

Cornell University was founded in 1865 by Ezra Cornell as "an institution where any person can find instruction in any study." Cornell, located in Ithaca, New York, heart of the beautiful Finger Lakes Region of New York State, was considered so unusual for its time that many educators assumed it would fail to attract a student body, due to its radical foundations of being nonsectarian and coeducational. Yet from its beginning, Cornell has attracted both male and female students, and people from many races and nations. It had one of the first women's residence halls in the Northeast, was one of the first to admit students of color and in 1906 was the founding institution for Alpha Phi Alpha, the first African-American undergraduate fraternity.

Cornell can trace its founding to The Morrill Land-Grant College Act of 1862, which created a partnership between research, instruction and extension that has become a model throughout the world. Specifically, the Morrill Act stated that any state accepting a grant of land was required to agree to use it for "the endowment, support and maintenance of at least one college where the leading object shall be, without excluding other scientific and classical studies and including military tactics, to teach such branches of learning as are related to agriculture and the mechanic arts, in such a manner as the legislatures of the States may respectively prescribe, in order to promote the liberal and practical education of the industrial classes in the several pursuits on professions in life." Therefore, Cornell University became the Land-Grant college of The State of New York when Ezra Cornell, a New York State Senator, proposed a bill, which eventually passed, in the New York State Senate, which established Cornell University in 1865. Furthermore, Ezra Cornell donated his farm for the site of the campus and 500,000 dollars of his own money. On October 7, 1868, Inauguration Day, 412 students, the largest entering class admitted to any American college up to that time, began their studies at Cornell University. Ezra Cornell delivered a speech in which he concluded with the University's adopted motto: "Finally, I trust we have laid the foundation of an University, an institution where any person can find instruction in any study." The first president of Cornell was Andrew Dickson White, another New York State Senator who shared Ezra Cornell's vision.

By around the beginning of the 1900's the structure of the university was taking shape. Many of Cornell's specialized colleges were established or in the process of being established, and the main infrastructure of the campus was set. For example, the first college of veterinary medicine was established at Cornell in 1896. Even a social caste system existed at Cornell. At the top of the social classes was about a half a dozen fraternities including, Chi Psi, Alpha Delta Phi and Delta Phi. Under these select fraternities, lay other fraternities, and professional and religious rooming clubs. Finally, at the bottom of the system were the independents, the students that did not belong to any social club. As this class system grew, prejudice and discrimination became defined at the university. For instance, a southern student withdrew from Cornell in 1900 because there were two colored men in his class. Moreover, Anti-Semitism, which was non-existent in the early days of the university, was becoming more pronounced, as immigrants from the Polish ghettoes and the Ukraine came over to America. As a result, the fraternities stopped accepting Jewish students into their fraternities. Therefore, a chapter of the fraternity Zeta Beta Tau was established in 1907 and became the first of three Jewish fraternities on campus.

World War I had a dramatic impact on the university. In September 1917, the university opened with 3,859 students enrolled, compared to 5,264 students enrolled the year before. Moreover, the majority of the students that decided to stay at Cornell enrolled in the ROTC program to become officers latter on in the war. It was estimated that over two percent of all officers in the military during the war were from Cornell.

Additionally, World War II had a large impact on Cornell as well. New army and navy programs were established to accommodate the large number of male students that wanted to serve in the war. The College of Engineering set up a one-year program for the industrial training of women in order to help in the war. Finally, physical training was mandatory for all men, military and civilian.

In 1945, Cornell, along with Brown, Columbia, Dartmouth, Harvard, Princeton, The University of Pennsylvania and Yale formed the Ivy League athletic league, also known as the "ancient eight." Although the Ivy-League is known for its high caliber achievement in the areas of: lacrosse, rowing, hockey, and squash, the commitment to academic excellence by the individuals schools that make up Ivy League is perhaps what gives the Ivy League is reputation.

In the third week of April 1969, 100 young Americans in the Afro-American Society (AAS) took part in an illegal occupation of Willard Straight Hall. The takeover, which was spurred by a faculty-student judicial board's decision to punish black students for a disruptive protest the previous December, and by a cross-burning at a black women's dorm that most black students believed was the work of whites, was the culmination of a two-year campaign to force Cornell to open what became the Africana Center, an academic setting where students could learn about such things as high rates of black combat deaths. After white students, from the fraternity Delta Upsilon, briefly broke into the Straight under the eyes of the campus police, the occupiers armed themselves. Although the AAS students walked out of Willard Strait Hall the next day, this is the first time guns have been introduced into a campus conflict.

On October 8, 1997, an astonishingly large pumpkin appeared atop Cornell's McGraw Tower. The pumpkin was estimated to weigh up to 60 lbs., and sat pinned to the 173 foot Tower for several weeks. This prank made national news even though nobody has come forth to claim credit for the ingenious stunt. Therefore, this marvelous act remains a mystery as to how the stunt was pulled off, and a memory in Cornell's history.

Today, Cornell is world-class university and a member of the Ivy League and the State University of New York. The university consists of fourteen colleges, consisting of four contract schools: The College of Veterinary Medicine, The College of Agriculture and Life Sciences, The College of Human Ecology and The School of Industrial and Labor Relations. The contract colleges are those that were created by an Act of the State Legislature and receive direct funding from New York State. The mission of the contract colleges is linked directly to the economic and social well-being of the State of New York. Additionally, the ten endowed colleges of the university, specifically, colleges are privately funded and do not receive direct funding from New York State are: The College of Arts and Sciences The College of Engineering, The College of Architecture, Art, and Planning The School of Hotel Administration, The Johnson Graduate School of Management, The Law School, The Weill Medical College, The Graduate School of Medical Sciences and The Graduate School. Cornell's colors are carnelian and white and while there is no official Cornell mascot, a bear is often associated with Cornell athletics, but nevertheless Cornell is known as "The Big Red."

Additionally, Cornell University is proud to be home to many important achievements in American history. For example, Cornell University Press was the first university publishing

enterprise in the United States and is one of the country's largest university presses. Throughout Cornell's existence, twenty-seven Nobel laureates have been affiliated with Cornell as faculty members or students. In 2002-03, the Cornell faculty included 4 Nobel laureates, a Crafoord Prize winner, a Legion of Honor recipient, a World Food Prize winner, 4 National Medal of Science winners, a Wolf Prize winner, 4 MacArthur award winners, 3 Pulitzer Prize winners, 6 winners of Alexander von Humboldt Awards, 5 Presidential Early Career Award holders, 25 National Science Foundation CAREER grant holders, a recipient of the National Academy of Sciences Award for Initiatives in Research, a recipient of the American Mathematical Society's Steele Prize for Lifetime Achievement, a recipient of the Heineman Prize for Mathematical Physics, an Office of Naval Research Young Investigator award holder, 3 Packard Foundation grant holders, a Searle Scholar, a Keck Distinguished Young Scholar, and a NYSTAR (New York State Office of Science, Technology and Academic Research) early career award winner.

Cornell has graduated many successful alumni that have had a great contribution in their field of expertise. Leaders in the business world consist of Adolph Coors and Joseph Coors, founder/first executives of the nation's third-largest brewery; Stephen Friedman, assistant for economic policy to President George W. Bush, and director of the National Economic Council; Herbert F. Johnson and Samuel C. Johnson, founder/first executives of the Johnson family businesses; Thomas W. Jones, Citigroup global-investment executive and Sanford I. Weill, philanthropist; and CEO of Citigroup. Famous Alumni in the political arena include: Samuel (Sandy) R. Berger, international consultant; national security advisor 1993–2000; Barber Conable, Congressional representative 1965–85; World Bank president 1986–91; Ruth Bader Ginsburg, U.S. Supreme Court justice; member of National Women's Hall of Fame; Janet Reno, U.S. attorney general 1993–2000; member of National Women's Hall of Fame; William P. Rogers, U.S. attorney general 1958–61 and secretary of state 1969–73 and Paul D. Wolfowitz, U.S. undersecretary of defense 1989-93; U.S. deputy secretary of defense, George W. Bush administration.

Cornell University has built on the success of its founder, Ezra Cornell, and has grown from 412 undergraduates in its first year to currently over 25,000 students. The main Ithaca campus has extended from one building in 1865 to 260 major buildings on 745 acres. Additionally, the Cornell University has added additional campuses in order to complement the Ithaca campus, including: The Weill Medical College in New York City and The Weill Medical

College in Qatar, making Cornell the first American University to have a campus in the Middle East. The university is a 300 million-plus per year research institution with students matriculating from all over the world and an excellent reputation that is known all over the world. The university's 2-billion-plus endowment allows for Cornell not only to provide a stellar education for its students, but also to research and develop solutions to problems that will benefit humankind. For example, Cornell has approximately 420 active patents, with research yielding such products as the canine parvovirus vaccine, an ultrasonic device used to treat glaucoma, a "gene gun" used in biotechnology and an artificial test-animal system. Cornell has made a significant impact in the areas of education, research and innovation in the past and will continue to do so for years to come!

College of Agriculture and Life Sciences Applied Economics and Management

The College of Agriculture and Life Science is the second largest undergraduate college at Cornell University. It is also credited as one of the most prestigious agriculture and related science colleges in the country. The College of Agriculture and Life Science was created in 1865 when federal land grants were given to states after the Civil War to establish colleges of agriculture. Cornell University founder's Ezra Cornell and Andrew Dickson White persuaded New York State legislature to locate the state's new land grant university in Ithaca. The college was originally named the Department of Agriculture in 1874, the evolved to the College of Agriculture in 1888, to the New York State College of Agriculture in 1904, and finally to its current name in 1971.

Currently, the department of Applied Economics and Management (AEM) located in the College of Agriculture and Life Science, offers one undergraduate major – AEM – which fall into three general areas: business, agribusiness, and applied economics. The business area has two specializations: business and food industry business. The AEM major provides students with a variety of courses pertaining to the majority of business fields, including finance, marketing, entrepreneurship, general management, etc. AEM is also home to Cornell's only accredited general business degree program for undergraduates. Recently, reviews from The Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business concluded that the AEM program is on par with the top undergraduate business programs in the United States. It is also only one of two accredited undergraduate programs in the Ivy League. In the classroom, students learn to work in teams, solve real world business problems, and even meet one-on-one high profile guest speakers; for example, Jim Nyce of Pepsico and Mark Ciccone of Proctor & Gamble. AEM is the second largest major at Cornell. With its recent accreditation, future prospects for the AEM department are confident.

The College of Arts and Science Economics

Cornell University was founded as a single institution where students would be afforded the opportunity to study a variety of subjects. All faculty and students associated with the whole institution of Cornell University. However, in 1886, the lawyers initiated a process of differentiation between the Law School, as a separate entity, and the Academic Department which encompassed all other fields of study. In 1903, the Academic Division was later renamed as the College of Arts and Sciences.

The Economics Department of Cornell University has matured steadily with the College of Arts and Sciences, contemporary times, and changing economic thought. The College currently offers 40 majors with 4000 enrolled undergraduates, and 1500 graduate students, making the College of Arts and Sciences a versatile asset and the largest college within Cornell. Meanwhile, the Economics Department has about 900 enrolled undergraduates pursuing a degree in Economics. The Bachelor's of Science degree in Economics is the most popular major within the college, graduating two-hundred students this year.

Students of the Economics Department receive a broad liberal arts education from the College of Arts and Sciences. As students enter the workforce, they often receive job offers from investment banks, commercial banks, accounting, financial planning, and management with an astute understanding of the relationship of market forces and how people relate to scarcity of resources. Other students continue receive graduate degrees in business or to become lawyers.

The Economics Department at Cornell is worthy of notable mention for its prestige, dynamic, yet, specific approach to the field of economics, as well as its faculty members. Currently there are thirty teaching economists, econometricians, and historians in addition to seventy other economists in other aspects of the University. Furthermore, Professor Karl Shell edits *The Journal of Economic Theory*, Professor Emeritus Jaroslav Vanek is acknowledged as the creator of the study of Economics of Labor Management, and the Cornell Economics Society is notably the "longest running economics and pre-business society at Cornell."

Altogether, the Economics Department in conjunction with Cornell offers a unique experience to develop the individual into a discerning, intelligent, and proactive student within the institution as well as throughout each past, present, and future student's life.

School of Hotel Administration Hotel Administration

The idea for the School of Hotel Administration began when the American Hotel Association wanted to make an institution where people would study the science of managing hotels and restaurants. Although the American Hotel Association was the main driver in getting the Hotel School, John McFarlane Howie is given credit for creating the idea. He owned highly successful hotels in Buffalo, New York, and came up with the idea of teaching potential managers how to be managers by working with industry leaders. This concept took a lot of convincing, because ten years earlier, the Association and John took the idea to then President Jacob Gould Schurman, who rejected it right away. Perseverance paid off and the world-renowned Cornel School of Hotel Administration was founded in 1922 when they offered the first ever undergrad program for hospitality management.

When it began, the hotel administration program was a part of the College of Home Economics. The first class was of only twenty students, but that quickly grew, when there were forty enrolled in the 1922-1923 academic year. This number nearly tripled when over 100 students were enrolled in 1924. The popularity and success of the school caught on quickly and by 1926, the Hotel Management program accounted for 22% of the College of Home Economics.

E.M. Statler was a revolutionary leader in the hotel industry as well as a member of the American Hotel Association when Cornell was building and growing their Hotel Management program. Cornell attempted many times at getting Statler's support and funding to increase the scope of the school, but Statler was against it whole-heartedly. Statler had a complete change of heart when he attended the school's second annual Hotel Ezra Cornell weekend in 1927, where students invited industry leaders to run a "hotel for a day" to showcase their education. He was so impressed by the student's abilities that he decided to donate funds.

Cornell's Hotel Management program got it's own home in 1949, when E.M. Statler's widow funded the construction of Statler Hall, which was built within a teaching hotel, the Statler Inn. In 1950, the School of Hotel Administration became a separate school within the College of Economics.

School of Industrial and Labor Relations Industrial and Labor Relations

Conceived by Irving M. Ives, majority leader in the New York State Assembly, The New York State School of Industrial and Labor Relations (ILR) was intended by Ives to facilitate the study of a topic that was not addressed by the curriculums in any of the country's institutions of higher education, that he felt was essential to business relations: employers and workers settling their mutual problems by discussion. In 1942, Ives' committee recommended that the school be established at Cornell University. Despite opposition from Cornell faculty members and the board of trustees, the bill establishing ILR at Cornell was passed on May 15, 1944.

The school opened its doors on November 1, 1945 and Ives was its first dean. Eleven graduates and 107 undergraduates enrolled at ILR in its maiden year. According to William B. Groat, one of the founders of the school, ILR was a product of "what was happening in the communities. Sit down strikes and everything else." The school was "supposed to study, namely, the British system of labor relations and profit sharing" and therefore its curriculum included "a foundation course...with studies of collective bargaining, social security, personnel management, the labor movement, and labor legislation."2 Courses in "organization of corporations, psychology industry, human and property rights, in government regulation...sociology, economics, English, public speaking, accounting [and] statistics" were given². The school's intention was to train its students to be research analysts, mediators, economists, statisticians, and government officials.

Today ILR "is the premiere institution in the field it pioneered: the study of employment related issues. ILR is a combination business program, liberal arts program, and professional program centered in the social sciences and their application to the real problems of real people." Its 775 students study human resources, organizational behavior, labor relations, collective bargaining, social statistics and international and comparative labor studies and its faculty comprise the largest concentration of scholars in these disciplines anywhere in the world.⁴

College of Human Ecology Policy Analysis and Management

The Department of Policy Analysis and Management was formed on July 1st, 1998 within the College of Human Ecology. It was created through the merging of the departments of Consumer Economics and Housing, and is lead by Professor Richard Burkhauser, who has led the department since. With this major, students learn to use data analysis, research, policy implementation strategies, and analytical thinking to examine the effect of varying policies on society. PAM draws on theories from economics, sociology, psychology, and government, and prepares its students for leadership positions in the public, non-profit, and private sectors. Within the major, students can concentrate in Family and Social Welfare Policy, Health Policy, or Consumer Policy. Faculty interests within PAM range from consumer protection regulation to natural resources, wildlife and endangered species.

The College of Human Ecology itself has an extremely proud history. It began in 1900 when Martha Van Rensselaer started a reading program for farm women, and by 1907, the department of Home Economics was formed. In 1911, Martha Van Rensselaer and Flora Rose were the first females at Cornell to be granted full professorship. From there, the Home Economics department kept growing, and in 1919, it became its own college, then a New York State land grant college in 1925. In 1922, the department of Hotel Administration was founded within the College of Home Economics, which became its own school in 1954. In 1969, Home Economics was reorganized into the College of Human Ecology, and now has 91 professors, 1382 undergraduate students, and 207 graduate students. The College of Human Ecology is now home to the departments of Human Development, Policy Analysis and Management, Textiles and Apparel, Design and Environmental Analysis, and Nutritional Sciences.

The Delta Psi Omega Colony

Since coming into existence on April 7, 2003, the Delta Psi Omega colony of Delta Sigma Pi has been working to establish a chapter at Cornell University. Brian Lewis and Lindsey Crumbaugh, now the colony's President and Senior Vice President, respectively, began laying the foundations for a colonization effort last spring by contacting the national headquarters of Delta Sigma Pi and recruiting potential members. It was not until this past fall, however, that informational sessions were held and formal recruitment commenced. The first of these sessions was held on September 20, with Sparky Graves and Nick Steinkrauss speaking with the nine interested students and faculty advisor, Charles Chang. Three brothers from the Syracuse University chapter also visited and shared their experiences at the meeting. Over the next month, two more informational sessions were held and the number of students interested in joining the colony grew to forty-two.

On October 17, the colony held its first elections in order to designate officers who would preside over the execution and fulfillment of the numerous requirements that need to be completed in order to submit the petition to become a chapter. The following people were elected to the eight positions on the executive committee: Brian Lewis (President), Lindsey Crumbaugh (Senior Vice President), Fedor Mikhailov (Vice President – Professional Events), Jessica Goldmark (Vice President – Colony Operations), Kate Nadolny (Vice President – Finance), Erin Perry (Chancellor), Kate-Lynn Timmermans (Vice President – Community Service), and Jillian Hunt (Vice President – Scholarship and Awards).

The first official General Assembly meeting took place on October 21. Dale Clark, Director of Chapter Expansion Services for Delta Sigma Pi, spoke at the meeting and educated the colony about the history of the fraternity as well as its rules, regulations and traditions. Dale also met with the executive committee in order to outline the events and other requirements that had to be fulfilled before applying for a charter. The colony got right to work!

Although various topics have been addressed, a focus of the professional events that have been held thus far has been that of business ethics. Geoffrey Osborne, a partner at PricewaterhouseCoopers in Philadelphia spoke to the colony about the various instances of


corporate fraud that have effected the economy over the last few years and the important role that management's ethics will play in preventing such scandals in the future. The colony also watched the movie "Wall Street" and held a discussion about business ethics following the screening. Tying into this theme, "Boiler Room", another film relating to ethics, was shown at a social event. Other professional events include; résumé workshops, a speech regarding women in business, a talk by Dr. Quinetta Roberson (a professor at Cornell University) during which she shared her experiences in the business world and offered advice to the colony's members on how to pursue their ambitions, and a lecture and demonstration on proper etiquette at business meetings and interviews that occur in a restaurant setting.

Community service events that have been held include; working at the Cayuga Nature Center, selling tickets to an event benefiting the Red Cross of Tompkins County, helping out at the Red Cross event, volunteering at the soup kitchen at Loaves & Fishes (a local ministry of hospitality), helping to run the Health Fair at Cornell University and making and delivering holiday cards to a local home for the elderly. The cards were made during a social event and holiday party at a bowling alley. Two other social events at local eateries have been held in order to facilitate the formation of bonds amongst the colony's members.

Although there are over a hundred names on the colony's attendance list, people continue to drop out and join, so a stable membership has yet to be determined. However, the executive committee has determined that there are sixty-seven members thus far who have met or are on course to meet the requirements to become founding fathers; these names are included in the petition.

The colony is thrilled with the progress that has been made so far and is confident that, pending the petition's approval, it will become an exemplary chapter of Delta Sigma Pi and a strong organization on Cornell University's campus. The professional events sponsored by Delta Psi Omega colony have proven to be educational and beneficial to the colony's members as well as to other Cornellians. The colony has also enjoyed helping the Cornell and Ithaca communities through the community service events that have been held and looks forward to further enhancing its reputation as a philanthropic group. It is the goal of this colony to continue to promote professionalism, service and brotherhood.

Summary of Committee Activities

Executive Committee

We have encouraged personal, social, academic, and mental growth amongst ourselves as well as throughout the colony as we offer opportunities to look at the deeper side of being an active professional. Through our laugher, tears, and curiosity, we have created a unique bond, a social and support network in the Executive Committee. We sincerely feel that without the initiative of each Executive Committee member, we would not be able to accomplish the incredible feat of sending this Petition, finishing the required events, or even congealing as a group of new found friends.

The goal of the weekly executive committee meetings was to ensure that the direction of the fraternity was heading in the right direction. In this atmosphere we could ensure that all officers were keeping up to speed and fulfilling their requirements. Additionally, we would use this time to plan what exactly we wanted to communicate to the General Assembly at our weekly meetings. This may be the most important committee of the fraternity since its purpose is to foster the cohesion of all the committees so that the goals of the colony are met.

Furthermore, having our faculty advisor Charles Chang and District Director Kelly Northridge present for the meetings offered an additional opinion to our collective thought process. Without these informational and cooperative meetings our success would not have been possible. Together we made the dream of being a chapter a reality and our perspective committees gave us that opportunity to all work together.

Professional

To prepare for the submission of our petition, the professional committee successfully completed eight professional events. The committee worked well together under Ted Mikhailov's supervision. The organization of the committee included the Head (Ted) and a Chair that was elected by the committee. Those chairs were Donna Wankmueller (fall) and Keith Motelson (spring).

Each week the committee brainstormed on potential programs and the steps involved in each. We then selected the programs and divided the committee into two groups each concentrating on one event at a time. The committee participation was exceptional with every member contributing enough to become a founding member by our colony standards.

The Colony's events began with a resume workshop to prepare our young colony for upcoming employer recruitment sessions, career fairs, and interviews. The professional committee then selected a colony theme. That theme was Business Ethics.

Our first ethics-themed event was the Boiler Room Screening and Networking where members saw the potential problems arising from unethical behavior and corporate fraud and later talked about the movie and how it affects our society. We continued that series with a presentation from an ethics expert, a partner at Pricewaterhouse Coopers, Geoffrey Osborne. He talked about recent corporate fraud events and its effects on the accounting industry and corporate reporting – a truly amazing event. Watching "Wall Street" and holding a discussion covering business ethics issues rounded up the series.

Other events included presentations on business etiquette presentation, career path, and balancing career and family. All of the above were delivered by some of Cornell's most popular professors. The Colony helped administer the Student Leadership Institute at Cornell and attended a presentation called "Demystifying Investment Banking" put on by JP Morgan.

The professional committee helped the Colony foster the study of business. The committee put on solid events at which the attendance ranged from approximately 15 to 80. We will hold at least two more professional events before the end of the semester.

Fundraising

The fundraising committee of the Delta Psi Omega Colony has been one of the more active committees within the colony. The committee meets weekly to discuss successes and challenges of the colony financially.

The committee has had many successes this semester. One of the greatest ones was helping to spark the interests of students within the colony within the colony in finance. At our weekly meetings, we reviewed our finances, discussed and proposed dues and fundraising options. As a colony, we realized the importance of having dues to support ourselves, as well as to let potential founding fathers show their dedication to Delta Sigma Pi.

One of the main focuses of the fundraising committee, and one of our biggest challenges, was corporate sponsorship. Throughout the semester, we have been in contact with many corporations. The members of the committee helped to draft a letter that was sent to companies who had expressed previous interest in helping with out fundraising endeavors. A big challenge was getting companies to respond to this. As simply one colony within all of Delta Sigma Pi, many corporations were hesitant to help us with sponsorship. Many companies have been very generous in pledging to help us with business and professional events.

We have two fundraisers planned for the semester. The first is a bottle opener sale. Most members of the colony and the related staff who have helped us during the colonization period have no merchandise that shows their Deltasig pride. We decided this would make a great fundraiser, also because it gets our name out on campus through the sale, as we plan to sell the bottle openers to people who are not affiliated with the fraternity.

Finally, we are planning a fundraising professional event, and etiquette dinner hosted by a Cornell professor. We feel that the best way to raise money is to educate the Cornell Community about business related topics in the process.

As a colony, our fundraising has been overall successful and has helped us to achieve the goals we had set for ourselves for the semester.

Service

Delta Sigma Pi upholds many values and morals. One of its greatest attributes is its mission of service. Through service, Delta Sigma Pi members can work to touch the lives of so many. For the past year, our Delta Pi Omega colony has worked to serve our community of Ithaca. We have strived to reach out to those in need and help in any way we can.

We helped the Red Cross on numerous occasions. We helped this organization with their Disaster Relief Fund by selling tickets to their event called Bargain Heroes. The money collected for these tickets helped victims of natural disasters. We also helped market and run the event.

We then decided to work with On-Site, an organization that helps students find service projects in their local area. Our service was at the Cayuga Nature Center to help clear trails and preserve the beauty of its forests. Through this project we learned a lot about nature and its deterioration due to the abuse that people put upon it.

After this event, we volunteered at Loaves and Fishes, a soup nearby soup kitchen. Our group prepared and served food to the needy. We interacted with both the homeless and the volunteers who have dedicated their lives to help the less unfortunate. Our eyes were opened to the needs of our very own community.

Our next service event was helping out the Oak Hill Manor nursing home. Our entire colony made holiday cards for the residents of this facility. We then took the cards to the home where we handed them out and socialized with the elderly residents. The smiles we saw and the stories we hard made us truly understand the power of volunteering.

To start off the second semester, our group volunteered to table and host the Student Health Awareness Club health fair. Through our work we learned about the various diseases and health issues that college students are facing and what preventative measures we could take. After his two-day event, we decided to team up with On-Site once again to donate our services. We helped build a café for foreigners who have recently immigrated to the U.S. We plan to continue our service events into the future, helping Cornell, Ithaca, and national organizations.

Scholarship and Awards

For a colony, this aspect of our colony does not entail the exact same obligations and duties that it would if we were an actual chapter. However, we have made significant strides to improve the scholarship of our colony, Delta Psi Omega. We are currently planning to organize study groups within our colony. We will have juniors and seniors paired up with sophomores and freshmen, according to majors. This will help the juniors and seniors to recall the material they have learned thus far at Cornell. Also, it will enable freshmen and sophomores to receive help from upper classmen who have experience in those particular subjects pertaining to their individual majors. Our colony's Vice President of Scholarship and Awards has introduced the use of webmaster.com to the colony members. This is a website that allows students to register (at no cost) and receive emails regarding the availability of various national scholarships. The colony members have all been informed of the website and receive weekly updates regarding scholarship availability. On the awards side, we have planned to introduce a weekly award for membership in the Delta Psi Omega colony. Each week, we will have a presentation of the "Colony Member of the Week". This colony member will be chosen by another colony member (who previously held the award). We have selected a Cornell bear (the Cornell University mascot) to pass around weekly. The recipient of the award will be in possession of the bear for an entire week and then select the next award winner. We feel this will be an excellent way to enhance brotherhood within our colony. We look forward to continuing our progress as a colony.

Social

The Delta Psi Omega Chapter has created stronger fraternal bonds through shared experiences and social interactions. By meeting as a colony outside of the business environment, members have had the opportunity to get to know each other on a more personal level. This has allowed the fraternity to work together smoothly and achieve all of its goals.

The first social event of the year was an appetizer night. During this event members were able to get to know each other and their interests. Members also had the opportunity to play games against each other such as pool and darts.

Although not closely related, the next social event held was a holiday bowling party. Members bowled in teams in a friendly competition, and the night ended with a gift exchange in celebration of the holiday season. The last event held this year was another appetizer night. The first appetizer evening went over so well, that we felt a second appetizer night was in order.

Through these events, we have seen a stronger bond grow between the members. Many new friendships have been made through the social events, which we plan to continue into the future. In our next social events we are looking to do more team building activities such as a ropes course or wall climbing. So far, though, the social events have been very successful in creating a feeling of belonging and brotherhood.







My interests and goals are closely tied to many of those involved in DSP and I am certain all the members will work together to both educate and help to advance each others aspirations.





- "Information Footholds: Expatriate Analysts in an Emerging Market" Job Talk Paper 2002: This paper seeks to resolve a divergent literature discussing barriers to information flows in an international context by separating local presence from investor sophistication and resource availability as possible sources of information asymmetry. The study compares foreign and expatriate analysts and finds that expatriates, defined as foreigners with operations in the emerging economy, significantly outperform foreign analysts on a number of metrics using a new hand-collected set of recommendations data and stock returns. The profitability of portfolios based on recommendations shows striking evidence of out-performance on the part of expatriates. Results are robust to several testing specifications involving both the levels of and changes in recommendations and are significant at both the individual and consensus levels. This study suggests that lack of local presence presents a substantial informational disadvantage that may give rise to biases in portfolio selection in institutional investing and that substantiates the value of establishing local research offices in emerging economies. Finally, the performance of local analysts reveals puzzling under-performance relative to expatriates. Resolutions of this finding are posited.
- "Information Asymmetry and Equity Research Relevance" Working Paper 2003: This paper investigates the behavior of institutional equity investors when substantial information asymmetries exist and establishes the irrelevance of information gathered by the poorly-informed for trading purposes. This study finds that poorly-informed traders have incentive to disregard their own information, opting instead to acquire information from the informed and to trade based on informed analysts' recommendations. By establishing the identity of the informed party ex-ante and by controlling for common information signals, the study is able to isolate information-based feedback to be the source of herding behavior and, more specifically, of potentially destabilizing positive feedback in trading. The uninformed are found to systematically follow the recommendations of the informed, even in contradiction of their own information. That is, only the best-informed analysts' recommendations are relevant to institutional trading.
- "The Leaking of Analyst Reports in an Emerging Stock Market" (with Mark Seasholes) Working Paper 2002: We investigate trading behavior before the release of analyst reports. We find net foreign buying precedes positive reports and net foreign selling

precedes negative reports. An even more surprising result is that funds managed by a given investment bank buy (sell) before positive (negative) reports issued by the same bank. This study uses a new, hand-collected dataset of analyst recommendations from Taiwan. Our paper sheds light on the mechanism by which information is incorporated into stock prices. We show how and when price revelation takes place. Our paper also points to the source of trading profitability by foreigners (not locals) in an emerging stock market. Finally, our paper repeats the adage caveat emptor to consumers of analyst reports. Though exchange rules do not allow trading before the release of a report, penalties are small and not enforced. Regulators might want to consider the results of this paper in light of the recent overhaul of disclosure laws.


