

## DATA ON THE ST. LOUIS METROPOLITAN AREA

It has been said that the Greater St. Louis Area "combines the vigor of the North, culture of the East, vision of the West, and hospitality of the South". Metropolitan St. Louis and the scenic Missouri and Illinois regions that surround it are rich in civic, cultural and recreational advantages.

### ST. LOUIS COUNTY

St. Louis County's undulating, forested hills, once dotted with farms and villages, now hold a well-spaced diversity of homes, industrial parks, commercial, educational, and cultural centers.

The urbanization has taken place with remarkably little strain, although two-thirds of the nearly 900,000 people have come since 1945.

Under orderly growth, the historic character of the County's major towns has been preserved while the County has developed as an entity within and around them. Long political severance from the City of St. Louis resulted in the establishment of law enforcement and other essential services. When the period of great growth came, there was a basic framework to receive families, firms and institutions.

Nineteenth century County growth was slow. At the turn of the century, only 50,000 people lived here, and high-rise pent-house apartments, freeways, space flight and the population explosion were far in the future.

### CITY OF ST. LOUIS

Geographically, St. Louis is 465 miles east of the center of the United States. Far more important in today's world, it is only 50 miles west of the nation's population center.

The proximity to the marketing crossroads of the nation is a major growth factor, coupled as it is with the fact that the area has the physical space for new industry and new residential communities.

Past and predicted future growth can be explained simply. The St. Louis Area has grown because people, and their businesses and industries, have found what they wanted here.

This area is really Missouri in miniature, representing the state's colorful history, varied geography, wide choice of living and--in recent years--working situations.

### INDUSTRY

Of the present 700 manufacturing industries in

the County, fewer than 50 were in the County before the 1920's. The big surge of industrial growth has taken place in the past quarter century, much of it in the past ten years.

In the 1956-66 decade, population increased by 55%; the number of manufacturing firms by 53% and their employment by 55%. Value added by the manufacturer doubled.

Open land, the area's importance as a transportation and distribution center, plus the development of industrial parks has explained much of the growth.

A broad spectrum of products is produced in the St. Louis area, although the solid base is in transportation. Giant McDonnell-Douglas Corporation, now Missouri's largest industrial employer, is one of the countries largest space craft and military aircraft producers. The three automobile manufacturer's in St. Louis have made this area the second largest auto center in the nation.

These are Ford Motor Company, where a new car rolls from the assembly line every 30 seconds; Chrysler Corporation, which has a capacity of 350,000 units a year; and General Motor's Chevrolet & Fisher Body Division. An important trend in this area is the

building of national and international home offices for large firms. One of the first was Brown Shoe Company, whose plants produce 30 million pairs of shoes a year. Brown was a pioneer in its County move. A recent move of a world headquarters is the 7-Up Company's move to Clayton. It would be hard to find a major United States company with national distribution which does not have a branch or office here.

As Brown makes no shoes here, Monsanto Company produces no chemicals in its new headquarters and research center campus, the core of its world-wide activities. An interesting part of Monsanto research, however, is the use of miniature pilot plants where testing reaches the last stage before actual production.

Alvey Conveyor Manufacturing Company produces package and pallet handling equipment and conveyors for export all over the world. The company has plants in Mexico and Europe.

McGraw-Hill, Inc. ships 22 million books a year from its computerized headquarters in St. Louis. The company leads in educational materials.

Wagner Electric Corporation, in the St. Louis area since 1906, now has three manufacturing centers here. Its automotive brakes and parts are tested on one of

the most sophisticated tools in the world--the dynamometer.

Emerson Electric Corporation produces armament systems, controls and electric motors. Tretolite Division of Petrolite Corporation produces chemical specialty compounds for petrochemical and other industries.

### TRANSPORTATION

St. Louis's transportation facilities and its location have been from its earliest days two very strong points. The large-scale and low-cost transportation facilities of air, rail, water and highways combine to move materials efficiently for assembly, processing and distribution from the St. Louis Metropolitan Area at the lowest possible cost.

St. Louis is the hub of the Mississippi River inland waterway system, which connects 29 of the principal industrial centers of 20 states with a total population of some 90 million.

St. Louis's well-rounded transportation and location picture are two major reasons why so many of the nation's biggest companies have plants here. It saves them freight costs.

The Metropolitan St. Louis Area is also recognized as the second largest trucking center in the nation. More than 200 common carriers of general commodities provide service to all parts of the United States and Canada. In addition to the common carriers, there are numerous contract, special commodity and heavy hauler carriers.

The St. Louis Metropolitan Area, serviced by 17 trunk line railroads and 5 switching lines, is the second largest railroad terminal in the nation. The aggregate mileage operated by these 17 trunk lines, and their affiliated companies, is 132,136 miles, or 60 percent of the total road mileage operated by Class I railroads in the United States.

When the Interstate Highway System is completed, it will converge on St. Louis from six directions. Interstate Highways 44, 55, 64 and 70, as well as U. S. Highways 40, 50, 61, 66, 67 and 460 will focus on the St. Louis area.

A network of commercial airlines serves St. Louis offering direct and fast transportation to all major cities in the United States. The five trunk and two local service airlines serving St. Louis, which is an international port of entry, furnish service internationally by direct connection with flights to these



various areas with reductions in freighting costs.

### NATURAL RESOURCES

The St. Louis area has four petroleum refineries, including Shell, which has one of the largest domestic refineries in the nation located here.

The area's coal reserves, in beds three feet or more thick, are estimated at 200 billion tons. Most of it is highly volatile and free burning.

In addition to coal, within a 125-mile radius of St. Louis lies a combination and variety of mineral resources matched by few, if any, areas of equal size in the United States. Besides coal and petroleum, the area has an abundance of iron ore, lead, zinc, copper, limestone, fluorspar, ceramic clays, silica sand and construction materials. Some \$300 million is now being invested in mining and smelting operation and prospecting activities, to uncover new deposits within 100 miles of St. Louis. What's more the region has immediate access to barite, silicon, limestone, titanium, fluorspar, soybeans, petro-chemicals, coal-tar derivatives, carbon-black, synthetic and reclaimed rubber and a host of inorganic and organic chemicals produced by local firms.

The three basic essentials for the production of iron (iron ore, coking coal and limestone) all are available within only 90 miles of St. Louis.

The role of minerals in the St. Louis area extends beyond that of a supplier of raw materials. The processing of minerals and metals from the raw state to the finished product makes up more than half of the manufacturing employment in the area.

### ECONOMICS

The economy and development of St. Louis, as it begins its third century, is literally soaring. In the St. Louis Metropolitan Area, employment in 1965 reached a record peak of 915,000. Unemployment dropped to 3.3%, well below the national average. Manufacturing output for the year increased 12%, compared with a national increase of 7%.

Those encouraging statistics have carried over into 1966. Those statistics have been joined by the region's new and continuing developments. The building of the Gateway Arch is credited with triggering an urban renewal program which, when the initial phase is completed in 1970, will have rebuilt 10% of the entire city at a cost of over \$2 billion in public and private funds.


## CIVIC ATTRACTIONS

New office buildings, high-rise luxury apartments, motels, hotels and restaurants are going up in downtown St. Louis, while older business buildings are taking on a dramatic new appearance via modern architectural facelifting techniques.

The new Civic Center Busch Memorial Stadium and the Spanish Pavilion (which was moved from its site at the New York World's Fair) will be adjacent to an 80-acre riverside park on which the Gateway Arch is located.

The Arch (designed by the late Eero Saarinen) at 630 feet is taller than the Washington Monument. It is the focal point of the \$30 million Jefferson National Expansion Memorial Park.

St. Louis' downtown development, like a rock thrown into a pond, has had rippling development effects throughout the St. Louis Metropolitan Area.






GENERAL HISTORY OF THE  
UNIVERSITY OF MISSOURI-ST. LOUIS

The University of Missouri, established in 1839 at Columbia, Missouri, has, from its inception, taken as its major task the role of leadership in the developing system of higher education in the state. Through the years, the changing demands of this role altered the University from a small liberal arts college, emphasizing a classical curriculum, to a large university embracing fifteen schools and colleges in Columbia, and a separate School of Mines and Metallurgy in Rolla, founded in 1870.

The University of Missouri-St. Louis opened in the fall of 1960 as the Normandy Residence Center of the University of Missouri. Established through the joint efforts of the University of Missouri and the Normandy (St. Louis County) School District, it began as a junior college serving 250 students its first year. An evening curriculum supervised by the Extension Division of the University provided adult education courses.

In 1963, a historic and fundamental change added the former University of Kansas City and the Normandy Residence Center in St. Louis to the University of Missouri, which now embraces four campuses: Columbia,



Kansas City, Rolla, and St. Louis. The administrative leadership of the University resides in a single Board of Curators and President, and in four Chancellors who act as the administrative heads of the campuses.

A federalistic administrative policy allows each of the four campuses the maximum freedom to develop programs designed to meet the needs of each area, while providing common overall policies and objectives. Thus the University of Missouri has provided a means by which it may more readily achieve its purpose. One university of four campuses with a common policy on admission, fees, research, faculty, and quality of education seems the best method of meeting the changing demands of an omnipresent future.

Today, in its classrooms, thousands of students are educated in a catalogue of disciplines which range from accounting to Zoology, while its professional schools graduate each year a constantly increasing number of engineers, physicians, veterinarians, pharmacists, lawyers, journalists, educators, business men, and other highly trained specialists. In its libraries and laboratories a constant search continues to broaden the boundaries of knowledge. On each campus an Extension Division brings the services of the University



to virtually every county, city, and village in the state, as its programs to citizens in all parts of Missouri grow in size and quality.

The University of Missouri-St. Louis owes its establishment to the rapidly growing educational need of the state's largest urban area for a state university campus which would provide education of high quality at moderate cost and serve the people of the metropolitan area by supplying the assistance and leadership which the responsibilities of the state university demand.

Construction has begun on a \$3,000,000 life sciences building. The five-story structure will house the departments of physics, psychology and biology. Plans call for occupancy by late next fall.


In the final drawing stage is a University Center, which will contain a student lounge, bookstore, meeting rooms and dining facilities, and will cost a little over \$2,000,000. To be linked to the University Center by means of a connecting corridor, the proposed J. C. Penney Education building will cost approximately \$1,500,000. Funds have also been appropriated for a multi-purpose building, which will have a 6000-seat gymnasium and facilities for physical education and a combination business, social sciences and education building.

Also under construction is a \$1,900,000 mathematics-languages building slated for completion this spring. It will be a five-story brick and stone structure with classroom accommodations for 1730 students. The university's new \$2,200,00 library is scheduled to be ready for occupancy by June. It will seat 1000 persons and have storage space for 240,000 volumes.

The original student body of 250 had grown to 540 by 1963 and to 7061 in the fall of 1967. The faculty, originally four full-time and eight part-time instructors, numbered 163 full-time and 108 part-time in the fall of 1966.

Altered from a two-year to a four-year institution in 1963, the University of Missouri-St. Louis now has a full four-year resident program in both its Day and Evening Divisions, as well as a graduate program in Education, offered in conjunction with the College of Education at the University of Missouri, Columbia. It is currently divided into a College of Arts and Sciences, and Schools of Education and Business. It held its first commencement in June of 1967, when 187 were graduated.

The campus is located in Normandy (St. Louis County)




on the site of the former Bellerive Country Club. Its 132 acres of grass, trees, and rolling land contain a recently completed three-building complex which houses classrooms; fully equipped laboratories; and faculty, departmental, and divisional offices. The second building houses the administrative offices, student cafeteria, Student Government Association, the research offices, statistics and psychology laboratories, counseling offices, and supplies the temporary quarters for the library.

The objectives and purpose of this campus can be summarized as the three-fold purpose of the discovery, the dissemination, and the application of knowledge. Or, stated in a different way, its purpose is that of research, teaching, and service to the people of the metropolitan area of St. Louis and to the state of Missouri. Its objective is academic excellence, and all students are required to follow a curriculum which gives them a broad training in the liberal arts and sciences, and depth in a major discipline of their choice.

This institution encourages students to qualify for advanced placement and credit, to enroll in the Honors Program if they qualify, to enroll whenever possible in seminars, in individual readings courses,

and in courses which emphasize undergraduate research. Faced with the necessity of a rapid expansion which will bring more than 20,000 students to the campus by 1975, it intends to maintain its primary concern with superior teaching, informal and frequent contacts between faculty and students, creative research, and service to the metropolitan community.





Central Tower





## HISTORY OF THE SCHOOL OF BUSINESS

1960 - The campus of the University of Missouri-St. Louis was started as a joint venture of the Normandy School District and the University of Missouri. Normandy bought the old Bellerive Country Club for \$600,000 with the intent of having a two year junior college. At this time President Ellis of the University of Missouri was thinking in terms of a four year campus at this site. Columbia provided the faculty and Normandy provided an administrative staff and maintenance men. Courses in Elementary Accounting, Statistics and Economics were offered.

1963 - The campus was purchased by the State of Missouri for \$60,000 and Dr. Bugg was appointed Dean of Faculties. The faculty was divided into: Humanities; Social Science; Science; Mathematics.

1964 - Department of Business Administration was formed.

1965 - The Business Department had a staff of two associate professors and three assistant professors.

1966 - The staff of the Business Department was enlarged to four associate professors and seven assistant professors. During this year the name of the department

was changed to Division of Business, reporting directly to the central administration of the campus and functioning as a semi-autonomous unit.

1967 - The School of Business Administration was staffed by three full-time professors, four associate professors, nine assistant professors, and three instructors. Out of this faculty fourteen people were qualified with a Ph.D. and all others were working toward this degree.

1968 - The School of Business Administration was staffed by four full-time professors, six associate professors, ten assistant professors and four instructors.

Curriculum - From the start the School of Business has kept up with the modern trends in professional education. They have integrated the developing concepts in quantitative and behavioral applications to administrative sciences. They plan to be accredited by the American Association of Collegiate Schools of **Business** (AACSB) by 1969. Also a Masters of Business Administration program will start in 1969.

The number of business students on campus has grown from 50 in 1960 to approximately 1500 in the 1967-68 school year. The new Business Administration Building will be completed by the Fall of 1970.

## HISTORY OF DELTA SIGMA CHI

March 1967 marked the beginning of what now is Delta Sigma Chi, a professional business fraternity. Joe Thomann, Joe Carapella and Bill Runge had been discussing the benefits of starting a fraternity at the University of Missouri-St. Louis. They checked into the different types of fraternities, service, social and professional, in order to make an intelligent choice.

Joe Thomann drove down to St. Louis University to talk with a member of Delta Sigma Phi social fraternity but he ended up with Ed Kuhn, president of Delta Sigma Pi. It was Ed that convinced Joe that a professional business fraternity was the answer to their problems. The original founders decided to correspond with Delta Sigma Pi. They started talking to their friends around school as well as members of the business faculty. Ed Kuhn informed Joe and Bill that the Grand President Marko and Executive Director Farrar were to be in St. Louis and this would be an excellent time to meet with the leaders of Delta Sigma Pi. Mr. Driemeier, a member of the business faculty at the University of Missouri-St. Louis, accompanied Joe Thomann and Bill Runge to the meeting set up with Mr. Marko, Mr. Farrar and Mr. Wolfenberg, Executive Secretary.

From their talk around campus, twenty-five students joined the newly formed organization, also Mr. Gantz and Mr. Hopper joined Mr. Driemeier as faculty advisors. Mr. Gantz, a member of Alpha Kappa Psi, suggested talking to both professional business fraternities in order to have a good comparison. After hearing from both fraternities, Delta Sigma Pi was chosen. This was all accomplished by the end of the winter semester in 1967.


During the summer, one field trip and a year-end party were held. Four of the original members were lost through graduation and five other members lost interest over the summer. At the close of the summer the officers met and a schedule of events was drawn up for the following semester using Delta Sigma Pi's basic format.

The first formal rush of Delta Sigma Chi brought thirteen pledges to the fraternity. Out of these, ten were finally selected as active members. Due to the loss of members over the summer a new executive board had to be elected. The new organization structure consisted of Jack Patton, President; Joe Thomann, Senior Vice-President; Jim Roof, Junior Vice-President; Tom Dickson, Secretary; Mike Moran, Treasurer; and Joe Carapella, Chancellor.

During the fall semester of 1967, seven business meetings were held, one regular program meeting, one program meeting and dinner combined, and one field trip. Christmas trees were sold during the season as a way to make money for our charter. On December 4, 1967, Grand President Marko came to St. Louis and pledged our local fraternity to the national. February 16, 1968 was the date of the first initiation for the first pledge class of Delta Sigma Chi.

Following the initiation, two weeks of rush were held at the University during which twenty-eight pledges were accepted. This semester there has been two business meetings and two program meetings with a field trip scheduled in April and two more program meetings set up in the future. The organization has fifty-three members at the present and two faculty advisors.

St. Louis' white cruciform Old Courthouse is framed by the towering Arch. The structure was begun in 1839 and steamboaters used its 180-foot high cast iron dome as a landmark. In one of its courtrooms, in 1847, Dred Scott's right to be a free man was first pleaded. This historic building has served as both museum and headquarters of the Jefferson National Expansion Memorial.





It is my pleasure to recommend to you the establishment of a chapter of Delta Sigma Pi on the campus of the University of Missouri - St. Louis.

The University of Missouri system was established in 1963. At that time, the St. Louis campus of what was then an extension center of the University of Missouri became integrated into the present-day four campus system. At that time, the discipline of business functioned as a department in the College of Arts and Sciences. In the 1966-67 academic year, business was recognized as a division at U.M.S.L.; in September, 1967, the School of Business was officially recognized by the overall controlling body of the University of Missouri system, the Board of Curators. June of 1967 marked the first graduating class of the St. Louis campus, which now numbers some 7,000 students enrolled in day and evening courses in the College of Arts and Sciences, the School of Education, and the School of Business Administration. Full-time faculty in business now numbers seventeen, with a major support staff of well-qualified, part-time people. Expansion will continually take place. The present size of the campus is limited only as the result of existing physical plant. Projections suggest a campus of about 22,500 students within a decade, and the advent of graduate study in the fall of 1969.

During the 1966-67 school year, a group of interested business students began groundwork in establishing a business club. With their decision to ultimately seek affiliation with the National Fraternity of Delta Sigma Pi, they named themselves Delta Sigma Chi and have conducted a worthwhile program of professional speakers, dinner meetings, professional tours, and social functions. Their overall program has been well-balanced and there has been a keen interest attested currently by a sizable pledge class.




Our university serves a sprawling metropolitan area where students tend to drive to the campus, receive their instruction and then leave.
