WESTERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY

Western Illinois University was established on April 24, 1899, and began operation on September 23, 1902. Western was the first state institution in Illinois to offer classes by extension and has continued to expand its instructional service programs both on and off campus to the present day.

The University is accredited up through the master's degree by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education for the preparation of elementary teachers, secondary teachers and school service personnel. The College of Business is accredited for its undergraduate degree programs through the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business. Western is a member of the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education and is an institutional member of the American Council on Education.

The primary purpose of Western Illinois University is to serve the needs of enrolled students and the people of surrounding area through its instructional, research, and service programs. In accomplishing this purpose, it assumes the responsibilities delegated to it by the Illinois General Assembly, the Board of Higher Education and the Board of Governors of State Colleges and Universities.

In carrying out its instructional responsibilities, Western places major emphasis on serving undergraduate students.

In addition to those entering freshman who qualify by institutional admission standards, enrollments at the junior and senior levels are supplemented by students who have satisfactorily completed a college-level transfer program in a community college or have transferred from other two- or four-year institutions.

The University also continues to provide for the instructional needs of a diverse graduate student body. At the graduate level, the University will continue to offer those programs that have traditional academic orientations as well as those that have vocational utility. It will continue to develop graduate programs to prepare students in fields where there is a demonstrated need. At the advanced graduate level, post-master's degree programs will be oriented mainly toward the preparation of school administrative personnel and personnel in other selected professional fields.

As the only public senior institution of higher learning in this area of the state, the University takes pride in serving the varied needs of the region. These needs are served through expansion of off-campus instructional, research, and service activities in response to changing needs. As the cultural center for the region, Western will increase its efforts to provide enriching cultural activities through programs in the performing and visual arts.

ENROLLMENT

Western is the sixth largest public university in Illinois, offering more than 50 undergraduate programs for about 12,000 students. Areas represented in the curriculum include humanities, social and natural sciences, fine arts, business, agriculture and a number of pre-professional and technical fields of study.

Students come primarily from Illinois, but more than 700 are from out of state, including 481 from foreign countries. More than 2100 students completed degree requirements between July, 1984, and June 1985, and more than 88 percent of those graduates who registered with the Placement Office were placed in graduate or professional schools or were employed within three months of their respective commencement dates.


W.I.U., both graduate and undergraduate classes are taught by senior faculty members. The ratio of faculty to students is 1:16, and the average class size is 25. W.I.U. faculty members hold degrees from the finest universities, and they are dedicated to teaching. However, their record of scholarship and public service is also exemplary: during the 1984-85 year, faculty members published 31 books, plays, portfolios and monographs and 327 journal articles and book reviews; they presented 417 papers and 178 exhibits and performances.

The College of Business is housed in the five-story, air-conditioned Stipes Hall. The Building is centrally located and provides convenient access to all parts of campus.

COLLEGE OF BUSINESS

The College of Business at Western continues to be one of the most active colleges with approximately 24 percent of the undergraduate majors. Despite a 5.3 decline in student in credit hour production in the fiscal year 1985, the college continues to lead the University in student credit hour production per staff year and in total cost per student credit hour based upon fiscal year 1984 figures.

At the present time the College of Business offers an undergraduate program with majors in accountancy, administrative office management, economics, business education, personnel administration, operations management, marketing, finance, transportation, and management. In addition to these major areas, the undergraduate program provides a sound foundation of studies in human behavior and quantitative skills, using statistics and research knowledge as a tool for decision making. Each undergraduate student is introduced to the computer in the freshman year, and uses it throughout his or her study in the College of Business.

The College of Business has been granted accreditation by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business, placing it amongst the top 15 percent of the nations more than 2000 schools of business. This accreditation has been granted for both undergraduate and graduate levels. The College of Business is an upper-division college with

majors seeking entry to junior and senior standing. Students at the freshman and sophomore level are enrolled as pre-business majors. Acceptance as an upper-level major in the College of Business requires the completion of at least 60 semester hours with a cumulative GPA of at least 2.50. Each student must also have completed accountancy 241 and 242, computer science 101, quantitative analysis 210, economics 231 and 232, and mathematics 137 and 138 or 139. Transfer students must meet these requirements before acceptance into a College of Business program. A total of 120 semester hours of credit is required for the Bachelor of Business degree. The last 30 credit hours must be taken at Western.

The College of Business is proud of its well qualified faculty and their wide range of professional skills and experiences. Presently they have doctoral or law degrees from over 40 internationally recognized universities. The faculties academic, professional, practical, and research background, as well as its continuing involvement in attempting to solve contemporary business and community problems enhances the quality of the classroom experience.


You will note that there is a considerable drop from the Fall Semester to the Spring Semester each year.
