Since returning home to Hawaii after graduation from Loyola Marymount University of Los Angeles, in May 2011, I have had the honor and privilege to serve as an unofficial advisor for the students of the Upsilon Eta Mu Colony of Delta Sigma Pi at the University of Hawaii at Manoa. I am now extremely grateful at this time for the opportunity to offer my full endorsement of this colony and strongly recommend that the Board of Directors take immediate action to approve their petition for a chapter charter.

This effort to build and sustain a strong and sustainable colony effort has been almost two years in the making now. History of O'ahu

Early back in history, around 500 AD, the first inhabitants of O'ahu settled themselves in Hawaii. These original settlers were comprised of mostly people from Tahiti who sailed and discovered the islands.

In January of 1778, O'ahu was recorded as the first island sighted by James Cook and his crew. Fortunately for him, even though he was just a European traveler, he was mistaken by the Hawaiians as the "God of Harvests" and was welcomed and treated well. However, his luck ran out about a year later when he was killed during a dispute with some people of the tribe.

During this period of history on the islands, a system of taboos, human sacrifices and "kapu" (known as a "keep out" system") helped define the early culture of Hawaii and distinguished the royalty from local people. Amongst the community of royalty distinguished from commoners, several rival chiefs were competing to get control of Hawaii. In the end of all the battles, King Kamehameha the Great achieved victory and eventually won control of all the Hawaiian Islands (with Oahu, being the last independent island to fall to his power). Through Kamehameha's reign, O'ahu became a thriving place of commerce.

After King Kamehameha the Great's death, O'ahu began to develop more fully and continue to become a center of commerce and trade. It wasn't until King Kamehameha III's reign that religious freedom, and national legislature was formed for further unification and organization of the island.

Throughout the history of O'ahu, there were many male monarchs, but the last one was King Kalakaua. It was under his reign that the Hawaii State Anthem, "Hawaii Ponoi," was developed, and the anthem is still sung today in the islands of Hawaii, right after the national anthem.

Once Kalakaua passed away, the throne was given to Queen Liliuokalani - but not for long. During her time as Queen, businessmen from North America enacted a coup that declared Hawaii as theirs. The United States president, Grover Cleveland, did not take any action to protect the native Hawaiians so in result, Hawaii was formally annexed in 1898.

In the 1900's, as American territory, many of the native Hawaiians died out from foreign diseases brought to the island while thousands of Japanese immigrants came to Hawaii and worked on the sugar cane and pineapple fields.

Forty-one years later, in December of 1941, Pearl Harbor got bombed by Japan and over 2,000 Americans were killed. Today, the memorial is still a popular visiting place, as many people from all over the world come to visit the memorial and remembers those lost.

In fact, thousands of people visit Oahu everyday and the tourism industry is the main supporter of Oahu's economy. Not only is Oahu looked at as paradise by many visitors, but it has the best of both worlds, offering a city (Waikiki), and countryside areas such as North Shore.

History of the University of Hawaii at Manoa

The University of Hawaii at Manoa was founded in 1907 as a land-grant college of agriculture and mechanic arts. It actually started off with only thirteen faculty members and a total of only

ten students. Although at the time it was located near Thomas Square in Honolulu, in 1912, the college moved to its current location in Manoa and was formally named the College of Hawaii. At this time, the college



only had one main building (known today as Hawaii Hall: shown right).

In 1920, the College of Hawaii was renamed to the University of Hawaii and continued to grow and expand throughout the 1930's. In December 1941, Pearl Harbor was attacked and classes were cancelled for two months. A year later, with a pretty big population of students with Japanese ancestry, a group called "Victory Volunteers" formed and many of these group members joined the 442nd Regiment and 100th Infantry Batallion - which is a famous United States Army Regimental Combat Team known for their slogan, "Go for broke."

As the university continued to grow, it was once again renamed in 1972 as the University of Hawaii at Manoa. In addition, the law school of the university opened up a year later in 1973.

With its remote and unique location, University of Hawai'i: Manoa began to lead academic and research world in newly, different directions. Pacific and Asian cultures began venturing to UH creating a new perspective on research. With the help of extramural grants and generous donations, UH:Manoa led the advancement of research in astronomy, marine biology, and geographical research. University of Hawai'i: Manoa is proud to have the ATST (Advanced Technology Solar Telescope) located on Maui's Haleakala to study the sun's activity. Also, the university is home to the world's only coral reef research center. By studying the ocean's geography, students and scientist preserve the ocean's reef.

In 1949, Shidler's College of Business opened up as the business department for University of Hawai'i. Over the years, Shidler thrived in offering students various career opportunities, scholarships, international study, entrepreneurship, and many more. Due to Hawai'i's remote location, Shidler began looking into international professors for the betterment of business acumen, study, and progression. In 2011, the United States News & and World Report established Shidler College of Business one of the top 25 international business graduate programs in the United States.

Years later, in 1965, University of Hawai'i: Manoa added John A. Burns School of Medicine. Funded by the tobacco plantations' monetary resources, the school of medicine thrived in expanding their department and school. Because of its growing popularity and

unique study of plants and resources, the United States, provided the school various grants and generous donations. These investments did pay dividends in the end. The Liaison Committee on Medical Education accredited the medical school allowing more federal grants to come in.

One of only 32 institutions nationwide to hold the distinction of being a land-, sea-, and space-grant research institution, UH Mānoa is ranked in the top 30 public universities in federal research funding for engineering and science and 49th overall by the National Science Foundation. In 2009, UH Mānoa received \$330 million in awards, with research grants reaching \$216 million and non-research awards reaching \$114 million. Seven of UH Manoa's faculty are currently members of the National Academy of Sciences, the National Academy of Engineering and the National Institute of Medicine.

Classified by the Carnegie Foundation as having "very high research activity," UH Manoa is known for its pioneering research in such fields as oceanography, astronomy, Pacific Islands and Asian area studies, linguistics, cancer research, and genetics.

The University of Hawai'i at Manoa boasts a low 14:1 student to teacher ratio as well as a degree in a variety of fields. With a medium sized student population of 20,429 and 1,229 full-time faculty members, much attention is given to students at UH Mānoa.

Not only does UH offer over 200 student organizations, more specifically (as of Fall 2010), UH Mānoa provides Bachelor's degrees in 92 fields, Master's degrees in 84 fields, Doctoral degrees in 51 fields, and Professional degrees in three fields. The alumni population is staggering as is the accomplishments and list of notable graduates who are leaders in their field today.



History of the Shidler College of Business

The Shidler College of Business was established in 1949, offering courses in accounting, economics, and industrial relations. It was based in Hawaii Hall on the University of Hawaii at Manoa campus. The College of Business Administration, as it was known at the time, benefited from the social and economic boom in post-war Hawaii and by the early '60's had expanded their curriculum to include management, finance, personnel, and statistics.

In 1967, the College of Business Administration received a national accreditation from the American Association of Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB), adding legitimacy to its programs and ranking it among other top business colleges across the nation. Two years later, the College's enrollment was such that it was quickly outgrowing its place at Hawaii Hall. Through a grant from the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, a new building was commissioned for the College. In 1971, the building was completed, and the College of Business Administration moved into its new facilities where it is still located today.

In 2006, Jay Shidler, a former UH business college student and real estate mogul donated \$25 million dollars to the school. In lieu of his generous contribution to the College, the Board of Regents decided to rename the school, and it has been called the Shidler College of Business ever since.

The College offers multiple undergraduate degrees in fields such as accounting, entrepreneurship, finance, human resource management, international business, management, marketing, and management information systems as well as Master degrees in financial engineering, accounting, China International, U.S. International, and Japan.

University of Hawaii at Manoa: Department of Economics

History:

Economics have been present at the University of Hawaii at Manoa since its opening in 1907 with Mildred Yoder as teacher to Hawaii's first course in economics. Toward the end of the 1930s, the university added a Master's degree in Business and Economics. The faculty of the Economics department was separated from the Business department in 1950 when the new college of Business Administration opened in September of that year. Faculty members continued to teach in both disciplines until the 1962-1963 school year when the faculty of the Economics department no longer included faculty of the Business department. The department moved from Spalding Hall to Saunders Hall in 1974; which was referred to as Porteus Hall at the time. Today Economics remain a separate department within the Colleges of Arts and Sciences.

The school year of 1962-1963 is what many faculty members consider the beginning of the modern Economics Department at the University of Hawaii as faculty was now loyal to only one department and Dr. Thomas Hamilton was just appointed President of the University. The first commercial flights to and from the islands also began that year stressing a new importance to the Economics Department of the State's largest public university. Ryuzo Sato, an associate professor, joined the department in 1963 after leaving as a faculty member at the University of Washington because of unpleasant anti-Japanese attitudes he experienced there. He quickly became chair for the Economics department at the University of Hawaii at Manoa from 1964 to 1966 before taking another faculty position at Brown University.

Sukhdev Shah became the first graduate from the University of Hawaii at Manoa's doctoral program in Economics in the Fall of 1973. Most of the students in the program were from East or South Asia and were likely to return after receiving their degrees. One of said graduates was Ae Sil Kim who became the first woman from Korea to have a Ph.D. in Economics. Shigeyuki Abe, another graduate, went on to teach at one of Japan's most prestigious universities; Kyoto University. Professors, as well as graduates, also left the University to move on to better plateaus such as Economics Professor Youngil Lim who took a position at the United Nations in Vienna, Austria in 1981.

At the time of this report, the chair for the Department of Economics is Professor Byron Gangnes who have taught at the University of Hawaii at Manoa for 22 years starting in August of 1990. Professor Gangnes researches as well as teaches international economics at the university and emphasizes on economic relationships between the U.S. and Asian economies.

Requirements for degrees in Economics:

Requirements for a Bachelor of Arts in Economics at the University of Hawaii at Manoa requires a minimum of 24 credits from Econ 130, 131, 300, 301, 321, three 300+ Upper Division Economics courses, and two 400+ Upper Division Economics courses. A minor in Economics at the University of Hawaii at Manoa requires 15 credits of upper division courses including Econ 300 and Econ 301. All courses toward a Bachelors of Art or minor in Economics must be passed with a grade of C or better.

A Masters in Economics require a minimum of 30 credit hours in Economics with 21 credit hours from 600- or 700-level courses, two semesters of residence, and an individual research project or a master's thesis. Credit from Economics courses 300-level and below will not be considered for this program. All courses toward a

Masters in Economics must be passed with a grade of B or better and be completed within seven years of admission.

A PhD in Economics require a minimum of three semesters in residence, a research paper, an oral comprehensive exam, a final oral exam, completion of qualifying examinations in microeconomic theory and macroeconomic theory, final dissertation manuscript submitted to the Graduate Division, completion of Econ 627, 628, 629 with a grade of B- or better, and an additional completion of seven 600- and 700- level courses in Economics. Applicants must also choose two fields from a list of five fields offered by the Department of Economics at the University of Hawaii at Manoa. All requirements toward a PhD in Economics must be completed within seven years of admission.

University of Hawaii at Manoa: Travel Industry Management (TIM) Department

The school of Travel Industry Management (TIM) was founded in 1966 and has had a rich history of innovation, growth, and change which brought it to its current status as one of the most respected programs, worldwide, in the field of hospitality, tourism, and transportation management. The TIM focus pioneered the concept of integrating all aspects of the travel industry under a single discipline built on a foundation of management science.

Located in the heart of the Pacific, the University of Hawaii's

is the leading professional
institution in the development and
education on all aspects of the
travel industry in the Pacific. The



school focuses highly on the fields of hospitality, tourism and transportation management. It is well known for its diverse and highly published faculty, who are involved in research and service in addition to their teaching activities. Due to its prime location, the school specializes in the Asia-Pacific region, however, the faculty as well as student body come from all over the world. The School also benefits from strong industry relations with travel, hospitality, accommodations, restaurant, tourism and transportation organizations all over Hawaii who are involved directly with School's activities and programs. The School is very student oriented with

excellent academic advising services and multiple professional clubs and activities designed to enrich the educational experience of students.

The TIM school offers its students two areas of focus in their pursuit of the BS degree: hospitality management and



tourism/transportation management. Each focus has a selection of courses that helps to strengthen each student's experience in their chosen area of travel industry management. The school strives to develop its students into

competent management professionals who are keen in the travel industry; the TIM program is able to do this through a curriculum that enables students to develop the leadership, communication, and problem-solving skills needed in the dynamic industry.

Since the University of Hawaii's TIM school is located such a diverse region of the world, the curriculum contains a global nature which is unmatched by other schools. Students are able to focus on the role and responsibilities that the travel industry has within the state, region, nation, and world. Students are also able to touch upon service-based enterprises, business ethics, and societal constraints. In addition to this wide-range of knowledge, students also gain practical knowledge regarding the operational aspects of the industry and develop "reality skills" within their chosen field of interest.

Of the fields of interest offered by the school, hospitality management attempts to arm students with the ability to apply problem-solving, decision-making, and critical-thinking skills to meet current and future industry challenges. The hospitality management focus emphasizes the relationship of the various constituencies in the management and operation of hospitality businesses, such as lodging and food services. Management of hotel and food establishments, food quality management, hospitality financial

control, advertising, and event management are just a few of the areas covered by the TIM school's impressive hospitality management program.

The second focus in the TIM school is the tourism and transportation industry management path. Students are exposed to

courses in both tourism as well as transportation and can choose to either focus on one or both of these disciplines. Tourism management covers destination management, travel distribution systems, marketing, geography, culture, and


The TIM school currently has five student clubs that provide opportunities for students to interact with their peers, meet industry professionals, and practice leadership skills through a wide variety of activities. These clubs include: Travel Industry Management Student Association, Club Managers' Association of America, Pacific Asia Travel Association, Young SKAL, and Eta Sigma Delta.

The School of Travel Industry Management offers high quality, accredited degrees and professional educational programs including:

- Bachelor of Science Degree with an emphasis in hospitality, tourism or transportation management and includes an extensive internship experience.
- Master of Science Degree in travel industry management.
- e-TIM Graduate Certificate Program (offered entirely on-line)
- Executive Development Institute for Tourism (EDIT)
- · Hawaii International Hotel Institute (HIHI)

Requirements for students entering the School of Travel Industry Management:

- Admissible to UH Manoa, which is a 2.0 cumulative transfer GPA for Hawai'i residents, and a 2.5 cumulative transfer GPA for non-Hawai'i residents.
- Evidence of potential for success in the travel industry, including, but not limited to, (a) participation in co-curricular activities in school or in the community, (b) personal recommendations, and (c) part-time or summer work experience.



Upsilon Eta Mu Colony The history

The Delta Sigma Pi: Upsilon Eta Mu Colony first started up in the fall of 2010 when Clayton Chong (A Deltasig alumnus who lives in Hilo, Hawaii) approached a couple of business majors at University of Hawaii at Mānoa. Eventually, they got others to join them in starting up a colony. Among these people were Anamarie Monkoski, Casey Wang, Jason Yim, Jason Crawford, Anisha Desai and Kenny Grant. Within Fall of 2010 and Spring of 2011, this group worked on spreading the word and even produced the colony's first t-shirts - which they also sold to the Hilo chapter.

In Fall of 2011, Kira Kawakami, a brother from Syracuse University's Xi Tau Chapter, transferred to UH Mānoa and jumped on board to help the colony to become a full-fledged chapter. During this time, Kira became President of the colony and the colony continued to grow to a group of about 10 people. Fortunately, the colony got in contact with the 2011 Collegian of the Year, Cody Silva and had the opportunity to work with him to establish the groundwork of the colony.

Throughout the fall semester, the colony worked on spreading the word about DSP around campus and the business school, and started organized and putting on fundraisers, community service, professional and social events. Some of the events included a professional workshop with Ryan Davis (a DSP alumnus), speakers from Enterprise Rental Car Company to discuss valuable networking skills, volunteering at the Palolo Retirement Home, and going to Dave and Busters for dinner and games.

While the organization of the colony started to come together and members got more of a sense of how Delta Sigma Pi is different from just any other club, the Upsilon Eta Mu Colony also experienced many obstacles. While figuring out what fundraisers work the best was one challenge, a major obstacle that the colony had to work with was how to get others aware of DSP. This was a challenge because unlike many colleges on the mainland, Hawaii has a very small Greek life. In fact, less than 1% of the campus is associated with any kind of Greek life (professional, social, etc). In addition, many prospective members in the beginning though that they could be a member of DSP and not be actively involved or show up to any events (as students often to in other business clubs). Another obstacle they had to face, had to do with the Shidler College of Business. In this school, there is a student organization called the Inter-Business Council (IBC). This organization was basically comprised of the business school clubs and had all the connections with the business school as well. In the fall semester, the colony felt that they should be a part of the IBC to become more widely recognized in the business school and to be able to work with other clubs. Despite a solid presentation by the president, Kira Kawakami, and Cody Silva, Delta Sigma Pi was not accepted into IBC due to other clubs not being sure of allowing another professional co-ed fraternity (other than Pi Sigma Epsilon) and even being threatened of the fact that DSP was a new organization to campus, but was quickly gaining momentum and strength.

Through overcoming all the obstacles thrown at them, the colony only grew stronger. By the spring of 2012, the colony had approximately 50 members, a few members attended the San Diego La Jolla Provincial Lead Conference, the colony built its structure and was more organized and a lot of substantial amount of progress was made. By the time Dale Clark visited the colony in mid spring, the colony was just about completed with all of the event requirements and after a second attempt of presenting in front of IBC, DSP was successfully accepted into the IBC group of the Shidler College of Business and became more widely0known throughout the business school.

As summer approached, several students changed their major to a non-business one, or dropped out due to them not being able to full

commit to being active (since they were members of other clubs, or they felt they couldn't dedicate their time enough). However, the colony did not let this affect them. They held elections, a new board of executive officers was chosen, and they were determined and excited to work on the petition over the summer. Currently, with 30 members, the members of the Upsilon Eta Mu Colony is ready and eager to have the colony installed as a new chapter in Oahu, and to finally become Delta Sigma Pi Brothers after all their hard work.


COMMUNITY SERVICE

Caine Nakata, Road to Success: December 2nd, 2011




"We Bring you Solutions for Life"




Resume Workshop: January 27th, 2012

Mock Interviews and Networking Event: April 18th, 2012





Dave and Busters: The colony got together for dinner and a night







Jeremy Lum




RYAN ACIE GOO


