



With enthusiasm I recommend the St. Cloud State College chapter of Delta Sigma Pi for international affiliation.





A BRIEF HISTORY OF ST. CLOUD

St. Cloud began as three separate settlements founded by three distinctively different gentlemen. One settlement was founded by Sylvanus B. Lowry, a political figure interested in fur trade and a former southern slave owner. Another settlement was founded by John L. Wilson, a native of Maine who was interested in a saw mill. The third was founded by George F. Brott, a professional townsite promoter.

The three settlements, all started between 1853-1855, were located on the west bank of the Mississippi River. The settlements were as varied as their founders. Lowry's settlement was inhabited by southerners who kept slaves; Wilson's settlement contained Catholics from Germany; and Brott's settlement had anti-slavery Protestants.

The demand for protection from the varied hardships of pioneer life forced the three large settlements to merge into one large city. In 1856 the city of St. Cloud was incorporated. This name was chosen because of the domination of Wilson's settlement and a strong liking by Wilson for Napoleon's residence at St. Cloud, France.

During the 1860's and 1870's the city of St. Cloud grew rapidly in both population and economic activity. The city was the head of navigation on the Mississippi River and the southern terminus of overland routes to the forts, settlements, and trading posts in the northwest.

Oxcarts from the north no longer continued to St. Paul, but now traded at St. Cloud.

The discovery of colored granite deposits in 1868 began an important phase of St. Cloud's industrial growth. Fourteen granite companies now make building stone and monuments that are shipped to every part of the country.

The year 1890 saw the Great Northern Railroad construct its carshops, and in 1905 a paper mill was established north of the city in Sartell. Hospitals, schools, government offices and manufacturing plants continued to locate and expand in St. Cloud. Firms in the city now manufacture or process such diverse items as truck bodies, boats, wire products, tools, freezers, refrigerators, sporting goods, feeds, meat products, optical lenses, building stone, monuments, seat covers, box cars, and corrugated boxes.

The St. Cloud area is one of the fastest growing regions in Minnesota, with homes, businesses and other new facilities springing up in each direction. From a population of 28,000 in 1950, St. Cloud grew to 38,815 in 1960. A special 1968 census revealed the city has 40,000 residents.

A HISTORY OF ST. CLOUD STATE COLLEGE

St. Cloud State College first opened its doors as the third State Normal School in September, 1869. The first building was the old Stearns House, a hotel which was purchased by the State Legislature. The faculty consisted of a principal and four assistants. The student body included 42 young women and 11 young men. In the years since this modest beginning, the school has developed into a college of established reputation with a physical plant valued roughly at \$30 million, a faculty in excess of 500 members, and a student body of more than 10,000.

This development from normal school to college follows closely the pattern of development of similar institutions throughout the country. Until 1898 the St. Cloud Normal School was essentially a secondary school with a few students of college grade. From 1898 on, the Normal School began offering a full junior college curriculum, and in 1914 the high school phase of the program was dropped. In 1921 the college was authorized by the State Legislature to adopt the name of Saint Cloud State Teachers College, and in 1925 it was authorized to grant the four year degree, Bachelor of Education. The name of the degree was changed to Bachelor of Science in 1940. The 1953 State Legislature authorized the College to grant master's degrees for graduate work.

The college is not primarily a teacher preparation institution today, Authorization was given in 1946 to grant the Bachelor of Arts degree to students completing a four-year general education course. Following the same pattern, a two-year Associate in Arts degree in general or pre-professional education was authorized in 1948. In 1957 the name of the college was changed to St. Cloud State College.

Today the college is a multi-purpose institution offering undergraduate and graduate programs of study in the School of Business, School of Arts and Sciences, School of Education, the Institute of Industrial Education and Technology and the Graduate School.

St. Cloud State College is currently comprised of the following: School of Arts and Sciences; School of Business; School of Education; Institute of Technology; and the Graduate School. The faculty is comprised of more than 500 full-time staff members who are serving approximately 10,000 students.



THE CAMPUS




BROWN HALL

This building houses science and mathematics classes. It has a science museum and auditorium that seats 250. It is named for Joseph C. Brown, the ninth president of the college.



BUSINESS BUILDING

The School of Business classrooms and offices are located in this building, together with the Center for Economic Education.



EASTMAN HALL

Formerly a gymnasium, it has a swimming pool, classrooms, offices, and houses the college health service. The building was named for Alvah Eastman, a former member of the State College Board and resident director.



GRAY CAMPUS LABORATORY SCHOOL

Elementary and junior high school for approximately 300 students, including special education classes for cerebral palsied children. It has a 200 seat auditorium, children's library and student teaching observation rooms. The building was named for Thomas J. Gray, president from 1881-1890.




HALENBECK HALL

Health, physical education and recreation building with a main gymnasium seating 7,500, a swimming pool, diving pool and two small gyms. The building was named for Dr. Philip L. Halenbeck, a St. Cloud physician who provided the college's first scholarship.




HEADLEY HALL

This is an art and industrial education and technology building with shops, laboratories, classrooms and offices, plus an art gallery and lecture auditorium seating 150. It is named for John W. Headley, a former president of the college.



PERFORMING ARTS CENTER

This building contains the music, speech, and drama departments. It also has a main theatre seating 485, a circle theatre, a recital hall seating 300, a rehearsal hall, private practice studios, and a television studio.



RIVERVIEW

This is the second oldest building on campus, it houses all English and foreign language classes and offices.

Joe Warren H. Stewart, a St. Cloud attorney who was a resident director.




STEWART HALL

This is the largest academic building on campus with 200 classrooms and offices, a bookstore, and an auditorium seating 1,200. It is named for Warren H. Stewart, a St. Cloud attorney who was a resident director.




ATWOOD MEMORIAL COLLEGE CENTER

This is the center of social activities on the campus and contains dining facilities, meeting rooms, and a number of recreational facilities including a 6-lane bowling alley. It is named for the Clarence L. Atwood family. He was a resident director of the college.




KIEHLE LIBRARY

This building houses library facilities, reading rooms, audio-visual classrooms and curriculum materials. It is named for David L. Kiehle, the second president of the college. It will soon be replaced by a learning resource center now under construction.



WHITNEY HOUSE

This building, a gift to the college by the heirs of A. G. Whitney, is used for the office of the president and other administrative officers.



Dormitory Complex

This is a complex consisting of eight dormitories housing 2,400 students. It also contains a large dining facility and parking facilities.

SCHOOL OF BUSINESS

A HISTORY OF THE SCHOOL OF BUSINESS

The first was the Red Cross (now Red Cross) Education Training Institute in the state of Missouri. It was founded in 1918 with three faculty members, of which one, Dr. Clark Deane, is still in the faculty in the School of Business.

The first and only degree was the Bachelor of Science in Business Administration. In 1947 permission was granted to award a Bachelor of Arts degree in Business Administration. Since then the Bachelor of Science in Business Administration, the Master of Science in Education, and the Master in Business Administration have become the degrees offered by the School of Business.

HISTORY

In 1949 there were only 100 students. This has increased in our present enrollment of approximately 1,100 students.

From its inception until 1949 the School of Business was housed in Old Main, a building that has since been torn down. From 1949 to 1952 all business classes were held in Student Hall. In the fall of 1952 the School of Business moved to its present home, the first new building.

The Business Building was formally dedicated in May, 1953. At Old Main College was the only building designed to be completely dedicated exclusively for business students in the State College System.

A HISTORY OF THE SCHOOL OF BUSINESS

St. Cloud was the first four-year business education training institution in the state of Minnesota. It was founded in 1936 with three faculty members, of which one, Dr. Clair Daggett, is still on the faculty in the School of Business.

The first and only degree was the Bachelor of Science which business teachers still receive. In 1947 permission was granted to award a Bachelor of Arts degree in business administration. Since then the Bachelor of Science in Business Administration, the Master of Science in Education, and the Masters in Business Administration have become the degrees offered by the School of Business.

In 1940 there were only three graduates. This has sky-rocketed to our present enrollment of approximately 1,500 majors.

From its beginning until 1948 the School of Business was housed in Old Main, a building that has since been torn down. From 1948 to 1968 all business classes were held in Stewart Hall. In the fall of 1968 the School of Business moved to its present home, the Business Building.

The Business Building was formally dedicated in May 1969. St. Cloud State College has the only building designed, built, occupied and operated exclusively for business students in the State College System.

The air-conditioned building, consisting of three floors and a basement has a reception area on each floor. On each floor are riser classrooms carpeted, draped, and equipped with the most modern and useful furniture and equipment. On each floor are specially equipped classrooms for accounting, typing, office machines, laboratories, and seminars. In the basement are a student lounge and a faculty lounge. An underground tunnel connects the building to other buildings on campus. An elevator is available for use by the handicapped.

On the first floor are the offices of the Dean of the School of Business and his conference room. In addition, on the first floor are facilities for the Bureau of Business Research, another first in the State College System.

Private offices are provided for all staff members on all three floors. Office facilities are also provided for graduate assistants.

The School of Business is comprised of four departments, namely; Accounting, Business Education and Office Management; Management and Finance; and Marketing and General Business. In addition, the School has a Bureau of Business Research which is the first to be established in the State College System and the University of Minnesota. Its objectives include providing a service for the business communities in the State of Minnesota and for students and faculty. Numerous projects have been funded during the past year including a statistical abstract for the State of Minnesota, which will be the first for the State.

Also in the School of Business is a Student Intern Program, which provides an internship for students in all majors, to participate in an approved program with business, industry, and other organizations. The student is registered for a full 16 credits for the quarter during the internship, works full-time for the firm, and is compensated for his services. Supervision is provided by the School of Business and the intern is evaluated by his superior in the firm. Upon completion of the internship, the intern is required to prepare a written report on his experiences and how they related to the various subject areas in his major field. In addition, he is expected to participate in a critique before a group of students in the School of Business to discuss his internship and to answer questions concerning it.

SIGMA CHI SIGMA

A HISTORY OF DELTA SIGMA PI

In May 1949 several officers of Alpha Sigma Chapter, University of Nevada, and District Director Henry Weber, visited the campus of St. Cloud to recruit a few interested young students in the School of Business into the Delta Sigma Pi Fraternity. At this time they provided information and encouragement to a small group of persons during the summer season the formation of a business fraternity in the School of Business at St. Cloud State College.

During the summer of 1949 they recruited a group of interested students to develop plans to actively recruit a business fraternity at the college after the start of classes in fall 1949.

HISTORY

On September 14, 1949, a meeting was held in the University Building of St. Cloud State College to see if there could be a business fraternity among the students in business major programs. Henry Weber, a professor at St. Cloud, presiding the meeting and representing Delta Sigma Pi to meet at Nevada State at Reno, September 24, to hear the chapter from Nevada State College. Delta Sigma Pi was a new chapter at St. Cloud State.

Approximately 15 students came to hear the Nevada State chapter and their chairman presented a Delta Sigma Pi to the interested students at St. Cloud State. The members from Nevada explained the goals of Delta Sigma Pi, showing slides in their speech and printed materials.

A HISTORY OF SIGMA CHI SIGMA

In May 1969 several officers of Alpha Epsilon Chapter, Minnesota, and District Director Dennis Weber, visited the campus at St. Cloud to acquaint a few interested male students in the School of Business with the Delta Sigma Pi Fraternity. At this time they provided stimulation and encouragement to a small group to pursue during the summer months the formation of a business fraternity in the School of Business at St. Cloud State College.

During the summer of 1969 this small group of interested students developed plans to actively launch a business fraternity in the early fall after the start of classes in fall quarter.

On September 25, 1969, an informal meeting was held in the Business Building of St. Cloud State College to see if there might be some interest among the students to organize a new fraternity on campus. Larry Clark, a student at St. Cloud, conducted the meeting and informed those interested to meet at Newman Center on Monday, September 29, to hear the chapter from Mankato State College explain the aims and purposes of Delta Sigma Pi.

Approximately 35 students came to hear the Mankato State chapter and their members present a short program to the interested students of St. Cloud State. The members from Mankato explained the goals of Delta Sigma Pi, showing slides of their social and professional events

and stressing the importance of "Brotherhood" in the membership of any fraternity. After chapter functions were discussed, the Greek name Sigma Chi Sigma was chosen temporarily, until St. Cloud was assigned a permanent one. Also at this time the following officers were elected for fall quarter:

Because no house was available for the St. Cloud Chapter of Delta Sigma Pi, it was decided to hold meetings every Monday night in one of the better classrooms in the Business Building of St. Cloud State. The Mankato State College Chapter of Delta Sigma Pi did an outstanding job of presenting the ideals of Delta Sigma Pi Fraternity and the chapter at St. Cloud State would like to thank the members of Epsilon Iota Chapter at Mankato State in this petition.

The first scheduled meeting of Sigma Chi Sigma was held Monday, October 6, with 25 interested students present. During the first meeting, plans for the Constitution were started along with discussion of our participation in Homecoming and various school events. Mr. Darrell Wentworth from the faculty of St. Cloud consented to advise Sigma Chi Sigma in all matters where help was needed. Also at this time, committees were appointed and began their duties. Dues were set and plans were made for successful financial management.

Subsequent meetings of Sigma Chi Sigma showed that all members were anxious to join the National Fraternity of Delta Sigma Pi so plans were laid to apply by petition during Spring Quarter, 1970. With this in mind, Sigma Chi Sigma began and/or participated in Homecoming, Sno-daze, and Career Day, along with various social events and the acquiring of speakers from many industries who spoke to the chapter and various guests from the Business College. Sigma Chi Sigma has also participated in intramural sports and has members on many important committees and organizations on campus.

On Sunday, December 7, 1969 the chapter was officially pledged by Dr. LaVerne A. Cox and Mr. Darrell Wentworth. Elections were also held at this time to replace the temporary officers and the results were as follows:
