Methodist University at Guthrie. Thus Texas and Oklahoma antecedents of the present University were wedded together, and thereafter the course of what is now Oklahoma City University became more clearly defined.

Due to financial difficulties the young institution at Guthrie failed to prosper. In 1919 the Oklahoma Methodist University moved to Oklahoma City, and the name was changed to Oklahoma City College under the direction of President E. G. Green. At that time the College had an enrollment of 115 students, a library of 1,000 volumes and a budget of \$9,000. Rented buildings at Northeast 12th and Walnut Street served as the campus.

The first of Oklahoma City University's present campus was acquired in 1921 when 20 acres of land were purchased. The first building, now the Administration building, was occupied in November, 1922.

Two years later the name of the school was changed to Oklahoma City University. It was during the presidency of Dr. Eugene M. Antrim in 1926 that the gymnasium was built. The third building to be erected was the School of Music in 1928.

For 18 years the school suffered the typical financial ups and downs without any additional buildings. The unification of Methodism in 1939 brought new strength and new hope to the University. President A. G. Williamson heroically steered it through the terrible depression and began the building of an endowment fund.

In 1941, Dr. C. Q. Smith became president of the University. Under his leadership the assets have increased more than 5 million dollars. There are 28 buildings on the campus today, including: the magnificent Gold Star Memorial Library and School of Religion, C. Q. Smith Student-Faculty Center, Industrial Arts and the School of Business. Additional purchases of land have brought the campus site to 50 acres in the center of metropolitan Oklahoma City.

The evening college had grown to such immediate proportions that the old YMCA building with 66,000 square feet of floor space, in the heart of the downtown area, was purchased in 1952 and converted into a spacious evening college. When additional buildings were completed on the campus in September, 1955, evening classes were moved to the campus to permit optimum use of equipment, parking, and other facilities.


The University is now operated through five autonomous schools: the College of Arts and Sciences, the School of Music, the School of Business, the School of Law and the School of Industrial Arts.

Enrollment of the University for the fall term of 1955 is 3,157. The University is fully accredited by the North Central Association, the

University Senate of the Methodist Church, the National Commission of Christian Higher Education and the Oklahoma State Board of Education. It is a member of the Association of American Colleges, Urban Universities, University Evening Colleges and the National Collegiate Athletic Association. As since its origin, Oklahoma City University is owned and controlled by the Methodist Church.

The University has for many years offered courses in various business subjects. In 1946, however, the School of Business was organized as a separate autonomous school. Under the direction of Glenn D. Overman and a capable staff, the School of Business has grown to be highly respected throughout the Southwest.

A student of business at Oklahoma City University may choose his major course of study in Accounting, Economics, Finance, General Business Administration, Management, Marketing, Secretarial Administration or Business Education. These courses are taught by well-qualified, effective instructors; and guest lecturers drawn from metropolitan Oklahoma City bring actual and practical experience in the business world to the students. Furthermore, the curricula are designed to allow the student not only to make an intensive study in the business field of his major interest but also to devote a substantial part of his time to other nonbusiness studies which are necessary to a well-rounded education.





HISTORY OF DELTA KAPPA

In the early part of March, 1944, a group of men from the Oklahoma City University School of Business were brought together by Dr. J. O. Thomas, the executive secretary of Delta Sigma Pi. The intention was to discuss the possibility of establishing a business fraternity. The purpose of this meeting was to learn about the organization and to discuss the college undergraduate professional business fraternity.

HISTORY OF DELTA KAPPA

This meeting was held at the home of Ralph W. Wiley and Charles E. Jordan, both of whom later served as presidents of Delta Kappa. The meeting was under the sponsorship and guidance of Glenn E. Overman, Dean of the School of Business.

It was at this meeting that the group first learned that Oklahoma City University was an eligible University and that the School of Business had sufficient enrollment to support an organization of this type.

Further, Mr. Thomas explained to the group the professional fraternity system, its function and objectives. He explained the Delta Sigma Pi Fraternity, its purposes and its organization.

Talks were also given at this meeting on the subject of business fraternities as they affected Oklahoma City University and the students of the School of Business. These were given by Glenn E. Overman and Charles E. Jordan. A luncheon meeting was conducted by Wiley for the meeting.

HISTORY OF DELTA KAPPA

In the early part of March, 1954, a group of men from the Oklahoma City University School of Business were brought together to hear J. D. Thomson, the executive secretary of Delta Sigma Pi, the international fraternity of commerce and business administration. The purpose of this meeting was to learn about the organization and purpose of the college undergraduate professional business fraternity.

This meeting was primarily the responsibility of Ralph W. Willey and Charles E. Burton, both of whom later served as president of Delta Kappa. The meeting was under the sponsorship and guidance of Glenn D. Overman, Dean of the School of Business.

It was at this meeting that the group first learned that Oklahoma City University was an eligible University and that the School of Business had sufficient enrollment to support an organization of this type.

Further, Mr. Thomson explained to the group the professional fraternity system, its functions and objectives. He explained the Delta Sigma Pi Fraternity, its purposes and its organization.

Talks were also given at this meeting on the subject of business fraternities as they affected Oklahoma City University and the students of the School of Business. These were given by Glenn D. Overman and Charles E. Burton, a business student who presided as host for the meeting.

After some discussion from the floor it was decided that a sufficient number of the students present were interested to justify organizing a fraternity in the field of commerce and business administration. At this time a date was set for the first organizational meeting of the group.

During the first organizational meeting on March 6, 1954, it was conclusively decided to organize a fraternity in the field of commerce and business administration on the Oklahoma City University campus. The first election of officers was also held at that meeting. The results were President, Ralph W. Willey; Vice President, Charles E. Burton; Secretary and Treasurer, Roger Pierce. There were 17 men present.

It was the consensu of the group that the aims of the fraternity shall be such that they are compatible with the objectives of the University and shall be formulated with these general purposes:

1. To bridge the gap between the fields of commerce and business administration and the undergraduate members of the fraternity in both practice and study
2. To foster closer relationship between the students of the School of Business and the business world
3. To encourage high scholastic attainment
4. To perpetuate friendship within its membership
5. To promote college loyalties

It was further agreed that another general aim of the organization would be to petition a national group at some future time.

Work began at once on the constitution and ritual of the fraternity. With the writing of a ritual the Greek letters Delta Kappa were chosen

as the name of the fraternity. The letters Delta Kappa were given secret and ritualistic meaning. Thereafter the ritual was written by the chairman of that particular committee, Davis M. Parker.

With the name chosen and the work on the constitution almost finished, the fraternity was well under way. The faculty and the Dean of the School of Business gave Delta Kappa complete support from its inception.

At the meeting on April 20, 1954, the new constitution was read for approval by the chairman of that committee, Wayne F. Walton. It was approved at the same meeting.

After the approval of the constitution by Delta Kappa it was submitted to the University Faculty Committee on Student Organizations. It was at this time that Delta Kappa was given recognition by the University.

Interest of the members and faculty continued to remain very high. So high, in fact, that at the first initiation all the original 17 men who were present at the first organizational meeting were present for their initiation and banquet. Glenn D. Overman, Dean of the School of Business, and John T. Hedges, business law professor, were also initiated at that time.

After the completion of organization in the spring semester of 1954, the fraternity went into recess during the academic summer vacation.

The following fall, Delta Kappa regrouped to begin the work to which the fraternity was originally dedicated. The aspects of rush, professional


programs and plans to meet the requirements of a petition were discussed and worked out. In addition, several campus projects were adopted and completed.

Each semester Delta Kappa has a rush smoker to which all the eligible students of the School of Business are invited. At these smokers, a personality from some field of business is guest speaker. Meetings are also attended by representatives from the School of Business faculty.

Along the lines of a professional program, Delta Kappa has now set up a policy that one of the two business meetings held each month be given entirely to a speaker or tour or some program which is compatible with the educational aims and ideals of the fraternity. The other monthly meeting is reserved for conducting the regular business of the fraternity.

Meeting the requirements to petition a national fraternity has always been in the plans of Delta Kappa. A committee was appointed to make a complete investigation. After this investigation the fraternity voted unanimously to petition Delta Sigma Pi.

Interest and participation continues to remain very high among both the membership and the faculty. As the rush program and the professional program continue to progress, the entire membership has adopted the policy of "going national" in order that the aims of Delta Kappa might be better accomplished.
