

As the railroad was being built toward the little city of Fort Worth in the early 1870's, one of the original settlers of Johnson Station refused to let "one of them infernal things" (the railroad train) go across his property. The rail bed was rerouted three miles to the north, and a new town sprang up. The town was named Arlington in honor of General Robert E. Lee's hometown in Virginia. The first train came through on July 19, 1876.

Soon, stores and buildings were being built in rapid succession, and people talked of a new brick post office. Arlington established a form of government and was incorporated in 1883. Johnson Station had signed its own death warrant, and its prosperity gradually moved to this new, typical, western town.

Arlington is located right in the heart of an immense and rapidly growing metroplex which is Dallas and Fort Worth. Although it is something of a geographic accident, what is going on in Arlington is anything but an accident. Arlington knows exactly what it is doing. It is a city with a purpose, a plan, and the Texas-style determination to make the most of what it has to offer.

The air corridors over Arlington these days are dotted with helicopters transporting northern industrialists, corporation presidents, and major league baseball tycoons. From their aerial perch above the town, the visiting VIP's look down at the land-rich environs of a city

which, during the past decade, developed from a residential community of 7,700 people into a major southwest industrial center with a population in excess of 50,000 people.

Immediately east of the city is the Great Southwest Industrial District, a sprawling 5,800 acre tract which is the largest industrial site of its kind in the nation. A few years ago this was farm land. Today, a market value has been established, and more than two million square feet of buildings have been erected. The roster of firms located on Great Southwest soil reads like a Who's Who of American Business, but there is still room for others, and the welcome mat is out.

Occupants include such big names as General Motors, American Can, United States Steel, Anaconda, Container Corporation of America, Vought Electronics, and General Foods, to name a few; they are all prominent. An integral part of the Great Southwest Industrial District development is Great Southwest Warehouses, a gigantic complex designed as a distribution center for manufacturers.

Occupying 110 acres of Great Southwest Industrial District soil is "Six Flags Over Texas," a fantastic ten million dollar funland, which has lured millions of pleasure seekers into the Arlington area.

In addition to Six Flags, still another major project may enrich the already healthy flow of tourist dollars into the area. In the northeast section of Arlington, adjacent to Six Flags, are 150 uncultivated acres which were purchased by the city as a site for a 50,000 seat, domed, major league stadium. The first 10,000 seat section is already under construction and will be used by the Dallas-Fort Worth Spurs. As soon as a major league franchise is obtained, the remainder of the stadium will be constructed. The prize may be awarded soon. "The Dallas-Fort Worth area is the largest in the country without big league ball," says Arlington Mayor Tom J. Vandergriff. "The area will get a ball club..."

Moving west over the city, a sky traveling visitor can see one of the fastest growing colleges in the nation, Arlington State College, where the current enrollment of 10,445 is roughly eight times the size of the student body a decade ago.

Everywhere one may look in Arlington, street, road, and building construction abounds and dramatizes the happy plight of a city caught in an era of exploding growth. An example is Arlington State College where new science and library buildings and two dormitories have recently been added, and a new auditorium and a theatre center are under construction. Statistical projections indicate that the school's present fifteen million dollar plant, as well as the student body, will be doubled by 1980.

A boom town is often a troubled town, a town of helter-skelter development with nightmarish zoning and construction problems. These penalties of sudden and explosive growth were escaped by Arlington where advance knowledge of the boom era provided time for enactment of controls. The character of the city's development is determined by zoning regulations

and building ordinances set down in accordance with a comprehensive Master Plan of the city government.

Arlington's embarrassment of economic blessings also includes a surplus of high quality skilled and semi-skilled personnel from eastern and northern industrial centers, and hand-picked talent from the growing tide of families moving into the Arlington area are available to staff the plants of inflowing industries.

Migration of the nation's workers into the area prompts this Chamber of Commerce description of Arlington: "A rare combination of Southern gentility and Yankee ingenuity - an atmosphere in which it is ideal to work." Along the same line, a company which specializes in community development surveys has taboed Arlington: "The Opportunity Frontier of Texas."

Tom J. Vandergriff has been mayor of the city for fourteen years and is responsible in large measure for its growth. He speaks with optimism about Arlington's future:

The futures of Arlington, as a community, and the Dallas-Fort Worth section, as a metropolitan region, are remarkably bright. Arlington is at the very heart of one of the nation's great growth areas of the years to come. The South's largest planned industrial park is located within the city limits of Arlington. Industries, large and small, have located here within the past few years and their numbers grow annually. Arlington State, already the fifth largest college in Texas, contributes more and more to a growing economy. Six Flags Over Texas and the new Dallas-Fort Worth Sports Stadium, located within Arlington, attract tourists in the millions each year. An abundant water supply, beautiful parks, beautifully wooded land and a geographic location only fifteen minutes away from either Dallas

or Fort Worth combine to make Arlington one of the prime locations for future growth. The already impressive population expansion from 7500 in 1950 to 60,000 residents today will no doubt pale in comparison to the development. certain to come in the years ahead.

HISTORY

A Brief History of Arlington State College

The school now known as Arlington State College has shown a peculiar sensitivity and responsiveness to the needs of its area since its inception. Originally established as a private academy to fill a gap apparent in public-school education, it gradually evolved into a semi-trade school offering courses in agriculture and auto mechanics while its locality was primarily a farm region and the automobile industry was just starting in the neighboring cities of Dallas and Fort Worth.

With the increasing urbanization and industrialization of the area, the school continued to respond readily to the need for engineering, business, and liberal arts courses to meet the higher degrees of sophistication becoming apparent, until it reached full senior-college standing in the fields most vital to the region's development. As educational requirements of industry and society continue to rise, ASC is already planning graduate work to meet the still more sophisticated demands of the space age.

When a private academy, called Arlington College, was established on the campus in the fall of 1895, it was designed to give the community a better type of education than was afforded at that time by the public schools. This academy and its successors—Carlisle Military Academy (1902-1913), Arlington Training School (1913-1916), Arlington Military Academy (1916-1917)—were influenced by the Webb School, a noted private academy at Bell Buckle, Tennessee, Each of the academies

was headed by able educators who strove constantly to improve the quality of their service to the community. One administrator endeavored to raise the school to a junior college which would serve the needs of the community for training leaders in the vocations of agriculture, the mechanic arts, and home economics.

Many of the leading citizens and the press of Arlington, Fort
Worth, and Dallas worked diligently for the establishment of a vocational school at Arlington; and, in the spring of 1917, the
Legislature of the State of Texas passed an act creating a juniorcollege branch of the Texas A&M College, named Grubbs Vocational College.
In 1949 the College became the largest state-supported junior college
in the Southwest. New legislation that year changed the name to
Arlington State College, and the title of the chief executive from Dean
to President.

The ten-year period 1949-1959 saw greater changes in the College than it had undergone during any other decade of its existence. Following a decline from 1,790 students in 1949 to 1,317 in 1951, the enrollment began to rise very rapidly in 1953, until in 1959 (the year the College added its third-year courses in certain authorized fields), it stood at 6,528. The enrollment for the fall semester 1965 was 11,514, placing it fourth among the 18 fully state-supported colleges in Texas. In October of that year it was fully accredited as a four-year school by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and beginning in the fall of 1966, the school will offer graduate degrees in selected engineering fields.

HISTORY

THE HISTORY OF THE DIVISION OF

BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

ARLINGTON STATE COLLEGE

The growth of Arlington State College's Division of Business Administration from the very beginning has been one of striving excellence for newer concepts and improved curriculum standards.

In 1901 as Carlyle Military Academy the following courses were offered:

- 1. Bookkeeping
- 2. Business Practice
- 3. Commercial Correspondence
- 4. Commercial Arithmetic
- 5. Stenography
- 6. Typewriting
- 7. Commercial Law
- 8. Business Law

In 1913 its name was changed to Arlington Training School. The curriculum was the same as above. In 1917 the school became a part of the A&M System known as Grubbs Vocational College. By 1935 the courses in Business Administration had increased by three additions:

- 1. Accounting
- 2. Principles of Accounting
- 3. Shorthand

In 1923 the school was renamed as North Texas Agricultural College with no changes in the curriculum in the Division of Business Administration.

In 1949 the name became Arlington State College, and in 1959 it was accredited as a four year school. At this time the following requirements for a BBA were:

- 1. English--12 hours
- 2. Government -- 6 hours
- 3. History -- 6 hours
- 4. Mathematics -- 6 hours
- 5. Behavioral Science--3 hours
- 6. Philosophy, Art, or Music -- 3 hours

- 7. Science--6 hours in a single laboratory science
- 8. Speech--3 hours
- Electives -- 9 hours outside of fields of business and economics

Major--27 hours of business, economics or

other approved

- 12. Electives—electives to include (1) a minimum of 9-12 advanced hours in one of the following: finance, management, or 12 advanced hours in economics.
- 13. Total hours--126
 This corresponds to the University of Chicago and Stanford's schools of business.

In recent years, much study and reflection concerning the field of collegiate education for business has been critical, focusing upon low academic standards, overspecialization, and excessive vocationalism. The 1959 criticism of the Carnegie-Ford Reports has been instrumental in promotion of a "New School of Business." Arlington State is now in the forefront in the Southwest of these "New Schools of Business."

The major premise of the "new look" in education for business is the assumption that education for business leadership must be fully as rigorous and demanding as education in engineering or the liberal arts.

There is a recognition in curriculum and program planning of the pervasive fact of change; the rapidity with which new developments occur attest to the wisdom of concentrating on the fundamentals. In general, the BBA (non-accounting) program is oriented toward managerial decision making.

Emphasis is increasingly placed on computers and the mathematical and statistical concepts and techniques. Today business vocabulary

includes linear programming, operations research, simulations, and econometrics.

In line with this general philosophy of broad-gauge, high level, and demanding education stressing the fundamentals, Arlington State offers three major degree programs in Business and Economics:

a Bachelor of Business Administration, a Bachelor of Business Administration (Accounting), and a Bachelor of Arts in Economics. In addition, students wishing to earn a BBA or BA in economics degree as preparation for entry into law school may do so by successfully completing a three-year-program in one of these fields at Arlington State and then entering the law school of his choice. Upon successful completion of the first year at an accredited school of law, Arlington State will award the appropriate BBA or BA degree.

Separate from the four-year degree programs, but administratively a part of the Division of Business and Economics, is a two-year secretarial program leading to an Associate in Science diploma.

The growth and size of ASC's Division of Business and Economics is a significant indication of the service it provides in this region. The Division in the fall of 1963-64 enrolled 3,007 majors, or almost one-third of the total college enrollment of 10,000 plus. This is an average increase of over 17% per year for the past three years. There is every reason to expect Arlington State to continue to grow, and for its Division of Business and Economics to remain one of the largest in the state.

The Division of Business and Economics at Arlington State was the first to undertake a full scale, Division-wide Honors Program.

The purpose of this Honors Program is to identify and select students

of higher ability as early as possible, and provide their capacities to the fullest.

The caliber of the potential Honors candidates in the student body in the Division is very high and the records these students have made here and are making at graduate schools and in business and industry is gratifying indeed.

The new faculty preparation standards of the Southern Association of Colleges, the regional accrediting agency, are already met by the Division of Business and Economics, although these standards will not go into effect until December, 1966.

The Professional Business Club of Arlington State College was organized on August 12, 1957, with Harvey Mitchell, president, and a Charter roll of forty members. This soon increased to 320 members. The Club was organized for the purpose of furthering the knowledge of Business Administration students by bringing in business leaders of the Dallas-Fort Worth area to speak.

The Club was organized for the following purposes:

- A. To develop competent, aggressive business leadership.
- B. To create more understanding and interest in choosing business occupations.
- C. To strengthen the confidence of the members in themselves and their work.
- D. To encourage members in the development of individual projects and establish themselves in business.
- E. To participate in cooperative effort.
- F. To establish and improve standards for entrance into the business field.
- G. Maintain contact with business graduates and cooperate with the Business Administration Department in other projects designed to strengthen the business curriculum.
- H. To promote a certain amount of scholarship among members.

On October 23, 1962, the Professional Business Club merged with the Economics Club to form our present organization, The Business and Economics Club. 


I have served no military duty.



I am presently employed with Kimbell Grocery Company as a part-time accountant.


