HISTORY OF THE AREA

"The Lake Charles Story"

When the people of Lake Charles began their search for natural resources by dredging a way to the Gulf of Mexico, they performed a feat without precedent and brought to this community an ever-increasing measure of industrial growth and prosperity.

In the year 1771, Bartholomew LeLieu and his bride, the French Miss, Catherine, both natives of Bordeaux, France, discovered the lake which was destined to become a very typical landmark of the South. The history of this region is intertwined with the story of the world.

The land they found was rich in every degree, wooded, and wild. Its soil depths and emerald tone is a picture of ancient forests, grassy willows and stately oaks still remain enchanting.

These first settlers lived in company with peaceful tribes of Choctaws, Comanches, and Cherokees until the coming of other pioneers. Among the first to come was Charles Sallier, originally from France. He was also known as "Charles Sallier". A man of vision, he was the first to see the value of the land. When the people of Lake Charles opened their area's treasure chest of natural resources by dredging a seaway to the Gulf of Mexico, they performed a feat without precedent and brought to their community an ever-increasing measure of industrial growth and prosperity.

In the year 1771, Barthelemy LeBleu and his bride, the former Mlle. Lamirande, both natives of Bordeaux, France, discovered the lake which was destined to become a geographical landmark familiar to lengthy roster of the captains of industry and commerce throughout the world.

They found the lake edged in snowy dogwood, redbud, and wild azaleas. Its cool depths and emerald tone in a setting of ancient cypress, graceful willows and stately oaks still remain enchanting today.

These first citizens lived in company with peaceful tribes of Choctaws, Coushattas, and Cherokees until the coming of other pioneers. Among the first to come was Charles Anselm Salliers, originally from the province of Savoie, France. He was also known as "Charles Savoyard", a nickname given him when he first arrived in this country because he came from Savoie. His use of the other nicknames of "Carlos Savoyard" and "Carlos Sallier" led to the belief by some people that he was a Spaniard; however, the "Genealogical Record of the Sallier Family", and records at the St. Landry Church in Opelousas show that he was French. When he settled in this area, he took his original name of Charles Sallier, and gave that name to Catherine, the only daughter of the Lebleus, and to the lake and the community....originally called Charley's Lake.

Glimpses into Lake Charles' past reveal the many things she has been to many people.

The settlers who came between 1780 and 1819 acquired their property from the Indians or homesteaded what was then known as the Rio Hondo lands. The original titles were based on Spanish grants to settlers in return for some stipulated service.

Rio Hondo was the name given by the Spaniards to the river which flowed through Lake Charles. It was later called Quelqueshue, an Indian term meaning Crying Eagle, and still later, it became Calcasieu.

History touches lightly on these earliest residents but their conglomeration of English, French, Spanish, Dutch and American names indicate that even in the beginning Lake Charles held great attractions for pioneers seeking security and well-being.

It attracted less desirable visitors, too. The wilderness route to the sea, the Calcasieu River, served the ships of slave traders and corsairs. Among the latter was Jean Lafitte, the legendary buccaneer, who headquartered in Lake Charles before lapsing into a career of piracy out of Campeche.

During the year 1840 the parish of Calcasieu was created out of the western part of St. Landry. It was a princely domain with but few inhabitants. Two thousand people lived within the 6,000 square miles of the original parish precincts. This sprawling area-including what is now Allen, Beauregard, Jeff Davis and part of Cameron Parishes-was long referred to as Imperial Calcasieu. In 1852, Lake Charles became the seat of Calcasieu Parish. With this position of political importance, growth was assured. The town was incorporated in 1867 with a total citizenry of about 400. The first Major was J. W. Bryan.

Jacob Ryan, often called the "father of Lake Charles", was the town's first real estate man. He sold property by the rope length along the street which bears his name. Ryan Street is the main street of the city.

It was still primitive territory. Transportation was largely dependent on roundabout water routes and without the facilities for development of timber and other natural resources, growth was slow during the next few years.

Captain Daniel Goos first came to Lake Charles in 1855. He established a lumber mill and a schooner dock which is now called Goosport, a suburb of the city. He was the first to point the way to progress for future generations when he established a profitable trade with coastal Texas and Mexican ports by sending his schooners down the winding reaches of the river out into the Gulf.

The coming of the railroad in 1880-Morgan's Louisiana Western which later became the Southern Pacific-spelled the doom of the schooner trade and distracted transporter's attentions from the river route to the Gulf. Thus began the new era.

J. B. Watkins, in his capacity as agent for a group of English investors, operating as the North American Land and Timber Company, purchased 960,000 acres in the area and then promoted the migration of farmers and mechanics from the midwest. He founded the "American", a newspaper first published in New York and later in Lake Charles.

In 1886, Mr. Watkins became the forerunner of the active citizens who comprise Lake Charles' Association of Commerce. He spent \$2,000 for one-cent stamps to send community promotional literature through the mails.

J. B. Watkins was instrumental in building the first railroad running north and south through this section. It became the Missouri Pacific. He built the town's first bank in 1885 and used it to promote his scheme to attract residents to this community.

Dr. Deaman A. Knapp of Ames, Iowa, made the development of a new industry possible. In 1891, with capital raised in New York, he built a rice mill. This mill, when in operation was the largest in North America, and was the first in Louisiana outside of New Orleans to establish the cash system of selling rice.

Dr. Knapp originated the "Boys Corn Club". This organization developed into the present nation-wide system of 4-H Clubs. He built and became the first president of the Calcasieu National Bank, which later became the Calcaieu-Marine National Bank.

John McNeese was the first parish school superintendent. The first public school in Lake Charles opened in 1882 with 203 students. John McNeese is the namesake of today's McNeese State College in Lake Charles with an enrollment of over 4,000.

The years passed, The forests of timber were thinning out. The lumber industry was failing. True, agricultural pursuits, the only other commerical attributes possessed by Lake Charles at the time, were of a profitable nature but the degree of profit was goverened by the vagaries of nature and were not consistent.

Then, in the mid-1920's, the people of the town, descendents of hardy, independent pioneer stock who had carved this community out of prairie and forest, displayed a courage, foresight and business acumen that is without historical equal. After being refused federal aid to dredge a channel to the Gulf of Mexico, they pledged themselves to a community project that had no precedent and has yet to be duplicated. They voted local bonds, dredged their own deep water channel to the Gulf of Mexico, built their own dock facilities and proceeded to tell the world that Lake Charles was open for buiness as a deep water port!

The world of commerce responded and the huge success of the venture finally commanded consideration from the Federal Government. Aid was forthcoming for shortening the route by the construction of a direct channel to the Gulf. The present seaway stretches just 34 miles south to the sea. Louisiana has two other deep water ports; New Orleans is 107 miles and Baton Rouge is 237 miles up the Mississippi from the Gulf.

The linking of Lake Charles to the world's sealanes proved a tremendous industrial attraction. During past decades the smokestacks have moved south.

Adjacent to the Ship Channel and the City of Lake Charles, twenty national manufacturers and their subsidiaries combine to form a nearly two-billion dollar chemical and petrochemical complex at Lake Charles. The area's industrial payroll totaled \$78 million dollars in 1967.

The ships, like their bustling port of call, have become almost unbelievably larger than they were back in the days when schooners sailed almost the same route from the lakeside village under the flag of Daniel Goos. The residents and the industries in the Lake Charles Harbor and Terminal District on April 4, 1961 approved a bond issue in the amount of \$13,000,000.00 for the expansion of the Calcasieu River Ship Channel and Pass and to deepen the channel to 40 feet and to widen it to 400 feet. The channel now can accommodate the largest tankers afloat without interference with freighter sailings. During 1967 the Port of Lake Charles handled 1,053,541 tons of general cargo across its wharves.

The United States Census reports Lake Charles' population for 1960 as being 63,392; 1940-21,207; 1950-41,272. This substantiates the statement that Lake Charles is a fast growing city. The Lake Charles Planning Commission estimated that the population was 77,070 as of January 1, 1967. A population of 90,820 is projected by the Planning Commission by 1970.

There is a Major-Council form of Government. (adopted in 1961)

The altitude is 17 to 22 feet. This mean annual temperature, 68.3 degrees F., average annual rainfall, 56.72 inches; average winter temperature, 54.2 degrees F., and average summer temperature, 81.7 degrees F.

The social and intellectual climate is simultaneously Southern and Western. Rice planters, manufacturing executives, cattlemen, and oil producers all work together in civic organizations to make Lake Charles a greater city.

Two 18 hole golf courses located just outside the city provides opportunity for this sport. There are two large bowling alleys in the city. Sam Houston State Park is located at West Fork on the Calcasieu River. It is a Louisiana State Park situated on 1,047 acres of land at the end of State Highway 378, approximately 10 miles north of Lake Charles. Fishing is available in Calcasieu Lake, Prien Lake, Calcasieu River, Lacassine and surrounding bayous and lakes.

Tennis is available at Lake Charles High School Courts and McNeese State College. Putt Putt Golf Course is located at Oak Park Boulevard and Highway 14. The downtown area contains three modern movie houses. The YMCA is located at 618 Kirby Street. Swim and play at the resort facilities on the beautiful north beach.

The Lake Charles Servicemen's Center is located on Bilbo Street in downtown Lake Charles. There are three hospitals located at Lake Charles. The Lake Charles Municipal Airport is located seven and one-half miles from the Parish Court House and City Hall in downtown Lake Charles and covers 1,649.44 acres. The cost of this facility was six million dollars.

There are two organizations open to boat owners-The Lake Charles Power Squadron for large boats and the Calcasieu Boat Club for owners of smaller craft. The college and high schools in the area provide a year-round schedule of intramural sports and competition.


There are several historical markers in the area. Among these are: Perkins Ferry Historical Marker, located at the junction of North Highway 171 and Graham Street; Confederate Monument on the front lawn of the Calcasieu Parish Court House; Lake Charles Historical Marker located on Highway 90 as you enter the city from the west along the lakefront; and crossed pistols in the iron railing design on the Calcasieu River Bridge.

The Calcauiou Historical Museum is located at 1019 Front Street in downtown Lake Charles with hours on Wednesday through Friday from 10:00 to 12:00 noon and 2:00 to 5:00pm, Saturday from 10:00 to 12:00 noon, and Sunday from 2:00 to 5:00 pm.

Industrial tours may be arranged by contacting the plant of your choice by telephone or letter. Charter boats are available for deep sea fishing.

Sowela Technical Institute, the only state supported Technical Institute in Louisiana, offers a variety of courses to train people to enter into business and industry and is located at 501 Broad Street in downtown Lake Charles.


It has been requested that I write this letter to inform you that a group of young men at McNeese State College, here in Lake Charles, are interested in becoming members of Delta Sigma Pi.

HISTORY OF MCNEESE STATE COLLEGE

McNeese State College was founded in 1939 as a division of Louisiana State University, offering only the first two years of higher education. Originally called Lake Charles Junior College, the name became John McNeese Junior College in 1940 by resolution of the University's Board of Supervisors in honor of a pioneer Southwest Louisiana educator.

Advanced to four-year status and separated from L. S. U. in 1950, the College was renamed McNeese State College and its administration was transferred to the State Board of Education. Four years later, McNeese gained significant recognition through admission to the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, highest accrediting agency in the United States for such schools in the South.

The 1960 Louisiana Legislature authorized McNeese to offer curricula leading to master's degrees in education. Subsequent expansion of the Division of Graduate Studies now enables McNeese to confer a total of eight graduate degrees, including that of Education Specialist which is a degree beyond the master's level.

In 1962 McNeese was organized into the following academic divisions: Education, Fine Arts, Humanities, Pure and Applied Sciences, and Graduate Studies. The Division of Commerce was created in 1966 to complete the current academic organizational structure.

Located on an 86-acre tract donated by the Calcasieu Parish Police Jury, the College opened its doors in 1939 with a physical plant of two buildings: the administration building (Kaufman Hall) and McNeese Arena. McNeese Auditorium was completed in 1940. These three structures are still in use today. As enrollment has grown from 154 in the opening year to the present more than 4,500, considerable land acquisition and physical plant expansion has occurred. In the summer of 1964, the Louisiana State Board of Education gave the College permission to apply to General Services Administration for a portion of the land and facilities at vacated Chennault Air Force Base. In the fall of 1966, the College received the deed to 242 acres and a number of buildings. This addition gives the College a total of 686 acres of land. This includes the main campus, a 280-acre farm, 65 acres on which the athletic plant and married-student apartments are located, and seven acres each for horticulture department and President's home grounds.



The Chennault campus is now an integral part of the College, housing the Special Education Center and the departments of Engineering, Nursing, and Technology as well as providing student residence and recreation facilities.

Most construction and additions to the campus have been made since 1956. Noteworthy among recent developments has been the provision of on-campus housing for students desiring these accommodations. Included are three modern dormitories for women, two for men, and a total of 162 apartments for married students. The most recently completed structure on campus is the Student Union, which includes Holbrook Ranch Student Center, cafeteria, bookstore, publications center, placement office, and post office.

Several million dollars worth of planned new construction includes a physical science building, administration building, teacher education complex, and additional student apartments.

McNeese State College, growing with Southwest Louisiana, has more than justified the dreams of the cattlemen, the Lake Charles Association of Commerce, as it was known then, Calcasieu Parish Police Jury, and other far-sighted citizens who were instrumental in its founding.

PRESIDENTS HOME

The Presidents Home is located across the street from the main campus. It was erected in 1965 and was patterned after the famed plantation homes of the Deep South.



Auditorium

The building was completed in 1939 with the seating capacity of 2200. Used for assemblies, concerts, and lecture programs. It is utilized by Community Concert Association and other civic organizations.



FINE ARTS BUILDING

The original Fine Arts Building was completed in 1949, with an addition being completed in 1963. It contains a number of classrooms, practice rooms, labs, and Ralph Squires Auditorium. It currently houses the Departments of Music, Speech, and Visual Arts.



Frasch Hall

The building was completed in 1956 and is currently accomadating Departments of Physical Science and Biological Science. Named after Herman Frasch, who discovered the process for extracting sulphur from underground, and the process of extracting sulphur from some crude oil.



Sallier Hall

One of a number of Women's Residents Halls, Sallier Hall was erected in 1956. It was named after Carolyn LeBleu Sallier, first child born in Calcasieu Parish.



Holbrook Ranch

Named after W. E. Holbrook of DeQuincy, Louisiana. Mr. Holbrook was President of the Police Jury when the College was established in 1939. Holbrook Ranch houses the main campus cafeteria, the College bookstore, the printing office, the post office, the Student Government offices, the career placement office, the Student Union Board, and a number of game rooms, as well as a coffee shop.



Kaufman Hall

The building was completed in 1939 and has been added on to since then. The building now contains classrooms and administration facilities. Named after Leymed Kaufman, who was a business leader of Lake Charles, Louisiana.



ZIGLER HALL

One of a number of men's residents halls, Zigler was erected in 1965. It was named after Fred Zigler a local business man and philanthropist. It contains a study room, a number of overnight accommodations for guest, and office space as well as residents facilities.



ATHLETIC FIELD HOUSE

The Field House was completed in 1964. It is ranked as the top field house in the state for small colleges. It contains offices, film rooms, training, and dressing rooms.



HISTORY OF THE DIVISION OF COMMERCE

The development of the programs in education for business at McNeese State College has paralleled the development and growth of the institution as a whole. The college was founded by an act of the state legislature in 1938, and the following year Lake Charles Junior College of Louisiana State University began its operation as a part of the university's junior division.

Two-year curricula in business administration and business education leading to the baccalaureate were offered during the initial semester at the junior college. There was also a two-year terminal program in secretarial science. During the freshman year of these programs, the usual arts and science coursework was required with specialized courses in business, accounting, economics, and secretarial science comprising the sophomore year.

In 1940 the name of the institution was changed to John McNeese Junior College of L.S.U. in order to honor the memory of the foremost pioneer in public education in the southwestern part of the state. The three curricula in the business area remained intact, and in 1944, sufficient growth of majors justified the creation of a Department of Commerce with its own chairman.

Continued development of the college's overall operations culminated in the state legislature conferring a senior college status and complete autonomy upon the institution in 1951. The name was changed to McNeese State College, and the various departments of the institution were authorized to confer a baccalaureate. Curricula in the Department of Commerce included accounting, general business, and management. Besides the two-year terminal secretarial science curriculum, a two-year program was added in distributive merchandising.

The first Bachelor of Science degrees in business were awarded in 1953, and the area continued to grow. When the college reorganized its departmental organization into divisions, the Division of Commerce was created and a dean appointed to head the unit. The expansion of degree programs was increased to include accounting, general business, foreign trade, economics, and secretarial science. A two-year secretarial science program was kept, and an evening program was begun in business.

The college made administrative changes again in 1958 when the departmental system was again adopted. An academic dean of the college was appointed to supervise the fourteen separate departments.

In the commerce area, two administrative units were organized, the Department of Accounting and Economics and the Department of Business Administration and


Secretarial Science. Four years later, the college again returned to a divisional organizational structure because of the continued overall increase in enrollment with five separate divisions, each with its own academic dean. At this time, the commerce area was placed in the Division of Humanities with the Departments of Accounting and Business Administration remaining intact. In 1967 the commerce area was separated from humanities and became an autonomous unit of the college under its own dean. The three departments comprising the division at this time were accounting, business administration, and economics. The next year the secretarial science curriculum was updated, and the name of the program changed to office administration to more adequately define the function of the coursework in that particular area.

At the same time, Master of Business Administration and Master of Business Education degrees were added to the commerce offerings. In the summer of 1969, one more change in the evolution of the business area will become effective. McNeese will designate each academic area as a school rather than a division. The School of Business will become official designation of the commerce area. Currently, degrees are granted in the following areas--general administration, marketing, management, economics, accounting, office administration, and finance.

The School of Business will move its operations to a new wing of the college administration building during the summer of 1969, and space will be reserved for a Bureau of Business Research which will begin operations in the fall of 1969.

Enrollment in the commerce area has continued to increase percentage-wise much greater than that of the college as a whole. During the past three years in which the Division of Commerce has operated autonomously, enrollment has increased 42%, while that of the college has increased 18% during this same period. The Department of Business Administration continued to be the area of greatest increase within the division and has posted a 52% increase during this time. Currently, enrollment in the Division of Commerce is over 900, and the faculty number nineteen. Growing at a rate of 250 per year, the new School of Business should double its current enrollment before the increase begins to level off.

Among the nine state colleges under the jurisdiction of the State Board of Education, McNeese is the only institution located in an industrial or in a metropolitan area. The outlook for the future in regard to the business programs is, therefore, very optimistic.


Dr. Adi S. Karna

He holds membership in Beta Alpha Pi a honorary accounting fraternity and in Gamma Eta Gamma a honorary legal fraternity.


