
Gentlemen:


Gentlemen:



CALIFORNIA STATE COLLEGE SYSTEM

The California State College System was established in 1949 by the California Legislature. It is a system of public higher education that provides a wide range of educational opportunities for students in California. The system is composed of 23 state colleges and 10 state universities. The system's primary purpose is to provide a high-quality education for all students, regardless of their background or financial resources. The system is funded by the state of California and is governed by the Board of Regents of the California State College System. The Board of Regents is responsible for the overall management and operation of the system, including the allocation of funds and the approval of policies. The system has a long history of providing excellent education and has played a significant role in the development of California's higher education system.

Education Act by the Legislature in 1960.

Responsibility for the California State Colleges is vested in the Board of Trustees, whose members are appointed by the Governor. The Chancellor is the administrative officer of the Trustees. Together the Trustees and the Chancellor set broad policy, while delegating responsibility for implementation to the colleges. The Academic Senate of the California State Colleges, consisting of elected representatives of the faculty at each college, recommends academic policy to the Board of Trustees through the Chancellor.

The 19 California State Colleges, from Humboldt County, in the north to San Diego in the south, comprise the largest system of public higher education in the Western hemisphere and one of the largest in the world. Current enrollment exceeds 250,000 full and part-time students who are served by a faculty that numbers approximately 13,000.

The schools offer over 1,200 accredited degree programs at both the Undergraduate and Graduate levels, maintain 93 nationally accredited professional schools and overseas programs for California students in 13 foreign countries.

Although San Jose State College, the oldest, was founded over a century ago, the California State Colleges were not drawn together as a system under an independent Board of Trustees until after passage of the Donahoe Higher

Education Act by the Legislature in 1960. Responsibility for the California State Colleges is vested in the Board of Trustees, whose members are appointed by the Governor. The Chancellor is the administrative officer of the Trustees. Together, the Trustees and the Chancellor set broad policy, while delegating responsibility for implementation to the colleges. The Academic Senate of the California State Colleges, consisting of elected representatives of the faculty at each college, recommends academic policy to the Board of Trustees through the Chancellor. Each college in the system has its own geographic and curricular character, but all emphasize the liberal arts and sciences. Programs leading to the bachelor's and master's degrees, as well as a limited number of joint doctorates, are master planned to anticipate and accommodate student interest and the educational and professional needs of the State of California. The primary responsibility of the faculty is the instructional process, with increasing recognition of the importance of the role of research as a necessary concomitant to higher quality teaching.

The California State Colleges are now in the most dynamic period of their development. Prior to World War II, there were seven State Colleges with a peak total enrollment of 13,000. Since 1947, twelve new colleges have been established and sites have been selected for new campuses in Ventura, San Mateo, and Contra Costa counties, California State College,

Bakersfield, will open its doors to students for the first time this year. Enrollment in the system is expected to go beyond 400,000 by 1980.

The California State Colleges offer programs of study for a full academic year at a number of distinguished universities abroad. Students study and live under the same conditions as students at the cooperating universities, but remain enrolled in the California State Colleges, where they may apply their work toward degree requirements in accordance with college regulations. The programs, which are voluntary, cooperative and systemwide in nature, are designed as bona fide academic undertakings with clearly defined educational and professional objectives.

For 1970-71, the cooperating Universities are: University of the Andes, Bogota, Colombia; University of Aix-Marseilles, France; Free University of Berlin and University of Heidelberg, Germany; University of Ghana; The Hebrew University of Jerusalem and Tel Aviv University, Israel; University of Florence, Italy; Waseda University, Tokyo, Japan; University of Granada and University of Madrid, Spain; University of Stockholm and Uppsala University, Sweden; and National University, Taiwan.

INTRODUCTION TO SAN JOSE STATE COLLEGE
SAN JOSE, CALIFORNIA

Enrollment now exceeds 25,000 students and is expected to reach 40,000 students by 1980.

Founded in 1857, in San Francisco, the college operated under the San Francisco School System as "Miss' Evening Normal School". The school was acquired by the State of California in 1862 when legislation was passed to establish the California State Normal School. In 1870 the Legislature voted to move the school to San Jose, where it was established the following year. The school operated as "San Jose State Normal School" until

1930 when it was changed to "San Jose State Teachers' College". In 1935 when the school was renamed "San Jose State College". San Jose State is located in San Jose, the first capital of California and the county seat of Santa Clara County. The campus is in the heart of the city, a rapidly growing community of more than 360,000 people, and is easily accessible to the business district.

San Jose is 50 miles south of San Francisco and only 30 miles from the Pacific Ocean, from which it is separated by the Santa Cruz Mountains. The area, bounded on the east by the Mt. Hamilton range, is known as the Santa Clara Valley. Plans are in the process

for further expansion of the campus at San Jose State to provide for the needs of the community. San Jose State offers more than a first rate education, it also offers a student the finest academic environment. A combination that few colleges can compete with. The growth of San Jose State effects the need and desire by students for quality in both education and environment.

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Although San Jose State is the oldest of the State Colleges, the California State Colleges were not drawn together as a system under an independent board of trustees until 1960 with the passage of the "Donahoe Higher Education Act".


San Jose State at present, owns and operates seven residence halls that accommodate over 2,000 students. In addition, the school owns 148 one and two bedroom apartments for married couples at Spartan City. Plans are in the process for further expansion of the housing at San Jose State to facilitate the long list of students desiring on campus housing. San Jose State's expansion program is not limited to housing however.

The new three story College Union was opened in 1970, housing, meeting rooms, recreation facilities, lounge and a book store were opened. 1971 offers even a newer look. A high rise Business building is due for completion by September of this year. Classrooms, facility offices, meeting rooms, and lecture halls will all be under one roof in this beautiful new building. A new library, next to the Business building is also scheduled for opening soon. But not all is new on the San Jose State campus. Tower Hall's ivy covered walls and rustic facade reflects, not only the age of the College, but its' ability to adapt and broaden with the dynamic changes of time.

San Jose State's size is not only mirrored by its' more than seventy buildings and 25,000 students, but also by its' international participation in higher education. Under its' International Exchange Program, students have the opportunity to expand their educational horizon by studying in such countries as France, Italy, Germany, Sweden, Tiawann, Spain, Japan, and Israel. The cultural and academic quality of this program has made it one of the most important and sought after programs at San Jose State.

Quality of the education at San Jose State is also recognized in the political circles in the State. Just passed in the State Assembly and Senate Education Committee is a bill that would change San Jose State College to San Jose State University. The bill is now before the Senate Finance Committee and after approval will be sent to the Senate floor for final acceptance. The bill is a further

reflection of San Jose State's importance and prominence in the field of higher education. The bill recognizes that San Jose State's achievements are not just that of a college but, more, the superior quality that only a University can offer.

Record of the Meetings of the Board of Trustees.

First Meeting.


Sacramento, May 23rd. 1862.

The first meeting of the Board of State Normal School Trustees was held in the office of Gov. Stanford on the above date. The Act of the last Legislature establishing this school, constitutes as Trustees of the same, the State Board of Education, (Composed of the Governor, Surgeon General, and also the Superintendent of Public Instruction) and the City Superintendents of San Francisco, Sacramento and Marysville.)


Trustees were all present at this meeting, but the Superintendent of Marysville.

The Board organized by electing Governor Stanford Chairman, and Superintendent Salt Secretary. The Normal School Act was then read section by section.

Mr Salt being requested to communicate the propositions of the San Francisco Board of Education, in relation to the Normal School, reported the substance of the following resolutions, adopted by the Board last named:

THE STUDENT UNION



SCHOOL OF BUSINESS

The School of Business at San Jose State College has developed a curriculum at both the undergraduate and graduate level which is designed to provide a relevant and appropriate business education. The curricular offerings have been carefully designed with the students' needs foremost in mind, and the school strives continuously to heed its students' suggestions to ensure the maintenance of a quality program.

The primary objective of the School of Business is to prepare students for positions of responsibility in the business and professional community. In all of its programs the school strives to convey an understanding of the principles, concepts and philosophy of good business management so that upon graduation students will be able to contribute effectively to business and society.

The School of Business at San Jose State College has developed an educational program at both the undergraduate and graduate level which is designed to provide a relevant and appropriate business education. The curricular offerings have been carefully designed with the students' needs uppermost in mind, and the school strives continuously to move in appropriate directions to ensure the maintenance of a quality program.

The primary objective of the School of Business is to prepare students for positions of responsibility in the business and professional community. In all of its' programs the school seeks to convey an understanding of the principles, concepts and philosophy of good business management, so that when students begin their careers in business they can make effective contributions.

The School of Business offers undergraduate curricular leading to baccalaureate degrees as well as graduate curricular leading to Master's degrees. In the undergraduate program for the baccalaureate degrees in business, students follow a three - dimensional program: {1} a broad range of subject matter outside the field of business, {2} a basic business core appropriate to all areas of business, and {3} a concentration of business subjects related to the student's field of interest.

The Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration is awarded upon satisfactory completion of a program of study or its equivalent normally requiring sixty nine units and involving from two to two and one half years for completion.

The School of Business participates with other schools of the college in offering the following inter-school major programs: Aeronautical Operations, Business and Industry {I.A.}, Industrial Design and Industrial Administration. The school also co-operates with the Geography Department in offering an Inter-departmental Baccalaureate Minor in Urban Studies. A Master of Urban Planning degree has become operative since September of 1970.

The School of Business co-operates with the Extension Services in developing courses to provide broader opportunities for employed persons to avail themselves of a continuing education. Progress is being made to offer

more specialized and technical courses through the college's extension services. Most of the faculty for these special classes are specialists from the particular occupational area.

The School of Business undergraduate program has been fully accredited by the American Association of Collegiate Schools of Business since May 1967.

In the school year 1969-70, the School of Business awarded 756 baccalaureate degrees, the fifth highest of any college in the nation. This represents approximately 16.2 percents of all undergraduate degrees granted by the college. In addition, a total of 138 master's degrees in business were awarded which included 107 MBA degrees, 20 MA degrees and 11 MS degrees. Students registered in undergraduate and graduate business curricular during the Fall of 1970, accounted for about 12 percent of all students enrolled at San Jose State College. In addition, 21.3 percent of the students in the Extended Day Program are in the School of Business.

The College Career Planning and Placement Center provides occupational information and placement assistance to San Jose State students and graduates on a continuing basis. Emphasis on career opportunities and areas of vital interest for students is the prime goal so that their skills and knowledges may be utilized in a most effective way. Group advisement, current information seminars, plant and school visitations, exploratory

work experience, practice interviews are among the programs sponsored by the Center. The Center is affiliated with the Association for School, College and University Staffing and also with the College Placement Council, and is therefore able to provide placement service on a national basis in addition to the referral services available on campus. During the past academic year a total of 484 business and industrial firms and government agencies, conducted 7,295 interviews and hired 700 applicants in Non-teaching positions.

Nine School of Business professional and honorary student organizations offer students the opportunity to participate in extra-curricular activities, representing areas of academic and professional interest. Each club draws upon the business community for advisers and speakers in co-operative endeavors such as seminars, leadership workshops and "mock interviews" programs.

The clubs are coordinated through the Executive Council of Student Business Organizations. The purpose of ECSBO is to promote unity, understanding and cooperation among the nine School of Business organizations. It also acts as an advisory board to the Dean in matters dealing with students affairs.

In addition to the regular undergraduate and graduate programs for business majors, special programs meet special needs. Current special programs offered in cooperation with various business and professional groups include seminars, short courses, student-faculty research projects, Institute and workshops.

The Distinguished Businessman Seminar Series and the Young Presidents Organizations Panels feature guest appearances of outstanding executives. The Institute of Industrial Relations offers seminars in professional and personnel growth. The Institute of Insurance Studies provides in service programs for businessmen in insurance. The RealEstate Research Bureau conducts research designed to benefit real estate brokers and salesmen.

A feature of the 1968 Distinguished Businessman Seminar involved a proposal made by W. M. Butten, Chairman of the Board, J. C. Penney Company, where in the School of Business and Penney's would form a partnership to develop a practical plan for providing jobs and economic ownership opportunities, particularly for those in lower income groups. The program is now well underway and the students and faculty of the School of Business are actively participating in the Small Business Consulting Service, working on programs to increase the enrollment of minority students in the School of Business, providing special business courses and seminars, and performing other services for the community as a whole. A most challenging feature of the 1969 Distinguished Businessman Seminar was an invitation by Robert V. Haasberger, President of Boise Cascade Corporation allowing a racially mixed team of our students to visit Boise Cascade operations in various parts of the country to study the company's effort in

expanding employment and training opportunities for disadvantaged minority groups. At present, a team of six students and one faculty member, encompassing various ethnic groups, is engaged in this project. The team expects to share some of the knowledge and insights gained with other students and faculty members. They also will prepare oral and written presentations to Boise Cascade management.

The School of Business continually strives to improve its curricular offerings. During the current year, offerings have included several experimental programs and new courses. An experimental honors course was offered during the 1970 Spring semester for the first time. It is limited to Senior Business students with a G.P.A. of 3.5 in at least 20 units of Business courses.

Another experimental program involves a newly designed School of Business Core. The courses started in the Fall of the 1970 semester. Three faculty members, are involved full time in the offering. Eighty students are involved in this core program. As pre-requisite to the experimental core, two semesters in economics and accounting and one semester each of statistics, electronic data processing and business law are required. Business Core I, 12 units, will be deviated primarily to promoting a knowledge of the basic disciplines of managerial sciences, and of the internal and external environments of business enterprise. Business Core II, 9 units, will


emphasize identification and solution of problems encountered in the functional areas of enterprise.

On July 7, 1969 began the process of constructing the new School of Business building. Completion is anticipated on May 1, 1971. The building features a ten floor faculty office tower. The classrooms are housed in a four floor L-shaped wing attached to the faculty office tower. All in all, the building will have 145,300 square feet and cost \$3.8 million dollars.




BUILDING O - THE SCHOOL OF BUSINESS

HISTORY OF THE FRATERNITY

the history of Delta Sigma Pi and finding that San Jose State was one of the few major schools of business not having a chapter, the students decided to form a business fraternity. This fraternity would be modeled after an average chapter of the International Fraternity of Delta Sigma Pi and would then seek a Chapter Charter from Delta Sigma Pi.

On September 30, 1970 an informal meeting was held at which time it was decided to officially form a professional business fraternity. The men who attended discussed what steps should be taken to form the fraternity. Candidates for office were nominated and the first official meeting date was set for October 24, 1970 with the intent of finalizing a constitution and by-laws and for voting on officers.

In September of 1970 sixteen newly arrived students at the San Jose State School of Business were discussing the schools' overall business approach. While the School of Business is recognized as one of the best in the nation, a definite spirit of togetherness was lacking. Numerous business associations were available to the students but these clubs only appealed to specific interests, no club incorporated the overall scope of business nor formulated a spirit of togetherness.

The new students wanted a club that included the entire business area and also one that would develop a spirit of unity among the members. With these objectives in mind the students approached Dr. Constantine Danellis for assistance; Dr. Danellis informed the students of Delta Sigma Pi and advised the students to read the history of the fraternity and what it stood for in the world of business. After reading

the history of Delta Sigma Pi, and finding that San Jose State was one of the few major Schools of Business not boasting a chapter, the students decided to form a business fraternity. This fraternity would be modeled after an average chapter of the International Fraternity of Delta Sigma Pi and would then seek a Chapter Charter from Delta Sigma Pi.

On September 30, 1970 a informal meeting was held at which time it was decided to officially form a professional business fraternity. The men who attended discussed what steps should be taken to form the fraternity. Candidates for office were nominated and the first official meeting date was set for October 26, 1970, with the intent of finalizing a constitution and by-laws and for voting on officers.

On October 17, 1970 the members of the new fraternity were invited to attend the Delta Sigma Pi Regional Conference held at the Doric Motor Hotel in Hayward California. The members who attended were impressed by the warm welcome extended to them by the members of Delta Sigma Pi. They came back to San Jose State with the firm conviction that they would create the core for and acquire a charter for a chapter of Delta Sigma Pi at San Jose State College.

The first official meeting of the fraternity was held on October 26, 1970 in Centennial Hall Room 226. The discussion of the goals for the fraternity and the election of officers was held. Tom Finnegan called the meeting of 16 members to order and the officers were elected as follows:

The members voted to invite Dr. Constantine Danellis and Dr. Robert Travis, both of whom are Delta Sigs', to act as fraternity advisers. These men accepted the positions. Also at this meeting the name selected and approved for the fraternity was "Sigma Chi Sigma". These three Greek letters stand for the abbreviation of San Jose State.

The goals of the fraternity were to "foster the study of business in universities to encourage scholarship, social activities and the association of students for their mutual advancements by research and practice. To promote closer affiliation between the commercial world and students of commerce, and to further a higher standard of commercial ethics and culture and the civic and commercial welfare of the community." The above goals were included in the Preamble of the Constitution and By-Laws of the fraternity which were accepted and signed by the members. The Constitution and By-Laws were submitted to the student council for approval. The official recognition by the Student Council came on November 3, 1970 signed by the President, Vice President, and

Attorney General of the Student Council, and by the Dean of which Student Activities. With the formal recognition, the Perch fraternity founded a meeting place at the Costanoan Room of the Student union. By this time the membership of Sigma Chi Sigma had grown to 25 members.

The activities of the fraternity proceeded in accordance with the Preamble, combining social and professional activities. The Executive Committee appointed Bob Loudy as Social Chairman and Craig Stutler as Professional Chairman. Bob Loudy organized an informal gathering at David Tenca's home on November 7, 1970 which was successful in bringing the members together outside the academic environment to enable them to get better acquainted.

The professional program of the fraternity has developed steadily. The first meeting was held at Bona Sera Chrysler Plymouth on November 16, 1970 to view the operations of a major automobile dealership. Following the inspection tour of the sixteen acre facility an informal question and answer session was held in the corporate board room. E. Taylor of the bank. Professional meetings continued in January with Mr. Kenneth Gobrecht of J. C. Penney Company. Mr. Gobrecht is an urban relations specialist on assignment to their Eastridge Mall shopping center project. February's meeting brought Mr. Irving Perch,

former president and founder of Aristocrat Trailer Company which has been acquired by Boise Cascade Corporation. Mr. Perch is now developing a four million dollar recreational resort known as Hill Country. March's meeting was held with Mr. C. R. "Ted" Hitchcock, Vice President of Financial Planning, Peterson Tractor Company. Yet to come are speakers such as Mr. Tom Harnett, Account Executive with Arthur Anderson Certified Public Accounting Firm and Mr. Dick Salle, former Deputy District Attorney of Santa Clara County in charge of consumer fraud.

In the area of community service, the fraternity has been involved in many projects. During the semester break the fraternity sponsored the Internal Revenue Service School on Individual Returns for the students and the community. Since the I.R.S. school many of the Sigma Chi Sigma members used the knowledge gained to help minority individuals in preparing their tax returns. The fraternity has raised funds for projects through a ski trip raffle and several flea market sales. The members are planning on holding a golf tournament in the near future.

The social programs have included several parties, a wine tour and the organization of the Sigma Chi Sigma Bowling team in March of 1971. This team will represent the fraternity in the Business Club League at San Jose State.

The fraternity appointed Earl Glenn and Steve Wolkow to be our representatives to the Executive Council of Business Students. The E.C.B.S. is the coordinating group for all Business School activities and Sigma Chi Sigma will be permanently represented with in office in the new San Jose State School of Business Building.

The pledging ceremony of Sigma Chi Sigma to Delta Sigma Pi was held on March 20, 1971 in the chapel of San Jose State. It was conducted by Mr. Nelson Mitchell, Western Regional Director, and assisted by Dr. Constantine Danellis, faculty advisor, and Robert Clifford, Peter Orgel and Phillip Sewald of the Zeta Rho chapter at the Menlo School of Business. The installation of the fraternity as a Chapter of the International Fraternal Order of Delta Sigma Pi is scheduled for May 8, 1971.
