The professionalism and quality of the programs Delta Sigma Pi has presented recently have been phenomenal and extremely well received. I believe this explains the rise in the membership, as well as its standing in the university community. This colony has definitely "earned its stripes." Some of the high-profile events Delta Sigma Pi sponsored this year alone include a mock interview event where students were instructed by and then got to practice with experienced interviewers from seven companies including Publix Supermarkets, Outback Steakhouse, and Target, and a resume workshop led by USF Career specialist Mary Mittag and Carol Osborne, Professor of Marketing. The workshop included actual critiquing of members' resumes. USFP serves students from throughout west central Florida. The polytechnic model emerged as a result of intense community engagement and was formalized in USFP's strategic plan, adopted in 2007. USFP students pursue degrees and certificates in over 20 degree programs and certificate programs and have learned to expect a multi-disciplinary focus, hands-on learning, real-world application, and a supportive campus community.

Since 1988, USFP has occupied a joint-use campus in Lakeland with Polk Community Collegeand is now engaged in the process of building a new campus at the eastern intersection of I-4 and the Polk Parkway, between Lakeland and Auburndale at the heart of Florida's High Tech Corridor.

USFP's current campus is located within 20 minutes of the downtown districts of Lakeland, Winter Haven and Bartow and within an hour of international airports in Tampa and Orlando. Area residents enjoy easy access to metropolitan amenities such as world class entertainment, professional sports (NFL, MLB, NBA and NHL franchises, as well as a host of minor league teams), Big East athletics, varied shopping and dining options, and a superb quality of life. Polk County was recently named an "All-America County," the only county so designated in 2007.

The University of South Florida Polytechnic was established as USF Lakeland in 1988 to serve the citizens of Polk, Highlands, Hardee and eastern Hillsborough counties in a regional setting. It has since evolved to become Florida's only polytechnic university. The University of South Florida is accredited by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (1866 Southern Lane, Decatur, Georgia 30033-4097; telephone 404.679.4500) to award degrees at the baccalaureate, master's, specialist, and doctoral levels, including the Doctor of Medicine.

The institution was initially accredited in 1965 and was last reviewed and reaffirmed in 2005. The institution is scheduled to receive its next reaffirmation of accreditation review in 2015.

1982: The state Legislature authorizes funds to begin planning of the USF Lakeland campus. After finding a high demand for the new educational facility, the presidents of Polk Community College and USF send a letter to Florida's Post-Secondary Education Planning Commission recommending a joint PCC-USF facility in Lakeland.

1986: Rather than hold groundbreaking ceremonies on the actual site, a 130-acre orange grove at the southeast corner of U.S. 98 and Winter Lake Rd., a dinner is held in the Lakeland Center with the theme "PCC/USF: An Idea That Sparks The Imagination." Dirt from the site is brought to the Lakeland Center and piled on a raised platform where a robot digs into the ground and says, "I dig PCC/USF Lakeland."

1988: USF Lakeland begins classes on Jan. 6, providing public higher education through the master's degree level for the first time in Polk County. The first of eight buildings, the Curtis Peterson Academic Center (named in honor of the state senator who was instrumental in obtaining funding) opens on the PCC/USF Lakeland campus.

1989: Nearly 2,000 students attend classes on the PCC/USF Lakeland campus (1,486 PCC students and 487 USF students). With enrollment surpassing expectations there is pressure for a second building.

1991: A second academic building (known as the Learning Center) opens. It features a large joint-use library, learning labs, general classrooms, computer classrooms and faculty offices.

2003: The Florida Legislature approves funding of a third academic building on the PCC/USF Lakeland campus. The effort was spearheaded by State Senator J.D. Alexander.

2004: Ground is broken for the \$32 million Lakeland Technology Building and renovation of the two existing academic buildings.

2007: The Lakeland Technology Building opens for classes. PCC and USF continue to expand the educational opportunities available to the community. USF Lakeland also goes beyond the walls of the primary campus and provides many full degree programs at various off-campus sites.

2008: USF Polytechnic receives its new name and serves over 2,500 students. USFP offers over 20 complete undergraduate and graduate degrees through the divisions of Applied Arts and Sciences, Business, and Education. The campus also supports a variety of individual classes, electives, web-based courses, certificate programs and program partnerships with the main campus in Tampa.

guests present.









