MUNCIE, INDIANA

A Muncie citizen in 1855 wrote to a friend in New York that "there is not much money around here. The merchants take furs, cattle, horses, and hogs in exchange for the goods". From this simple barter system came a prosperity that initiated a steady economic development and produced the largest industrial city and trading center of the East Central Indiana area.

The city derived its name from the local Munsee Indians, a branch of the original Delaware tribe, after which the county is called. In the early days of poor transportation, it was probably the White River which attracted the first settlers to the Muncie area, but the acquisition of a rail-noad line in 1852 was of considerable importance in developing the town as a trading center. By the end of the (ivil War, Muncie had been incorporated as a city and with the founding of its first bank in 1856, was well on its way toward becoming a prosperous city. The gas "boom" of the 1880's was all it took for the city to change completely to an industrial economy.

During the 1890's, 5400 natural gas wells were drilled in Indiana, most of them within one hundred miles of Muncie. With the gas came at least four glass factories, a pulp mill, a nail concern, knitting mills and steelworks, among other industries. When the gas resources began to fail after the turn of the century, most of Muncies' companies remained instead of making it a ghost town as was the result in many Eastern Indiana towns.

Among the early industries was the nationally known Ball Brothers plant whose fruit jars and related products are shipped to all parts of the world. The company also owns zinc, rubber, and paper plants. In 1901, Warner Gear established a plant for the manufacture of automobile and farm machinery components. Presently it produces about ten

thousand auto transmissions per day. Other leading companies are Delco Battery, (hevrolet-Muncie, Markoefer Packing (ompany, and a new Westinghouse Electric (orporation plant designed to build the largest transformers in the world.


Among the many contributions of the Ball Brothers is the largest and best hospital in Eastern Indiana and what is now Ball State Teachers (ollege, located in the western section of the city. This institution of learning lends a college-town atmosphere in addition to Muncies' other characteristics. Ball State has been recognized for more than twenty-five years as one of the country's leading liberal arts and teacher-training institutions.

Muncie has long been regarded as a "Typical American" city. In 1940 it was named "Ideal American (ity" of secondary size by a New York research organization. The city's own airport was opened in 1932 and has sixty planes and five runways. The port is one of the best in the Midwest for a city of its size. Muncie is served by excellent rail, air, and highway transportation facilities. A radio station has been in operation for nearly forty years and a television station has been added to better communication facilities in recent years. In addition to its position as county seat and trading and financial center for the surrounding agricultural and suburban area, Muncie is highly diversified, being the manufacturing center for 165 manufacturing concerns producing more than 200 products which include automotive products, steel products, glass products, furniture and food products.

Muncie is truly a typical midwestern city. The diversity of the city is typified by the dozens of industrial concerns, service industries, wholesale and retail firms, and transportation companies. Muncie provides several beautiful parks, with a new complete recreational area being developed southeast of the city; a system of fine schools, many of them newly built; excellent hospital and medical facilities; one of the best agricultural surrounding areas in Indiana, and a group of dedicated civic leaders who are intent upon

leading Muncie to greater heights in economic and civic development. The added presence of the third largest educational institution in Indiana completes the diversity of Muncie by making available numerous educational and cultural opportunities that would otherwise not be possible in a city of its size. The citizenry of the locality of the Muncie Metropolitan area numbers over one hundred thousand persons. The impact of Ball State upon the community can easily be seen by its addition of another ten percent of the population, made up of 8,000 students and several hundred staff and faculty.

Muncie citizens and those who know its assets and potentials recognize that Muncie continues to be the "Ideal American (ity".


BALL MEMORJAL HOSPITAL

Ball Memorial Hospital is the largest and best equipped hospital in Eastern Indiana. It is one of the many philanthropic endeavors of the Ball Family,




BURRIS LABORATORY SCHOOL

Burris School, one of the modern schools serving the city, is located on the Ball State campus. It is used extensively by the education department of the college as a laboratory school.




MC CULLOCH PARK

THE GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT OF BALL STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE

Ball State Teachers College is located at Muncie, Indiana, the county seat of Delaware County, 56 miles northeast of Indianapolis. Situated in a predominantly residential area of Muncie, the campus consists of more than 400 acres. The prevailing architecture at Ball State is Tudor Gothic, although recently constructed buildings are in contemporary functional design. Brick and stone facings predominate on all buildings.

Immediately adjoining the campus is Ball Memorial Hospital, a private enterprise which cooperates with the College in medical technology and nurse-training programs.

Higher education on what is now the Ball State campus began in 1898. The school was first known as Eastern Indiana Normal Institute. Later the College operated under three other names: Palmer University, Indiana Normal School, and Muncie Normal Institute.

Early in 1918 the property and facilities of Muncie Normal were purchased by the five Ball brothers, nationally known glass manufacturers at Muncie, and donated to Indiana State Normal School, a state institution at Terre Haute. This gift enabled Indiana State to establish an eastern division, which opened on June 17, 1918, with an enrollment of 383 students. The new Eastern Division conferred its first baccalaureate degrees in 1920.

In 1929 the Indiana General Assembly gave formal recognition to the generosity and public spirit of the Ball family by incorporating the Ball name into the title of the Eastern Division. This same Act of the General Assembly established Ball State as a separate college. Since 1925 the College has been fully accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. Ball State is now the fastest-growing institution of higher education in Indiana. Moreover, with an enrollment of over 8,000 students and construction of many new buildings, Ball State

ranks third in the state, surpassed only by Purdue and Indiana Universities.

Recent improvements to the campus include a new Music building, an English building, and a large addition to the Library. An extensive addition to the English and Music buildings was completed in 1961; this unit houses a small theater, radio and television facilities, and class-rooms. Ground will be broken in 1962 for the 3,500-seat (ommunity-College Auditorium which will complete the English-Music complex. In addition, construction was recently begun on a new physical education plant.

The major portion of Ball State's recent physical expansion has been in the construction of new dormitories. One men's residence and two women's residences have recently been completed, a coeducational residence is under construction and scheduled for completion in 1962, and plans for still another coeducational hall have been announced. Other recent construction includes a two-fold expansion of the Student (enter and modernization of the heating plant and equipment.

In addition, College officials have announced plans for construction of a new student health center, a large football stadium, an addition to the Science Building, and for expansion of the Business Department facilities.

Physical expansion has been only a part of Ball State's recent growth. The number of departments offering undergraduate schedules has increased to fourteen, and Ball State now provides programs in liberal and applied arts, pre-professional study, and graduate study, as well as the original curriculums in education.

Largest among the fourteen departments is the Business Department; the several curriculums in Business boast of an enrollment of more than fifteen percent of all undergraduate students.

Greater intensity within each degree program has paralleled Ball state's rapid growth. In the spring of 1932 the College began presenting courses on the graduate

Level. The first master's degrees were conferred in June of 1934. The first doctor's degree was granted jointly with Indiana University in December of 1952. In June of 1960, the first doctor's degree on a joint program with Purdue University was granted. Programs leading to both Doctor of Philosophy and Doctor of Education degrees were begun by the College in September of 1961.


Ball State also offers many cultural facilities for the enjoyment of students and the community. The Art Gallery which is nationally recognized, houses more original works by the old masters than any college art gallery in the country. Displaying collections of nearly every type of artistic endeavor, the galleries not only feature the college's own collection but exhibits of student art work are also shown throughout the year. During special weeks of the school year, featured exhibits of textiles, painting, and sculpture are also shown.

In other areas, the College schedules a wide range of programs directed toward the cultural interests of the campus and community. A convocation series annually brings to the campus outstanding artists in many phases of world activity. Also, many concerts and recitals are given throughout the year by the students and faculty of the Music Department, and by the Muncie Symphony Orchestra.

The newest addition to the large cultural program offered by the College is the College-Community Auditorium Series. This series brings to Ball State an outstanding array of dramatic and musical talent. Spotlight Theatre plays and a schedule of popular and foreign films are also presented for the entertainment of students, faculty, and townspeople.




ADMINISTRATION BUILDING

The remodelled administration building is the oldest building on campus and houses classrooms as well as the administrative and business offices.




ARTS BUILDING

The gallery in the arts building lists a collection of old masters comparable to any other school in the country. The classrooms are used for the instruction of art, social science and foreign languages.




DE HORITY HALLS

One of the two women's residence halls completed in recent years houses one-thousand women in a modern atmosphere.




ELLJOTT HALL

Facilities of the Frank Elliott Ball Hall for men include student rooms, cafeteria, lounge, kitchen, and club rooms.




COLLEGE LIBRARY

The new Music Building and its counterpart the English Building, will be integrated into the College Community Center including a large auditorium, a small theater, and the Music and English Departments.




NOYER HALL


PROPOSED PHYSICAL EDUCATION PLANT

Ball State has a profound need for a professional business administration fraternity. The business education department and particularly the business administration area of this department is one of the fastest growing and best regarded divisions of our college. As one who is in daily contact with many of our 20,000 alumni, I see on a first-hand basis the impact that our business administration majors are having on business and industry in our geographic region.

Today our college, although still carrying the title of Teachers College, is not "just" a teachers college, for our graduates are in the several professions and myriad occupational fields.

As an institution today, about 80 per cent of our graduating seniors are licensed to teach and about 70 per cent actually enter the teaching profession. About ten years after graduation, the percentage of graduates remaining in teaching areas drops off to about 50 per cent.

Dr. Swanson was appointed to the faculty at Ball State in 1954. Immediately prior to his teaching assignment in Muncie, Dr. Swanson had been a visiting professor at Columbia. In addition, Dr. Swanson was a faculty member at Thiel College.

Prior to the appointment in 1961, as Business Department Head, Dr. Swanson had advanced to the position of Coordinator of Departmental Services. Dr. Swanson, recognizing the fact that an education in business administration must serve to prepare students for the business world, has been a motivating force to Beta Alpha Pi this year.

Gentlemen:

It is a pleasure to respond to the invitation from Beta Alpha Pi, a local professional business administration fraternity, to support their petition to become affiliated with Delta Sigma Pi.

The following information has provided the base on which The Department of Business Education decided to support the action of these young men in both organizing Beta Alpha Pi and in petitioning your organization for affiliation:

- 1. There are approximately 1500 majors and minors enrolled in this department as of September of the current academic year. The two major curricula on which these students are enrolled are business teaching and business administration. The number enrolled on these two is approximately the same, although the business administration group has an insignificantly greater number at the present time.
- Most of the persons enrolled on the business administration curricula are men. The greatest need for a professional fraternity in this area, therefore, exists for men.
- 3. The program in business administration is officially only 8 years old. In this short time it has expanded to become one of the major curricula and to serve an increasing number of students. Complete areas of specialization are provided in accounting, marketing/merchandising, and general business administration.
- 4. The faculty of the Department of Business Education, consisting of 29 full and part-time persons, approve of the formation of this professional fraternity. Eleven of the faculty members who work primarily in the business administration area are lending support to the work of the group.
- Beta Alpha Pi is the only group of this nature to be authorized for this campus.
- 6. The students who formed Beta Alpha Pi are among those with the highest scholastic standing in the business administration curriculum. In my contact with the group I have gained the impression that all members are active in the local fraternity's activities as well as in other activities on the campus.

Robert M. Swanson, Head Business Education Department The Department of Business at Ball State has been preparing men and women to enter the field of business since 1918. During the first thirty-six years of its operation, the department was ably headed by Dr. Mark E. Studebaker whose direction stimulated its growth and reputation parallel to that of Ball State.

In the Autumn of 1953 the department first utilized the modern facilities of the Practical Arts Building. The new premises provided the much needed classrooms, offices and laboratories that stimulated expansion and future developments in the Business Administration Program. Part of this development was reflected in the addition of several new courses pertaining to business administration. These courses helped fulfill the formal objective "... to prepare students for positions in business and industry ... " and to meet the demand of Indiana's commercial population for professionally trained personnel. Upon the retirement of Dr. Studebaker in 1954, Dr. Robert E. Bell was appointed head of the department. New courses have continually been added until at present the Business Administration Curriculum is a fully developed, though constantly expanding program of professional training. In September 1961, upon the elevation of Dr. Bell to the position of Dean of the Division of Fine and Applied Arts, Dr. Robert Swanson was appointed head of the Business Department.

The annual Studebaker Memorial Lecture brings a prominent figure of the business world to address the entire student body every year. Speakers in recent years have included Dr. Lillian Gilbreth, who has been voted among America's ten outstanding women; and Mr. William Clark, Financial Editor of The Chicago Tribune. Also, a scholarship fund has been established in the Studebaker name. The annual Business Honors Banquet, sponsored by the faculty of the department, is held in early May each year. At this occasion scholarships

are presented and awards are given to outstanding students in the accounting, marketing and the secretarial fields as well as special recognition to student organization leaders.

The undergraduate curriculum in Business Administration leads to the Bachelor of Arts and the Bachelor of Science degree in four areas of specialization. They are, in descending order of enrollment, as follows:

ACCOUNTING: The accounting curriculum covers the area from simple record keeping to complex financial statement analysis. It develops abilities to render accounting services such as auditing, tax service, cost accounting, budgeting, and systems installations. Outstanding students may take part in the accounting internship program with nationally known public accounting firms.

GENERAL BUSINESS: This curriculum is especially planned to provide training for those students who wish to prepare for managerial types of positions in modern business and industry. Graduates are qualified to accept positions as management trainees in the fields of sales, finance, insurance, personnel administration, and office management.

MARKETING - MERCHANDISING: This area embodies the entire system of distribution. Included is the study of marketing, retailing, salesmanship, advertising, merchandising problems, interpretation of business and ecomonic data and several other phases of distributive operations.

SERETARIAL: The four year secretarial curriculum is designed especially for those students who desire to prepare for executive secretarial jobs or similar positions which usually require a college degree.

The program leading to a Business Administration degree is designed to provide a broad liberal arts education in addition to the intensive specialization in one of the four concentration areas.

The graduate program in business features the comprehensive study of the management problems encountered in the complex business situation of modern industry. This program has been developed with the cooperation of many area businesses and industries to serve the needs for the further education of their younger executives. The graduate offerings are scheduled largely in the evenings to facilitate the attendance of these people who are employed in the Muncie and surrounding communities. The curriculum leading to the Master of Arts Degree in Business is rapidly becoming an important aspect of the business administration program being offered at Ball State.

The Ball State Placement Bureau actively assists the student in business by offering the opportunity of a job interview with representatives of many large and varied industrial concerns and business firms as well as securing reference reports, keeping personnel records, and answering inquiries about graduates.

To supplement the academic atmosphere there are a number of organizations offering social and informative functions within the department. The Commerce Club, oldest departmental organization on campus, was initiated by Dr. Studebaker in 1920. It is open to all departmental students and faculty and continues to serve as a social organization to develop closer relations among the students and faculty. The first honorary fraternity established at Ball State was the Business Education Fraternity, Pi Omega Pi. The local Xi Chapter was installed in 1929. A Chapter of Delta Pi Epsilon, the business education graduate honorary faternity, was established at Ball State in 1948. Then in September of 1961, Beta Alpha Pi, a professional fraternity for top business administration students was organized. As the newest organization in the Business Department, it is making its place both on the campus and in the community. At the present, Beta Alpha Pi is petitioning to become a Chapter of the International Professional Commerce and Business Administration Fraternity of Delta Sigma Pi.



HISTORY OF BETA ALPHA PI

HISTORY OF BETA ALPHA PI

Early in April, 1961, a few students saw the need for a professional organization among the business administration students at Ball State. Through a concentrated exploration and study, ways to meet this need were sought.

John Lewis made an initial investigation and thorough study of several professional organizations. During the Spring of 1961, many students of the business department were contacted and it was found that there was an unusually strong desire for such an organization. During this time, Dr. Robert Bell, the Head of the Business Department, was contacted and stated that such an organization could be beneficial and he advised further investigation. The investigation continued until it was decided that Delta Sigma Pi most nearly fulfilled the desires of the students interested in organizing a group.

On July 31, 1961, Michael Lesher and John Lewis visited the Central Office of Delta Sigma Pi in Oxford, Ohio to obtain information and advice on the organization of a chapter at Ball State (ollege. The information received from the Central Office was diligently studied by a group of interested students. Next, a petition for the organization of a professional business fraternity, such as Delta Sigma Pi, was circulated throughout the business department to poll the student interest. The response was so encouraging that it was decided to initiate an intensive effort to organize a local fraternity. This was followed by contacting all male business professors who unanimously indicated their support of the efforts.

The actual conception of Beta Alpha Pi came September 18, 1961, when the first meeting was held. At this first meeting the Constitution and By-laws were adopted. Officers were elected in accordance with the By-laws as follows:

President - John E. Lewis

Senior Vice-President - Rodney L. Bishop

Vice-President - William L. Johnson

Treasurer - William E. Smith

Secretary - Michael L. Lesher

Chancellor - David E. McGuire

Historian - Donald L. Clark

The name of the organization was chosen to be Beta Alpha Pi Fraternity which represents Business Administration Professional Fraternity. The final business to be conducted at this first meeting was the selection of the following faculty advisors:

General Faculty Advisor - Mr. Joseph W. Jackson Accounting Advisor - Dr. J. Virgil Herring Marketing-Merchandising Advisor - Mr. Clair D. Rowe General Business Advisor - Mr. William R. Smith

At subsequent meetings new members, both faculty and students, were initiated. On October 20, 1961 the petition to the Student Senate for recognition as a legal campus organization was approved.

Since the very beginning and during the short history of the fraternity, the members have shown an extremely high esprit'de corps. Their scholastic achievements are excellent; their social and extracurricular activities are all inclusive. From a simple beginning this group has grown in stature as well as number, with each member working to do his part to make the organization respected both on the campus and in the community. This local fraternity has begun entirely as an organization of students, governed by students, and operated by students of business administration at Ball State.

The purposes of Beta Alpha Pi are six fold and can best be outlined in the following summary:

(1) To affiliate and become an Ideal (hapter of the International Professional Commerce and Business Administration Fraternity of Delta Sigma Pi.

(2) To promote the professional education of Business Administration students by means of professional programs

such as, talks by business leaders, industrial plant tours, and observing businesses and how they are run.

(3) To promote a close-knit fellowship among the members

through close association and mutual interests.

(4) To promote scholarship among the members and to encourage prospective members to attain high standards.

(5) To cultivate and develop those leadership abilities

that will be useful in the professional business world.

(6) To promote and publicize the excellent Business Administration program that Ball State has developed and to encourage the continued improvement in this program.
