

HISTORY AND DEVELOPMENT OF VIRGINIA COMMONWEALTH UNIVERSITY

Richmond Professional Institute (one of the components of Virginia Commonwealth University) was originally begun as the Richmond School of Social Work and Public Health in September, 1917. With thirty-one students and one full-time teacher and director, Dr. Henry Horace Hibbs, the initial effort was training social workers and public health nurses to meet the country's wartime needs.

By 1921, the curriculum had expanded to include programs in Recreational Leadership, Extension Courses and Dramatic Art. This expansion led, in 1925, to the affiliation of the school with the College of William and Mary, headquartered at Williamsburg, Virginia, and the adoption of the name Richmond Division of the College of William and Mary. After adding other departments and including a graduate school of Social Work, the name was again changed in 1939 to Richmond Professional Institute of the College of William and Mary.

In 1940, the General Assembly made its first appropriation from tax funds for the operation and maintenance of the Institution. The school of Business was organized the same year, followed by the school of Music, Occupational Therapy, and the Department of Applied Psychology.

In 1946, a two-year branch of engineering studies was established in cooperation with Virginia Polytechnic Institute. 1947 saw the beginning of the Department of Education and 1950 was the year of Journalism.

Obtaining independent accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools in 1953, Richmond Professional Institute added, in 1955, the School of Rehabilitation Counseling and several two-year programs in Engineering Technology.

During the period from 1917 to 1959, the chief resident administrative officer was Dr. Henry H. Hibbs. He served first as Director, Dean, and later as Provost. Upon his retirement in 1959, the post of Provost was assumed by Dr. George J. Oliver, who had been Director of Extension for the College of William and Mary. In 1960 the title was changed to president.

Under the leadership of Dr. Oliver, the school became independent of the College of William and Mary, added the School of Education and organized a two-year program in Law Enforcement. He also saw the addition, in 1966, of the School of Arts and Sciences, formed from existing courses and broadened to provide better opportunities for students seeking a liberal arts education.

Dr. Oliver retired in 1967, passed the presidency to Dr. Roland H. Nelson, Jr., who remained one year. Upon the departure of

Dr. Nelson for other duties, Dr. Francis J. Brooke was named interim provost.

It was in June, 1969, that the present incumbent of the president's chair arrived in the person of Dr. Warren W. Brandt. Dr. Brandt has assumed control of a full size university which came into being as the result of a two-year study by a special commission appointed by the governor of Virginia. This committee recommended that the Richmond Professional Institute and the Medical College of Virginia, also a state supported institution of higher education, be merged to form Virginia Commonwealth University. The merger took effect on July 1, 1968.

Now fifty-two years old, the institution serves better than 13,000 students in fourteen different schools. Master's degrees are offered in six different schools of the Academic Division and post-graduate work is also offered in the medical fields of the Health Sciences Division. The Academic Division of the university is located at Shafer and Franklin Streets in a residential district of the city while the Health Sciences Division is in downtown Richmond at Twelvth and Marshall Streets. Present plans call for extending the Academic Division campus southward toward the James River.

In addition to Founder's Hall, 827 West Franklin Street, which was the first building occupied by Richmond Professional Institute, sixty-one pieces of real estate were acquired over an approximately twelve block area to provide facilities for the growing institution. Among the newer buildings , the Hibbs Building, named for the first chief officer, houses the Bookstore, student and faculty cafeterias, a student snack bar and lounge and three full floors of modern classroom facilities. The Gymnasium, erected in 1951, is undergoing additions to include a full sized olympic type swimming pool and additional classroom space. It is in the Gym that the present headquarters of the School of Business is located.

New structures now being built include the School of Art and a new Library. The new School of Business is to be located on a tract of land being cleared at this time. Plans are under way for a School of Education building and a new facility for the Chemistry department.

As a modern urban institution of higher education, Virginia Commonwealth University seeks to identify itself with the city of which it is a part. While its campus is the community, its nine major buildings blend the old with the new and the classic with the modern as a constant reminder of its community setting. The university seeks to preserve the best of its past to blend with the

Vibrant growth of the present and the promise of the future. The physical plant reflects this view.

Student enrollment is projected above 30,000 within the next five years. As the largest institution of higher education in the Old Dominion, the major share of the responsibility for quality performance by Virginia college alumni rests now with Virginia Commonwealth University. Major manufacturers, business establishments and school districts in Virginia and neighboring states are becoming increasingly aware of this fact; and interviews for job placements are increasing at a rapid rate.

CURRENT FACTS ABOUT VIRGINIA COMMONWEALTH UNIVERSITY

VIRGINIA COMMONWEALTH UNIVERSITY OPERATES ON THE SEMESTER SYSTEM AND OFFERS BACHELOR'S DEGREES IN ART, ARTS AND SCIENCES, BUSINESS, ENGINEERING, EDUCATION, OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY, SOCIAL WORK, GENERAL MEDICINE, DENTISTRY AND NURSING.

THE STUDENT BODY APPROXIMATES 13,000, HALF OF WHICH IS COED. BEING AN URBAN UNIVERSITY, A LARGE PERCENTAGE OF THE STUDENTS COMMUTE DAILY TO THE CAMPUS. DORMITORY FACILITIES ARE AVAILABLE FOR APPROXIMATELY 2,000 PERSONS.

THE STUDENT NEWSPAPER IS PUBLISHED TWICE WEEKLY AND HAS RECENTLY BEEN NAMED "THE COMMONWEALTH TIMES". CIRCULATION IS PLACED AT 10,000 COPIES EACH ISSUE. VARIOUS BULLETINS ARE PUBLISHED BY EACH DEPARTMENT FOR ITS LOCAL READERS.



THE CAMPUS


THE CAMPUS

The campus is a beautiful area with many fine buildings and a large green lawn. The main building is a large, white, classical-style structure with a prominent portico. To the right, there is a smaller, more modern building with a glass facade. The campus is surrounded by trees and a well-maintained lawn. The sky is clear and blue. The overall atmosphere is peaceful and academic.



FRANKLIN STREET

A major traffic artery extending nearly the entire width of the city of Richmond, Franklin Street bisects the Virginia Commonwealth University campus. This view is looking east toward the business district where the Health Sciences Division of the University is located. In the background is Rhoads' Hall, a girl's dormitory.



SCHOOL OF BUSINESS

Bounded by Harrison, Linden, Floyd and Main Streets, construction has begun on the new classroom and office building for the School of Business. Scheduled for completion in the fall of 1971, this modern edifice represents \$3,232,000.00 of the construction now in progress, costing a total of \$9,590,466.00, which includes the gymnasium addition, a new library and the fine arts building.

Funds have been authorized for a School of Education and a chemistry building to be started during the 1968-70 biennium.



THE ADMINISTRATION BUILDING

Located at 901 West Franklin Street, the Administration building provides classroom and office space as well as the official University address. This structure was originally a private mansion, as were most of the other original thirty-six structures when acquired, and became school property in 1930. The registrar, Office of Development, Treasurer and other important functionaries operate from this location.



THE HIBBS BUILDING

Named for Dr. Henry Horace Hibbs, founder and director of the Richmond School of Social Work, forerunner of the present university, this structure was completed in 1959. It houses the campus bookstore, two cafeterias and a student snack bar in addition to modern classroom facilities. Its cost, \$1,781,000.00.



RHOADS HALL

Named in honor of Mr. Webster S. Rhoads, Jr., a member of the Board of Visitors, who died in December 1967, this modern structure houses 719 coeds. Of the thirteen dormitories at the Academic Division of the University, this is the most imposing and was completed in 1968 at a cost of \$3,250,000.00.



THE GYM

Present location of the School of Business administrative offices, the gymnasium is undergoing a major addition to provide additional classrooms, an olympic swimming pool and an auditorium at a cost of approximately \$1,832,298.00. Occupancy of the new facilities is scheduled for mid-1970.



THE MANAGEMENT CENTER

Located on the corner of Franklin and Shafer Streets the Management Center occupies one of the older structures at the University. It was originally a residence and later became a doctors office. In 1969 it became part of the institution.

THE SCHOOL OF BUSINESS

HISTORY OF THE SCHOOL OF BUSINESS

Organized in 1940 to add to a growing urban institution of higher learning, the School of Business was headed by Dr. Charles Carlson, who remained until Dr. Kenneth Zimmer was named director in 1953. The B.S. Degree in Business was conferred on three students of the Class of 1944. Real growth began subsequent to the Korean conflict, and the year 1965-66 saw enrollment surpass 1,000 students for the first time. In recent years the School of Business has accounted for nearly one-fifth of the total enrollment of the academic division of the university. Figures for the 1969-70 school year show 2,245 students. Projections for 1975 are for more than 4,000.

Programs now offered include Accounting, Business Education, Data Processing, Economics, General Business Administration, Management, Marketing (Cooperative Distribution), Secretarial Administration and Graduate Studies.

The Department of Graduate Studies became operative in 1956 offering the Master of Science degree. Plans are now under review for the Master of Business Administration degree.

In addition to the degree seeking students, nearly 1,000 persons are enrolled in evening classes as special students.

The Faculty has grown from an inauspicious 12 at inception to the 72 now engaged in the varied duties of this school.

The School of Business operates the Management Center to provide specialized non-credit education to individuals and to businesses. A wide variety of courses and seminars are presented to more than 3,000 persons annually, representing over 1,300 businesses and organizations. The Center also conducts the University's portion of the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development Title VIII program sponsored to improve government personnel performance throughout Virginia.

The Bureau of Business Research was organized in an effort to provide a stimulus for faculty to engage in research and as a means of making the research capability of the faculty available to the business community. Twin-trailers on Virginia highways and problems of small businesses in the inner-city areas of Richmond are studies now being conducted.

Since its beginning the School of Business has had space problems. Present classroom and office space, while much improved over years gone by, will be moved to a new Business Administration Classroom and Office building scheduled for completion by the fall of 1971.

The goals of the School of Business are constantly under review with

improvements in curriculum, faculty, student and facilities at the heart of most of its efforts.

Dr. J. Curtis Hall, the present dean and Dr. J. Kenneth Roach, Director of Graduate Studies are constantly alert for innovative materials, procedures, curricula, or personnel that may assist in sustaining the phenomenal growth of this important segment of Virginia Commonwealth University.

History of Sigma Omega Beta

In February of 1968, Mr. Michael DeFra a law professor at Virginia Commonwealth University inquired into his classes for students interested in beginning a local chapter of Delta Sigma Pi, an international professional fraternity. Mr. DeFra asked those interested to meet in his office to discuss the possibility of such a venture. At this meeting Mr. DeFra explained the aspects of Delta Sigma Pi and what the requirements would be in order for us to establish a local chapter on our campus.

Those present at that first meeting were; Tyree Felder, Ben Vorhies, Buddy Patterson, Bill Koogler, Barton Rager, and Tim Hanger. This group of interested students then formed a steering committee with Tyree as chairman in order to study the matter further. From this committee we began planning our program for the spring semester and the following year. Of course, membership would be our first matter so we decided that in order to be eligible for membership into Sigma Omega Beta a person must have established a 2.0 average. This was done in relationship with the requirements of Delta Sigma Pi so there would be no question as to the eligibility of our members when the time came to become initiated into the national organization. Through weekly meetings we were able to set up our programs and introduce new members.

During the spring semester we began developing our organizational structure. This structure is made up of the following offices; President, Vice-President, Treasury, Secretary, Historian, with three committees; Membership, Finance, and Activities.

Our activities for this semester included Mr. Howard Carwile, a member of Richmond's city council, as a guest speaker for one of our meetings.

Also during the spring semester we went as a group to the Camptown Races which are held annually in Ashland, Virginia. Later in the spring, Mr. Ellery Lacy a field representative from Delta Sigma Pi visited our campus to answer our questions and acquaint us with the national organization. In the latter part of the semester we held the election of officers for the coming school year. The officers and committee heads for the school year of 1969-1970 are; Tom Thorpe-President, Buddy Patterson-Vice-President, Jeff Clark-Secretary, Larry Bosserman-Treasury, Tim Hanger-Historian, Buddy Patterson-Membership Committee, Larry Bosserman-Finance Committee, Tom Thorpe-Activities Committee.

With the end of the school year approaching it was decided that since many members would remain in Richmond over the summer the organization should continue to have a number of organizational meetings during this time in order to continue our program and better plan the coming year. Upon receiving an invitation to Delta Sigma Pi's national convention in Michigan during the month of August the organization decided this would be an excellent opportunity to further understand Delta Sigma Pi. Mr. Larry Bosserman and Mr. Tyree Felder represented our organization at this convention and found it very rewarding.

With the beginning of another school year we began working on our plans for national entrance this year. We are now holding meetings twice a month. Perhaps our biggest professional activity to date was this semester when Dr. Brandt who is a member of Delta Sigma Pi and also the president of Virginia Commonwealth University spoke before our members on the subject of Virginia Commonwealth University. This meeting was very stimulating and termed a big success. Later in the semester we enjoyed two movies which Mr. Felder acquired for the group. They were, "Competition

in Business" and "Consumer's Union". Also this semester we had a local insurance representative inform us of insurance and it's importance to us, and a trip to the Federal Reserve Bank in Richmond on December 12, to tour the facilities.

Mr. Ben Wolfenberger a representative from Delta Sigma Pi visited our campus on December 9 to view Sigma Omega Beta's progress. The officers of our fraternity had dinner with Ben and later held a meeting with the rest of the fraternity. Ben told us how we were progressing and answered any questions concerning our initiation date. This brought us one step closer to national recognition.

We are now planning a membership drive to recruit underclassmen which will enhance our longevity. These programs we believe will prepare us for assuming the responsibility of becoming a chapter in Delta Sigma Pi.


