## HISTORY OF ORLANDO

### "CITY BEAUTIFUL"

A century ago, the "City Beautiful" was covered with a tall pine forest and Seminole Indians strolled among the trees, often camping along the banks of the numerous lakes in the area. Wild orange trees, bearing sour fruit, grew uninhibitedly in the forest. Who could conceive that a thriving industrial city, famed for its beauty, citrus, and mild climate, would emerge from an area of such primitive surroundings?

When the Seminole War ended in 1842, Captain Aaron Jernigan selected this location for his home. It was called Mosquito County, being formed by the State Legislature in 1824. Mosquito County extended from St. Augustine southward to Key West and westward to Gainesville. Attorney D.W. Butler recently found an article in a law book which showed Spain's former ownership of Mosquito County. It read as follows:

Instructions of State Department: Colonel Robert Butler was by Major General Andrew Jackson designated on June 20, 1821, to receive the East half of Florida for the United States from Spain. This was consummated on July 10, 1821, and the agreement was signed by Jose Coppinger for Spain and Robert Butler for the United States. It was certified by Juan De Entralgo, Government Scribe and Secretary City Council.

Aaron Jernigan brought his family to the area from Georgia in January, 1842 and built the first log cabin. He was officially the first settler.

Other families followed. Among them were W.B. Hull and John Worthington. Mr. Hull and relatives came from Georgia in 1855 and in

1883 constructed a two-story frame house on the corner of Conway Road and Fern Creek Drive. Mr. John Worthington, coming in 1856, was one of the first to sell merchandise. He built a saw mill, a grist mill, and a cotton gin. The settlement was now a trading post.

The settlers of this new frontier raised cotton, corn, sugar cane, sweet potatoes, and cattle. There was also some cultivation of oranges from the indigenous orange stock which the first white settlers found growing wild in the forests. Being largely self-sufficient, the pioneers made their own furniture, including spinning wheels to make the cloth from cotton which they grew themselves. Shoes were made from the hides of their cattle, and gourds were used to make jars and other containers. They ground sugar cane for a sweetening substance, and their coffee was made from sweet potatoes which were dried, parched, and ground. Old guns, thrown away by soldiers during the perennial fighting with the Indians, furnished steel for the blacksmiths.

On May 30, 1850, a post office was established in the vicinity and was called "Jernigan" after Aaron Jernigan. However, seven years later the name was changed to Orlando. Several legends attempt to explain the origin of the name. One says that Judge James G. Speer, who came in 1854, took the name from that of a character in "As You Like It", a play by Shakespeare. This is somewhat supported by the fact that the city has a Rosalind Street. Another explanation is that a certain Mr. Orlando was leading an ox caravan to Tampa when he had an attack of "colic". He passed away in the vicinity of Orlando and was buried where he fell. Later,

passersby said, "There lies Orlando."

The story that has become the official origin of the name was told by early settlers about Orlando Reeves. In this part of the State, United States soldiers were stationed to aid the pioneers in fighting the Indians. Orlando Reeves was appointed for sentinel duty, only to have been killed by an Indian while attempting to warn his companions of the danger. His comrades chased the Indians away and buried Orlando the next day under an oak tree on the south side of Lake Eola. A wooden slab was put over the grave with the word "Orlando" on it. Since then, the oak has grown into a large tree and is located at 16 Lake Street.

At the time of the death of Orlando Reeves, B.F. Caldwell of Alabama deeded to the County Commissioners four acres of land as a site of the new village of Orlando.

During this exciting period of history, many businesses were established and buildings constructed. The first school was in the old log courthouse, but schooling was abruptly ended in 1868 when the building burned. This did not seem to hinder the progress of the schools, for in 1872, school resumed in the Free Church Building. The first teacher of the school was Cassius A. Boone. Professor Duggar, C.O. Meoux, W.G. Johnson, Fons Hathaway, and J.W. Simmons were the directors for the new Public School System.

One of the young newcomers to the settlement, Russell W. Hargrave, had this to say about the first school:

I well remember the first school I attended. The furniture was simple. A heavy twelve-inch plank resting on three barrels

formed the desks. A similar plank, resting on nail kegs, formed the seats which were full of slivers, so you didn't slide around much. On a rostrum in front was a table, a three-legged swivel chair, and a box of sawdust. When classes were called, the students stood in a row just beneath the rostrum. If anyone offended the teacher, he laid it (the whip) upon the first pupil he could reach, and that was generally a slow thinking pupil instead of the guilty one.

Festivities and celebrations were as much a part of the settler's life in 1850 as they are today. On Christmas, the people spent the day dancing and eating. Of course everyone didn't dance and eat, as shown by this account:

The cow punchers took over the city late at night and the Marshal hid out and let them have their fun as there were too many for him to handle. They rode their ponies up and down the streets and kept firing their pistols into the air. There were two saloons in Orlando at that time and the cowboys rode their ponies into the front door and up to the bar and drank their liquor without dismounting....They lassoed a cow and dragged it through the streets and then tried lassoing each other or any citizen who happened to be on the street. Most of the town boys attended "Cracker Dances" held in the country.

The village of Orlando did not remain quite so wild for long though, for on June 3, 1875, the first Town Council meeting was held. Orlando was now an incorporated town. It had a population of approximately seventy-five people. At that time the commercial district consisted of three stores, one blacksmith shop, a livery stable, and two saloons. The court house was a log cabin.

The city hall was a two-story brick building on Oak Street (now Wall Street). The building housed many city officials including the mayor, marshal, and city clerk, and later it held offices for the street

commissioner, sanitary inspector, and tax assessor.

The governmental system of laws in the new town of Orlando was similar to that in the western part of the United States. As an example, one morning one of the prominent ladies of the city drove her horse and buggy into the business part of town. The Mayor, passing at that time, thought it only gentlemanly of him to tie her horse to an awning post. The Marshal at that time, Marshal Carter, saw what happened and arrested the Mayor for breaking the hitching ordinance. So the next morning in police court the Mayor acknowledged the arrest, brought up his own case, and fined himself one dollar!

In 1876, there were no daily papers in Florida and only a few newspapers that came out weekly. Orlando had a population of two hundred and wanted a regular newspaper, so Mr. Rufus Russell established the Orange County Reporter. On April 10, 1946, the name was changed to the Orlando Star, but was changed again about a year later to the Orlando Evening Star. This wasn't the only early newspaper, however. The South Florida Sentinel began March 4, 1885, in opposition to the Orange County Reporter. Other early newspapers were: The Florida Cracker, the Spectator, and the Democrat.

As the population of Orlando grew, the need for new and better establishments grew also. Railroad construction gave Orlando its first impetus of growth. In 1880, a railroad was constructed from Orlando to Sanford and by 1884, the three original stores expanded to forty-one. By 1886, the city had fifty stores, seven churches, a

seminary, an opera house, five hotels, two carriage shops, an ice manufacturing plant, four drug stores, three bakeries, and two weekly newspapers. The population was approximately 4,500 persons.

In W.S. Webb's history of Orlando, he wrote of it as "The Phenomenal City" because of its sudden spurt of growth of population from 1884 to 1886. In those days, that was considered wonderful growth. After the freeze of 1894-1895, the name wasn't used anymore. The people of Orlando began to put more emphasis on the beauty of the city and a beautification program began in 1888. The program achieved outstanding success and in 1908 the name "City Beautiful" was adopted, after a proposal by Mrs. W.S. Branch, Senior.

Orlando was now on its way to being a prosperous city. The budding of cultivated sweet oranges in the early 1900's stimulated a great expansion of citrus acreage. The wild orange groves had all been eliminated and citrus became the key of Orlando's early prosperity.

In 1925, Orlando was the largest city in Orange County, having a population of 25,000. In the fifty years since it was incorporated in 1875, it had had a steady all-around development. Schools, churches, homes, hotels, stores, theatres, industries, and recreation all had played a big part in the economic growth of the "City Beautiful".

The depression of the middle part of the 1920's didn't bypass the Orlando area, although the central part of the State suffered less than both coastal areas. Large suburban and rural areas were cut up into lots and sold at inflated values. Local governments as well as citizens were

loaded with debts. The hastily constructed houses and hotels were vacant. Orlando made a quick rebound from this, however, and became headquarters for many large fruit agencies. More schools were built as a result of the 1920's boom. The new schools were Cherokee, Orlando High, Princeton, Marks Street, Delaney, Kaley, and Jones High for the Negroes.

The next thirty years of Orlando's history consisted of rapid economic growth and commercial development. The tourist business grew by leaps and bounds, also. Of all the nation's metropolitan areas established prior to 1950, Orlando's population gain was the greatest between 1950 and 1960.

Metropolitan Orlando today is an attractive citrus, industrial, and tourist center of major proportions. The major sources of income are citrus, tourists, industrial enterprises, cattle raising, and agriculture. Seventy-five per cent of the State's citrus industries lie within Orlando's seventy-five mile trade area. The city is also a center of defense production, with missiles and related components being manufactured here. There are more than 401 industrial plants within Orlando, and the number increases monthly.

The population of Orlando is approximately 116,000 with about 600,000 visitors coming annually to visit. Greater Orlando population is 450,000. The city proper covers an area of 21.6 square miles with 432.5 acres of parks.


The City of Orlando has a mayor-council form of government, being

governed by a mayor and four commissioners. The city is divided into four districts and a representative is elected from each district to serve on the Council. The mayor acts as the Chairman of the Council and conducts all meetings.

The city is in the same isothermal section with Egypt, Sicily, the Madeira Islands, Southern Palestine, and Southern China. The average annual temperature is 72.5°; the average wind velocity is 8.8 miles per hour; and the average yearly rainfall is 63.77 inches, most of which is in the summer.

Recreational facilities in the Orlando area are so varied that there is recreation for everyone. Since the climate is mild, outdoor sports and patio living are popular the year around. Civic clubs, women's organizations, and youth groups flourish. "Blossom-ringed lakes radiate a panorama of color over the city.....stately oaks drench houses and streets in shade." These pleasant surroundings of such a warm and friendly community make Orlando a better place in which to live, work and do business.

Nevertheless, a city cannot be judged by economic standards alone; other factors must be considered. For example, the city of Orlando has a lot to offer in the way of recreational facilities as well as churches of all denominations. Homes and schools in this area are very modern, with few exceptions. These are a planned part of living in Orlando, In conclusion, Orlando is, without a doubt, a place with unexcelled opportunities for good, wholesome living.






F.T.U. Opening Convocation Dedication

## STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

Florida Technological University has been established as a state university to provide educational opportunities to the people of the State of Florida through teaching, research, and service. As one of the nine public universities in the State, Florida Technological University is basically a general purpose institution of higher learning. In fulfilling this role, it offers baccalaureate degrees in business administration, education, engineering, humanities and social sciences, and natural sciences and mathematics. Selected graduate courses at the master's level are offered in business administration and education to part-time on-campus students. Continuing education courses are offered off campus to the citizens of the East Central Florida Region consistent with the assigned responsibility of the institution.

In addition to its general purpose role, Florida Technological University has a specific role to fulfill which contributes to its uniqueness as one of the public universities within the State. This is in emphasizing the development of teaching and research programs in the various technologies and in experimenting with new ways of perceiving academic concerns from a technological point of view.

## STATEMENT OF PHILOSOPHY

The philosophy of the University has two basic tenets: first, an ACCENT ON THE INDIVIDUAL, and second, an ACCENT OF EXCELLENCE. In view

of the growing concern about the loss of individual identity in today's environment, Florida Technological University is indicating its attitude toward the individual worth of the student, his vitality, his character, and his development by placing an ACCENT ON THE INDIVIDUAL. The campus master plan has been designed to encourage face-to-face communication between students and faculty. One objective of this plan, called the "Village Concept," is to maintain a small college atmosphere in each of five villages while at the same time providing educational and enrichment opportunities normally available only in a large university setting. Realizing that some of tomorrow's leaders will come from today's students, the University's accent is not only the individual but also on THE RESPONSIBLE INDIVIDUAL.

With an ACCENT ON EXCELLENCE, Florida Technological University provides an academic program for each individual student. Programs and courses have been developed to:

Develop the student's intellectual capacities so that he may have a better understanding of his present environment, the knowledge of his inheritance from past civilizations, and a basis for anticipating and mastering the conditions of his future.

Refine and intensify the student's powers of thinking and judgment necessary to stimulate his intellectual advancement and to establish him as a productive member of society.

Strengthen the student's awareness of the privileges and responsibilities of citizenship in a democracy.

Excite the student's intellectual interests and encourage him to continue to seek knowledge throughout his adult life.

Offer the student an opportunity to prepare for a profession and to develop competence in his chosen field - the pivot from which to expand his horizons in all areas of life.

It is the hope of the University that each individual student will join with the others of the university community in striving not just for expansiveness in thought and action but also for excellence. While broadening our horizons, we must not forget to look upward and in seeking perfection, "Reach for the Stars".

#### MASTER PLAN FOR THE CAMPUS

The campus of Florida Technological University consists of 1,227 acres of land, much of which is covered with handsome pine, palm, cypress, cedar, and oak trees. Lakes and ponds contribute to the natural beauty of the campus. Lake Claire covers approximately forty acres and Lake Lee encompasses about fourteen acres. While the campus is in the process of development, every effort is being made to preserve and enhance the natural beauty of the site.

The Village Concept on which the University's campus master plan is based is so new that there are only a few in existence. In fact, the Florida Technological University village plan is unique. The present plan envisions a circle within which will be located all of the buildings and other facilities needed during the first ten years of the life of the University. The central core of the campus will contain the general and specialized academic buildings, such as the library-Learning Resources Center and Science Buildings. Closely related academic disciplines will be clustered together for identity and convenience. In close proximity to and radiating from the central core of the campus in a concentric circle will be the separate student

communities called "villages".


Among other facilities, plans call for each village to contain residence halls, a village (student) center, an infirmary, and a physical education recreation area. Five villages are planned during the first ten years, each one designed to serve about 3,000 students. The Village Concept will assist the University in maintaining a small college atmosphere for each student while at the same time providing the student with the educational and enrichment opportunities available only in a university setting.

Growth and progress are two pertinent words today as FTU expands into a dynamic and ever-changing institution of quality higher education. The Fall of 1969 saw the student enrollment expand from the first year figure of about 1,500 to the expected student body of over 3,500. In five years, the student body is expected to reach 10,000 and 15,000 in 1977. Experts now predict that by 1980 the student body will approximate 25,000.

Not only is the student body expanding, but the faculty which numbered 97 during the first year of operations now stands at 175 with the start of classes in 1969. By 1978, the faculty is expected to number around 870.

The University opened in 1968 with the first phase of construction representing an investment of about \$8.9 million which included the first phase of the Village Center (Student Union), the Library Building, Science Building and Science Lecture Hall, four Residence Halls and a utilities complex large enough to serve the needs of a small city.

Construction on the second phase of buildings at FTU is well under

way. It represents a value of approximately \$6.5 million in modern functional structures of which the 31 classroom General Purpose Classroom Building is scheduled for occupancy at the beginning of the fall term. By 1970, the Administration/Classroom Building and Science/Technology/Data Processing Buildings are scheduled for completion.

### THE CAMPUS IN 1969-70

A winding road lined with oak and pine trees leads from the main entrance to the heart of the campus, terminating at the Library Building. This imposing five-story building serves a multitude of purposes. In addition to housing the library, it also temporarily contains general classrooms, the data processing center, the language laboratory, office space for the faculty, and the administrative offices.

Just a short distance from the Library Building is the Science Building. This structure, containing classrooms, faculty offices, and teaching and research laboratories, accommodates all of the biological and physical sciences activity. The science Lecture Hall, seating 320 persons, adjoins the Science Building.

The Village Center, commonly referred to on other campuses as the "student center" or the "student union," is the focal point of much student activity on the campus. Included in the Village Center are food service facilities, indoor recreational areas and equipment, offices for student organizations, the infirmary, and the Department of Music.

The University has residence facilities available for 432 students. These facilities consist of four interrelated residence halls, each of



which houses 108 students. Two of the double story residence halls are for men students; the other two accommodate women students. Students live in suites composed of a bedroom-study area, a living room, and a bath. Included in the suite pattern are single rooms for 48 students; all other rooms are designed to accommodate two students.

The outdoor recreational facilities are designed to accommodate the physical education academic programs, the organized intramural program, and the informal recreational activities.

#### THE EAST CENTRAL FLORIDA AREA

The University is located in the center of the dynamic East Central Florida region of the State. This area is well endowed with a rich heritage of educational, cultural, industrial, and recreational activities.

The public school systems of the area have experienced rapid growth in recent years while maintaining high-quality programs. The several privately supported colleges and public junior colleges have served the higher educational needs of Central Florida, the State, and the Nation for a number of years. Florida Technological University became a part of this group in September of 1968.

The arts flourish in East Central Florida. About 297,000 library volumes are shelved in the new Orlando central public library and its eight branches. The Florida Symphony Orchestra, located in Orlando, was the first all-professional symphony orchestra in the State. Each year it presents subscription concerts, as well as pop and children's concerts. For the past three years, the Summer Music Festival in Daytona Beach has

featured the London Symphony Orchestra. There are several art galleries and museums in the area, as well as wide participation in the annual Winter Park Sidewalk Art Festival. Housing one of the South's few planetariums, the Central Florida Museum and Planetarium presents celestial shows and exhibits and displays, many of them with a space-age orientation. Several theater groups are active in the area.

Business, industry, and finance in this area have experienced considerable expansion in recent years. Much of this growth in East Central Florida has been in the "technical" industries, including electronics, aircraft, missiles, and scientific instruments. The location of the John F. Kennedy Space Center, NASA, about 25 miles east of the campus site, accounts for a significant amount of the economic activity in both technical and non-technical industries. Agri-industry makes a significant contribution to the area's economy. It is based principally on citrus and truck crops. The area is a manufacturing and distribution center for consumer products for the entire State. Central Florida is also expanding as a Regional insurance center.


Recreational and entertainment activities are both varied and numerous. Since it is located near the center of the State and is a crossroads for several major highways, this area either includes or is close to many of the educational, cultural, and tourist attractions of Florida. For example, Daytona Beach, St. Augustine, and Cypress Gardens are within short driving distance of the campus. Regularly scheduled tours make it easy to visit the Kennedy Spaceport, "Gateway to the Moon."

Sports enthusiasts will appreciate the many opportunities for boating, fishing, and swimming. Orange County alone provides several parks open to the general public. Orlando fields its own professional football team - the Orlando Panthers of the Continental Football League - and is the spring headquarters for the American League Minnesota Twins baseball club, as well as the home of the Class A Orlando Twins.


This section would not be complete without a description of the plans for Florida Disney World. This huge complex is being built approximately 15 miles southwest of Orlando; 43 square miles of land have already been acquired and preliminary work is well under way at the site. Disney World will include as its major features:

- A. A Theme Park. Similar to Disneyland in California, but considerably larger, the Theme Park is expected to open in October of 1971. Adjoining the Theme Park will be hotel, motel, recreational, and entertainment facilities for the entire family.
- B. An Industrial Park. In the 1,000-acre Industrial Park, the Disney staff will work with individual corporations to create a showcase of industry at work. This facility also will provide employment for many residents of Disney World.
- C. EPCOT (The Experimental Prototype Community of Tomorrow). Since EPCOT will depict urban life 25 years into the future, it will never be complete, but will always be introducing, testing, and demonstrating new ideas and new technologies. EPCOT is designed to serve an initial population of 20,000.


The estimated 1966 population in the East Central Florida region was about 924,000 and is projected for 1,286,700 by 1972. The estimated rate of increase of population from 1966 to 1970 for this area stands at 24.2%.




Conceptual Rendering of EPCOT

## ACCREDITATION

The University is a candidate for membership with the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools and is working closely with the Association in pursuit of accreditation and membership at the earliest possible time.

FTU is listed in Report of Credit Given By Educational Institutions, 1969 (page 23) with a "A" Rating. An A rating means "Transcript of record given full value." This handbook published by the American Association of College Registrars and Admission Officers shows the acceptability of transfer credits based upon their (AACRAO) evaluation.

## FLORIDA TECHNOLOGICAL UNIVERSITY FOUNDATION

The Florida Technological University Foundation, Inc., has been established to provide funds and services not available through State appropriations or fees. The Foundation assists the financial aid program, scholarship program, as well as institutional development.

The Foundation has also made available a limited number of short term loans for emergency purposes. Information concerning the FTU Foundation sponsored financial aid may be obtained from the Director of Student Financial Aid, Office of Student Affairs.

## THE COLLEGE OF BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

The purpose of the College of Business Administration is to provide an educational experience which will assist students in developing their potentialities for leadership and service in business, in government, in teaching, and in research related to business problems and operations. It seeks to provide the student with a strong foundation in liberal education, a thorough background in basic business and economics courses, and specialization in at least one major area of business.

The College contributes to the advancement of knowledge through the research activities of its faculty and students and provides educational services for business, government, industry, finance, and other groups in the community. It also recognizes its responsibilities to students in the other colleges of the University by providing them with an opportunity to complement their education with courses in business and economics.

Being mindful of the rapid rate of change in our society, the College places heavy emphasis on the understanding of the principles of business and economics and the utilization of logic in the solution of business problems. It strives to strengthen the student's powers of creative thinking, increase his sensitivity to ethical and social values, and instill in him a desire for learning that will continue after he has taken his place in the business community.

In the Spring of 1969, a group of people were about the task of organizing a chapter of Phi Beta Lambda International at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte.

Amongst one of the organizational members of Phi Beta Lambda, whose names were Raymond Richer, James Reagan, and Robert McClintock. Although Phi Beta Lambda was a professional business fraternity, these three men felt it did not possess the qualities they sought in a professional business fraternity. While Phi Beta Lambda aimed toward business education these men looked more toward the strict business aspect.

Within a short period thereafter, Richer, Reagan, and McClintock decided to organize their own professional business fraternity at UNC Charlotte. On April 10, 1969 the first organizational meeting of the Chi Beta Alpha Fraternity was called in order.

Twenty-two persons were present including Mr. Ray Henry, president of the Delta Sigma Pi Fraternity. Raymond Richer was serving as chairman and Robert McClintock temporary secretary.

At this meeting it was decided to have affiliation with Delta Sigma Pi, a P.E. or Alpha Sigma Phi.

At the second meeting, April 20, 1969, it was voted to have affiliation with Delta Sigma Pi and an organizational committee was formed.

In the Spring of 1969, a group of people went about the task of organizing a chapter of Phi Beta Lambda Fraternity on the Florida Technological University campus.

Present at one of the organizational meetings of Phi Beta Lambda, among others were Raymond Richar, James Reagan, and Robert McClintock. Although Phi Beta Lambda was a professional business fraternity, these three men felt it did not possess all the qualities they sought in a professional business fraternity. While Phi Beta Lambda aimed toward business education these men leaned more toward the strict business aspect.

Within a short period thereafter, Richar, Reagan, and McClintock decided to organize their own professional business fraternity at FTU. So at 1:00 p.m. on April 18, 1969 the first organizational meeting of the FTU Business Administration Fraternity was called to order.

Twenty-one persons were present including Mr. Ray Ford representing Delta Sigma Pi Fraternity. Raymond Richar was acting chairman and he appointed Robert McClintock temporary secretary.

At this meeting it was decided to seek affiliation with either Delta Sigma Pi or Alpha Kappa Psi.

At the second meeting, April 29, 1969, it was voted to seek affiliation with Delta Sigma Pi and an organizational committee was formed.

On May 6, 1969, the name Chi Beta Alpha was officially adopted. Originally the name Chi Beta Alpha denoted College of Business Administration but since that time it has come to mean a lot more as is revealed to new brothers upon initiation into the Brotherhood of Chi Beta Alpha Fraternity.

May 13, 1969 elections were held for the first officers of Chi Beta Alpha. The following very qualified members were voted into office:

By a unanimous vote Mr. J. Thomas Simmons was elected Fraternity Advisor.

The first formal initiation was held on October 5, 1969 and thirty-six charter members became Chi Beta Alpha brothers.

Chi Beta Alpha has grown with incredible speed from its insecure infant stage to its position now among the strongest and the best.

Chi Beta Alpha has a particular meaning for each and every brother. Through the hard work commanded by the fraternity, loyal ties of brotherhood and friendship have developed. Chi Beta Alpha has presented an

avenue through which brothers can express and develop themselves in ways which might otherwise have been difficult if not impossible.

Chi Beta Alpha strives to develop the well-rounded college man. Not only does the fraternity offer an opportunity for learning about the business world, but it also offers activities which develop a man socially. Chi Beta Alpha, ideally, satisfies all the needs of the student of business administration.

Chi Beta Alpha has developed into an organization of which brothers and pledges alike are very proud.
