


Dear Mr. Ashamy:





The Story of Lewis College.

The story of Lewis College is a story of the ideals of gifted men. It is a story of the fulfillment of their great dreams by the Christian Brothers. The story of Lewis College is a story of growth, brick by brick, and building by building. It is a story of a school that has been known by five different names and which has undergone three major changes in its educational organization.

It all began in 1930 when Mr. and Mrs. Fitzpatrick (pioneers of the Lockport, Illinois area) donated 160 acres of land to the Archdiocese of Chicago for what ever purpose it might be best served. It was finally determined that the land would be used to build a "technical school" for the education of young boys.

On May, 30, 1932, 5,000 people attended the dedication of Holy Name Technical School. The following August, fifteen boys started classes at the new school. Courses were offered in mathematics, physics, mechanical drawing, electricity, shop, and chemistry.

In the school year of 1933-34, a gymnasium was built, along with a system of streetlights, and water system. By 1935 these projects were completed, as well as a road, a two story dormitory, and an annex to the original school building.

By the school year of 1933-34, the name of the school was changed to Lewis Holy Name School of Aeronautics. The Lewis curriculum provided for a four-year industrial arts high school.

In 1936, the school was forced to close down for financial reasons. After returning a year later, the aeronautics division was in full swing, and the school purchased a farm and the equipment. Most of the school's food was now raised by the students.

In 1950, the school was changed to Lewis School of Aeronautics. The high school program was continued, and an aeronautical program was added. The Christian Brothers Provincial of the St. Louis district, under the leadership of Brother Paul, Lewis has been very

school was organized offering courses in flight aviation mechanics and aeronautical engineering. Approval of the Civil Aeronautics Authority was obtained for the flight and mechanics school and accreditation of a four-year engineering college was granted by the United States Department of Education and the Illinois State Department of Education. Two new buildings went up in 1940-41 school year; a hanger and a new cafeteria and finally, a new administration building.

The full high school program was discontinued in 1941, and a four-year junior college was established. It was also in '41 that Lewis won recognition for its work in gliding and soaring instruction. The Army Air Force and the U. S. Marine Corps began to conduct experiments in motorless flight at Lewis about this time.

On November 28, 1942, the entire school facilities were contracted to the Navy for flight training. By May 15, 1944, Lewis had trained 1,200 pilots for the war effort and the school once again opened its doors as a four-year junior college.

In 1950 the high school division was dropped entirely, and Lewis College became a four-year liberal arts college, and the aviation maintenance and flight areas were discontinued, as the essential reason for the school. However, the college was predominantly an industrial arts school.

The story of the 60's is the story of another breed of men, the Christian Brothers. Having been here only for a short number of years they have provided an impetus to the growth of Lewis College and have put the word "Pursuit" into the vocabulary, into the very life of every Lewis man, teacher and administrator.

Lewis College was acquired from the Chicago Archdiocese in June, 1960. Brother Leander Paul was appointed president by the Christian Brothers Provincial of the St. Louis district. Under the leadership of Brother Paul, Lewis has seen many

improvements, both academically and physically. Academically, Lewis College gained membership in the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

Physically we have seen the addition of three buildings on our campus; the John F. Kennedy Memorial Gymnasium; Trinity Hall, which houses the Academic Administration building, and the new Science Building, and the Christian Brothers Data Processing Center; and Fitzpatrick Hall, a mans residence. The library and cafeteria have been expanded, and the old academic building has been converted into a new technical institute. The college enrollment this year exceeded one thousand -- the largest in the history of the school.

The Lewis story is the story of a small dynamic school, a school which started as a technical high school, struggled through the years, and then made the arrival at the maturity of a liberal arts college. The last chapter of this story has not been written yet, for our arrival is but a point of departure. Now that we have made our arrival at maturity we can begin a pursuit of excellence. A bright future lies just over the horizon for Lewis College -----let us pursue it.

The College Today.

Lewis College is a Catholic men's college of arts and the sciences, directed by the Brothers of the Christian Schools. The college is incorporated under the laws of the state of Illinois as a non-profit, tax exempt educational institution. Courses of study are offered through which the degrees of Bachelor of Arts and/or Bachelor of Science may be earned.

The Christian Brothers teach at Lewis College. Three centuries of complete devotion to the principles of Christian Education have enabled the Brothers to develop a system of education that strives for balance in intellectual, moral, social and professional training.

The philosophy of teaching is inspired by that wisdom which led Pope Pius XII to declare the founder of the Christian Brothers, Saint John Baptist de la Salle, "Patron of Christian Teachers." The Brothers are ably assisted by diocesan and religious priests and by lay professional instructors distinguished for their zeal, learning and professional competence.

The College Tomorrow.

Lewis College has planned an impressive development program for the next five years, 1965-1970.

The new curriculum will be a dominant factor in revealing the "new look" of Lewis. The office staff plans to analyze the records of each student and evaluate his records as they pertain to the new curriculum. This will be completed by the spring of '65 pre-registration session. Students transferring to Lewis with two years of acceptable academic credits will have their programs arranged so they can complete their last two years here. Four hour courses will be substituted for three hour courses at the discretion of the Dean. If the student is in good academic standing such changes will be more readily available.

Many new buildings will be sprouting up on campus in the next five years;

- ** Four new four story dormitories, which when completed will be known as the student residence complex, will be completed by 1970. The student complex will include a centrally located cafeteria for resident students.
- ** The theater and common lobby which will be an extension of the John F. Kennedy Memorial Gymnasium is of major priority, is the Learning Resource Center.
- ** Learning Research Center, a four story building will contain a library, visual aid center, faculty resource and seminar rooms.

- ** The athletic fields will be moved just to the west of the J. F. K. Memorial Gym. parking lot forming an athletic zone in the immediate vicinity of the gymnasium.
 - ** The present library facilities will be remodeled to be used as a social and cultural center of the college. In this same building, each student organization will be given an office through which all its business may be conducted.
- The total cost of this new expansion will be 7.7 million dollars, The cost of the dorms will be 3 million dollars; the Resource Center 1 million; the gymnasium addition 1/4 million; and the new science building 1/2 million dollars.

A college of arts and sciences, Lewis College has as its immediate goal the intellectual development of its students. This development is three-fold in its scope; the gaining of knowledge and information, the development of right intellectual habits, and the formation of right attitudes and dispositions.

Intellectual Development.

The college aims to assist its students to acquire a background of knowledge and understanding. The knowledge we refer to here is a penetrating understanding which has a permanent and ineradicable effect on the intellect, which is as it were, assimilated into the very life of the intellect. Along with this assimilation of knowledge and as a part of it, it is the aim of the college that the student establish for himself right principles of thought and action, principles on which he can base his decisions and judgments. This includes the formation of a hierarchy of values by which to order his life.

As a second aspect of intellectual development, the College strives to assist its students to habituate themselves in the proper process of thought and judgment.

Since the capacity for knowing and understanding depends very largely on the attitudes and dispositions of the person

The aims and objectives of Lewis College are stated in the form of ideals to be striven towards. Ideals, so that the students can continue striving towards higher and higher educational development, and that there will be some inspiration for students to continue after their college years.

The ideals have been divided into three separate but complimentary areas; intellectual development, religious and moral development, and finally, social development. As a college of arts and sciences, Lewis College has as its immediate goal the intellectual development of its students. This development is three-fold in its scope; the gaining of knowledge and information, the development of right intellectual habits, and the formation of right attitudes and dispositions.

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knowing, Lewis College aims to foster in the student those attitudes which provide the proper atmosphere for intellectual growth. The college also aims to establish a campus atmosphere favorable to the free acceptance of truth and moral self-direction by students.

Social Development.

Man is by nature a social being as well as an individual person, and so the aims of Lewis College do include assisting the student to achieve social maturity and to acquire a spirit of community responsibility and a sense of vocation in the light of his intellectual and religious development.

Social maturity includes an understanding of people and an appreciation of the natural need that each of us has for others. It means a willingness to accept responsibility, and an acquisition of the virtues and dispositions which living harmoniously in the society of others entails.

Religious and Moral Development.

Besides intellectual and social development, Lewis College also aims to assist the student to achieve religious and moral development. It presents to the student an intellectual grounding in the Catholic faith, and encourages him to achieve a living faith that permeates all of his thoughts and actions.

The college strives to promote the religious life of the student as a personal relation with Christ, and it presents the student the ideal of love of God and that permeates all of his thoughts and actions.



Cafeteria.

This building was built to house the administrative offices, and did so until Trinity Hall was completed in September of 1963. It now is the location of the cafeteria and a snack bar-recreation area for the students.

Location of Lewis College.

The campus of Lewis College consists of slightly over six hundred acres, which were acquired over the years partly by gift, and partly by purchase. A part of this acreage is at present occupied by a small airport, operated by the college. The college itself is at present using about one hundred and fifty acres.

The campus is situated outside of Lockport, Illinois, about thirty-five miles southwest of Chicago, Illinois, and several miles north of Joliet, Illinois. It borders one of the main highways, U.S. Route 66A, but the college buildings are well secluded from the traffic, occupying the crest of a gradual rise from the highway. The general atmosphere is thus undisturbed and conductible to intellectual and spiritual development.

The undergraduate curriculum in the department leads to a Bachelor of Science in Marketing, Business Management, and Accounting, and a Bachelor of Arts in Economics.

The Department strives to provide intellectual training in economic analysis and the broad field of Business Administration to equip the student for advanced study and/or the effective participation in the world of trade and commerce. Students may major in either economics or business administration; and those electing business administration may concentrate in accounting, management and marketing.

The Economics curriculum seeks to arouse the student's interest in those social and economic aspects of his daily experience that are vital for the preservation of democratic freedom and the realization of Christian values. Further, it also endeavors to provide some degree of the scientific competence needed today to deal critically with the propaganda of special-interest groups, irrational economic opinions, and ill-conceived programs of economic betterment. The Department of
Business Administration and Economics.

The Department of Business Administration and Economics at Lewis College will be 3 years old at the end of the 1964-65. During this period the department has been under the able head of Mr. Roger G. Ashmay, who is largely responsible for the tremendous expansion of the department.

The Department of Business Administration and Economics has, in a sense, always in existense. From 1959 through 1962 it was considered a part of the Division of Social Sciences. In 1962, the Department came into its own.

In May of this year, and at the time of this petition, the Department consists of Mr. Roger Ashamy and 5 full time faculty members. Class enrollment in this department reached 400+ this school semester. Majors are offered in the areas of Marketing, Business Management, Accounting and Economics.

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individual counseling, the student is exercised in logical thought processes that demand recognition of problems, the selection and evaluation of evidence, and decision-making in the light of assumptions and special conditions.

The Business Administration curriculum provided professional competence through specialized instruction in each of the three major areas. Courses in these areas, marketing, management, and accounting, are studied concurrently with required social and liberal arts courses to enable the student (1) to evaluate the social implications of alternative business action, (2) to distinguish clearly between moral issues and economic issues, and (3) to recognize the non-economic impacts of business organization.

All three areas of business administration are primarily intended to develop those habits of thought necessary for active citizenship in a democratic, free-enterprise society; secondarily, they endeavor to provide the kind of liberal discipline, rooted in broad understandings rather than in specific techniques, that may be useful later in various fields of business or in further academic work.

Science Hall

The most recent building constructed on campus houses all of the biology and chemistry laboratories. On the lower level, the department of computer science is located and will be offering courses designed to teach business students the application of computers in a variety of situations.


Gentlemen:


Gentlemen:

The Commerce Club of Lewis College strives to aid its members in furthering their knowledge of the their interest in commerce, industry, and related subjects. It endeavors to increase their ability to accept responsibility, both now and in later life. And, it aims to provide opportunities for healthy and beneficial social activities.

On Thursday, November 9, 1961, the Lewis College Commerce Club adopted its constitution, and since then has operated as an effective organization to augment the education in the classroom of its members.

Membership is limited to the students enrolled in the Departments of Economics and Business Administration. They also must be in good standing at Lewis, scholastically, spiritually, and socially.

Summary of Activities.

For the purpose of order, the activities of the Commerce Club will be presented by years.

1964-1965. On October 10, 1964, the club again toured the
1961-1962. The Commerce Club elections were held on November 16, 1961. At the first meeting, Brother Robert gave an introductory speech on "Economics and the Contemporary Man." On January 9, 1962, the Club toured the Caterpillar Tractor Company plant in Joliet, Illinois, seeing both the production and the accounting departments. On February 27, 1962, Mr. William Bryne, from Burroughs Corporation spoke on "Salesmanship as a Career." Another guest speaker from the Internal Revenue Department in Joliet, Illinois, was invited to speak at the March meeting on "Your Personal Income Taxes." The final meeting of the year was held on May 17, 1962, at which time new officers for the coming year were elected. (taken from the secretary notes.)

1962-1963. On October 17, 1962, Mr. Shale Baskin gave a speech on "Clothes and the College Student." The club's first trip was taken on December 7, 1962, to Chicago, Illinois. The day included tours through Merrill, Lynch, Pierce, Fenner, and Smith, Inc., the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago, the Mid-west Stock Exchange, and the Board of Trade. On March 28, 1963, the members traveled to Melrose Park, to the Ford Motor Company Assembly Plant. On April 24, 1963, the Annual Commerce Club Banquet was held, and on May 24, 1963, elections for the new officers was held. (taken from the secretary notes.)

1963-1964. On October 15, 1963, the Commerce Club went to the Texaco Refinery in Lockport, Illinois. We were given a brief, but comprehensive look into the oil industry. On November 10, 1963, the United States Steel Facility in Joliet, Illinois was visited. And on March 17, 1964, the year was climaxed by an excellent tour through I.B.M. facilities in downtown Chicago. The members of the club played a management game using the computers. To close the year, May 15, 1964 was designated as our election day, and we held our banquet on May 16, 1964. (taken from the secretary notes.)

1964-1965. On October 10, 1964, the club again toured the Caterpillar Tractor Company plant in Joliet, Illinois. On November 18, we toured the Ford Motor Company Stamping Plant in Chicago, Illinois. And on December 4, 1964 we sponsored, in co-operation with the International Relations Club, a Computer Mixer. Couples were matched through the use of short personality forms. And the semester was capped by the banquet on January 16, 1965. The "Man of the Year Award" was given for the first time to the most active member. The second semester began with a trip to the Chicago Stadium for a hockey game February 17, 1965. On March 17, 1965, the club was addressed by Mr. John Pope of the National Cash Register Co. on "What is a Computer." On April 2, 1965, we went to the Ford Motor Company Assembly Plant in Melrose Park, Illinois, and

sponsored a "Sadie Hawkins Day Dance", again using a computer to match couples. Mr. George McArdle, president of Sales Techniques Inc., spoke to the club on "How is your power of Persuasion", on April 7, 1965. Election day was on May 7, 1965 and the annual banquet was held on May 12, 1965.
