

HISTORY OF
WINSTON-SALEM STATE UNIVERSITY

History of the University

The University of North Carolina was chartered in 1789 and opened its doors to students at its Chapel Hill campus in 1795. Throughout most of its history, it has been governed by a Board of Trustees chosen by the Legislature and presided over by the Governor. During the period 1917-1972, the Board consisted of one hundred elected members and a varying number of ex-officio members.

By act of the General Assembly of 1931, without change of name, it was merged with The North Carolina College for Women at Greensboro and The North Carolina State College of Agriculture and Engineering at Raleigh to form a multi-campus institution designated The University of North Carolina.

In 1963 the General Assembly changed the name of the campus at Chapel Hill to The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and that at Greensboro to The University of North Carolina at Greensboro and, in 1965, the name of the campus at Raleigh was changed to North Carolina State University at Raleigh.

Charlotte College was added as The University of North Carolina at Charlotte in 1965, and, in 1969, Asheville-Biltmore College and Wilmington College became The University of North Carolina at Asheville and The University of North Carolina at Wilmington, respectively.

A revision of the North Carolina State Constitution adopted in November 1970 included the following: "The General Assembly shall maintain a public system of higher education, comprising The University of North Carolina and such other institutions of higher education as the General Assembly may deem wise. The General Assembly shall provide for the selection of trustees of The University of North Carolina ...". In slightly different language, this provision had been in the Constitution since 1868.

On October 30, 1971, the General Assembly in special session, merged, without changing their names, the remaining ten state-supported senior institutions into the University as follows: Appalachian State University, East Carolina University, Elizabeth City State University, Fayetteville State University, North Carolina Agricultural and Technical State University, North Carolina Central University, North School of the Arts, Pembroke State University, Western Carolina University, and Winston-Salem State University. This merger, which resulted in a state-wide multicampus university of sixteen constituent institutions, became effective on July 1, 1972.

The constitutionally authorized Board of Trustees was designated the Board of Governors, and the number was reduced to thirty-two members elected by the General Assembly, with authority to choose their own chairman and other officers. The Board is "responsible for the general determination, control, supervision, management, and governance of all affairs of the constituent institutions." Each constituent institution, however, has its own board of trustees of thirteen members, eight of whom are appointed by the Board of Governors, four by the Governor, and one of whom, the elected president of the study body, serves *ex officio*. The principal powers of each institutional board are

exercised under a delegation from the Board of Governors.

Each institution has its own faculty and student body, and each is headed by a chancellor as its chief administrative officer. Unified general policy and appropriate allocation of function are effected by the Board of Governors and by the President with the assistance of other administrative officers of the University. The General Administration office is located in Chapel Hill.

The chancellors of the constituent institutions are responsible to the President of the chief administrative and executive officer of The University of North Carolina.

History of the College

Winston-Salem State University was founded as the Slater Industrial Academy on September 28, 1892. It began in a one-room frame structure with twenty-five pupils and one teacher. Now it has over 2,000 students - all of college level - and a plant of fifty-eight acres valued at approximately twenty million dollars.

In 1895, the school was recognized by the State of North Carolina and in 1897 it was chartered by the State as the Slater Industrial and State Normal School.

The University is a state-supported institution for the preparation of teachers, principals, and supervisors for the public schools of North Carolina, and for basic preparation for professional nursing. At present the University is expanding in the area of liberal arts.

From the beginning, the school has insisted upon the vital importance of elementary school teachers in any program of building an improved citizenship; and emphasis has, therefore, constantly been placed upon the quality and quantity of training for these teachers. In 1925, the General Assembly of North Carolina recognized the school's leadership in this field; granted the school a new charter, extending its curricula above high school; changed its name to Winston-Salem Teachers College; and empowered it under authority of the State Board of Education to confer appropriate degrees. The Winston-Salem Teachers College thus became the first Negro institution in the United States to grant degrees for teaching in the elementary grades.

Pursuant to action of the North Carolina General Assembly of 1953, the Nursing School was established. The basic nursing program covers four academic years of study, with equal emphasis on academic and professional education. Graduates are awarded the degree of Bachelor of Science.

In 1957, the North Carolina General Assembly revised the charter of the College and authorized the expansion of the curriculum to include secondary education and any other specific types of training as directed and determined by the State Board of Higher Education. The North Carolina General Assembly of 1963 authorized the changing of the name from Winston-Salem Teachers College to Winston-Salem State College. A statute designating Winston-Salem State College as Winston-Salem State University received legislative approval in 1969.

On October 30, 1971, the General Assembly reorganized higher education in North Carolina, and on July 1, 1972, Winston-Salem State University became a constituent part of the University of North Carolina, subject to the control of a Board of Governors.

This four-year-co-educational university is accredited by and holds membership in the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction, the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education, North Carolina Association of Colleges and Universities, American Council on Education, College Entrance Examination Board, the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education, the American Association of State Colleges and Universities, the North Carolina State Board of Nursing, The National League for Nursing, and the National Carolina League for Nursing, American Association of Colleges of Nursing; American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business and National Association for Business Teacher Education.

Six chief administrators have served the institution since it was founded in 1892. They are as follows: Simon Green Atkins (1892-1904), Cadd Grant O'Kelly (1904-1910), Francis Marion Kennedy (1910-1913), Simon Green Atkins (1913-1934), Francis Loguen Atkins (1934-1961), and Kenneth Raynor Williams (1961-1977). H. Douglas Covington became the seventh chief administrator in July, 1977.

Winston-Salem State University is located in Winston-Salem, Forsyth County, North Carolina, a city of approximately 140,000 inhabitants. This thriving Twin City is a leading educational center of the State and possesses a fine system of public schools. Winston-Salem is the location of the old and famous Salem College for women and of Wake Forest University, a co-educational institution supported by the Baptist

Requirements for a Major: Each student shall select a major area of concentration from among the following: Biology, Business Education, Elementary Education, Health and Physical Education, Mathematics, Medical Technology, Music Education, Nursing, Office Administration, and Urban Affairs.

Requirements for a Minor: Each student shall select one minor from among the following: Art, Biology, Black Studies, Chemistry, Dramatic Arts, Economics, English, Health and Physical Education, History, Mathematics, Music, Political Science, French, Spanish, Sacred Music, and Sociology. Business Education, Elementary Education, Music Education, Office Administration and Special Education, Nursing majors are not required to select a minor area.

Bachelor of Science in Applied Science - The Bachelor of Science in Applied Science degree program is designed for graduates of accredited technical, and business vocational schools who hold the Associate of Applied Science degree. It requires a sufficient number of courses in general education to provide the fundamentals of a liberal education, provides for education and training beyond the basic occupational preparation, and provides a curriculum for those whose academic needs are not met by existing major programs leading to a baccalaureate degree.


A student who has received one bachelor's degree may receive a second bachelor's degree provided that all specified requirements for both degrees are fully met, and provided also that a minimum of 30 semester hours is completed after satisfying the requirements for the first degree. Also, an additional year of residence is required.

Requirements for a Major: Each student shall select a major area of concentration from among the following: Biology, Business Education, Elementary Education, Health and Physical Education, Mathematics, Medical Technology, Music Education, Nursing, Office Administration, and Urban Affairs.

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
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
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Above: C.G. O'Kelly Library


Below: Coltrane Hall






Above: The Administration Building of Winston-Salem State University

HISTORY OF THE SCHOOL OF BUSINESS

Summary

The School of Business was established in 1911 as a department of the University of Michigan. It was the first business school in the United States to offer a four-year undergraduate program. In 1917, it was elevated to the status of a school, and in 1921, it was granted the authority to confer degrees.

The School of Business has a long and distinguished history. It has been a leader in the development of business education in the United States and has produced many of the nation's business leaders. The school's curriculum is designed to provide students with a solid foundation in business principles and practices, as well as the skills and knowledge necessary to succeed in the business world.

The School of Business is committed to providing a high-quality education to its students. It offers a variety of programs and courses, including undergraduate, graduate, and executive education. The school's faculty consists of some of the most accomplished business scholars and practitioners in the world. The school's facilities are state-of-the-art and provide a conducive environment for learning and research.

HISTORY OF THE SCHOOL OF BUSINESS

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HISTORY OF BUSINESS DEPARTMENT

History

The Business Department has been in existence since 1966, beginning as a teacher education program. In 1971 a major in business administration was added.

Since 1975, four concentrations in the area of business administration have been offered: accounting, economics, computer science, and housing management.

The title of the secretarial administration program has been changed to more adequately reflect its content: office administration.

In terms of enrollment, the program has grown from 258 students in 1970 to 491 students in 1978, a 53 percent increase. The current enrollment reflects somewhat more than one-fifth of the total enrollment of the University. Additionally, there are presently nearly twice as many students majoring in business administration as there are majoring in any other single program of the University.

The purpose of the programs of the Department of Business is to prepare students for professional positions in the fields of business, industry, government, management, and education. The Bachelor of Arts degree with a major in business administration is designed for persons who seek full-time employment in business administration and management immediately upon completion or who wish to continue into graduate study. The Bachelor of Science degree with a major in business education is designed for persons planning to become business teachers in junior high or high schools. The Bachelor of Science degree with a major in Office Administration is an applied business program for students seeking employment in office management and office support positions. Both programs leading to the Bachelor of Science degree are designed to prepare the graduate for advanced study if desired.

Strategies

In light of considerations stated above, and in accord with established University procedures, the Department of Business at Winston-Salem State University proposes to take the following actions during the 1977-79 biennium.

1. Develop an accounting laboratory for use by all business students including those taking core accounting courses as well as those pursuing a concentration in accounting.
2. Develop framework for establishing "majors" in accounting, computer science, housing management, and economics. Identification of courses will change from a single Departmental name, as currently practiced, to specific discipline names.
3. Develop a "capstone" course for all areas of business administration. Develop other courses in human relations, personnel management, marketing, and economics. Study curriculum and make appropriate adjustments in each area.
4. Develop word-processing laboratory for use by all business education and office administration classes.
5. Employ a minimum of two qualified accounting faculty persons, Employ minimum of one additional business administration faculty person.

Objectives:


To produce graduates who have necessary and high-level skills for (1) immediate employment in economic and other social institutions as managers, accountants, information systems administrators, economists, office administrators, business teachers, etc.; or (2) successful pursuit of graduate study in business and/or allied fields. Specifically within the next biennium the Department proposes to:

1. Strengthen and refine the existing tracks in the business administration program, e.g. accounting, economics, computer science, housing management, and general business administration. Strengthening and refinement of these areas would serve the demand for graduates who have definite and easily identifiable, high quality backgrounds in each area. Students should have much clearer notions of their career paths.
2. Refine and further develop the business education program. In addition to the existing "comprehensive" track, it is proposed that additional basic business and distributive education tracks be established. These tracks will provide the student with wider options in terms of areas of teacher certification. Additionally, they will reflect the trend of less shorthand and more basic business. These tracks will fill the needs of students who wish to combine business administration subjects with a teaching career.
3. Strengthen and expand the office administration program to include studies that examine human relations in business, labor relations, and personnel administration, in addition to the existing study of contemporary facets of management and office administration. While the program is open to all students, regardless of sex, this expansion would particularly serve the special educational needs of women in obtaining executive positions and positions of administrative responsibility.
