


It has been brought to my attention that the Sigma Pi honorary fraternity of Ferris Institute is applying for admission into the International Fraternity of Delta Sigma Pi.


A number of our leading business administration and accounting majors in our School of Commerce here at the state college have visited with me relative to installation of a Delta Sigma Pi Chapter here at the college.

HISTORY OF THE CITY

The Rapids is a Creek town, which is situated on the banks of the Michigan River. This town, which is situated in the county seat of Macomb County, Michigan, was founded in 1825. The name was given by one of the first settlers of this place to be found in this section of the nation.

The site location was due to the fact that the Huron River which empties into the Bay of Saginaw Bay and provided excellent locations for mills. During this

period of operation the production of large quantities of lumber was the result of the development of this section of Michigan. It was by various other sections of the country.

The city was first incorporated under the act of December, 1837, one of the earliest acts of the Michigan Legislature. It was then known as Big Rapids. The name was changed to Big Rapids in 1857.

In the spring of 1857, Big Rapids achieved a form of city government. Since incorporation very much has followed and included the installation of a water system and fire department.

The next year, in the fall of 1858, the first train of the Grand Rapids and Chicago Railroad passed through the city.

History of Big Rapids

Big Rapids is a direct descendant of the colorful lumbering days of Michigan. This quiet progressive city, the county seat of Mecosta county, now occupies an area which was once covered by one of the finest stands of virgin pine to be found in this section of the nation.

The city's location was due to the "big rapids" of the Muskegon river which hampered the flow of logs down stream and provided excellent locations for sawmills. During their period of operation the sawmills were responsible for the production of large quantities of lumber which contributed to the development of this section of Michigan as well as various other sections of the midwest.

The city was first known as Leonard, after Dr. F.B. Leonard, one of the earliest settlers, but was quick to change the name to Big Rapids because the lumbermen referred to it as "the big rapids."

In the spring of 1869, Big Rapids achieved a form of city government. Civic improvements were quick to follow and included the installation of a water system and fire department.

The next year, in the fall of 1870, the first trains of the Grand Rapids and Indiana railroad steamed through the city.

The twenty-five years following the installation of the first railroad found the community flourishing as the lumbering industry reached its peak in 1893. As the chopping sound of the lumberjack's axe and the whining of the sawmills began to decrease in volume, it became necessary for the city to seek new industry. Following the departure of the lumbermen, manufacturing establishments developed, as did agriculture.

In 1892, John Hanchett founded the Hanchett Manufacturing Company. This was later developed by his brother, Volney, into one of the leading sawmill filing machinery manufacturing plants in the nation. The company has been in continuous operation since its founding and at the present time is the leading manufacturer of huge industrial grinding machines.

At the present time Big Rapids has seven principle industries including: Hanchett Manufacturing Company which produces saw sharpeners and industrial grinders; the Denham Manufacturing Company, producers of accessories for automobile and refrigerator manufacturing companies; the Hanchett Maga-Lock Corporation, producers of magnetic chucks; the Rapids Furniture Shops which specialize in exclusive mahogany tables; the Wolverine Shoe Manufacturers, makers of men's shoes; the Fashion Industries, Inc., manufacturers of women's rayon lingerie; and the Madison Industries, Inc., producers of gun drills.

The development of the oil and gas industry in the area has been of great benefit to the economy of Big Rapids. The Taggart Brothers Company was the pioneer in this development for in the early twenties they discovered the Austin field, one of the largest gas storage fields in the United States.

Big Rapids' population of about 7,500 enjoys a stable agreeable average temperature of 69 degrees in July to 31 degrees in February. The average precipitation for the area is 32 inches.

Some of the major assets of the city include a fine consolidated school system; a thirty-five bed hospital to which an addition is presently in the process of completion; a radio station, WRBN, which is located two miles south of the city; and fourteen churches of various denominations.

Big Rapids is served by one of the oldest daily newspapers in Michigan, The Big Rapids Pioneer. The first issue was printed on April 17, 1862 and was a weekly paper. In August of 1881, the paper began daily publications which have since been continuous.

Big Rapids now has more retail establishments than ever before in its history and its annual volume of business is well above the state average. The future of this growing city is further enhanced by the Big Rapids Chamber of Commerce, as well as several fine civic organizations, all of which are active in the welfare and development of the city.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF FERRIS INSTITUTE

BIG RAPIDS, MICHIGAN

Ferris Institute was established on September 1, 1884 by the late Woodbridge N. Ferris. It was operated in a downtown location in rented quarters until 1895, when it was moved to the location of the present campus.

It was originally called the Ferris Industrial School, but in 1899 it was rechristened with its present title, Ferris Institute. Its first building was erected in 1894, a difficult period of depression. With an original enrollment of 15, by 1907 its alumni numbered over 25,000.

Mr. Ferris described the school as "an institution which prepares young men and women for the actual duties of life." Early emphasis was on work at the secondary school level, and appeals were directed particularly to young people and adults who had been denied the opportunities of an education. The whole spirit of the school was antagonistic to any philosophy of class education. Mr. Ferris described the first courses of study thus: "The curriculum embraces a complete course in business training, a comprehensive teacher's course, a practical course in industrial science, and common English." Thus, the commercial department was one of the original departments of Ferris Institute.

In 1893 the beginnings of a pharmacy department were made, with one student in attendance, with Mr. Ferris as teacher, and an early edition of Remington's pharmacy book as the text. By January, 1902, there were one hundred students enrolled in pharmacy. In 1900 "first-year college" department was added and arrangements were made with a number of other colleges to accept credits on transfer. A few years later, two years of college level work were added, particularly in the normal and pre-professional levels.

Ferris Institute is recorded at Washington as being one of the few schools offering terminal vocational programs early in the century. A number of these

were in commerce. Out of these, as the professional needs arose, grew the four-year degree programs in commerce and business administration.

In 1912, in the then totally Republican state, by virtue of the school's heavy alumni list, Mr. Ferris was elected governor on the Democratic ticket and was re-elected in 1914. He entered the United States Senate in 1922 and died in office in 1928. He had previously sold most of his stock in the school corporation to two of his associates, Mr. Gerrit Masselink and Mr. Bert S. Travis, who carried on operations while Mr. Ferris was engaged in political activities. Mr. Masselink outlived him by only a year; and as a result of the depression of 1929, while another building was under construction, the school found itself in financial difficulty.

In 1931, forty Big Rapids businessmen underwrote the institution as a non-profit corporation and operated it until 1949, at which time it was offered to the State of Michigan. Senate Bill 251, the Smith-VanderWerp Bill, was passed by the Michigan Legislature, and signed by Governor G. Mennen Williams on May 17, 1949, accepting the school as a member of the family of state colleges. This act was the result of a study by the Committee of Seventeen, headed by Dr. Alexander Ruthven, president of the University of Michigan. The committee, after careful study, reported favorably on the proposal.

On February 21, 1950, a fire of unknown origin destroyed all of the buildings except the Alumni Building and half dozen war surplus barracks being used as student living quarters. Three days later the school was once more in operation, using these barracks as temporary classrooms and offices. Legislative appropriations were made for reconstruction, and by fall, 1952, classes were meeting in the new East Building, with administrative offices, library, and other student activities housed in the new West Building. Since 1952, the history of Ferris has been one of rapid growth and expansion. The school has mushroomed to meet the tremendous educational needs of the decade and the student demand for the curricula particular to it.

No other school in the country has had a background that has had imposed in its very existence, within the framework of the general purpose of the institution, those principles of practical vocational training based on sound general education. To accept an adult student at any educational level, to remedy his deficiencies, and to send him out to participate in the world equipped with the knowledge of his trade or profession, armed with ethical integrity, was the basic idea of the founder and the basis of state acceptance of the school.


Highlighting some of the educational developments in recent years, degrees based upon four years of standard college work were first offered in 1932, though for several years only a handful of students elected the degree courses, the majority continuing to elect terminal work. Today, by contrast, approximately 73 per cent of all Ferris students are taking courses which lead to the B.S. degree in commerce, teacher's training, or pharmacy. The number taking pre-professional and terminal commerce work brings to about 86 per cent the number taking work at the college level. The remainder are enrolled in the high school department and in the school of trades and industry.

In 1953, the Board of Control, as they interpreted the legislative mandate contained in Public Act 114 of the public acts of 1949, outlined eleven major program objectives pursuant to the institution's educational program. These objectives, which are merely a summary restatement of educational developments through the years are:

1. A degree program in pharmacy, concentrating primarily in the retail drug field.
2. A degree program in commerce limited to selected specialties, with non-degree training for secretaries, salesmen, accountants, and other commercial occupations.
3. Degree programs for secondary teachers in commerce and science.
4. Pre-professional and general education programs permitting one to two years of work to be transferred to other colleges and universities.
5. Accelerated high school and college preparatory courses for adults and those who need to make up deficiencies for college work.

6. Non-degree vocational programs for women.
7. Non-degree trade and industrial programs for men.
8. A community program on a regional basis offering credit and non-credit courses.
9. College terminal programs for the training of technicians in various industrial, medical, scientific, and service related occupations.
10. Education service programs, such as seminars and conferences.
11. Cooperation with public and private institutions in the presentation of workshop and classroom instruction in selected areas.

Ferris Institute has held true to the plan of its conception--a plan that has proved to be a direct answer to the needs of the American public for life in the twentieth century. It is, in short, a practical program, based on sound academic principles, flexible enough to fit the requirements of a rapidly changing universe.

HISTORY OF COMMERCE DIVISION

Through the years the Commerce Division has spent its days in various ways and for various purposes, a little more or less and the results have been, naturally, somewhat varied. The Commerce Division was organized in 1884 as one of the three original departments of Ferris Institute. Historically, the instructional program was geared to provide practical business training for bookkeepers, stenographers, and storekeepers. In 1910, the business teacher education curriculum was added to the offerings of the Division. Three curricula were listed, commercial teachers course, shorthand teachers course, and combined commercial and shorthand teachers course. The four-year program in Commerce leading to the Bachelor of Science Degree was begun in 1933.


Through the years the Commerce Division has opened its doors to everyone having a sincerity of purpose, a willingness to work hard and the capacity to achieve. Students entered at any time and continued in training until they had achieved their goals. The purposes, clientele, and entrance requirements of the Commerce Division have not changed materially throughout the years. The purposes or objectives of the Division may be summarized as follows:

1. To provide the basic training in commerce and related educational subjects to enable the student to understand his business environment, to assume additional responsibilities, and to qualify for promotional opportunities.
2. To inspire the student to acquire further knowledge not only in his chosen field of activity but also in general education.
3. To inculcate in the student high ethical standards of conduct in his personal, business and community relationships.
4. To encourage the student in the development of a better appreciation of good literature, art, music, science, and the opportunities for wise use of leisure time.

5. To awaken the student to a full realization of his personal responsibilities and duties as a citizen of his community, state, and nations.

The courses of study, however, have been reorganized, expanded, and grouped together into sharply defined degrees and terminal vocational needs of the individual in a rapidly changing, complex business society.

The Commerce Division stands alert and sensitive to the changing needs of the individuals, businesses, communities, businessmen and leaders and looks forward to continued growth in its field of service.

PROFESSIONAL FRATERNITIES

The Beta Mu Chapter of the RHO CHI PHARMACEUTICAL HONOR SOCIETY, the only national honorary society for scholarship in pharmacy, was installed at Ferris Institute on May 19, 1955. Memberships in RHO CHI is by invitation and is limited to those persons in the top 20% of the Senior Class with a grade average of at least 3.00.

Since installation, the Beta Mu Chapter has endeavored to promote scholarships within the pharmacy division by presenting awards each spring to the outstanding sophomores and by sponsoring various education programs throughout the year.

ALPHA PSI OMEGA

The Kappa Eta Cast of Alpha Psi Omega, National Honorary Dramatic Fraternity, was established at Ferris Institute in 1946. The cast is one of the three hundred collegiate chapters in the nation.

Membership to the fraternity is earned through the Ferris Playhouse by acquiring fifty points by acting, stage work and other dramatic activities. Kappa Eta Cast annually presents fraternity pins to those members who have made outstanding contributions to dramatics on the Ferris campus.

In the fall the fraternity sponsors a Drama Clinic Day for the surrounding high schools to promote education and interest in the dramatic field.

Neighboring fraternities participate in our initiations and the cast is often a guest during the season at initiations and play productions of these colleges.

RESUME OF THE FRATERNITY SITUATION ON CAMPUS

The Interfraternity Council is the coordinating body of all social fraternities at Ferris Institute. It organizes and supports social and recreational activities and promotes and encourages scholastic achievement among its members. It fosters mutual understanding and cooperation among the fraternities and the Ferris Institute Administration and Faculty and promotes the welfare of both school and fraternity as a whole.

PHI SIGMA CHI fraternity was founded as national fraternity in 1901 and Iota Beta chapter of Ferris Institute came into being in 1926.

The "Phi Sigs" have been active on the campus for the past thirty years while at the same time being of service to the community. The men of PHI SIGMA CHI have proudly sponsored the Ferris Institute Homecomings and have tried to make their school and themselves better through this and other activities.

OMEGA TAU OMEGA fraternity was founded in 1949 by a group of eight veterans. In 1950, a charter was granted by the school to the fraternity, making it a new member to the group of fraternities on campus.

In the years that this organization has been functioning, it has shown much spirit in activities and has been taking an active part in college functions throughout the school year. The O.T.O.'s have brought five name bands to the campus of Ferris Institute for the entertainment of all of the students.

PHI DELTA CHI fraternity, a national pharmacy fraternity was founded at the University of Michigan in 1883. The local chapter at Ferris Institute was established in September of 1950.

The local chapter has been known for its many social and professional activities. The social events are climaxed by a big all school formal dance called "The Sno-Ball", sponsored by the fraternity in the fall quarter of each school year.

KAPPA PSI NATIONAL PHARMACEUTICAL fraternity was founded in 1879. Gamma Chi chapter was installed at Ferris Institute in March 1952. It is one of the forty-eight collegiate chapters. Until that time they were known as Gamma Kappa Chapter of Kappa Alpha Phi (National Young Men's Fraternity) which was established at Ferris in 1928.

KAPPA PSI, although being a professional fraternity, is active socially on the campus. They sponsor an annual Sweetheart Ball on Valentine's Day each year. The Kappa Karnival, the highlight of student government day festivities, is also presented by the Kappa Psi's.

Fourteen men of Ferris Institute, feeling a need for a social organization to develop more fully the extracurricular activities of the students, organized a club known as STAGS AT BAY. It was soon decided that a social fraternity was desired and on September 1, 1921, STAGS AT BAY, took the equivalent Greek letters for their name - SIGMA ALPHA DELTA.

In 1923, SIGMA ALPHA BETA, applied for incorporation under the laws of the State of Michigan, finding another organization with the same name, it changed to SIGMA ALPHA DELTA.

KAPPA SIGMA KAPPA fraternity, Eta Chapter of the International Social fraternity, KAPPA SIGMA KAPPA starts each year with an after-game dance, followed up with their annual "Millionaires Party". Other activities throughout the year include such things as an entry of a float in the Homecoming Parade, participation in Interfraternity sports,

DELTA TAU EPSILON became recognized as a fraternity on April 25, 1956, by vote of the Interfraternity Council. The fraternity functioned on an organizational status basis for a period of two years and was fully recognized by the Interfraternity Council in May, 1958.

It was well received by these businessmen, and Sigma Pi received several favorable replies from them.

In the spring of the year Sigma Pi holds its annual picnic at Chippewa Lake. Swimming and boating are the main forms of recreation, and of course the brother's consume huge quantities of food. Also in the spring of the year Sigma Pi holds its initiation banquet. A guest speaker is generally brought in from the business world for this event.

Although Sigma Pi is the newest fraternity on the Ferris Campus, it already holds an important position in campus activities. Future plans call for an expanding of these activities as the fraternity grows in size.


