## Columbus History

Located in a pleasant river valley, Columbus is at the head of navigation on Georgia's longest river, the Chattahoochee, and at the foot of a series of falls extending more than 30 miles , furnishing tremendous water power.

Created with the signature of Georgia Governor John Forsyth on December 24, 1827, Columbus has often been called "a perfect example of a planned 19th Century town," with the many broad streets and avenues of its old section still following the pattern laid out by the cities founding fathers.

At the start of the "War Between the States," Columbus was still a frontier settlement, but she threw her mills, her wealth, and her patriotic young men into the war with great enthusiasm, making Columbus one of the most important industrial cities in the Confederacy.

Columbus is said to have furnished more troops to the Southern cause, in proportion to population, than any other city. As a result of this, in 1866 a group of Columbus women inaugurated the custom of Memorial Day, on which the Confederate dead are honored. This Memorial Day is still observed throughout the South each April 26.

The turning point in Columbus history came with the start of World War I, when in 1918 an army post was established here. This post was named for General Henry L. Benning, a Columbus lawyer and soldier who served the confederacy with distinction. This post is now known as Fort Benning, the Infantry Center of the United States Army and the largest infantry school in the world.

Columbus has grown a lot since the first settlers arrived early in 1828 to establish a settlement in the last frontier of the 13 Original Colonies, and today, Columbus is the second largest city in Georgia.



## HISTORY OF COLUMBUS COLLEGE

Columbus College is the result of community endeavor. Its establishment was first seriously proposed by the Post War Planning Committee of the Columbus Chamber of Commerce in 1945. In April of 1949, the voters of Muscogee County, Georgia, approved the merger of the city and county schools under enabling legislation which authorized the Muscogee County School District to operate a college.

In June, 1949, a 157-acre college site was purchased. Of the \$105,907.50 purchase price, \$92,195 was contributed by Muscogee County residents. Sewer lines were run through the site, and a \$100,000 bond issue was passed for roads and streets through the college site.

During the period 1945 - 1958, the Commissioners of Roads and Revenues of Muscogee County, the City Commissioners of Columbus, the Education Committee of the Columbus Chamber of Commerce, and the Muscogee County School Board continued to urge the establishment of a college in Columbus.

Following the passage of the Georgia Junior College Act of 1958, the Muscogee County Board of Education applied to the Regents of the University System of Georgia for a junior college as a unit of the University System. The Muscogee County Board of Education spent approximately \$100,000 to modify the former Shannon Hosiery Mill into an adequate temporary facility for Columbus College. The first freshman class was enrolled in September, 1958.

Construction of a permanent facility was not begun until October, 1961. Construction was delayed approximately two years by controversies surrounding the location of the Lindsay Creek By-Pass highway. The location of the by-pass route resulted in the reduction of the college site to approximately 131 acres. Columbus College's permanent site was occupied by the administrative staff in December, 1962, and the first registration in the new facility was held January 2, 1963. The College buildings were dedicated on January 6. Columbus College held its first open house in late January.

During the summer of 1965, a home for the president was completed at a construction cost of \$55,000. Contracts were awarded in May, 1965, for an Administration Building and a Science Building at a construction cost of approximately \$700,000. These buildings were occupied in the fall of 1966. Recently completed are three buildings at a total cost of \$2.9 million; they are an addition to the physical education building, which contains a swimming pool and a minor sports gymnasium; a fine arts building which includes a 900-seat auditorium; and a student union building which accommodates student activities, student recreation, food service, and a bookstore.

Building plans for the next biennium include a paramedical building, a social science-humanities building, a life sciences building, a faculty office building, and an additional library.

In December, 1963, J. Alvan Davis, Judge, Superior Court, Muscogee County, granted a charter to the Columbus College Foundation, Incorporated. This Foundation was organized to promote the growth and development of Columbus College, to expand educational opportunities, to finance capital improvements, to acquire real estate, and to acquire and administer funds. This Foundation began active support of various projects and programs connected with Columbus College in September, 1965. The Foundation raised over \$500,000 which was matched by the Regents of the University System of Georgia along with a supporting grant of \$600,000 from the Federal Government, for the construction of the \$1.6 million Fine Arts Building and auditorium. The Foundation committee responsible for the fund drive was headed by Mrs. Simon Schwob.

Columbus College was accredited as a junior college in December, 1963, by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools after a minimum waiting period and without reservations or conditions.

In April, 1965, the Regents approved the application of Columbus College to begin transition to senior college status in September, 1966, the first class to graduate in June, 1970.

Columbus College continues to be an outstanding example of what a community can do to provide educational opportunity for its citizens by willingly assuming a share of the financial responsibility.



## HISTORY OF DELTA SIGMA EPSILON

In November of 1968 a group of 50 business majors met for the purpose of organizing a professional fraternity. Under the guidance of the first president, Tom Maholik, and the head of the Business-Economics Department, Dr. Roger Collins, the group set its goals at petitioning for membership in Delta Sigma Pi national fraternity. In line with this decision the group selected Delta Sigma Epsilon for their name.

At the beginning of Spring quarter, several Delta Sig members visited the CC campus to meet with the members and to discuss the various requirements for petitioning to go national. These men were Benh Wolfenberger, Executive Secretary of Delta Sigma Pi, Roger Greer, President of Georgia States Kappa Chapter, and J. Phillips District Representative of Delta Sigma Pi.

At the present time we are preparing our petition for presentation to national in late November or December, 1969. We now have two Delta Sig alumni helping us toward our goal, they are John Parish, the advisor from national, and Tom Webb, an alumni from Pi chapter at Georgia, who is serving as one of our advisors.

Past activities for the fraternity have been the sponsoring of dances for the school, industrial tours for the business department, and dinner meetings for the brothers. We also sponsored Elain Powell in the Miss Columbus College Beauty Pageant (part of the Miss America Pageant). Also, we built the winning entry in the annual Columbus College bed race, and in the process set a school record for the event by completing the six-mile race in 35 minutes.
