SECTION III. UNIVERSITY HISTORY

SIGMA BETA IOTA SECTION III: UNIVERSITY HISTORY FOUNDING & MAJOR DEVELOPMENT

The Founding

The University of California at Irvine, was one of three new campuses established in the 1960s under the California Master Plan for Higher Education with the San Diego and Santa Cruz. One of the new campuses was to be in the Los Angeles area; the location selected was Irvine Ranch, an area of agricultural land bisecting Orange County from north to south. This site was chosen to accommodate the county's growing population, complement the growth of nearby UCLA and UC Riverside, and allow for the construction of a master planned community in the surrounding area.

Unlike other University of California campuses, UCI was not named for the city it was built in; at the time of the university's founding (1965), the current city of Irvine (established in 1975) did not exist. The name "Irvine" is a reference to James Irvine, a landowner who administered the 94,000 acre (380 km²) Irvine Ranch.

Major Development and Growth Events


UC Irvine itself has grown with its surroundings, with the university earning national acclaim in academia that reflects its status as a nationally-ranked public research university. This fast-paced growth has made UC Irvine the educational and cultural center of Orange County. As part of its long-term efforts to "attain flagship status," UC Irvine has implemented construction projects (estimated to cost \$1.3 billion over the next decade) that will accelerate the campus build-out and employ the remainder of the university's land grant. The exponential increase in construction activity is a part of the Strategy for Academic Development at UCI through 2015, a master plan that outlines the vision of making UCI a first-choice university for college applicants nationwide.

Three Term Average 2006-2007



SECTION IV. DEPARTMENT OF ECONOMICS

SIGMA BETA IOTA SECTION IV: DEPARTMENT OF ECONOMICS HISTORY OF THE DEPARTMENT

In August 1964, Daniel G. Aldrich, the first chancellor at the University of California, Irvine launched the university's initial undergraduate academic plan which began with the College of Arts, Letters, and Sciences. The College of Arts, Letters, and Sciences housed five divisions which included: Biological Sciences, Fine Arts, Humanities, Physical Sciences, and Social Sciences. Within the division of Social Sciences, an Economics program was pioneered and to this present day, the program exists as one of the most widely enrolled within the university. Starting as a division, Social Sciences developed into a School, referring to an academic unit as defined by the university, and the program of Economics eventually became known as the Department of Economics.


The Department of Economics currently offers three majors which are: Economics, Quantitative Economics, and Business Economics. Students are able to obtain Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) degrees within all three majors while Economics also offers the Master of Arts (M.A.) degrees and Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) degrees. The most current available statistics available through the university show that in Spring 2007, the School of Social Sciences had the most enrolled students with 5,557 (see detailed chart below, Chart 1) and the combined degrees within the Department of Economics, and Quantitative Economics respectively (see detailed chart below, Chart 2). In conjunctions with all three majors, the Department of Economics also offers an optional specialization in International Issues and Economics. In addition, the Honors Program in Economics is open to high-achieving students also in all three majors.

Currently, the Department of Economics has 26 permanent faculty members, with research and teaching interests that encompass a broad range of fields. In addition to strengths in micro theory, macroeconomics and econometrics, specifically Bayesian and classical, the department has expertise and prominence in many applied fields, including economic history, industrial organization, international economics, labor economics, public choice and public finance, transportation economics, and urban economics. Members of the Department maintain close tires with members of the Department of Political Science and the Paul Merage School of Business, the graduate school of business at the University of California, Irvine. Also, members of the Department maintain affiliations with the Institute for Mathematical Behavioral Sciences, the Institute of Transportation Studies, then Institute of Global Conflict and Cooperation, the Center for the Study of Democracy, and the program in International Studies.



SIGMA BETA IOTA SECTION V: COLONY DEVELOPMENT SUMMARY

Establishing the Colony

Sigma Beta lota began as an idea that originated from Myles Sterrett, a new transfer student who declared Economics as his major in the winter quarter of the 2006-2007 school year. Sterrett happened to be family friends with an industrious member of Delta Sigma Pi, Patrick Bonfrisco. Growth

The winter quarter of the 2006-2007 school year primarily consisted of filling out the proper paperwork and spreading the word of the new colony by Sterrett and Su. A handful of UCI students joined the colony along the way.

As spring quarter of 2007 began, the main focus was to recruit more members for the colony in order to gain momentum. Efforts consisted of talking to friends and classmates who shared the common interests of business and economics. Weekly meetings were held to discuss topics such as recruitment and marketing strategies. By the end of the quarter, the colony consisted of about a dozen students who made up the initial executive committee.

The members of the colony held meetings during summer of 2007 to discuss the upcoming school year. The small group brain stormed ideas to publicize and recruit for the fall quarter. Suddenly, the pressure for money was realized and the all the members tried to land corporate sponsorships. The efforts were not in vain.

At the start of the fall quarter of 2007, the colony made posters, printed flyers, and made tshirts to attract attention. The members put on an Information Night to recruit more students for the cause. As more students joined the colony, the first fundraising and professional events were planned and executed. Colony members made posters for recruiting purposes, and held weekly meetings on Mondays.

Professional Development and Community Service

It was during the winter quarter that Sigma Beta lota gained the most momentum and established itself as a strong organization. There were two waves of successful recruitment, which consisted mainly of interviewing potential members. Two fundraising events with StaffPro were successfully carried out, as well as seven professional events and six community service events. Social outings were also organized to allow colony members to get to know each other and bond. In addition to these events, colony members came together to study at the Student Center study lounges to improve on their academics.

Measuring Success

(Presented by Alec Traub of Creative Environments of Hollywood) November 5, 2007

On November 5, 2007, the members of the Sigma Beta Iota Colony of Delta Sigma Pi attended a professional event featuring guest speaker Alec Traub, an acquisitions and developments manager of Creative Environments of Hollywood.

This was the first professional event the colony had held since becoming Sigma Beta Iota. Myles Sterrett, colony President, and Tawny Wong, Vice President-Professional Activities, had been introduced to Mr. Traub by Carol Spencer, UCI's Alumni Relations Chair. Alec Traub began by telling the colony members a little bit about his college experience in order to make a connection wit the audience. A graduate of UCI in 2000, Mr. Traub majored in Sociology and joined a fraternity while at UCI. He became president of his fraternity shortly after initiation.

Mr. Traub told the colony members of how he overcame obstacles during college, balancing his school work and his fraternal obligations. This was a story that hit very close to home for the audience. Many of the colony members are beginning to feel the pressure of school and the responsibilities of being a part of a fraternity. His introductory story was very well delivered and won the attention of the colony members right away.

Financially, he is considerably more successful than others in his age range.

Instead, being successful is being passionate about your occupation and constantly growing as an individual. The colony definitely benefited from his extremely inspirational speech.

This event was open to the entire University of California, Irvine campus. Sigma Beta lota had advertised it weeks in advance. The turnout of the event was rather large considering the fact that the colony is not as well known as other organizations on campus.

Upon graduating from the University of Kansas, she found herself in Irvine, California, where she would contribute her leadership experience to the career she was about to embark on in the company. Sarah Estacio, a fourth year at the University of California, Irvine, recently interned at Target and shared her experience with all of us at the event. She is the Campus Liason for Target Corporation and is in charge of internship opportunities at the university as well as organizing events for Target at UCI. Stanzel and Estacio spoke about what leadership meant. Having strong leadership skills does not necessarily mean having power or authority, but rather taking initiatives and possessing good communication skills. A good leader would have a great concept of unity; for example in Target where employees work in teams, a good leader would be encouraging and appreciative of others in the team while giving constructive advice to further improve the performance of the team.

A leader is not always a manager, nor is a manager always a leader. Using various charts and props and drawing from her own experiences, Stanzel differentiated between managers and leaders. A manager does not focus on other's feelings but rather on keeping the company running efficiently while a leader facilitates work and inspires others to act voluntarily. In essence, a leader is a manager and more. Stanzel emphasized on the idea that there is no such thing as a perfect leader. There are many traits a leader can possess, some leaders will excel in certain traits while others will fall short of them. A good leader will focus on his strengths and take advantage of them to lessen his weaknesses; in another words, a good leader will use his assets to work on his flaws.

In the working environment, managers may evaluate one's performances periodically in hopes of improvements from the employee and progress for the company. At Target, employees are evaluated on what the company refers to as the "9-Dimension of Excellence." The evaluation breaks leadership into nine different categories and each employee is thoroughly assessed under each category to ensure improvement in the future. The "9-Dimension of Excellence" is a great valuation tool in that it helps the team leaders and employees know exactly what their strengths and weaknesses are so they can focus on working on their shortcomings while continuing to excel in their strong points.

Toward the end of the workshop, Stanzel and Estacio emphasized the importance of leadership and shared their experiences while working at Target. They went over some common interview questions regarding leadership skills and encouraged us to be persistent when looking for a job. Résumés and cover letters are important because they demonstrate one's communication skill which can reveal oneself as a leader. All in all, leadership is an essential attribute, and having great leadership skills is a great investment towards one's future. As part of a colony working toward installation, members of Sigma Beta lota are all considered leaders in a sense that we are all working together towards the same goal – founding the premier business fraternity here at the University of California, Irvine.

Investment Banking and Financial Planning (Presented by Andrew Carroll of NCH Consulting) January 16, 2008

On January 16, 2008, the members of the Sigma Beta lota Colony of Delta Sigma Pi attended a professional event on investment banking and financial planning presented by Andrew Carroll of NCH Consulting.

Investment is related to savings or deferring consumption. In finance, investment is buying securities or other monetary assets in the capital markets. Investment bankers today are very well-paid because of the duties their job entails. To learn more about investment banking and financial planning, Sigma Beta lota invited Andrew Carroll to speak at the University of California, Irvine about his job as a General Manager of an accounting and financial planning firm.

Mr. Carroll works at NCH Consulting Group Incorporated, a financial planning company, in Fullerton, CA. He obtained many financial licenses, including the Series 7, CPA, CFP, etc., even before he finished his college education at Cal State Fullerton. Carroll has been with NCH Consulting for a few years and he is here tonight at UCI to offer his knowledge and guidance by sharing his work experience with the colony. He began by emphasizing the importance of networking, as that is how he got his job. Carroll also spoke about the difference between what one learns in college versus on the job.

One of the most important things Carroll mentioned during the night was communication and its importance in his job. Communication plays a significant role in retaining clients and improving businesses, yet colleges don't always provide students with such pertinent education. Colleges tend to systemize students in the sense that students become used to the mundane cycle of attending lectures and midterms that are strictly based on the topics covered in class. Carroll argues that colleges don't necessarily prepare you for jobs in the financial industry by sharing his work experiences at NCH. Like all other financial planners and investors, Carroll is expected to know everything about investments from his clients. However, if knowledge of investments is the only thing he possessed, he will not be able to thrive in what he does. Carroll's main concern and focus of his job is selling himself by being personable and winning his clients' trust so he can continue to build his client base; and these are the things that colleges don't teach to students.

Carroll suggests the colony to keep up with current events and read from recent business publications that teach you how to think instead of textbooks. He touched upon the sub-prime mortgage crisis and its influence on the market and continues to lecture about the different

types of investments – stocks, bonds, real estates, and even IRA and 401k accounts. Carroll concludes the event holding a Q&A session on investments. The colony and other prospective members inquired him on various questions regarding investments and what they can do to better themselves in the future.

Résumé Workshop (Presented by Leslie Ocampo of Celtic Leasing) January 28, 2008

The résumé is the first thing an employer encounters regarding a job seeker. In fact, the employer's first impression of the job seeker comes from the résumé itself, thus a great deal of importance is ascribed to the résumé. Although there isn't a set format on how a person is to write his or her résumé, there are fundamental guidelines that should be followed to ensure a positive first impression. Given that, Sigma Beta lota, a colony of Delta Sigma Pi, invited Leslie Ocampo from Celtic Leasing to teach the members how to write an effective résumé here at the University of California, Irvine.

Leslie Ocampo is the Corporate Recruiter for Celtic Leasing located in Irvine, CA. She has traveled to many colleges in the Orange County and L.A. region seeking for potential employees and interns and therefore has looked through countless résumés and cover letters. Ocampo has stopped by the UCI Career Center plenty of times to offer her guidance on résumé/cover letter writing and interview techniques. She is here today to share with us the Do's and Don't's of résumé writing as well as critiquing the members' résumés.

Ocampo began her presentation by going through the basics of résumé writing. First, the length of a college student's résumé should not exceed one page. A good résumé should be printed on quality bond paper, preferably one that is at least 20 lbs or designated for résumés; colored paper is unprofessional and is a big don't. Font should be standardized and easy on the eyes, nothing fancy or too small or too big; flashy graphics are unnecessary and should be avoided.

Grammar and spelling are very important—have a career counselor proofread the résumé if needed. Ocampo mentioned that she still comes across résumés and cover letters with grammar and spelling errors, which indicates a lack of effort in job-seeking. The content of the résumé is also very important. Objectives are not necessary, but should be specific and tailored to the position applying if used. Education comes next; the expected date of graduation and GPA (if above 3.0) should be present and Dean's List may also be included in this section.

Work experience and additional activities are listed after in reverse chronological order, and details should be in bullet points instead of paragraph form. When describing any unrelated job, be strategic and leave out details that have no value. A list of skills or certification may be present if necessary.

Think like an employer when writing the résumé and without lying or exaggerating the truth, emphasize the required skills by using action verbs. References are usually provided upon request, so they do not need to be included. Most importantly, be sure that the necessary contact information is present on the résumé, especially the e-mail address. Ocampo emphasized that the content of the résumé should be professional. Nicknames should not be included; neither should age, race, or social security number be disclosed. E-mail addresses need to be professional as well, nothing questionable such as "naughtyangel@yahoo.com" or "cartmansucks2@gmail.com"; instead something simple like "johnsmith17@gmail.com" would be ideal.

Ocampo mentioned a recent trend in the recruiting process that utilizes online communities such as MySpace and Facebook. Recruiters today are checking the various social networking tools on the internet to find out more about potential employees. Therefore, it is best not to post anything inappropriate since there is a possibility that the employer may come across them.

Ocampo concluded the résumé writing workshop by leading a résumé-critiquing session and holding a résumé contest for the members of the colony. Winners of the contest were John Lough and Joey Chang.

The Consulting Industry

(Presented by Rob Campbell and Taylor Lapsys of Kuhler & Associates) February 4, 2008

On February 4, 2008, the members of the Sigma Beta lota colony of Delta Sigma Pi attended a professional event on the consulting industry presented by Kuhler & Associates.

If asked what they want to do after graduating, many of our members would likely respond by saying they want to get into consulting. But if asked for specific details, most would have no idea what kind of consulting they want to get into or even what being a consultant really entails. Fortunately, Kuhler & Associates, a small tax advisory firm based in Newport Beach, was kind enough to send two of their consultants to UCI to share their experiences with the consulting industry and answer any questions that Sigma Beta lota members might have.

Rob Campbell, director of field consulting, and one his staff, Taylor Lapsys, began their presentation by testing our members' knowledge on what a consultant really does. After members offered some answers, Rob explained that consultants are just people called in to fix problems that are beyond the capabilities of a company's in-house staff. As an example of this, they elaborated on how Kuhler & Associates specializes in obtaining California enterprise zone tax credits for employers throughout California. Most large accounting firms, such as the big four, do not bother with such a niche part of the tax law so Kuhler & Associates has almost no direct competition and is one of the only firms to offer comprehensive services in this area.

Campbell and Lapsys continued with many stories of what a typical day was like for them as tax consultants and stressed that one of the most important things to have in any industry is interpersonal skills. For instance, Mr. Campbell said that Kuhler & Associates was able to expand rapidly in three years because they pride themselves on face to face interaction with their clients that set them apart from firms that treated their clients as just another number. Good communication skills are also crucial in adapting to the varying personalities of clients since there is not a one size fits all approach to explaining your product or convincing clients that they actually need it.

After getting a better idea of what the consulting industry was like, our members began to raise questions about how to get in and/or choose the right firm to work at. Mr. Campbell answered by saying that since he joined Kuhler & Associates he has never regretted working at a smaller firm. He says that building his career in such an environment allowed him much more autonomy and exposure to different things than a bigger firm, which probably would have just limited him to preparing one kind of tax form.

As one of only thirty some employees, Mr. Campbell also felt he was able to make a more significant impact on the success of the entire firm than if he were one of thousands of employees at a big firm.

Regarding how to get into consulting, Mr. Lapsys told members that the most important thing in getting any job after college was to first have prior experience working part-time in a professional setting and really working on obtaining core technical skills in applications like Excel. Mr. Campbell followed up by advising members to make use of recruiting or "headhunter" services, especially if they planned on targeting smaller firms, because many small firms use them in lieu of having a recruiter in-house. They concluded their presentation by describing their internship opportunities and holding a short networking session with our members.



Interview Techniques

(Presented by Yu-Kai Chou and Jun Loayza of FD World) February 7, 2008

On February 7, 2008, the members of the Sigma Beta lota colony of Delta Sigma Pi attended a professional event on interview techniques presented by Yu-Kai Chou and Jun Loayza of FD World.

It was halfway into the internship recruiting season and many Sigma Beta lota members were being contacted to schedule interviews for summer internships. Doing well in interviews is one of the most crucial parts of the job searching process and usually it's also the hardest. Therefore, to help the members meet their interviews with confidence and develop interview skills to amaze their prospective employers, Sigma Beta lota invited speakers from Future Delivery (FD), a company founded to facilitate "recruitment, business development, and networking for students and professionals in a fun, productive virtual environment".

Yu-Kai Chou, CEO and founder of FD, and Jun Loayza, Chief Marketing Executive of FD, began their presentation with a brief overview of their FD Edge service. FD Edge is the coaching division of their business, offering training on every step of the job searching process.

Yu-Kai emphasized the importance of their services by saying that most undergraduates have only brought out 15-30% of the potential in their résumés. Jun also claimed that students have no idea how to stand out in career fairs, maintain the positive attention of recruiters, and correspond correctly with employers, all of which ends up playing a part in the interview process. They claimed that the preparation you do before the interview can be as important in the whole process as the interview itself.

According to Jun, recruiters and managers look not only for people with technical abilities but also people that they want to work with everyday. Jun advises the colony members to attend all recruiting events, like career fairs, and build a positive "subconscious recognition" in the minds of the recruiters and professionals attending the events. The best way to do this is to talk to them about anything except their jobs when networking, everyone else asks them what working at their firm is like and what they do so talking about something else will leave a more unique impression. After doing all this and hopefully getting an interview they recommend getting a list of common interview questions and practicing with friends.

As the presentation moved into how to get through the actual interview, Jun and Yu-Kai first went over some fundamentals to leaving a good impression. Yu-Kai told members to always smile because interviewers might not always remember exact answers to questions but rather what they felt about the answers.

Furthermore, to avoid the typical question and answer format Jun suggests it is essential to answer questions with concise and hopefully unique stories to interest the interviewer and potentially lead into a conversation. Asking intellectual and relevant questions about the position or the company is also another way to really stand out from the crowds. For instance, if the CFO of the company recently stepped down, asking about it will demonstrate knowledge about the company and might even put some pressure on the interviewer.

They concluded the presentation by going over how to answer some of the most common questions like "tell me about yourself", "why you?", and "what are your 3 greatest strengths/weaknesses". The speakers were then able to take a short break before an enthusiastic networking session concluded the events of the evening.



How Does Southern California Edison provide power efficiently and effectively? (Presented by Linda Low, Kyle Addiss, and Juliet Murphy of Southern California Edison) Monday, February 11, 2008

On February 11, 2008, the members of the Sigma Beta lota colony of Delta Sigma Pi attended a professional event on the energy industry presented by Southern California Edison.

How California gets its power has always been problematic. However the recent petroleum crisis has spurred an eclectic amount of innovations to produce reusable energy efficiently. The state and privately owned companies have already spent billions in research and development to find the silver bullet that can resolve California's gargantuan demand for electricity. Given that, Sigma Beta Iota, a colony of Delta Sigma Pi, invited Linda Low, Kyle Addiss, and Juliet Murphy from Southern California Edison to the University of California, Irvine to teach the colony members how SCE are on the frontlines in alleviating this statewide energy crisis.

Linda Low is a manager from the customer service department for Southern California Edison located in Rosemead, CA. She has worked in Southern California Edison for nearly eight years and shared with the colony how Southern California Edison empowers customer to become key contributor to the energy solution.

Today's Southern California Edison is the product of more than a century of providing reliable electric service to central, coastal and southern California. They've helped their customers stretch their energy dollars through rebates, which can be redeemed through SCE's awardwinning energy efficiency programs. Customers can receive incentives for helping to control power demand through "demand-response" programs, which help to keep wholesale supplies and prices under control.

As part of their commitment to environmental protection, the electric power provided to customers includes more alternate and renewable energy (16.7%), from a greater variety of resources than nearly any other utility in the world. SCE has been active in efforts to improve Southern California air quality since the 1940s. SCE is also an active donor to community and educational causes. SCE employee volunteers annually donate more than 700,000 hours of work to community and non-profit organizations.

The Financial Services Industry (Presented by David Keithly of Capital Group Companies) February 25, 2008

On February 25, 2008, the members of the Sigma Beta Iota colony of Delta Sigma Pi attended a professional event on the financial services industry presented by David Keithly of Capital Group.

Many large financial services firm do not recruit from UC Irvine, due to the lack of a finance major. Most Sigma Beta lota members have thus found it difficult to learn more about this exciting industry. With the vast majority of members majoring in economics, there has been a definite interest in the field of financial services and the many different careers it has to offer. To help members get more exposure to the industry, Sigma Beta lota invited a speaker from the Capital Group Companies, one of the largest mutual fund providers in the US, to present an overview of the different types of financial services.

David Keithly, a team manager at Capital Group Companies' Orange County office, began by introducing the services Capital Group Companies provide and a brief history of the financial services industry. David explained that the contemporary financial services industry has only been around since 1999. The Glass-Steagal Act of 1933 split the banking sector between commercial banks and investment banks, banning commercial banks from investing in equity securities in an effort to prevent a financial crisis like the Great Depression from reoccurring. However, this act was repealed in 1999 with the passing of the Gramm-Leach-Bliley Act, which once again allowed banks and other financial service providers to consolidate and offer a wide range of services. The industry then experienced rapid growth, increasing its market share in the S&P500 index from 13.1% in 1999 to 20.3% in 2004.

Following this brief history, David went on to inform members of the different types of financial services and lists of some of the largest firms that offer each service. The four main categories of financial services are banking, investment, insurance and intermediation or advisory services. Banking is further divided into regular retail banks that offer the day to day banking services used by common people, private banks that cater to very high net-worth individuals, and capital market banks that raise capital for corporate clients. Capital Group Companies falls under the investment branch of financial services, which mainly involves asset management in the form of running various types of investment funds. The insurance sector also makes up a large part of financial services by offering insurance brokering, insurance underwriting, and reinsurance of insurers themselves.

Finally, there are the intermediation or advisory services, which is probably what most people think of when referring to financial services. This category includes the stock brokers and discount brokers that advise both individuals and institutions in their investment decisions and executes the actual trading on financial exchanges.

David wrapped up his presentation by describing some of the opportunities available at Capital Group Companies and explaining why they are a great way to gain experience working in the financial services. The event drew to a close after interested members spent some time networking with David.

The group hopes to provide a network of support services to promote the personal, social, cultural and academic wellbeing of UCI's diverse student body. The group hosts different events for the student body and for the community surrounding the university.

The Orange County Food Bank distributes 17 million pounds of food annually. The food bank also attends to 24,000 citizens of the community each month. Additionally, the food bank provides personal care items and food to 300 non-profit service organizations. The food bank typically assists the homeless, disabled, seniors on fixed incomes and the unemployed.

The members of Sigma Beta lota met with other volunteers from other clubs on campus at the Orange County Food Bank. There were hundreds of other volunteers waiting for the event to begin. A representative from the food bank gave a speech honoring Martin Luther King Jr. and gave instructions as to how the event was going to unfold.

The volunteers were split into groups of 30 and worked was working on assembly lines to create boxes full of food. The boxes we were making were for the elderly that had specific nutritious needs. The cardboard boxes first need to be assembled, then each volunteer placed a single canned or preserved food item into the boxes in an assembly line. Items included apple juice, rice, grape juice, and cereal. The boxes were then sealed and moved to another storage location. The shift lasted for four hours, and our line made a total of one thousand and seventy two boxes during our shift.





The Kiwanis Club of Huntington Beach decided to gather donated clothes and box them to be sent to these outer regions. As the regions that the Kiwanis Club of Huntington Beach decided to help are considered volatile, they have decided to have the donations be shipped with the army to these regions.

Bolsa Chica Wetlands Restoration (Hosted by The Bolsa Chica Stewards) March 2, 2008

On March 2, 2008, the members of the Sigma Beta lota colony of Delta Sigma Pi attended a community service event to help restore native plants in the Bolsa Chica wetlands.

The Bolsa Chica Stewards, the Restoration Team of Bolsa Chica Land Trust, were the hosts of the event. Their director, Kim Kolpin, and his team of volunteers have dedicated their time to restore the natural habitat of plants and animals of the land for the last 12 years. They work alongside the California Department of Fish and Game to protect the Reserve and prevent it from being industrialized.

The Bolsa Chica Stewards is composed of volunteers that try to give back to nature by restoring the ecosystem that people have disrupted over time. So far, they have replanted over 13,000 native plants on the Reserve. They hold this event twice every month where they do a variety of tasks. From October to April, the Bolsa Chica Stewards focus on planting native plants. During the other months, they work on taking care of the plants and the maintenance of any project that is needed to be done.

At this event, all volunteers were to aid in the planting process. Volunteers ranged from high school to those who are in their retirement. There were about fifty volunteers in total. The leader of the event gave instructions on what to do as well as a brief history of what the Bolsa Chica Stewards do and what they have accomplished. Then, everyone drove from the meeting location to the wetlands near Huntington Beach.

Sigma Beta lota made up about half of the volunteers. First, everyone was put into groups of about two and began to remove non-native plants that would endanger the native plants. The reason why the non-native plants needed to be extracted was because they block sunlight and they devour up all the water. Six people assisted the leader in carrying and placing the plants in locations where holes were to be dug. Then, the volunteers were instructed on how to plant. The plants have to be planted in a specific way in order for them to survive or they would otherwise die. With proper techniques, the survival rate would increase to sixty to eighty percent from forty percent. The event lasted for about three and a half hours where Sigma Beta lota planted about forty plants out of sixty.

Canned Food Drive (Hosted by Western Service Workers Association) March 3, 2008

On March 3, 2008, the members of the Sigma Beta lota colony of Delta Sigma Pi volunteered in a canned food drive organized by the non-profit organization Western Service Workers Association (WSWA).

This particular canned food drive is one of many events WSWA holds in an effort to assist their members in need. Colony members went door-to-door in residential areas to ask for donations of canned food. Donated goods went to the low-income homes that the organization supports. WSWA keeps track of which houses have already been asked to donate food, and for each new food drive, they are able to cover new areas. Sigma Beta lota was able to contribute to this mission due to the high number of volunteers. Colony members were able to cover six blocks in one hour. The food collected will go to the families whose members work minimum wage jobs and are unable to support themselves with that meager income. Many are forced to work two jobs, suffer from debt, or just do not have enough to eat. Food drives are just one way WSWA assists its struggling members.

WSWA is an all-volunteer effort, community supported association that has been organizing service, domestic, and other low-paid workers in Orange County, California. Their goal is to assist these people in gaining greater control of their lives through their participation in the organization. The organization is for low income workers who are receiving minimum wage. More and more members face unemployment, part-time jobs, or use temporary agencies. WSWA aims at organizing to improve these peoples living and working conditions. The participants of the organization receive the food collected in food drives such as the one Sigma Beta lota participated in. Many different companies (large and small) such as Walmart sponsor this WSWA as well.

The food drive Sigma Beta lota volunteered for is one of the many food drives that WSWA has. The goal of their food drive is 1,000 cans. The objective of this event was 100 pledges or 50 contacts. WSWA does food distributions three times a week. This non-profit organization recognizes the rising prices of food and other necessities and desires to help out these struggling families by providing them with food. This small relief allows them to focus their money on other things such as car payments, insurance, etc.

At the event, all the members walked through the neighborhoods near Michelson and Culver in the city of Irvine. The colony split into groups of two and went door to door down different streets speaking to the residents on Hopkins Street, Angell Street, Bascom Street, Gillman Street, Mann Street, Norton Street, Butler Street and Elm Free Lane. For each house on these streets, volunteers knocked on doors and recited a script that WSWA had already prepared. In summary, it described what WSWA is, what the event was, where the food goes and when the volunteers would return to collect the canned food. For the homes that were willing to help out, colony members left a reminder flyer and wrote down their phone number. One of the members actually got food donations on the spot.

Something taught in school is that there is enough food in the world to feed everyone, but due to unequal distribution, people still starve. Organizations such as WSWA ensure that everyone in the community has a full stomach and that no child should go hungry just because their parents have a job does not pay enough. Sigma Beta lota had the opportunity to help fight for WSWA's cause and bring some relief to low-income families.


Aside from school-related work, Mr. Nguyen participates in a business club, Undergraduate Business Association, and participates in various recreational sports such as running and tennis.


As a second-year student, Ms. Yu is constantly looking for internship opportunities. She is actively seeking opportunities to network with recruiters and attends many recruiting events
