



During September of 1987, I had the pleasure of discussing plans of forming a collegiate chapter of the International Fraternity of Delta Sigma Pi, at St. Mary's University in San Antonio, Texas. Mr. Stephen Hennigan, a Brother from the Epsilon Nu chapter at the University of New Orleans, contacted me by telephone about the venture. Since that time, I have gotten to work with Brother Hennigan and have seen the results of his efforts, motivation and enthusiasm. I am pleased to recommend that the Sigma Alpha Tau Colony at St. Mary's University be approved to operate as a chapter of International Fraternity of Delta Sigma Pi, once the Colony and the members fulfill all requirements necessary.

As a recent graduate of Texas A&M University and a new San Antonio resident, I was pleased to hear of Stephen's plans. I was initiated on April 19, 1986, number 77 in the Lambda Nu chapter at Texas A&M, and am now a Life Member in Delta Sigma Pi. 
Dear Brothers:

ST. MARY'S UNIVERSITY

HISTORY

St. Mary's University was started by four brothers of the Society of Mary in 1852. The school at that time was known as the St. Mary's Institute. The brothers offered classes in temporary quarters in the Military Plaza. In 1853 the brothers moved the school to a permanent location on the San Antonio River. Shortly after that the school was recognized as St. Mary's College by the State of Texas.

In 1894 due to overcrowding in the downtown area the school opened a new campus at the present location of Woodlawn Hills. This location was known as St. Louis College. This name recognized the founders, the St. Louis province of the Society of Mary. In 1923 all classes were transferred to the Woodlawn campus. It began offering baccalaureate degrees in liberal arts, the natural sciences, and business. In 1927 St. Louis College changed its name to St. Mary's University and was approved as a member of the Association of Texas Colleges and Universities. Full membership in the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools dates to 1949.

St. Mary's began offering some coeducational classes in 1927 and by 1963 all classes were coeducational.

The Schools of Arts and Sciences and Business Administration date back to the beginning of the University in 1923. The School of Law was established in 1934. The Graduate School was established in 1936. In 1967 the Division of Engineering was added.



ADMINISTRATION BUILDING

The Administration Building, built in 1894, is the oldest building on the 135 acre campus. It originally housed the entire school, then known as St. Louis College. It presently contains the offices of the Bursar, Registrar, Admissions, and Alumni, as well as the printing and mail rooms.

COLLEGE OF BUSINESS AND ADMINISTRATION


HISTORY

In 1923 the College of Business Administration offered courses in Accounting and Economics. During the years, as professional education advanced, the curriculum evolved from courses in Accounting, Economics, Insurance, Law, Marketing, and Office Management to programs of study for the major functional areas of administration as required by the complexity of modern business. In 1959 the undergraduate curricula were reorganized and a graduate program for the Master of Business Administration degree was initiated. These programs became the School of Business Administration. As a general theory of Administration developed, the School's curricula, instruction, and research were oriented to careers in areas of increasing managerial opportunity - government, institutional, and profit enterprises. In 1973 the School of Business and Administration was created to provide academic preparation for professional leadership in administration.

In 1981 the School of Business and Administration received \$50,000 from the Algur H. Meadows Foundation as the first payment of a total pledge of \$250,000 for the establishment of the Algur H. Meadows Center for Entrepreneurial Research. Also in 1982, a \$100,000 endowment was completed to fund the Diedre R. Harkins Professorship in Free Enterprise.

With the launching of the Free Enterprise Symposiums in 1977, the Students/Executives Dinner was established, which later evolved into an integral part of the week long joint school and community affair known as Business Week, featuring "visiting professors" from the San Antonio business community who address business classes in a variety of topical areas.

The first business related degree offered at St. Mary's University was the Bachelor of Science in Commerce degree offered through the College of Business Administration in 1923. In 1948 the BSC was changed to the Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) degree. St. Mary's University has offered business administration degrees continuously for sixty years.



ALBERT B. ALKEK BUSINESS BUILDING

Undergraduate and graduate business classes are held in the Albert B. Alkek Business building. With the building's construction in 1982, St. Mary's University became the only college or university in San Antonio with a building devoted exclusively to the study of business.

SIGMA ALPHA TAU COLONY

HISTORY

The idea for a St. Mary's chapter of Delta Sigma Pi actually dates back as far as 1959, when Brother McKeeshan looked into the possibility but decided against it due to high faculty turnover. Later attempts in 1963, 1965, and 1967 also proved unsuccessful. In 1972, Dean Paul Goelz decided that a chapter of Delta Sigma Pi would overpower the already-weak organizations existent at that time.

It wasn't until 1987 that a viable plan for a chapter was formulated by Brother Stephen Hennigan of the Epsilon Nu Chapter at the University of New Orleans and Brother Jeffery Cave of the Delta Nu Chapter at Loyola University of New Orleans. This discussion took place at the 36th Grand Chapter Congress in New Orleans. Brother Hennigan was in the process of transferring to St. Mary's University at the time.

On September 29, 1987, Brother Hennigan first addressed this issue with Dean Robert Howe of the School of Business and Administration. On October 5 the first official steps were taken with the filing of the Intent to Organize form with the Office of the Dean of Students. One day later, nine students met with Brother Hennigan in the lobby of the Alkek Business Building to discuss the benefits of establishing a collegiate chapter of Delta Sigma Pi.

On October 21, the group chose to officially organize as the Sigma Alpha Tau Colony of the International Fraternity of Delta Sigma Pi (symbolizing the first official Colony in San Antonio, Texas). At this meeting, officers were elected and committees established. One week later, on October 27, the Letter of Intent to Petition was signed and submitted to The Central Office. The first Executive Committee meeting was held on November 1.

The Colony began actively recruiting with a presentation to the business students on November 11. The presentation was made by C. Dean Ferguson, Director of Chapter Services, and Vic Tabor, Gulf Western Regional Director. Also in attendance were Brothers from the Lambda Nu and Theta Omega Chapters. That night a barbeque was held at Brother Hennigan's home for all interested students. Recruiting continued throughout the week of November 16 with a table set up in the Aikek Business Building to provide information to prospective members.

The first professional activity occurred on November 19, with a speaker in the business building. A follow-up social event was planned for the next evening.

At the conclusion of the Fall semester, 105 students had expressed interest in joining the Colony, 19 of which were formally committed.

The Spring semester began with the adoption of the By-Laws and a full calendar of events. Proposed budgets were

also discussed at the January 10 meeting. A tour of USAA took place on January 14, which was open to all students. Over forty people attended, and the tour was proclaimed to be a great success.

The Colony hosted an Area Conference for all chapters in the Gulf Western Region on January 16. Many topics were discussed which helped the Colony members further their understanding of the workings of a formal chapter. It was well attended and progress was made in enhancing the Brotherhood of the regional chapters. A reception was held that evening in honor of the visiting chapters and new recruits. Over 100 people attended the reception, of which 65 were representing the Sigma Alpha Tau Colony.

The Colony attended the Mayor's Cup Basketball Tournament on January 20. On January 26, a speaker from the FBI addressed interested Colony members.

As of petitioning date, the Colony has an official roster of 67 members and continues to grow as a result of its high level of enthusiasm and participation. Each member contributes his unique individuality to the integrated whole, bringing an ever-strengthening bond to the Colony.
