



ADELPHI UNIVERSITY

HISTORY

Founded in Brooklyn and chartered by the State of New York in 1896 as Adelphi College, Adelphi University was the first degree-granting liberal arts institution of higher education on Long Island.

In 1929 Adelphi moved from Brooklyn to the present Garden City site, twenty miles from Manhattan. In 1963, Adelphi was granted University status by the Board of Regents of the State of New York. The president of Adelphi University is Timothy Costello.

Adelphi, a community of scholars, is a part of the metropolitan community of New York City as well as Long Island. Thus, it can make contributions to, and draw upon, cultural and social resources of an area that ranges from rural to suburban and urban. Its programs are varied in order to meet the many needs of a large and heterogeneous population, including youths, adults, elderly, foreign students, Americans from all parts of the United States, and those interested in different types of advanced and post-graduate education.

Adelphi University is set within a beautifully landscaped campus of seventy acres. It is situated in the attractive residential community of Garden City, Long Island, within fifty minutes driving distance from midtown Manhattan.

Throughout its history, Adelphi University has been non-discriminatory in race and religion. It has successfully maintained its private, non-sectarian, coeducational standards. Adelphi's intellectual versatility is represented by its students and outstanding faculty.




RUTH S. HARLEY UNIVERSITY CENTER

The University Center is named in honor of the former Dean of Women, Ruth S. Harley, who retired at the end of the 1969-1970 academic year. She devoted 50 years of service to Adelphi University. The striking architecture of its exterior represents a distinct departure from conventional institutional design.

Facilities on the lower level include a Crafts Center, with a complete dark room, a bookstore, Rathskeller, A Fireplace Lounge, and a Game Room.


The second floor is the main activity area of the Center and contains three divisible meeting rooms, the largest of which can function as 1500-seat auditorium.

The University Center also provides office space for many student organization; including: WBAU(the campus radio station), the Student Activities Board, The President's Advisory Council, and the Student Political Association.




SCHOOL OF BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

This building contains classrooms and offices for the School of Business Administration and the graduate programs of the Institute of Advanced Psychological Studies. The University's Computer center is also located on the basement floor of the business building.




HARVEY HALL

Harvey Hall is the center of African American Studies, Anthropology, English, International Studies, and Languages. Religious Studies, Speech Arts, and Speech Pathology-Audiology are also located in Harvey Hall.



WOODRUFF HALL

Among the largest of Adelphi's structure, this building serves the Departments of Dance, Physical Education, and the athletics program. A swimming pool, seventy-five by thirty feet, and a gymnasium are maintained for use by the Physical Education Department. The gymnasium has two basketball courts and floor space for indoor tennis, baseball, paddle tennis, badminton, and volleyball. In addition, there are dance studios, squash courts, and a running track.



OLMSTEAD THEATRE

The Olmstead Theatre is one of the newer buildings on campus. Many elaborate productions have been performed in the theatre. It has also served as the learning ground for the increasingly successful drama and dance departments.



SCIENCE CENTER

In this building are located the Departments of Biology, Chemistry, Earth Sciences, and the Science Library, which contains 85000 square feet. The building is a 96-sided, roundhooking structure equipped with 77 laboratories and the latest facilities for the support of teaching and research in these departments.




BLODGETT HALL

The classrooms, Laboratories, and Studios of the Departments of Art, Communications, Music, and Physics are located in Blodgett Hall. The experimental psychology Laboratory, the Instructional Medical Center, and the Observatory with its six-inch telescope are also housed in this building.



LEVERMORE HALL

Levermore Hall is the Administration Building. The offices of the President, Adelphi College, Graduate School of Arts and Sciences, Admissions, The Registrar, the Bursar, Student Affairs, Financial Aid, Placement Summer Sessions, and many classrooms are located here.



SWIRBUL LIBRARY

Swirbul Library, designed by Richard J. Neutra, opened in the fall of 1963. It is dedicated in memory of Leon A. Swirbul, who was a member of The Adelphi Board Of Trustees in 1959-1960.

The University Library holds more than 315,000 volumes, as well as other media of communications, including over 18000 listening and viewing materials. Approximately 15000 bound volumes are added each year, and the Library subscribes to more than 3000 current periodicals.

COLLEGE OF BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

HISTORY

Business and banking education for the years ahead must be responsible to new economic, social, and political forces that are reshaping the major institutions of our society. The Adelphi University School of Business prepares students to deal with complex problems arising from this period of change.

An important objective of the academic and professional programs is to develop students to have the capacity to make informed decisions as they move into responsible positions. To this end, all students are required to enroll in core courses to insure that they are exposed to the salient theoretical concepts. Students may designate their major field of interest and take a sequence of courses in that particular discipline involving the use of case studies, electronic data processing techniques, seminars and independent study. It is essential that they have a thorough grasp of the complex organizational problems associated with their particular area of study.

An intangible aspect of the learning environment in the Schools Of Business is that the students learn that there is seldom one "right" answer to a problem. Rather they are encouraged to think in terms of alternative ways of handling problems and the short and long-term alternative costs of different solutions to the problems.

The School of Business has attracted an exceptionally strong and talented faculty to their ranks. In turn, they review on a continuing basis the scope and the contents of the curricula offered to the undergraduate and graduate students.

Good faculty and relevant courses of study are to no avail unless each student is seen as a unique individual having his/her special interests and intellectual strengths, as well as having the need for counseling and assistance in mastering some parts of the curricula. Candidates are carefully screened and those admitted students are provided personal counseling by a member of the full-time faculty. Efforts are made to continually monitor the process of students so to optimize the likelihood that each student will successfully complete a course of study with one of the Schools of Business.

Adelphi University has developed a reputation for being innovative in its approach to education. The School Of Business, as is the rest of the University, is exploring new areas to meet society's needs for people with well-trained minds.

ADELPHI UNIVERSITY

Schools of Business

Programs of Study

The Schools of Business of Adelphi University consist of the School of Business Administration and the School of Banking and Money Management.

The School of Business Administration offers graduate curricula leading to the Master of Business Administration, Master of Business Administration with a Certified Public Accountant sequence, and Master of Science in Accounting degrees. The School of Banking and Money Management offers a graduate curriculum leading to the Master of Science in Banking and Money Management degree.

The M.B.A. degree program consists of a maximum of 51 credits and a minimum of 39 credits. This flexibility is intended to accommodate students with varied academic backgrounds, including those who have earned an advanced degree and are now seeking to earn a graduate business degree. Concentrations may be pursued in thirteen areas of study: accounting, banking and financial markets, business economics, corporate finance and investments, hospital and health-care management, international business, management, management of the arts, marketing, organizational behavior, personnel administration and human resource development and management, public management, and taxation. Courses on campus are given in the late afternoon and evening.

Through a special arrangement, the M.B.A. program is currently being offered on four commuter railroad lines, on selected morning and evening trains, and at eight community locations in Nassau and Suffolk counties.

A 30-credit Master of Science in Accounting degree program is designed to prepare highly qualified men and women to enter the field of public or private accounting. Successful completion of the program reduces New York State's CPA work experience requirement to one year.

The M.B.A.-CPA program is designed for students without prior accounting knowledge who desire to obtain CPA certification within the context of a graduate M.B.A. program. Successful completion of this program qualifies a student to sit for the New York State CPA examination and reduces the CPA work experience requirement to one year.

The M.S. in Banking and Money Management degree program consists of a maximum of 48 credits and a minimum of 36 credits. The number of credits required depends upon the academic background of the student. The program is designed to provide a thorough understanding of significant banking and monetary problems, issues, and challenges, including technical aspects of the operations of financial institutions and markets. Courses cover financial aspects of commercial and federal reserve banking, savings banks, savings and loan associations, mutual funds, and others.

Research Facilities

The Schools of Business house the largest computer installation at any private Long Island university. The Burroughs B6800, with a multiprogramming module, provides real-time access for students. In addition, the Adelphi University Library contains a fine collection of economics, banking, and business reference texts as well as the largest collection of reference materials on real estate appraisal in the United States.

Financial Aid

Graduate assistantships in business administration and banking involve teaching or service in the Schools of Business and provide remission of tuition. Students may take advantage of five different assistance resources: company tuition-refund plans, tax deduction for educational expenses (U.S. Treasury regulation no. 1.162-5), increased VA benefits, a University deferred-payment plan, and loans from the New York State Higher Education Services Corporation.

Cost of Study

Tuition was \$145 per credit hour in 1980-81. The application fee is \$20, and the University fee for full-time students is \$85.

Cost of Living

The University aids single and married students in finding suitable accommodations whenever possible. The cost of living is dependent upon location and the number of rooms rented.

Student Group

Last year, about 1,100 graduate students were enrolled in business administration and banking programs on campus and more than 400 additional students were in off-campus programs.

The Community

Adelphi, a community of scholars and students, is part of the metropolitan community of New York City. Thus, it can draw upon the cultural and social resources of the city as well as its own extensive program in the arts.

The University and The School

Adelphi University is set within a beautifully landscaped campus of 70 acres in the attractive residential community of Garden City, Long Island. At the undergraduate level, the School of Business Administration also offers a five-year B.B.A.-M.B.A. program (150 credits) for outstanding undergraduate students (except accounting majors) who begin their studies at Adelphi.

The Schools of Business, in conjunction with the University Placement Office, offer a career planning service to all students and alumni interested in obtaining employment. Assistance is given in securing career information, writing résumés, interviewing, and planning job campaigns.

Applying

The M.B.A. program and the M.S. in Banking and Money Management program are open to men and women who hold a bachelor's degree from accredited colleges and universities and whose credentials compare favorably with those of other candidates. No specific prerequisite courses are required for admission.

Students applying to the M.S. in Accounting program should have completed an undergraduate accounting curriculum that satisfies the New York State CPA education requirements.

To apply for admission, students must submit an application for admission to the Graduate Admissions Office with the required supporting credentials. The Graduate Management Admission Test (GMAT) is required of all degree applicants. Foreign students whose native language is not English are required to take the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) and file a financial affidavit.

On September 15, 1981 Beta Alpha Upsilon held its first professional activity. Bob Seaton of Merrill Lynch spoke about the present economic situation and various types of investment opportunities.
