HISTORY

The Lafayette area was first settled in 1763 when exiled Acadians from Nova Scotia reached Louisiana. Many were assigned lands in and near Lafayette on the Vermilion River where they established homes and made friends with the Indians.

Cajuns, as they are called today, are the present day Acadians and are a thrifty, hardworking, fun-loving, but devoutly religious people. The Cajuns work, play, and love with equal enthusiasm.

The Cajuns' pleasure loving nature expresses itself in the community gatherings, dances, and peculiar sports that are integral parts of bayou life.

Probably the first settlers to locate in what is now Lafayette were Andre' Martin, and the brothers, Jean and Marin Mouton, who arrived here during the 1700's. The first written record of the settlement is the report of a missionary, Pere Michael Barriere, who wrote in 1804 about his visit to the large plantation of Jean Mouton.

Since then Lafayette, the center of French Louisiana, has grown to a busy city exceeding 100,000. It serves as a focal point for a surrounding 50-mile area, because of its medical complex, municipal auditorium and convention facilities, the University of Southwestern Louisiana, and the Municipal Airport. It is also the site of the Heymann Oil Center, internationally unique in that it houses offices of every major oil company in the world.

It's a different world you see when you visit in Lafayette. Here French is the key word, the coffee is dark, people are friendly and crawfish a delicacy. This includes the annual events that are "musts" which include the Mardi Gras or "Fat Tuesday". A city of flowers, Lafayette annually stages a Camellia show, Iris show and Azalea Trail. The Louisiana Gulf Coast Oil Exposition, held every other Fall in Lafayette, features parades, an Oil Queen, her court, and an unparalleled exhibition of oil field equipment and machinery.

UNIVERSITY OF SOUTHWESTERN LOUISIANA

The University was established by legislative Act in 1901 as the Southwestern Louisiana Institute and was later chartered as the University of Southwestern Louisiana on September 28, 1902. The first building was a wooden building in 1901. Its name was changed to Southwestern Louisiana Institute of Liberal and Technical Education. In 1960, the legislature authorized a change of name to the University of Southwestern Louisiana. Since its founding, the University has had five presidents:






THE CAMPUS

The State Hall 1902

1902

The first State Hall was opened in 1892 and in 1902, the new State Hall was opened which is still in use. This was subsequently torn down. State Hall is the first building which houses the Legislature and Governor's office. It is the college's Deans, President and Vice-Presidents. It is the first building dedicated to honor Senator Robert Smith, who was the first legislator, which established the college.

#### MARTIN HALL

The first Martin Hall was erected in 1901 on University Avenue. In 1963, the new Martin Hall was erected directly behind the old one, which was subsequently torn down. Martin Hall is the Administration Building, which houses the Admissions and Registrar's offices, as well as, all the College Deans, President and Vice-Presidents of the University. Martin Hall was dedicated to honor Senator Robert Martin, who introduced the Act to the Legislature, which established the college.



#### F.G. MOUTON

F.G. Mouton Hall houses the College of Business Administration. It was erected in 1963. The building was named for Frank G. Mouton, who was a member of an early Board of Trustees of Southwest Louisiana Industrial Institute.



### FOSTER HALL

The oldest building on the campus is Foster Hall. Built in 1902 as the first dormitory, it has been remodeled several times and has served a variety of purposes. It was dedicated in 1921 to Murphy J. Foster, governor of Louisiana from 1892 - 1900. Foster Hall presently houses many administrative offices of the University.



#### DUPRE LIBRARY

The first floor of Dupre Library, located on St. Mary Boulevard, was erected in 1961, with the second and third story additions made in 1967. The library's cataloged collection presently contains approximately 450,000 volumes. Besides the regular holdings in each subject matter area, the library has several special collections. Dupre Library was dedicated to honor the family of Miss Edith Dupre, one of the first faculty members, who retired in 1944.



## STUDENT UNION

The University of Southwestern Louisiana Student Union, located on McKinley Street, was erected in 1970. The Union building houses meeting rooms, a browsing library, lounges, television lounges, ballroom, cafeteria, snack bar, theatre, information desk, art gallery, check cashing center, telephone facilities and the USL bookstore. Students are encouraged to participate in activities of the Union and to make full use of the Union facilities. Membership on all Union committees is open and students are encouraged to attend and join.

The College of Commerce was formally established in 1952. Dr. Herbert A. Hamilton served as Dean until 1976 when he retired. Dr. Paul Burnam served as Acting Dean until Dr. Rexford C. Hauser was appointed in 1977.

The College, now the largest on the campus of the University of Southwestern Louisiana, with over 2,500 students, has grown tremendously since its inception with only 440 students. Keeping in line with progress and growth, a Master of Business Administration Program was created in 1973 - 74.

The most recent change in the College was the change of name to the College of Business Administration in 1980 - 81.

The College of Business Administration has as its major objective, the preparation of young men and women for entry positions of responsibility and leadership in the business community. A core of professional courses, common to all areas of business, is required of all students. An area of specialization affords the student an intensive study of a particular facet of business. Areas of specialization include: Accounting, Economics, Finance, Management, Marketing, and Office Administration.

The degrees offered by the College of Business Administration are: Bachelor of Science in Business Administration, Master of Business Administration, Associate of Science in Office Administration, and Certificate in Office Administration.

In addition to the regular program of classes, the Evening Division offers courses in areas such as Certified Professional Secretary Program, Executive Master of Business Administration, and a Real Estate Program to facilitate continuing education and personal growth.
