History of the City of Fullerton

Fullerton, a city of approximately 100,000 inhabitants, is located in North Orange County, about 30 miles southeast of central Los Angeles.

The 22 square miles which Fullerton now occupies were first a part of the San Gabriel Mission holdings. Much of this land was sold to a group of German colonists who founded Anaheim. Other parcels were bought by ranchers who were the landowners in 1886 when Edward R. and George H. Amerige of Malden, Massachusetts joined the tourist rush to California. A year later, they contracted to buy 390 acres of cactus and sagebrush north of Anaheim for \$68,250--based on inside information that the Santa Fe Railroad would soon come through the area on its way to San Diego. To consolidate their holdings into a rectangular tract, the brothers acquired more land and joined forces with financier H. Gaylord Wilshire and Pacific Land Improvement Company, represented by George H. Fullerton.

When it came to naming the new town back in 1887, it was urged that it be called Amerige for its founder; however, the Amerige Brothers did not wish this. At their suggestion, it was named Fullerton in honor of George H. Fullerton, the president of Pacific Land and Trust Company, who was instrumental in bringing the Santa Fe Railroads to the city. Fullerton was incorporated in February 15, 1904, and the first mayor, Charles Chapman, was elected.

Fullerton Junior College first offered classes in 1913, and it is the oldest continuously operating junior college in the state. The name has recently been changed to Fullerton College because course availability is now beyond the junior college level.

During World War I, Fullerton was known as an important shipping center. In this period, "modernization" was launched. The first mail routes were begun. The Fire Department bought a fire truck, and the city established its own water company.

The decade between 1920 through 1930 was marked by growth. In 1922, the California Hotel was completed. The California Hotel is now the site of a completely modernized commercial development, the Villa del Sol.

Following Lindberg's flight across the Atlantic, the Fullerton Airport began operation. In the 1930's, the Val Vita Company was founded--now Hunt-Wesson Foods, Inc.

The completion of the Spanish Architecture City Hall with its clock tower in 1941 set the stage for dynamic growth that has marked Fullerton's progress since World War II. The Fullerton Police Department occupied that structure when the new City Hall was completed in 1963.

By 1973, there were over 300 industries--with Hughes Aircraft, Beckman Instruments, Aerojet-General, and Hunt-Wesson Foods, Inc. being the four largest.

In 1959, a new college was started in Fullerton. It was dedicated on a 235-acre site in East Fullerton as California State College at Fullerton. In 1972, the college earned accreditation and became California State University, Fullerton.

Southern California College of Optometry opened in Fullerton in the fall of 1973, the Pacific Christian College came to Fullerton in the spring of 1974, and Western State University of Law was completed shortly thereafter--bringing a total of five colleges in Fullerton, an asset to the community, which is a great source of pride.

California State University, Fullerton

California State University, Fullerton is located about 30 miles southeast of central Los Angeles and is the center of the new Southern California population center. The University is a commuter institution. Less than 1% of the students live in university-affiliated housing. Approximately 75% of the students come from within a radius of 15 miles from the campus. However, on-campus residency halls are presently under construction and are planned to be completed by the summer of 1987.

In 1957, California State University, Fullerton became the 12th State College in California to be authorized by the Legislature. The following year, a site was designated in northeast Fullerton. It was purchased in 1959, and Dr. William B. Langsdorf was appointed as founding president, the first staff was selected, and plans for opening the new college were made. Originally named Orange County State College, the university began classes for 452 full- and/or part-time students in September 1959, using local high school facilities. In the fall of 1960, the college began classes on its own campus, occupying 12 temporary buildings.

The name of the campus was changed to Orange State College in July 1962, to California State College at Fullerton in July 1964, to California State College, Fullerton in July 1968, and then to California State University, Fullerton in June 1972. The first permanent building, the six-story Letters and Science Building (now Miles D. McCarthy Hall), was first occupied in 1963.

Today, there is dramatic evidence of additional rapid growth. Sixteen buildings have been completed, and enrollment has climbed to over 23,000.

On May 26, 1971, Dr. L. Donald Shields, who had served as acting president for seven months, was appointed the second president of Cal State Fullerton. Dr. Miles D. McCarthy became acting president from January 1981 to October 1981, when the third and current president, Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb, took office on October 1, 1981.

The School of Business Administration and Economics

Since its establishment in 1959, California State University, Fullerton's School of Business Administration and Economics has sought excellence in teaching, research, and community service through the combination of a distinguished faculty, able students, and excellent facilities. The school has earned the distinction of being accredited at the graduate and undergraduate level by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools and Business. Accreditation assures a rigorous course of study covering the full spectrum of business administration. It also indicates a well-qualified faculty and high standards for students.

The school offers a broad exposure to business administration and economics. Behavioral and quantitative sciences are studied within both theoretical and applied contexts. Emphasis is placed on effective verbal and written communication. Students are made aware of the need for innovative solutions to business problems which encompass human needs and ethical objectives.

Currently, eight degree programs are offered by the school to meet the various needs of the student. They include an MBA emphasizing breadth of knowledge, an MBA allowing work in various areas of specialization, an MA in Economics, an MS in Taxation, an MS in Management Science, a BA in Business Administration, a BA in Economics, and a BA in International Business. The fields of specialization offered are Accounting, Economics, Finance, Management, Management Information Systems, Management Science, and Marketing.

Presently, there are about 6800 undergraduate and graduate students enrolled in the School of Business Administration and Economics.

History of Delta Sigma Beta Colony

The idea to form a colony of Delta Sigma Pi on the campus of California State University, Fullerton was initiated in late spring of 1985 by CSUF's Chairman of the Management Department, Dr. Tom Johnson, who is a faculty initiate from Ohio University's Alpha Omicron Chapter of Delta Sigma Pi. He discussed with management major Erik Jensen the possibility of starting a colony on the campus of CSUF.

With Erik expressing interest, the first meeting was held in the summer of 1985 with Erik Jensen and Valerie Mejia, our first colony president and vice president, respectively, Dr. Tom Johnson, South Pacific Regional Director Bill Kinsella, and District Director Bob Flores.

With two dedicated members in Erik Jensen and Valerie Mejia, our colony was off to a good start. After several strategy meetings, two full days were spent at the University's New Student Orientation Program Activities Fair to recruit new members. Students who were interested in the colony were contacted regarding the introduction meeting.

Bill Kinsella and Bob Flores joined Erik and Valerie to welcome new members in early October. Marilyn Shapiro, an alumnus of the Zeta Rho Chapter of Delta Sigma Pi, was elected treasurer of our colony. In mid-October, Director of Chapter Services C. Dean Ferguson visited us on campus, and our members took him out to lunch. C. Dean Ferguson gave our colony a deeper knowledge of the fraternity and its programs. Also in the middle of October, our members attended "Casino Night" sponsored by the Los Angeles Alumni Chapter at Loyola Marymount University. This gave us the opportunity to meet members from other chapters and alumni.

Meanwhile, recruiting continued and throughout the fall semester of 1985 a dedicated group of about ten began to work towards nationalization. We began meeting semimonthly to discuss charter requirements and to socialize. Delta Sigma Beta became our colony name.

A free car wash, in conjunction with a bake sale, was our first major activity and fundraiser. Car wash funds were raised through company and private sponsorship. Sponsors paid per car or a flat total amount, while each person who had their car washed was given a brochure advertising our sponsors. Donations were also collected from those who had their car washed. A total of 80 cars were washed, and our members had a terrific time.

We held our first elections in December, with Marilyn Shapiro becoming our new colony President. The following members made up our Executive Committee: Roberta Lum, Senior Vice President; Michele Pavonarius, V.P. for Professional Activities; John Morrissey, V.P. of Finance; Kim Manning, Secretary; and Joanna Keating, Historian.

Our new officers and members got together during intersession for a potluck party. We arranged to meet weekly in spring semester, starting the first week of school. Our new officers also attended the Southern Pacific Regional Area Planning Conference at Loyola Marymount University. Many ideas were exchanged between other chapters and our colony.

We held an informational meeting in the first week in February. The Central Office sent letters to the sophomores and juniors at CSUF inviting them to attend our meeting. Bill Kinsella, Bob Flores, and our colony president, Marilyn, informed the interested students about the merits of Delta Sigma Pi.

During the first two weeks of school, an information table was set up in the lobby of Langsdorf Hall, our business building, for recruiting. We also decided to increase and improve our publicity campaign through better flyers, posters, and articles in our school paper, The Daily Titan.

Our first professional event featured Mark George, a representative from Consolidated Restaurants of California, who spoke about the diverse field of management, especially in the restaurant business.

Membership continued to grow with about twenty members in mid-February. We also received a new District Director, Adrian Avalos, an alumnus of the Eta Chi Chapter at Cal Poly Pomona. In mid-March, our members met Adrian for the first time at a party given by alumnus Cynthia Wells.

In late February, we added a few new members to our Executive Committee; Ricardo Gomez-Gonzalez became our V.P. for Operations and Barnett Protas our new Chancellor.

Because our recruiting efforts had been paying off, during spring break we had a party to socialize, and Trivial Pursuit became the "official" board game of our colony parties.

After spring break, we had our second speaker for the spring semester. CSUF alumnus William Matthies gave a discussion on venture capital. Also in late April, Bill Tatum, our Provincial Vice President, visited our campus and gave our members some helpful advice on recruiting at our Business Meeting. Also in April, our president began to work on the Bylaws of Delta Sigma Beta.

In early May, we had elections for our fall Executive Committee. The following officers were elected: Sheila Boyce, President; Joanna Keating, Senior Vice President; Teoyolli Luna, V.P. for Professional Activities; Debbie West, V.P. for Finance; Ricardo Gomez-Gonzalez, V.P. for Operations; Janet Karasawa, Secretary; Barney Protas, Chancellor; and Cathy Karasawa, Historian.

Our first dinner banquet was held on the first weekend of summer break at Club Paris of Santa Ana. We had 26 attendants, with Bill Tatum, Bill Kinsella, Adrian Avalos, Dr. Tom Johnson, Erik Jensen, and Valerie Mejia as our special Guests. The members presented Dr. Johnson with an award in appreciation for his work. Erik and Valerie received Founders Awards. The President's Award was given to Joanna Keating by Marilyn. John Morrissey received the Most Outstanding Member Award from the members of the Colony. The Colony also presented Marilyn with an award of appreciation for her dedication as President. "Fun" awards were given to all members by the President for their contributions.

During the summer, our new Executive Committee attended the first Southern Pacific Region Leadership Conference at Loyola Marymount University. We met many new friends and discussed short- and long-term goals of the overall Fraternity and of individual chapters and colonies.

We appointed a Social Committee Chairman, Michele Pavonarius, and a Financial Committee Chairman, Issa Bahbah, during a summer Executive Committee meeting. We had several parties during the summer including a potluck dinner, as well as a beach party. These social events strengthened the bonds of our members.

Realizing that our most important objective for the fall semester of 1986 would be recruiting, the Executive Committee had several strategy meetings during the summer to plan an extensive recruiting program and to plan the calendar of events for the fall semester.

We spent two days at the CSUF freshman orientation in August of 1986 and had a "Hello" informational lunch during the second week of school. We planned two "Meet The Colony" functions during our four-week recruiting period; the first was a party with an "Aloha" Hawaiian theme, and the second was a softball game and picnic. We all had lots of fun getting to know each other, meeting several members from other chapters, and socializing with some of the alumni members of our colony.

In the last week of September 1986, we had our first professional speaker for the fall, Mr. Bill Bridgford, Chairman and CEO of Bridgford Foods, who spoke to us about planning for changes in the environment. We also selected Nirav Pavikh to be our Community Service Chairman. In late September, the Bylaws of our colony was amended by President Sheila Boyce. In early October, our members attended the South Pacific Regional Conference at the Miramar Hotel in Santa Barbara. We learned much more about the Fraternity and its programs, which will assist us in improving our programs through attending the educational seminars, and were inspired by many prominent people in our business community at the Career Faire.

On October 13, 1986, Executive Director Michael Mazur met with our Executive Committee and helped us plan for our final steps in reaching our goals of nationalization. The following day, he spoke to members at our Business Meeting and emphasized the need to all work together to reach our goals.

Presently, we have 33 members and 4 alumni members in our colony of Delta Sigma Beta. We have several events lined up, including a community service event in which we will provide services to runners in the "Night Light 10K Run"; proceeds will go to local charities. We will also have a professional speaker from the General Accounting Office who will speak on "Government Efficiency."

Delta Sigma Beta Colony is also planning an operations tour of Anaheim Stadium with the Kappa Mu Chapter from Cal Poly San Luis Obispo in late November.

Working closely with Bill Kinsella, Bob Flores, and Adrian Avalos, we are ready to join the International Business Fraternity of Delta Sigma Pi. Not only does Delta Sigma Pi offer us opportunities, we believe that we have much to offer Delta Sigma Pi, as well as our local community.
