




The Administration of Madison College strongly supports, and grants approval for, a professional fraternity in Business Administration. This is in accord with our commitment to an exemplary academic program.


I am writing concerning the establishment of the Delta Sigma Pi Chapter for the School of Business at Madison College.

Admissions policies are high and the Business School is known as having the most difficult curriculum on campus.



This is a letter to support the establishment of a Chapter of Delta Sigma Pi for the School of Business at Madison College.


In my judgment, the program of the School of Business has sufficient size and maturity and now merits a professional business fraternity. It is the objective of this writer and the top administration of the College that we develop a School of Business Administration of sufficient quality to warrant accreditation by the American Association of Collegiate Schools of Business. It appears that this could be an objective capable of being achieved in three years. We have approximately 650 undergraduate majors and approximately 80 graduate students this past semester and are experiencing exceptionally high growth rates in the neighborhood of 25% to 50% a year. Our faculty additions will be in the neighborhood of about one-third more for the fall of 1974 than they were for the fall of 1973.

Any consideration given to the request of the very hard working student group here to establish a Chapter of Delta Sigma Pi will be appreciated.

Students at Madison College are interested in obtaining a chapter charter from Delta Sigma Pi. I would like to support their endeavor.



## HISTORY OF MADISON COLLEGE

Madison College was established by the Virginia General Assembly in 1908 as the State Normal and Industrial School for Women. The college opened its doors to the first student body in 1909 with an enrollment of 209 students and a faculty of 15. Its first 20 graduates received diplomas in 1911.

In 1914, the name of the college was changed to the State Normal School for Women at Harrisonburg. Authorization to award the Bachelor of Science degree was granted in 1916, and the first degrees were awarded to nine students in 1919. During this time a campus plan was established and six buildings were constructed.

The college became the State Teachers College at Harrisonburg in 1924 and continued under this name until 1938, when it was named Madison College in honor of the fourth president of the United States. During this period the College was authorized to confer the Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science degrees in Liberal Arts.

During the period 1949 to 1969, the campus was enlarged to 240 acres with 19 buildings constructed. The buildings are part of a capital outlay expansion plan which has been increased and projected through 1980 to provide for a future total enrollment of 6,500 students.


Madison College first enrolled men as day students after World War II. In 1966, by action of the General Assembly, the College became full co-educational. Since 1954 Madison has been authorized to offer graduate work at the Master's level. A 1964 amendment to the Code of Virginia established a corporation, The Visitors of Madison College, and transferred to that body, from the State Board of Education, authority to govern Madison College. By 1967 a total of 13,070 Bachelor's degrees and 481 Master's degrees were awarded. During this period 40,950 students attended the College. This total includes regular students, those in evening school, in summer school, and special students.

Madison has had four Presidents: Julian Ashley Burress 1909-1919; Dr. Samuel Page Duke, 1919-1949; G. Tyler Miller 1949-1971; and Dr. Ronald E. Carrier, 1971 to the present.

THE HISTORY OF THE SCHOOL OF BUSINESS  
MADISON COLLEGE

Madison College's newest and fastest growing division is its School of Business. The Business School gives the student a wide range of classroom, laboratory, and practical experience to provide intelligent direction in a complex business-oriented society. The goal is to give the graduate a knowledge of business fundamentals and an appreciation of social, economic, and political environments in which modern man operates.

The School of Business at Madison College, was established on July 1, 1972, under the direction of Dean Billy J. Hinton. The School of Business is the result of two years of planning. In its young existence, vast growth and an ever-growing drive for professionalism have become the trademarks of the School.

In the three-year span between the Fall of 1970 and the Fall of 1973, individuals receiving instruction leading to credit had risen from 2,200 to 4,200--a 43% average annual increase. Credit hours, in the same period, have risen from 6,880 to 12,500.

Three departments comprise the School of Business:

1. The Department of Business Administration and Economics,
2. The Department of Business Education and Office Administration,
3. The Department of Home Economics

In the Fall of 1973, the Department of Business Administration and Economics boasted 750 departmental majors, a 104 percent increase over the enrollment in the Fall of 1974. Indeed, the department is currently the fastest growing and largest single department on campus.

With the vast growth of the School of Business, upgrading the staff and standards have been necessary, and the School is continually growing in both quantity and quality. The School's curriculum is also undergoing change as the Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Arts in Business Administration both presently are being phased out. Emphasis is being given to the Bachelor of Business Administration degree in the effort to raise the professional standards of the School. Accreditation with the American Assembly of College School of Business, of which Madison College is currently a member, is expected in approximately two to three years.

The goal of the School of Business is to give the graduate a thorough knowledge of business fundamentals and an appreciation of the social, economic, and political environments in which modern man operates.

Growth with professionalism has been and shall remain the ultimate goal of the School of Business of Madison College.

## HISTORY OF BETA UPSILON SIGMA

The formation of Beta Upsilon Sigma began more than three years ago as a business club for those interested in the fields of business. Although the club had an uncertain beginning, its formation persisted through the interest and dedication of a few hard working individuals.

The formation of the formal fraternity, Beta Upsilon Sigma did not take place until the fall of 1973. A social mixer was held at a professor's home to create an interest and to have people become acquainted with one another. The mixer was a success and a meeting was held within a week to elect officers to begin work on a petition to Delta Sigma Pi. The officers were:

Vice-President for Professional Activities:

Treasurer: Bob Rosson

The club began with an increase in membership of up to twenty members with additional persons showing interest. Our first, and current, faculty advisor,

Mr. Kirby Lee McGown was nominated and approved for the position.

One of the first activities in which the fraternity participated was to attend, in mass, a local business seminar. This established some rapport between the local business men and the college, particularly the school of business. After this for some reason membership declined to sixteen members. It was during this time that Executive Director, Mr. Charles Farrar visited us on campus to discuss the prospects of our being entered with the national fraternity. Several methods were used to recruit new members but to no avail. Even when guest speakers such as Mr. David Crosby from Kawneer/Amex came to speak to the fraternity the lack of interest and enthusiasm was apparent.

Since the President, Harry Balser, was a graduate student matriculating in December, 1973, Dale Cobb was appointed as President pro-tem until the spring semester.

In January new elections were held with the following results:

With these offices now filled the president assigned a committee to begin research on the interest of obtaining the charter of the national fraternity Delta Sigma Pi on the campus. The results were that there was a great deal of interest and many people had been either not informed about this last semester or had misunderstood the purpose of the local fraternity. At this time it was learned that women could not be allowed to join the national fraternity and, being only fair, Cheri Kennedy was informed of this fact and asked to resign. The officers that were left were given a vote of confidence to remain in office since the momentum had begun for the petition. But with the vacancy left by Cheri, it was necessary to nominate a new secretary and other new officers to fill new positions. The results were:

Vice-President for Pledge Education:

Chancellor: Jay Demeter

The membership now was at an all time high of 32 members and this was primarily the result of a vigorous recruiting campaign that involved the faculty talking about the fraternity Delta Sigma Pi and what its establishment would do for Madison. Also a radio commercial was aired during

strategic times on the local campus radio station WMRA informing people of this activity and why it was being formed. Also a table was set up in the lobby of Harrison Hall, the business building, to have personal contact between current members and prospective members. This also allowed the time for an explanation of the fraternity and its goals. Dr. Henley was nominated to assist Mr. McGown as faculty advisor. At the time of this printing, the current membership stands at 37 undergraduate members, five faculty members and one alumnus pledged to the establishment of the National Fraternity Delta Sigma Pi on the campus of Madison College by April 20, 1974.

The committees have obtained all pertinent material necessary for the compilation of the petition to Delta Sigma Pi and this work will be finalized and sent in for binding.



During the interim in which the Grand Council will vote on our petition, the fraternity will pursue several goals that were established in January. The first being a fund-raising activity. A softball team to represent the fraternity will continue the fraternity's involvement with intramural activities as the basketball team is

winding up the season shortly. A school-wide book sale, an enlargement for our spring sale, is being arranged for the fall semester, 1974. A drive for a charity is also being considered. A desire to meet with local and Valley businesses has been expressed and our Vice-President for Professional Activities is looking in to the possibilities available. Additionally, as soon as there are enough competent persons located, a tutoring service will be established, at a reasonable cost, for those students in business who need assistance.

There are other plans and ideas for our fraternity as in the area of scholarship and further study into business problems with guest speakers.

This, perhaps, is the basis for our applications and petition to Delta Sigma Pi for the establishment of a professional business fraternity: To nurture these ideals and further professionalism in the school of business and to give a set of ethics to the future business student here at Madison.
