

ACCREDITATION AND RECOGNITION

The University of Tampa is fully accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools for teacher education by the Florida State Board of Education. It holds membership in the following organizations:

The University is approved by the Veterans Administration for the education of veterans under Public Law 550 and Public Law 894. Credits earned here are accepted by the Army, the Navy and the Air Force for aviation cadet or officer cadet training.

LOCATION AND HISTORY

The first glimpse of the University of Tampa will be of thirteen silver minarets which stand above the buildings and trees of the city. These minarets, each representing a month of the Moslem year, have become a symbol of Tampa and educational opportunity. They rise from the main University building, erected in 1890, as the Tampa Bay Hotel by railroad magnate

Henry B. Plant at a cost of \$3,500,000. Considered the finest example of Moorish architecture in the country, this building is five stories in height, 1200 feet long, and contains more than 500 rooms. It has been host to crowned heads of Europe and to Teddy Roosevelt and his Rough Riders during the Spanish-American War. Formerly the hotel was the scene of many balls and debuts, and the center of social and cultural life of Tampa. Today this building houses classrooms, laboratories, offices, library, clubrooms, theatre and a Municipal Museum which preserves its original furnishings and objects of art.

Leased from the City of Tampa in 1933 on a 99 year lease, the building has been constantly modernized and restored for more efficient educational use, yet continues to reflect the Tampa tradition.

The University is located in beautiful Plant Park, replete with tropical foliage and overlooking the scenic Hillsborough River. Although an urban institution and only a seven-minute walk from the downtown shopping district, the beauty of its location on the riverfront provides a campus which rivals many suburban colleges. The proximity of downtown offices, banks, theatres and business establishments is an important factor for those who wish to earn while they learn. The campus is fifteen minutes by taxi from Tampa International Airport and twenty-five minutes from the St. Petersburg-Clearwater Airport. The Seaboard and Atlantic Coast Line railroads and major bus lines also serve

Tampa. Miles of causeways lead to the white beaches of the Gulf of Mexico. Warm fresh and salt waters encourage swimming, skin diving, water skiing, fishing and boating. Sunny skies and sub-tropical climate offer opportunities for year-round picnicking and other outdoor living.

The University was founded in 1931, by public-spirited citizens of the community to provide higher education for young people who lacked financial resources to go away to college.

Today it is rapidly becoming a residential institution. Beneath its minarets one finds students from 37 states and 14 foreign countries, a friendly faculty and all the elements of a sound liberal arts education.

Although the University bears the name of the city in which it is located, it is a private institution. It is non-denominational, chartered under the laws of the State of Florida as a non-profit corporation, and is governed by a self-perpetuating Board of Trustees elected from among leaders in business, industry and the professions.

The Business Department is a small but dynamic group of men vitally interested in business yesterday, today and tomorrow.

SECTION II

THE CITY OF TAMPA

Tampa, hub of Florida's West Coast and Florida's second largest city, is historically old but its growth into a big city, is comparatively new.

In 1528, the Spanish explorer, Narvaez, landed at or near the site of Tampa and in 1539 members of DeSoto's expedition came ashore here. But it was many years before white men made a permanent settlement.

The origin of the name "Tampa" seems lost to history, but it apparently was an Indian name for the largest Coloosan town.

Tampa Bay was discovered and explored about 100 years before the settlement of Plymouth or Jamestown. After Narvaez and DeSoto, little is known of its history during the next 300 years. This period is covered only by Indian legends and the bloody stories of pirate invasions, including the saga of the infamous Jose Gasparilla, which forms the basis for the city's spectacular pirate festival held each February.

During the past 150 years, the white man moved in. Hillsborough River, which runs through the heart of Tampa, was the hideout for Confederate blockade runners. It was in Tampa that the expression "Remember the Maine" originated. And it was here, too, that Colonel "Teddy" Roosevelt's Rough Riders trained before going to Cuba.

Now, the main industrial city of Florida and trade center of the state's most populous and prosperous area, Tampa is the manufacturing, distribution and trade center for nearly one-half

of Florida's people. But, at the same time, it is headquarters for thousands of vacationists drawn by its superb climate, recreational facilities and proximity to most of Florida's major attractions.

Tampa has a particularly advantageous and strategic location with regard to the rest of Florida. Sprawled around the mouth of the Hillsborough River near the head of Tampa Bay, the city is easily accessible. Some 1,056,000 persons, representing nearly 40% of Florida's population, live within a 100-mile radius of Tampa, while 54 of the state's 67 counties are within a 200-mile radius.

Tampa boasts of three institutions of higher learning; the University of Tampa, Florida Christian College and the new University of South Florida.

The city's location on Tampa Bay, in addition to making it one of the major U.S. ports, also gives it important climatic advantages. With the Gulf of Mexico only a few miles away, Tampa is naturally air-conditioned. It seldom suffers from extremes of temperature, and has an average of 72.4 degrees year round. Sub-freezing is rare, and the highest reading ever recorded was 98.

The city itself celebrated its centennial during 1955, marking the 100th anniversary of its charter. Rapid growth throughout the entire city has pushed the population figure to 274,407 as January, 1960.

Although many know Tampa as a center of Florida's vacation-land, actually it is Florida's leading industrial city as well. And within the past year, more than 15 new industries have located here. Many moving from the North select Tampa because of its ideal climate, the low cost of building and maintenance, and the low rate of absenteeism among employees. Perhaps the most famous of all Tampa-made products and the basis for its early growth is the cigar. Today, Tampa leads the world in the production of clear-Havana handmade cigars, although recently severely hindered by the Cuban Situation.

In 1958, Tampa became one of the greatest centers in the world for the brewing of beer. Two of the giants of U.S. brewing have completed huge plants in the Tampa Industrial Park, at the northern edge of the city.

Tops among Tampa's other industries are citrus canning and phosphate production. With 67% of Florida's huge citrus production in the Tampa trade area, the city is the citrus canning and supply center of the world. Fifty-nine of Florida's citrus processing plants are in the Tampa area, four within the city limits.

Some of the world's largest phosphate mines are within a short distance of Tampa, and nearly three-fourths of all the phosphate mined in the U.S. comes from this area. A recent development that has caused a new boom in the phosphate industry is the extraction of uranium from the mineral waste.

Other important industries include the manufacturing of cement, auto batteries, paint and finishes, furniture, garments, cans, boxes, fertilizers, wire, cable, beer, boats, mobile homes and sporting goods. Also important are commercial fishing and shrimping.

Industry is only as good as its possible means of transportation. There, Tampa has a special advantage since it is well served by all types of commercial transportation. Two railroads, nine airlines (including jet service), two bus lines and many trucking firms have major terminals in the city. Interstate 4 will be completed within one year.

Tampa International Airport has recently been designated the official airport for the West Coast of Florida. Daily jet service to all major cities in the United States and Canada is available. Complete customs and immigration services are established at the modern multi-million dollar terminal.

The air above Tampa is usually a busy place. In addition to the many commercial and private flights, there is the activity from the humming 6000 acre MacDill Air Force Base, a major link in the chain of Strategic Air Command and Tactical Air Command bases, as well as being headquarters for the Strike Command. MacDill is the largest operational air base in the Southeast, and has a peacetime complement of more than 10,000 men.

Tampa's deep-water port makes shipping one of the city's most important businesses. Largest in point of tonnage between

Mobile and Norfolk, the port handles more than 13 million tons a year. Ships from all nations appear in the harbor.

As one can readily see, Tampa is clearly the site of the development of one of the finest cities in the United States. And along with the expansion of industry, community and population, the University of Tampa is growing too. In the past three years it has changed from a commuter institution to almost entirely a residential college. So you see, everything here is growing hand in hand.

Last year, some of the Business Club's members were commissioned to survey every rental establishment in the Tampa area for a real estate firm that was trying to establish a fair price for a large rental unit that they were selling.

The excellent job done by the Club members on this project is still being seen here. One of our members got the job of managing the rental for the new owners.

Most of our members work part-time in the Tampa area. This has given us contacts with banks, retail and wholesale outlets and various civic organizations.

Our cause and projects are being promoted in this area. But we needed an international viewpoint. So some of our members sat in on the Pan American World Trade Conferences, held in Tampa the last two years. This past year we made up a small display for the exposition.

The Club has worked hard for this moment. The moment when we could sit down and write this recap of our activities in the Petition. We realize that it is not time to lean back and say we've done a good job. Instead, we know that the job is just now beginning.


DR. DAVID M. DELO


MAIN BUILDING, UNIVERSITY OF TAMPA


AMERICANA ROOM

Student Center now under construction at a cost of \$650,000 should be completed in March of 1963, will include such facilities as, post office, book store, game rooms and meeting rooms for school organizations.



LYKES HALL

Lykes Hall, the Puritan Hotel, a renovated brick residence was donated to the University of Tampa in 1960 by the Lykes Family and houses 78 men.



MCKAY HALL

McKay Hall, built in 1959 and additions in 1962 is completely air-conditioned and houses about 175 men in its modern furnished rooms.



SMILEY HALL

Smiley Hall built in 1959 with the addition of an air-conditioned wing in 1962, houses approximately 120 men.



PI KAPPA PHI FRATERNITY HOUSE

This ornate structure is one of many elaborate homes situated in the Hyde Park area adjacent to the University of Tampa campus. It has been converted into a fraternity house and is now the home of the Pi Kappa Phi Fraternity. Its spacious quarters includes 22 rooms and a well-equipped kitchen for the convenience of the 35 fraternity brothers housed within.



HOWELL HALL

Howell Hall, the old Crescent Hotel bought in 1961, houses about 250 girls with its air-conditioned rooms, wall to wall carpeting and ceramic tile baths, dining facilities and large lobby.



INDUSTRIAL ARTS BUILDING

Built by the Alumni of the University Industrial Arts Department. It houses all the equipment for the Department. It was built at a cost of \$8000 and is comparable to a \$30,000 plant in the open market.
