## HISTORY OF LAS CRUCES, AND AREA

Las Cruces, New Mexico, the friendly city, located in the 85% Sunshine Belt of the Southwest, has a population of approximately 33,000 people. It is nestled in the fertile Mesilla Valley of the Rio Grande and is often described as the "Land Where Nature is Kind." Here one may observe green fields and lovely foliage, then quickly cross typical western prairies to reach towering mountains and drink in the beauty of tall pines and other trees of the forest. Las Cruces, enjoys the best in all year-round climate; mild in winter with summer heat tempered by cool mountain breezes.

It is known that because of plentiful water of the river and the lush greenery of its bottomlands, prehistoric people built their small villages and campsites along the Mesilla Valley. One of these camps has been uncovered just below the surface of the earth on the exact location of Las Cruces.

During the sixteenth century the Spanish explorers and colonists came, most of them on their way to and from the region of Santa Fe. They found the Rio Grande a perfect highway, and easy trail through mountain ranges, and water furnished for both humans and their beasts of burden. On these various journeys, the Spaniards established camp-grounds in advantageous places that soon became know by

name. One especially well known site was Estero Largo, a camp situated by a long lagoon. It is thought by some that Estero Largo was on the Present site of Las Cruces, for even as late as 1881, a disconnected estuary of the river extended for several blocks through the main part of town.

The wily Apaches found Estero Largo an ideal place to waylay and massacre white strangers. Party after party of Spaniards lost their lives at this campground. Burial was given the bodies where they fell and small crude crosses were put up at each grave. Soon the mesa edge nearest the water was covered with weatherbeaten crosses, and travellers along the Camino Real began referring to the tragic spot as the "Place of the Crosses."

Many fascinating stories could be related, if time and space permitted, concerning the fabulous Mesilla Valley and the establishing of Las Cruces. In 1528 Cabeza de Vaca and his small band of Spanish adventurers made their way north from the Gulf of Mexico and entered this enchanted Valley. Making their way through the vast plains of Texas, they sighted the mountain chains east of the valley, crossed through them and soon found themselves in the Indian village of Dona Ana, even then the center of a flourishing farming district. Here they were supplied, by the natives, with food, and they crossed the Rio Grande as their march continued north.

After the early explorers, came settlers from Mexico, a restless mass of people seeking homes. In 1840 Dona Ana

was established. By 1846 when the territory came under the flag of the United States, the population of Dona Ana increased to the point where it became necessary to locate a new townsite to provide for the overflow. Colonists who were camping on the present site of Main Street in Las Cruces, petitioned American soldiers in Dona Ana to survey them a townsite at the "Place of the Crosses." Lots were drawn for homesteads and when the new town was laid out in 1849, it quite naturally became known as Las Cruces, "The Crosses."

Las Cruces, became incorporated as a town in 1907 and as a city in 1946. Modern Las Cruces still merits the names of "The Crosses" because it stands at the crossroads of three great national highways, U.S. 70, 80, and 85.

When Dona Ana County was formed on January 6, 1852, from the southern portion of Socorro County, Dona Ana was made the county seat and remained as such until 1882 when it was again moved back to Las Cruces, and remains there today.

Many factors have had a part in the building of this beautiful city. The founding of the Loretto Academy in 1879 by the Sisters of Loretto, paved the way for Las Cruces' present fine school system. In 1898 the establishment of Las Cruces College, which a year later became the New Mexico College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, and now the New Mexico State University of Agriculture, Engineering and Science, has contributed greatly to its expansion. Churches, mercantile houses and industries have played an important part in the city's growth. Perhaps the greatest single factor in the

growth of Las Cruces was the arrival of the Santa Fe Railroad in 1881, and, of course, the waters of the Rio Grande are, as always, of utmost importance to all of the valley as well as Las Cruces.

The main industry of the valley is agriculture: cotton, lettuce, chilies, onions, and other agricultural products. Livestock, too, has a definite place in the industrial life of the county. In 1945 the establishment of White Sands Proving Grounds for Rockets, now known as White Sands Missile Range, east over the Organ Mountains from Las Cruces, brought added business and prosperity as well as many, many more people to the community.

Many residents now here came on doctor's orders and, having found health again, are pursuing a gainful and uninterrupted business life. A comparatively low sick rate is the rule. Moderate, equable temperatures, an intermediate altitude of 3,860 feet, beneficial desert air, and the beauty of the Organ Mountains, bring many persons seeking a lovely, comfortable place in which to live their "golden years". The amazing productivity of the valley soil has drawn people seeking small farms. Others have come to serve in the Army, Navy, or Marines, and after discharges, have returned to make their homes. The atmosphere is touched with romance of Spain and Old Mexico, an imagination stirring background for living. With the expansion of White Sands Missile Range, people from other countries are moving here and sharing bits of their native culture with us, making us truly a cosmopolitan city.

Within easy driving distance of Las Cruces, are: White Sands National Monument; campsites and resorts in the Sacramento Mountains, where one may spend cool summer vacations or ski and bobsled in winter; Carlsbad Caverns; the Mogollon Mountains with the its Gila Wilderness; Elephant Butte Dam with excellent fishing, and boating facilities, Caballo Dam with the same facilities; the beautiful Organ Mountains to our east; Radium Springs to the north where people have come for generations to bathe in the medicinal water; Juarez, gateway to Old Mexico, to the south, and many, many more interesting and historical places.

## HISTORY OF THE UNIVERSITY

In 1888, the settlers of the Mesilla valley, realizing the need for an advanced educational system, founded Las Cruces College. In accordance with the Morrill Act of 1862, the 28th Legislative Assembly of New Mexico, on February 28, 1889, passed an act making the college, New Mexico College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts.

In 1890, New Mexico College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts formally opened its doors in the newly completed Main Hall, a two-story brick building of fourteen rooms and a basement.

A land grant college, it is located on the East mesa lands of the Rio Grande Valley in the South-Central part of New Mexico.

The campus is one mile east of Mesilla Park, three miles southeast of downtown Las Cruces, and forty miles north of El Paso, Texas just off U.S. Highway 80.

Forty-three miles to the south is colorful Juarez, Chihuahua, Mexico, gateway to interior Mexico.

Although the University has its own Post Office, University Park, New Mexico, the radio, express and telegraph is Las Cruces, New Mexico.

In 1926, New Mexico College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts was accredited as a degree granting institution by the North Central Association of Colleges

and Secondary Schools. It was also accredited by the American Association of University Women in 1954.

In November of 1960, the constitution of New Mexico was amended to change the name to New Mexico State University. In accordance with the Legislative Assembly, the University was divided into four colleges and one school-the College of Arts and Sciences, the College of Engineering, the College of Agriculture and Home Economics, and the Graduate School.

The 2,755-acre campus consists of sixty-four permanent buildings, the oldest being Science Hall constructed in 1897, and the newest being a two million dollar agricultural building completed in 1962. The Physical Plant is valued at \$16,675,000.00. The University also maintains a 289-acre irrigated experiment farm and orchard, a 61,760-acre cattle and experiment ranch, a 2,160-acre recreational area in the Organ Mountains, and numerous barns and experiment station buildings.

A unique feature of the University is its on-campus landing strip which is 300 by 4,400 feet.

New Mexico State University is feeling the rapid growth of New Mexico and the Southwest with a present enrollment of about 3,700 and a predicted enrollment of 8,000 in 1972.


Being the oldest institution of higher learning in New Mexico, New Mexico State University has had a long, full past and is looking to a long, bright future.



CHEMISTRY BUILDING




### CHEMISTRY BUILDING


### HADLEY HALL


### BRANSON HALL

The University library is housed in Branson Hall, a completely modern building erected 1951 to 1953. It contains 50,000 square feet of floor space on four floors and has refrigeration air conditioning throughout. The more than 130,000 volumes are classified according to the Library of Congress System.



### JETT HALL


Jett Hall was added to the College of Engineering Plant in 1957. It provides offices for the Dean of Engineering, the Mechanical and Civil Engineering Departments, classrooms, engineering drawing rooms and engineering laboratories.



### RESEARCH CENTER

The Research Center was completed in 1960, and includes facilities for basic research in all departments of the university by research professors, the faculty, and graduate and under-graduate students. It contains 10 research offices, 17 research laboratories, two administrative offices, a conference room, a small lecture room, machine and electrical shops and drafting room.






### GARDINER HALL

Gardiner Hall provides for the large physics and mathematics departments and was completed in 1960. The building has the finest of modern laboratory and classroom facilities.



### REGENTS ROW RESIDENCE

This new air-conditioned residence center accommodates 310 men and was completed in August of 1962. The center features modern two-man rooms with a connecting tile bath between rooms. An outstanding feature of the center is the patio area which typifies the outdoor living of the Southwest.



### FINE ARTS CENTER

The new Fine Arts Center at New Mexico State University will be completed this spring. It includes a 400-seat Little Theater at left and the circular music building at right. The \$850,000 center has been financed through proceeds of a statewide bond issue voted by New Mexico citizens.



## HISTORY OF THE DEPARTMENT OF BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION AND ECONOMICS

When New Mexico College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts opened in 1890, the objective, as specified in the Morrill Act, was to teach such branches of learning as were related to agriculture and the mechanic arts in order to promote the liberal and practical education of the industrial classes. Today, as New Mexico State University, the school provides a greatly expanded program which includes professional courses in business administration and economics designed to develop the abilities necessary for responsible positions in business and government.


A Department of Commerce was established in 1909 but the course offerings were limited for the most part to stenographic and bookkeeping subjects. A Department of Business Administration replaced the Department of Commerce in 1925 and the first degrees--Bachelor of Science in Business Administration--were conferred in 1926 on five members of the senior class. Mr. G. L. Guthrie became acting head of the department in 1927, succeeding Mr. J. W. C. Harper who had planned the first curriculum for professional training in business administration. Mr. Guthrie became head of the department in 1928 and is serving in that capacity today. Since 1937, the department has been known as the Department of Business Administration and Economics.

The department now provides its students a choice of four majors: general business, accounting, economics, and

business education. In addition to these specific majors, the department offers the necessary courses to permit some specialization in the fields of marketing, finance, and management.

Since 1959 a cooperative program for students in accounting has been available. Students secure their on-the-job training at White Sands Missile Range near the University campus and enter the program after completing at least two semesters of work on campus. One semester a year is spent on the work phase, the following two semesters on campus as full time students.

Today 347 students are majoring in the department of Business Administration and Economics. Since 1926 when the first Bachelor of Science in Business Administration degree was granted in 1926, 440 degrees have been awarded.

MINUTES OF AN MEETING

In the spring semester of 1957, Mr. Charles Harris, Assistant Executive Secretary of Delta Sigma Pi, visited the Delta State University. The faculty of the Business Administration Department and a small group of business majors met with Mr. Harris, where he presented a report which outlined the advantages of establishing a chapter of Delta Sigma Pi on our campus.

Shortly after Mr. Harris's visit several meetings were held by over twenty interested business students. Discussion centered on the possibility of a colony with intentions to affiliate with Delta Sigma Pi. The primary purposes behind the discussion for affiliation were to further the interests of the business student and create a closer campus relationship. An election was held and officers were elected. Mr. G. L. Guthrie, Head of Business Administration and Economics and Mr. E. E. Owen, Registrar, Professor, Business Administration, acted as sponsors for our new business administration colony. It was decided to call the colony Delta Sigma Pi. The colony met every other Wednesday night. Speakers were brought in from other parts of the business world, and the colony was presented with some interesting films on Delta Sigma Pi.

## HISTORY OF NU MU SIGMA

In the spring semester of 1961, Mr. Charles Farrar, Assistant Executive Secretary of Delta Sigma Pi, visited New Mexico State University. The faculty of the Business Administration Department and a small group of business majors met with Mr. Farrar, where he presented a report which outlined the advantages of establishing a chapter of Delta Sigma Pi on our campus.

Shortly after Mr. Farrar's visit several meetings were held by over twenty interested business students. Discussion centered on the forming of a colony with intentions to affiliate with Delta Sigma Pi. The primary purposes behind the discussion for affiliation were to further the interests of the business student and create a close fraternal relationship. An election was held and officers were elected. Mr. G. L. Guthrie, Head of Business Administration and Economics; and Mr. F. T. Downs, assistant professor, consented to become sponsors for our new business administration colony. It was decided to call the colony Nu Mu Sigma. The colony met every other Wednesday night. Speakers were brought in from different facets of the business world, and the colony was presented with some interesting films and talks.

Nu Mu Sigma contributed a booth and sponsored a beauty contestant in the 1961 Spring Carnival Activities.

In the Fall of 1962 new officers were elected, and plans were layed for our future business program. Many problems arose in our program and in our membership expansion. Mr. James Thomson, Executive Director of Delta Sigma Pi, visited our colony in the early part of the Fall semester and contributed additional information and suggestions. In November, Nu Mu Sigma voted unanimously to petition Delta Sigma Pi for affiliation. Mr. Warren Armstrong, Director of the Inter-Mountain Region for Delta Sigma Pi, was helpful in giving information and advice to the officers at an after dinner meeting. This was an afternoon meeting attended by Mr. Armstrong, Mr. Downs, and Nu Mu Sigma officers.

Since this time we have improved our organization and presented ever improving business programs. We have drawn on California, Arizona, Texas, and New Mexico for business speakers; and Nu Mu Sigma has planned business tours, a public business machine display, film presentations, and limited social activities. We have had the full cooperation of the Business Administration Department, and in particular, Mr. G. L. Guthrie has devoted much of his time and effort in advising and assisting Nu Mu Sigma Colony of Delta Sigma Pi.




