

Colorado at Colorado Springs, Colorado Springs, Colorado.


Chi Chi Chi was formed exclusively for the purpose of affiliation

Sigma Pi and to further carry out its tradition and programs.



The History of Colorado Springs

Colorado Springs was founded on July 31, 1871 by General William Jackson Palmer. One of the first concerns in building the town was to establish a water supply, since there were no natural sources of water available. Palmer was instrumental in developing pipelines from Manitou Springs and reservoir projects, such as Prospect Lake Reservoir, to the city. In November 1871, Fountain Ditch was completed, and the town had water. In the same year, Palmer planted 6000 trees to replace the arid land.

The town of Colorado Springs became a city on March 16, 1876. People came to Colorado Springs because of the mining booms near Pikes Peak in the late nineteenth century, but the booms were short-lived. Industry in Colorado Springs then focused on railroad transportation.

Palmer conceived and executed the mountain railway system. In 1889, the Pikes Peak Cog Railway was opened as the highest railroad in the world. In 1890, the Pikes Peak Highway opened, and the Colorado Midland to Leadville was established in 1894. The Short Line Railroad to Cripple Creek, completed in 1901, was later made into Corley Toll Road, and eventually a mountain highway (now called Gold Camp Road) after Cripple Creek busted in 1923. The Santa Fe Railroad, which has been converted into a bike path that runs through Shook's Run Park, and Rock Island Railroad are two other former railroads. The only remaining railroad that still operates is the Denver-Rio Grande, which was one of Palmer's conceptions.

Today, Colorado Springs has a population of almost 300,000. Colorado Springs is a central location for many tourist attractions, and many local businesses provide support for the tourism industry.

Location

Colorado Springs is located at the foot of Pikes Peak, between Denver and Pueblo on Highway Interstate 25 in east central Colorado.

Government

The government of Colorado Springs consists of a Mayor, Vice Mayor, and a City Council. The current Mayor is Robert Isaac, the Vice Mayor is Leon Young, and there are seven members of the City Council.

Colorado Springs is the home of many military bases. Peterson, Falcon, and Cheyenne Mountain Air Force Bases are all part of the Peterson Complex. The Peterson Complex, along with the United States Air Force Academy and Fort Carson Army Base, are the top three employers in Colorado Springs.

Churches and Schools

In earlier times, it was important to establish churches and schools to attract women to the mining towns. The first church service held in Colorado Springs was on January 13, 1872. The Methodists were the first to arrive and to build the first church building in the town. Today there are hundreds of churches of many denominations in the city.

The first school in Colorado Springs was founded November 13, 1871, and the first school district, District 11, was established in September of 1872. Today in Colorado Springs there are 16 school districts, including 121 elementary and junior high schools, 18 private, parochial, and public high schools, 11 colleges and universities, and 31 trade and vocational schools.

Health Facilities

Because Colorado Springs was a good place to be cured from tuberculosis, many sanitoriums were located here. Some of the sanitoriums included Cragmoor, Mount St. Francis, and Glockner. The first hospital built in Colorado Springs, St. Francis Hospital, was built in 1888. Today, local hospitals include Penrose-St. Francis and Memorial, which all offer emergency care.

Parks and Recreation

Located at the very heart of downtown Colorado Springs, Acacia Park was the city's first park. The Antler's Hotel, originally the Colorado Springs Hotel, donated Antler's Park and the Alamo Park, where the Pioneer Museum now stands, to the city. General Palmer made additional gifts to the city, such as Monument Valley Park in 1907, which is a series of boulevards and pleasure grounds running alongside Fountain Creek. Austin Bluffs, now called Palmer Park, offers a clear view of the whole range of the city. Today, there are 254 parks in Colorado Springs.


Various recreational activities in Colorado Springs include hiking, rock and mountain climbing, backpacking, fishing, skiing, camping, biking, swimming, golf, and tennis. Colorado Springs is also the central location for many tourist attractions, of which the most famous is Pikes Peak. The Pikes Peak Highway allows tourists to drive nineteen miles to the summit of Pikes Peak, which is at an altitude of 14,110 feet. The view from the summit is so spectacular that it inspired Katherine Lee Bates to write the words to "America the Beautiful" after visiting Pikes Peak in 1893. The Pikes Peak Auto Hill Climb, which is the second oldest race in America, takes place every July 4 on the Pikes Peak Highway.


Colorado Springs is also the location of other mountain roads, such as High Drive (which runs from North Cheyenne to Bear Creek), Rampart Range Road, and Old Stage Road, which all provide scenic overlooks of Colorado Springs. Ute Pass, one of the most popular mountain highways, was originally dubbed "the Highway to the Mines." Along Ute Pass, one can visit the Manitou Cliff Dwellings Museum, which has preserved Southwest Indian Dwellings from the period between 1100 to 1300 A.D.; Cave of the Winds, which features amazing geological formations; and Laser Canyon, where the world's largest laser cannons create unbelievable laser effects half a mile long and fifteen stories high.

Garden of the Gods, which contains magnificent red sandstone rock formations, is another popular tourist attraction of Colorado Springs. Others include Cheyenne Mountain Zoo, which is America's only mountain zoo; Seven Falls, which is known as the "Grandest Mile of Scenery in Colorado;" Van Briggle Pottery, which is one of the oldest active art potteries in the United States; the United States Air Force Academy; and the Olympic Training Center.

Revenues

Colorado Springs receives most of its revenues from property and sales taxes. Other sources of revenue include fines, forfeits, licenses, permits, and fees.





The History of UCCS

The History of the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs

The University of Colorado at Colorado Springs was originally established as the Colorado Springs Extension Center, administered by CU Boulder, and was housed at various temporary downtown locations in its early years. In 1964, the Cragmor Foundation gifted the University of Colorado with 82.5 acres of land at the foot of Austin Bluffs in northeast Colorado Springs, which is the current location of the UCCS campus.

After minimal renovations to the buildings, which were a part of this gift and which had formerly housed a tuberculosis sanatorium, classes began on September 20, 1965, with 1,282 students, a budget of \$393,469, and much of the hospital equipment still in place. The few library books available were stored in bathtubs and chalkboard erasers were pads removed from sanatorium beds.

As funding became available, renovations to the original buildings continued; and, in 1971, Dwire Hall was constructed to provide additional classroom and library space. Later in the 1970s, a separate library facility was constructed, as was a sciences building and the first phase of the student center. With further land donations, the campus area had grown to the present 420 acres.

The most recent phase of construction included the \$9.2 million Engineering Building and a \$4.2 million expansion of the University Center. The Colorado Commission on Higher Education has accepted UCCS' current Master Plan for expansion of its graduate programs and construction of a research park and residential housing.


UCCS received NCA accreditation in 1972; and, in the same year, a Colorado constitutional amendment was passed giving UCCS full university status. A year-round instructional program consisting of 16-week spring and fall semesters and an 8-week summer semester are operated at this campus.

Section 5 of Colorado House Bill 1187 outlines the mission of the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs: "The Colorado Springs campus of the University of Colorado shall be a comprehensive baccalaureate liberal arts and sciences institution with selective admission standards. The Colorado Springs campus shall provide selected professional programs and such graduate programs as will serve the needs of the Colorado Springs metropolitan area, emphasizing those professional programs not offered by other institutions of higher education."

The University of Colorado at Colorado Springs is one of four campuses in the University of Colorado system, and its standards and course offerings are closely coordinated with that system. Located at the Colorado Springs campus are the College of Letters, Arts and Sciences, the College of Engineering and Applied Science, the College of Business and Administration, the School of Education, the Graduate School of Business Administration, and the Graduate School of Public Affairs. The Continuing Education Division and the instructional television network offer additional opportunities for learning.


A grant of \$3.1 million by the El Pomar Foundation, a local philanthropic organization, created the Colorado Institute for Technology Transfer on campus to integrate UCCS' business, engineering, and aerospace programs with the needs of the region and state.

The University of Colorado at Colorado Springs celebrated its 25th anniversary in 1991 with a student body of 6000 students and an annual budget of \$22 million. In its 25-year history 9,582 students have graduated from UCCS.

Undergraduate Enrollment









Dwire Hall

Constructed in 1971, Dwire Hall was named after Dr. George J. Dwire, who was instrumental in the donation of Cragmor Sanitorium to the University. This building currently houses the College of Business as well as an auditorium where Theatreworks performs.




Engineering Building

The most recent addition to the UCCS campus, the Engineering Building was constructed in 1985 and houses the College of Engineering and Applied Sciences, which became autonomous from the CU Boulder Engineering College in 1984. This College offers a Masters Degree in Computer Sciences and a Ph.D. in Electrical Engineering.




Gallery of Contemporary Art

Created in 1981, the Gallery of Contemporary Art consists of more than 6,400 square feet of exhibition, storage, workshop, and classroom space. Visited by more than 16,000 people each year, it hosts approximately 6 major exhibitions of nationally and internationally famous artists each year.




Main Hall

Completed in 1914 as the Cragmor Sanitorium, this building is still used for classrooms and administrative offices.




Science Building


UCCS Library

The UCCS Library has a collection of 250,000 book volumes, 240,000 microfilm volumes, 8,000 maps and 2,500 media items, including 2,500 current serial and journal titles and U.S. and Colorado government documents.



University Center

Expanded to its present 38,000 square feet in 1987, the University Center houses the gymnasium, fitness center, pub/cafeteria, bookstore, lounge/study area, and meeting rooms.

The History of the College of Business

The College of Business was established with the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs in 1965 and is the only business college in Southern Colorado with American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB) accreditation, and is one of about 300 nationwide with ACCSB accreditation for its MBA program.

The mission of the College of Business is to serve the needs of the Pikes Peak Region and Southern Colorado for competent and responsible managers, for continued education of those already in such positions, and for research. To this end, the college works closely with the local business community in the professional development of its students.

Ninety-five percent of full-time faculty in the business college are doctorally qualified and contribute to the advancement of knowledge in their fields through research and publication as well as by serving in positions of leadership in business, civic, and professional organizations locally and worldwide.


While pursuing a degree, a majority of the diverse student body in both the undergraduate and graduate programs are also employed; and the motivation and experience these students bring to the classroom add to the learning experience. The younger students also benefit from the perspectives of older students and vice versa.

In 1990, the UCCS College of Business gained autonomy from the CU Boulder business school, enabling it to redesign its degree programs to more accurately fit a '90s business environment, and changes to the curriculum have already been implemented.

Majors in the undergraduate program include Accounting, Finance, Information Systems, Information Systems/Accounting, Organizational Management, Marketing, Personnel-Human Resources Management, Production/Operations Management, Public Agency Administration, and Small Business Management. M.B.A. degrees are also offered in all of the above areas.



Business Majors by Category




Descriptions of Majors Offered in the


- I. Accounting: designed to prepare students for careers in public accounting, business and industry, and not-for-profit and governmental organizations.
- II. Finance: intended to provide the student with an understanding of fundamental theory pertaining to finance and to help the student develop the ability to make practical applications of the principles and techniques of sound financial management in business affairs.
- III. Information Systems: designed for those who wish to prepare themselves for professional careers as systems analyst/designers.
- IV. Marketing: prepare students for career opportunities in sales, advertising, marketing research, product development, retailing, wholesaling, and related endeavors, both domestically and internationally.
- V. Organizational Management: provides a foundation for careers in management, personnel/human resource management, small business management and entrepreneurship, and public agency management.
- VI. Personnel/
Human Resource Management: prepares students for careers in PHR by covering such topics as recruiting, staffing, training and development, evaluation, compensation, career planning, safety and health, equal employment opportunity and affirmative action, and labor relations.
- VII. Production/
Operations Management: designed to prepare students for professional careers in production and operations planning and control, inventory management, and purchasing in both manufacturing and service organizations.





The History of XXX

In November 1991, John Ryan, Jeff Chandler, and Alex Lefur determined that there was a need for a fraternity to be organized on the campus of the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs. They requested information from several organizations and concluded that Delta Sigma Pi would provide the best opportunity for the professional association between students and the community.

In December, Delta Sigma Pi sent correspondents to inform interested students about the purpose of the organization and the fraternity. After this initial contact, a group of interested students decided to begin the XXX Colony of Delta Sigma Pi. The organizational committee met several times over the winter break to study the laws of Delta Sigma Pi and to plan a course of action to spark involvement from other UCCS business students.

The first XXX Colony meeting was held on January 30, 1992 with 31 business students in attendance. The colony held thirteen business meetings and ten executive committee meetings throughout the spring and summer semesters.

On February 27, the colony enjoyed its first guest speaker. Jean Herman from the Better Business Bureau gave an informative presentation about deceptive business practices.

The Social Activities committee remained very active during the spring semester, holding Friday and Saturday afternoon clubs at Bennigan's and Meadow Muffins to encourage association between members.

The XXX Colony softball team played every Saturday afternoon, averaging one and seven in the season, and taking second place in the tournament finals. Other social events included a potluck luncheon on February 29 and a tailgater BBQ at the opening game at Sky Sox Stadium on April 18.

On May 2, the colony participated in its first community service event, the El Paso County Household Hazardous Waste Collection Program at Penrose Stadium. Additionally, the colony adopted a 2 1/2 mile stretch of road on Austin Bluffs Parkway near UCCS to clean up trash on the right-of-ways. Member teams participate in the Adopt-A-Park Program, sponsored by the Parks and Recreation Department, every Saturday morning.

The colony's first alumni event was a BBQ luncheon. It was held on campus on May 23, and several Colorado Springs Delta Sigma Pi alumni attended.

On June 13 the colony held its first fundraising event. A carwash/bakesale was held with the cooperation of a local McDonald's restaurant. A second carwash was held on July 18.

The summer semester was concluded with an end of semester BBQ at Thorndale Park on August 8. Members played volleyball and enjoyed banjo music supplied by a talented member.

The colony participated in many recruiting events during the first week of the fall semester, which was August 24 through 28. On August 24, the colony sponsored a Back-to-School BBQ to recruit new members. During the entire week, members gave classroom presentations and set up a recruiting table to give information to interested students. At the recruiting table, the colony also sold campus coupon books as a fundraiser.

On Saturday, August 29, the colony participated in the second half on the Household Hazardous Waste Program. Members worked hard collecting old gallons of paint to be used for county painting projects.

Recruiting events continued on August 31 with "Meet the Members Night." The colony served wine and cheese and provided information to interested students. There was an overwhelming response, and many members joined that night.

On September 2, the colony sponsored its first professional speakers for the fall semester. Dean Rothe and Chancellor Nuzum spoke to the colony about the importance of participating in extra-curricular activities.

September 5 was the colony's third and final carwash of the season. Many new members attended, and with their team effort it was the most successful carwash.

The first executive committee meeting and the first colony meeting for the fall semester were held on September 11. Carla May, Chapter Consultant, attended both meetings to give suggestions on how to become a successful chapter. Throughout the fall semester, the colony held a total of six business meetings and seven executive committee meetings.

Social events continued throughout the month of September. On September 19, members attended the Air Force Academy football game against Colorado State University after a BBQ tailgater in the parking lot.

On October 6, the colony sponsored its second professional event. Dave Palenchar from the El Pomar Foundation spoke to the colony about the Foundation, which is the largest not-for-profit organization in Colorado.

Fundraising was an important event during the month of October. On October 7 and 8, colony members volunteered to work at the Fundraising CU Telethon to raise funds for the UCCS College of Business. Members called alumni from the business college seeking donations for the College of Business.

On October 9 and 10, the colony co-sponsored the Laser U2 show at Cave of the Winds - Laser Canyon. Members helped promote the event, served as parking lot attendants, helped with crowd control, and Delta Sigma Pi received a portion of the admission proceeds.

The colony remained active with its social events during October. On October 18, the colony held a bowling social at Harmony Bowl, and afterwards members met at a local Dairy Queen. On October 23, after one of the colony meetings, members gathered at Chi Chi's Mexican Restaurant for a Friday afternoon club.

During the month of October, members also participated in an ongoing fundraising event to seek direct donations from local Delta Sigma Pi alumni and local businesses. Several businesses donated merchandise for the Silent Auction, which was held on November 7, along with a BBQ/Potluck social event for Founder's Day.

Throughout the month of November, members participated in a name hunt to get to know each other. Members had to collect 31 signatures by the December 4 colony meeting, which was the final meeting for the fall semester.

The colony is now in the process of planning for Installation Day and for spring semester activities. The colony is looking forward to the Spring 1993 semester and the many events and activities designed to make this colony a successful chapter of Delta Sigma Pi.
