
Speaking as an alumnus of Delta Sigma Pi, I am proud to see efforts being made to colonize a Delta Sigma Pi Chapter at Clemson University.



Clemson University is a land-grant, coeducational institution, fully accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. (List of degrees conferred by the University are accredited by Association for Engineering and Technology, American Council on Education, National Association of Agricultural Experiment Stations, National League for Nursing, and Society of American Technicians. The University was established in accordance with the will of Thomas Clemson and the Act of the General Assembly of South Carolina, approved by the State in 1889 and the State accepted his bequest for the founding of the University in 1890.

HISTORY OF CLEMSON UNIVERSITY

Although born in England, Thomas Clemson became closely identified with South Carolina upon his marriage in 1838 to Ann Maria Calhoun, the daughter of the foremost statesman in South Carolina history and former Vice President of the United States, John C. Calhoun.



Following the Civil War, Clemson and his family to the United States. After the death of Calhoun, Clemson and his family moved to Clemson, South Carolina, where he lived until his death in 1889. Clemson was a prominent figure in the state of South Carolina, and his bequest to the state in 1889 provided the foundation for the University. The University was established in 1890, and it has since become one of the leading institutions of higher learning in the South. The University's history is closely tied to the history of South Carolina, and its founding is a testament to the vision and generosity of Thomas Clemson.

Clemson University is a land-grant, state-supported institution, fully accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. (Latest re-evaluation completed in 1981.) Curricula are accredited by Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology, American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business, National Architectural Accrediting Board, National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education, National League for Nursing, and Society of American Foresters. The University was established in accordance with the will of Thomas Green Clemson and the Act of Acceptance of the General Assembly of South Carolina. Clemson died in 1888 and the State accepted his bequest for the founding of the University in 1889.

Although born in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania and educated at the Royal School of Mines in Paris (1828-1832), Thomas Clemson became closely identified with South Carolina upon his marriage in 1838 to Anna Maria Calhoun, the daughter of the foremost statesman in South Carolina history and former Vice President of The United States, John C. Calhoun.

Following the Civil War, Clemson brought his family to Pendleton, South Carolina to live. After the death of Calhoun, the Clemsons came into possession of the Fort Hill homestead, which is located in the northwest corner of the state in the Piedmont approximately midway between Atlanta, Georgia, and Charlotte, North Carolina.

After the tragically young deaths of the Clemson's children, and the death of his wife, Clemson devised a will which provided at his death for "the establishment of a scientific institution upon the Fort Hill place." Under the provisions of the will, the government of the University is vested in a Board of thirteen members, including six elected by the Legislature and seven life and self-perpetuating members.

Although the University was legally established as the Clemson Agricultural College of South Carolina in 1893 and often informally referred to as Clemson A & M College in later years, the present title of Clemson University was not adopted until 1964.

During the first year that Clemson College was open to students, the enrollment was 446 students, and there were 16 members of the faculty.

The College began with its student body organized as a cadet corps and subject to a pattern of military discipline. The military organization prevailed until 1955 when the College shifted to a civilian student body.

In 1897 the instructional program was organized into the Agricultural, Mechanical, Chemical, Academic, and Military Departments. The Textile Department was added in 1898. The South Carolina Agricultural Experiment Station, which had earlier beginnings in the State, was moved to Clemson in 1890. The Extension Service was organized after the passage of the Smith-Lever Act in 1914.

By 1933 the enrollment had grown to 1108 students, the teaching staff to 111, and the administration to 16, including the President and 15 deans and directors. The earlier departments, with the exception of the Military Department, became schools in 1933-1934 and a School of Education was added. Divisions previously organized under the department became departments within the schools, and there were 18 standing committees of the faculty.

In 1953-1954, with a first semester enrollment of 2749, the organization was essentially the same as that of 1933-1934. There were 28 standing committees responsible directly to the President, but this organization was too cumbersome for the scope of the program. The institution was operating on a "university" basis under a "college" organization and one which would be cumbersome even for a smaller college.

The Board approved a reorganization with four executive officers responsible directly to the President: the Dean of the college, the Dean of Student Affairs, the Comptroller, and the Vice President for Development. Other changes in academic organization were made. The School of Chemistry was made a department under the School of Arts and Sciences; and the School of Education was divided into a Department of Agricultural Education (under the School of Agriculture) and a Department of Secondary Education (under the school of Arts and Sciences). The Deans of the Schools and Director of the Libraries were made

directly responsible to the Dean of the College.

Up to 1955 the student body had been organized under a military (cadet corps) system. Transition to the civilian type of organization was effected. The ROTC program was continued and administered by the Dean of Student Affairs. In 1961 the military departments were made regular instructional departments in the School of Arts and Sciences.

Other changes effected included a reorganization of the Committee of the Board of Trustees and the establishment of councils advisory to the President. The door opened for the establishment of a faculty senate and broader participation by faculty and staff in the affairs of the institution. The twenty-eight committees of the faculty were abolished to prepare for more meaningful committee organizations.

The President of the University is the chief executive and administrative officer elected by the Board of Trustees; and under the President there are six areas of administration, each headed by a chief administrative officer responsible to the President. In July, 1979, Dr. William L. Atchley succeeded Dr. Robert C. Edwards who had served as President for the past twenty-one years. Dr. Atchley has since undertaken the reorganization of his office and staff which includes the creation of a President's Council consisting of representatives of all segments of the University. Presently, the executive officers include:

When the College opened in 1893, the first "Prospectus" announced two four-year curricula supplemented by two-year curricula and a preparatory course. The major fields announced were "Chemistry and Agriculture" and "Mechanics and Engineering".

When the 1913-1914 session, Architectural Engineering had been added, and provision had been made for seven majors in agriculture. By 1933-1934 twenty four-year programs were offered leading to the bachelor's degree, and by 1953-1954, twenty-nine undergraduate curricula were being offered.

Over the next two decades the University slowly expanded its undergraduate curricula to its present offering of seventy-six degree program. More than 11,000 students are presently pursuing undergraduate degrees administered by the College of Agricultural Sciences, Architecture, Education, Engineering, Forest and Recreation Resources, Commerce and Industry, Liberal Arts, Nursing, and Sciences. Approximately seventy (70) percent of the University's total enrollment is from South Carolina. Enrollment from outside South Carolina comes from all of the 50 states and from 38 countries.

In 1962 the Honors Program was begun to offer challenging, in-depth studies to qualified students at two levels--a Junior Division and a Senior Division. Enrollment in these classes has fluctuated from a low of fifty in 1965 to the present high of 155.

Although a few master's degrees had been awarded earlier, graduate work began to assume an important place in the University. In 1955 a report by a team of specialists provided the basis for the current graduate program, and additional funds were made available for graduate assistantships and fellowships.

During the 1960-1970 decade graduate offerings were expanded to provide opportunity for doctoral degrees in agriculture, engineering, natural sciences, mathematics, and management. The first Ph.D. degree was awarded in 1960 in plant pathology. The master's degree was offered in forty areas, the doctorate in twenty-three.

In 1980 the Graduate School provided graduate programs in fifty-one areas leading to the master's degree and twenty-six

areas leading to the doctoral degree. Approximately 2100 students are pursuing graduate degrees.

Since the opening of the University, through the first semester, 1980-1981, 91276 students have been awarded the bachelor's degree. During this same period 387 associate degrees, 7357 master's degrees, 577 Doctor of Philosophy degrees, and 80 Education Specialist degrees have been awarded.

Clemson University has come a long way and undergone many changes since the first 446 cadets donned their uniforms in 1893.

The military system was abolished in 1955; and in 1964, Clemson College became Clemson University. Women were first admitted in the 1959-60 school year and presently comprise approximately 44% of the student populace. Handicapped students are now benefitting from recently completed construction projects that have made the entire campus accessible. These extensive changes included: special water fountains, elevators, ramps, parking spaces, and rest rooms.

In the next few years a multi-million dollar Strom Thurmond Center For The Performing Arts will be built on campus. Senator Thurmond chose to donate his official papers to his Alma Mater, Clemson, though many major Universities were vying for them. Thurmond, who is currently the Speaker Pro-tempore of the United States Senate, has been a Senator from South Carolina for 27 years and is a former Governor of the State.

The University is proud of the directions it has taken since the moment Thomas Green Clemson first penned his will. A clear entity has been retained through the interrelationships of colleges and departments, providing a fundamental and general educational program. A well rounded University, it is the home of the 1981 National Football Champions and the school of "Miss Universe, 1980", Shawn Weatherly. Clemson is also named in the New York Times listing of the top 150 schools in the U.S.

Clemson's past sparkles with the dreams of one foresightful man and it has a proud history. It's future shines bright with the promise of continued growth as the University eagerly meets the challenges of tomorrow.

The College of Commerce and Industry is a part of the University of South Carolina, Columbia, South Carolina. The College is a part of the University of South Carolina, Columbia, South Carolina. The Office of Professional Development and the Center for Professional Development are also integral parts of the College.

The College is an educational organization responsible for the academic success of its students. It is one of the major colleges of Clemson University, ranking second in total enrollment among the nine colleges. As an integral part of the University, the College has an excellent record in teaching, research, and service.

The faculty of the College is assisted by non-graduate staff, part-time visiting lecturers, graduate assistants, and technicians. Further development of the faculty is achieved through their participation in sabbatical leave, continuing education courses, consulting, and attendance at professional meetings.

The College of Commerce and Industry was formerly the College of Industrial Management and Textile Sciences. The newly appointed dean of the College, Dr. Lynn Jacobson, submitted this organizational plan after approval by the University's Board of Trustees. It was put into effect in January, 1981.

The Department of Industrial Management was created in 1958 within the School of Arts and Sciences. The first group of students with majors in Industrial Management was graduated in June of 1960. The name of the department was changed to the College of Commerce and Industry in 1981.

The College of Commerce and Industry consists of the Schools of Textiles, Accountancy, and Business. The School of Business is comprised of the Departments of Economics, Management, Finance, and Marketing. The Office of Professional Development and the Small Business Development Center are other integral parts of the College.

The College is an educational conglomerate responsible for these academic areas. It is one of the major colleges of Clemson University, ranking second in total enrollment among the nine Colleges. As an integral part of the land-grant institution, the College has as its mission teaching, research, and serving.

The faculty of the College has increased along with the expansion of its programs and increased enrollment. The full-time staff is assisted by non-academic staff, part-time visiting lecturers, graduate assistants and technicians. Further development of the faculty is achieved through their participation in sabbatical leave, continuing education courses, consulting, and attendance at professional association meetings.

The College of Commerce and Industry was formerly The College of Industrial Management and Textile Sciences. The newly appointed Dean of the College, Dr. Ryan Amacher, undertook this reorganization. After approval by the University's Board of Trustees, it was put into effect in January, 1982.

The Department of Industrial Management was created in 1955 within the School of Arts and Sciences. The first group of students with majors in Industrial Management was graduated in June of 1957. The number of graduates increased from 22 in that year to 92 in 1962. On July 1, 1962, the Department of Industrial Management and the School of Textiles were combined to form the School of Industrial Management

and Textile Sciences. In 1967, the Department of Economics was formed in the School. Economics was formerly part of the College of Arts and Sciences. The School of IM&TS was designated a College in 1969.

The Departments of Accounting and Finance were organized within the College on July 1, 1974. The Department of Marketing was created more recently. Today, over 2500 students are enrolled in the College.

The College first submitted an application for baccalaureate accreditation by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business in June, 1976. That application was, in due process, approved in the spring of 1977. A full re-evaluation was completed last year.

Clemson University and Furman University in Greenville, S.C., jointly offer a program of study in business administration leading to the Master of Business Administration degree. The degree is awarded jointly by both Universities and carries the names of both of them. The academic capabilities of both institutions are brought to bear on the program. Administration of this program is vested in a Policy Board appointed by the Presidents of the two Universities.

The College of Commerce and Industry serves not only the students, but the nation as a whole as it fulfills its important mission of teaching young men and women not only about the business world, but about life as well.





Initial contact with Delta Sigma Pi was through the past President of Beta Gamma, Sammy Wullner. He introduced the meaning of Delta Sigma Pi to Rae Fritz who then proceeded to organize a chapter with the help of Chuck Eaton, an alumnus of Beta Gamma.

The first step was to obtain permission from Dean Amacher for a chapter at Clemson University. After this permission was granted, a drop-in party was held to introduce students to Delta Sigma Pi. The response was excellent. One week after the drop-in, on February 17th, the first meeting held. Weekly meetings continued following this date.
