
We, the brothers of Alpha Beta Pi, a Professional Business Fraternity on the campus of Purdue University, present for your consideration this petition for a chapter charter.


To Whom It May Concern:







HISTORY OF PURDUE UNIVERSITY

FREDERICK L. HOWDE HALL OF ADMINISTRATION

The Frederick L. Howde Hall of Administration was built in 1936. Until 1975 it was known as the Executive Building. Howde Hall houses the offices of admissions, the registrar, the nurse and the dean of students as well as the offices of the president, executive vice president, provost, treasurer, and the vice presidents for business services, development and student services. Howde Hall is open each weekday and half the day on Saturdays.



FREDERICK L. HOVDE HALL OF ADMINISTRATION

The Frederick L. Hovde Hall of Administration was built in 1936. Until 1975 it was known as the Executive Building. Hovde Hall houses the offices of admissions, the registrar, the bursar and the dean of students as well as the offices of the president, executive vice president, provost, treasurer, and the vice presidents for business services, development and student services. Hovde Hall is open each weekday and half the day on Saturdays.

PURDUE HISTORY

On July 2, 1862, the Congress of the United States passed the Morrill Act, an act donating public lands to states and territories which may provide colleges for the benefits of agriculture and the mechanic arts. Section 4 of this act states, "...each state which may take and claim the benefit of this act, to the endowment, support, and maintainance of at least one college where the leading object shall be, without excluding other scientific and classical studies, and including military tactics, to teach such branches of learning as are related to agricultural and mechanic arts, in such manner as the legislatures of the state may respectively prescribe, in order to promote the liberal and practical education of the industrial classes in the several pursuits and professions in life." In 1869, the General Assembly of Indiana accepted \$50,000 from Tippecanoe County, 100 acres of land from local residents, and \$150,000 from a man, John Purdue. Thus a land grant college was founded in West Lafayette, Indiana, and named Purdue University.

When the first classes began at Purdue in 1874, there were 39 students and 6 instructors. There were 4 buildings on campus. University Hall, constructed in November of 1877, was considered the main building on campus and is still used for classrooms today. Now the West Lafayette campus of Purdue University boasts more than 32,000 students, 133 buildings on a 647 acre campus, and 193,000 alumni throughout the world.

Purdue University is fully accredited by national, regional, and professional agencies. A member of the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, Purdue has been chosen

as one of the 48 member institutions in the Association of American Universities. The Krannert School of Management is accredited by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business, and the School of Technology is accredited by the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology.

Purdue's first president was Richard Owen in 1872, who resigned shortly before classes began. Abram C. Shortridge succeeded Owen and had the honor of awarding Purdue's first degree in 1875. Emerson E. White served as the third president from 1876 to 1883, and he resigned due to his antifraternity stand. James Henry Smart held the office until the turn of the century. Winthrop E. Stone was Purdue's fifth president until his death in 1921, succeeded by Edward C. Elliott who served until his retirement in 1945. In 1946, Frederick L. Hovde was elected to the presidency and served until 1971. Arthur G. Hansen, a Purdue alumnus, took the office as Purdue's eighth president and resigned in 1982. John Hicks then acted as president until the ninth president, Stephen Beering was chosen in 1983. Today, many of Purdue's past presidents have campus buildings named in their honor.


Purdue is a university full of tradition. John Purdue is buried in front of University Hall, near what is known as the "Hello Walk". It is customary to say hello to anyone you meet along this walkway.

The name "Boilermakers", has been adopted as the title for all Purdue students. In 1889, Purdue played Wabash College in football and started a long chain of victories. The angry

students of Wabash called the Purdue players "Sluggers", "Cornfield Sailors", "Haymakers", and "Boilermakers". The last name struck the fancy of the Purdue students and Purdue has been the home of the "Boilermakers" ever since.


The Purdue Memorial Union was constructed in honor of those who died in World Wars I and II. There is a memorial cross on the floor of the Great Hall and tradition dictates that no one ever walk on the cross.

There are many other Purdue traditions illustrating the great pride, spirit, and unity of Purdue's students. In the 114 years of existence, Purdue has become a powerful symbol of scholastic achievement, tradition, and pride.



UNIVERSITY HALL

University Hall is the oldest building on the Purdue campus. The Hall was dedicated in 1877 when a faculty of nine was teaching 166 students. Originally designed to be the main building on the campus, University Hall contained a chapel, an academic hall, the library, and recitation rooms. In 1960-61 the building was completely remodeled inside for classroom and office use.



PURDUE MEMORIAL UNION

The Purdue Memorial Union memorializes Purdue men and women who served and died in World War I. The original building opened in September 1924 and has had five major additions, the last one in 1958. Food services, bowling, billiards, hotel, offices, lounges, and an art gallery are offered in The Union.



STEWART CENTER


Stewart Center is named in honor of Bruce Stewart who served as Purdue Vice President. Stewart Center was built in 1958 as the fifth addition to the Purdue Memorial Union. It contains three theatres: Loeb Playhouse, Eliza Fowler Hall, and the Experimental Theatre. Also in Stewart Center are: the offices of the Continuing Education Administration, the offices of the Division of Conferences, the Stewart Center Gallery, a ballroom, the offices of many of the student organizations, along with many exhibition and demonstration rooms and lounges.

HISTORY OF KRANNERT SCHOOL OF MANAGEMENT

KRANNERT GRADUATE SCHOOL OF MANAGEMENT

Krannert building was completed in 1961. Herbert A. and Winifred M. Krannert donated a large portion of the money for the building. Krannert Graduate School of Management Administration. The school has a large collection of business history books. In 1964, the name of the school was changed to Krannert Graduate School of Management. The name by which it is known today is Krannert School of Management. The school was founded in 1963.



KRANNERT GRADUATE SCHOOL OF MANAGEMENT

Krannert Building was completed in 1965. Herman C. and Ellenore D. Krannert provided a major portion of the funds for the new building, Krannert Graduate School of Industrial Administration. The school's library includes a large collection of economic theory and business history books purchased in Europe. In 1976, the name of the building was changed to Krannert Graduate School of Management, the name by which it is presently known. An addition, Krannert Center for Executive Education and Research, was begun in 1981 and recently completed and dedicated in the fall of 1983.

KRANNERT HISTORY

In 1953 Economics split from Purdue's Department of History, Economics, and Government with Emanuel T. Weiler appointed head of the newly formed department. Three years later in 1956, Purdue established the Department of Industrial Management and Transportation within the engineering schools. Also, a program leading to a Master of Science in Industrial Management was accepted. Then, in 1957, the first class with a Master of Science in I.M., composed of 29 men, graduated from Purdue University.

E.T. Weiler, in 1958 became the first dean of the School of Industrial Management. At the same time a doctoral program in economics and a Bachelor of Science in I.M. were established, allowing the school to offer both undergraduate and graduate work. In 1961 the first doctoral degrees in economics in the nation were awarded by Purdue University and eighty students became the first to receive the Bachelor's Degree in Industrial Management.

A generous gift from Herman C. and Ellenore Krannert, provided funds for a major portion of the cost of a new building and established the Krannert Graduate School of Industrial Administration. In 1964 the School of I.M. created the Cooperative Education program. Later that same year, a large collection of books on economic theory and business history was purchased in Europe for the Krannert Library. Finally, in 1965, the Krannert Building was completed and George R. Baker, dean of the Harvard School of Business, served as the keynote speaker at the dedication ceremonies. Further expansion occurred a few


years later when in 1981, ground was broken for the Krannert Center for Executive Education and Research. Completion is expected sometime in the latter part of 1983.

In addition to the I.M. curriculum, in 1970 an economics major was established. Three years later the doctoral program in administrative sciences added a manpower management and development option. Moreover, the Purdue University Board of Trustees, in 1976, approved the name change of the school to its current name, the Krannert Graduate School of Management.

The position of dean has been filled with very distinguished and qualified people in Krannert's brief history. Rene P. Manes became associate dean as John S. Day replaced E.T. Weiler as dean of Krannert in 1969. John S. Day was then replaced by Wilbur Levellen in 1978. From 1979 to 1983 Krannert had Dean Keith Smith. In 1983 Dennis Weidenaar was appointed acting dean and will preside until July 1984 when Ron Frank from the University of Pennsylvania will become the newest dean.



HISTORY OF
THE DEPARTMENT OF
SUPERVISION

In 1956 Harry S. Bellman, Head of the Industrial Education Department at Purdue University, initiated a plan to develop a supervisory section in Industrial Education. This plan was based on the need expressed by faculty, students, and industry to train and educate students to assume roles in lower level management. Since there was no such degree available in the newly founded Department of Industrial Management and Transportation, students wanting to study lowlevel management were forced into Industrial Education. These were the beginnings of the Department of Supervision.

In order to meet the demands of this new field of study, Professor Bellman hired Tom Hull to teach related courses. Students in Industrial Education could now specialize in training that prepared them for entry as first line supervisors and managers. Then in 1963, anticipating the development of the new School of Technology, Industrial Education split from the Education Department and spent a year under C. H. Lawshe's control in Regional Campus Administration. Dean Lawshe felt that both Industrial Education and Supervision would be better off in the new School of Technology.

The school of Technology was founded in 1964, under Dean Lawshe's direction. The Department of Industrial Education with the Supervision section was moved into the School of Technology that year. Finally, in 1966 the Department of Industrial Supervision was created out of the Department of Industrial Education. During this same year, George McNelly became the Dean of Technology and Professor Hull became the Head of Industrial Supervision. Faculty and Staff for the Department of Industrial Supervision came from the Department of Industrial Education.

With the creation of the new department, 196 students transferred into Industrial Supervision. Most of these students came from the old Department of Industrial Education, although 38 did come from other fields. In the following year, the first 58 Bachelor of Science Degrees were awarded.

In subsequent years, Industrial Supervision has grown into one of the largest departments in the School of Technology, it has an enrollment three times that of its mother department. In 1978, the department changed its name from Industrial Supervision to Supervision in an effort to clearly reflect the greater emphasis being placed on lower level managerial training. In 1983, our Department Head, Professor Hull, stepped down and was replaced by our present Department Head, Professor Gregory Barnes.
