The History of The University of Texas at Dallas

Introduction

The University of Texas at Dallas is a Carnegie R1 classification institute, denoting "Highest Research Activity," first established as a public research institution by the founders of Texas Instruments, Eugene McDermott, J. Erik Jonsson, and Cecil Green. UT Dallas is located in Richardson, Texas, less than 20 miles north of Downtown Dallas, and sprawls over 500 acres. After eventually joining the University of Texas Systems in 1969, The University of Texas at Dallas has helped students pursue higher education in over 138 programs across eight different schools including: Arts & Humanities, Arts, Technology, & Emerging Communication, Behavioral & Brain Sciences, Economic, Political, & Policy Sciences, Engineering and Computer Science, Interdisciplinary Studies, Management, and Natural Sciences & Mathematics. The University enrolls approximately 28,000 students – 18,500 Undergraduates & 9,500 Graduates - through its offering of bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degrees.

The most popular programs offered at the university are within the schools of Behavioral and Brain Science, Engineering and Computer Science, and Management. Both undergraduate and postgraduate degree programs in these respective schools are ranked among the top in the nation, as well as internationally. UT Dallas constantly focuses on improvement, and has an energetic and innovative mindset that results in sustained development in all areas. This development is aided by the recruitment of top students, Nobel Laureate, members of various National Academies, and over 560 tenured/tenure-track professors, all of whom are deeply involved on campus. In sports, UT Dallas competes in NCAA Division III athletics in the American Southwest

Conference, fielding thirteen total teams between men and women's sports. The university is most notable for its nationally recognized Chess and Debate teams.

Our Beginning/Accreditation

Under Bryce Jordan, the first University of Texas at Dallas President, the university started in July 1971 with only one building on campus--- currently known as the Founders Building. Through President Jordan's 10-year tenure, he helped acquire 275 acres of land upon which were built several new buildings, including a campus bookstore. The University of Texas at Dallas was granted accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools in 1972, and in 1973 the first diplomas were awarded. In 1975, the first undergraduates were admitted, although it wasn't until 1990 that the Texas legislature authorized freshman and sophomore students to attend the university. Throughout that span, expansion and growth was rampant with enrollment rates doubling and new programs being constantly added. This same drive and expansion continues to this day with new buildings and facilities, including parking garages powered completely by renewable energy sources, being added, or renovated, annually.

Recent Developments & Future Outlook

Throughout the 2000's, the university has embraced its growth and rapidly expanded its campus size under former President David Daniel. These plans set forth the current development and student growth experienced by the university. Since 2014, UT Dallas has new and expanded buildings for: the Jindal School of Management, the

Student Services Building, the school of Brain and Behavioral Science, the School of Engineering and Computer Science, new dormitories, four large apartment developments on campus property, and the eventual expansion of the School of Natural Science and Mathematics. Currently, The University of Texas at Dallas is led by Dr. Richard C. Benson who was appointed in 2016, and serves as only its fifth president, guiding the school as it approaches its 50th anniversary in 2019.

Overview & Rankings

The University of Texas at Dallas is located in Richardson, Texas, and was established in 1969. The school originally allowed only graduate students, and began accepting undergraduate transfer students in 1975. In 1990, the university accepted its first class of undergraduate freshmen. The University has a constant focus on innovation and expansion, something it has maintained to its core to this day, and which has recently been recognized with a Carnegie R1 classification, the highest ranking for research activity. UT Dallas is currently ranked #1 in the nation and #21 in the world on *Times Higher Education* list of colleges under 50 years of age. Additionally, *Kiplinger's Personal Finance* magazine ranked UT Dallas among the top 100 "Best Value" public colleges in the United States for 2016.



Offerings




Student / Faculty Ratio 23:1




Student Demographics



The University of Texas at Dallas has 23 conference titles since 2002, ranking as powerhouse contenders in the NCAA Division III American Southwest Conference.

There are 13 different intercollegiate teams with more than 300 student-athletes. The chess team is the most notable team on campus, having own or tied for first place in the Pan-American Intercollegiate Chess Championship 10 times since 2000.

Naveen Jindal School of Management

Background

The School of Management was founded in 1975, six years after the founding of the University of Texas at Dallas. The School of Management (SOM) is the largest of the eight individual schools at UT Dallas with more than 9,100 students enrolled (Fall 2016). In 2010, SOM was renamed the Naveen Jindal School of Management by the University of Texas Board of Regents after Naveen Jindal, a distinguished alumnus who donated a portion of a \$45 million package along with Nancy and Charles Davidson.

Rankings

In 2017, *Financial Times* ranked JSOM as 15th in research in its Top 100 Full-Time Global MBA Programs. Additionally, *U.S. News & World Report* ranked the Full-Time MBA program as 38th in the nation and tied for 16th among U.S. public universities. Additionally, the online graduate business program was ranked 2nd in *U.S. News & World Report's* 2017 Best Online Graduate Program Rankings.




Enrollment

Enrollment by Program




Undergraduate Enrollment by Major

Enrollment by Class Standings



History of the Texas-Dallas Colony

Beginning

On September 7, 2016, Jonathan Molinar reached out to the Central Office of Delta Sigma Pi with the intent to start a colony at the University of Texas at Dallas. Following communications with Central Office and Dale Clark, the Director of Chapter and Expansion Services, Jonathan met with the Associate Dean-Marilyn Kaplan and Chapter Advisor-Amy Troutman to gain assistance and approval with the intent forms.

At this point, Jonathan recruited Meher Vallabhaneni and Mariam Allahrakha in establishing the Texas-Dallas Colony on October 20, 2016. In the closing weeks of the Fall 2016 semester, Jonathan, Meher and Mariam began recruiting their officer team and planned for official recruitment events beginning in the Spring 2017 semester.

Jonathan would become the Texas-Dallas Colony President, Mariam would become the Senior Vice President and Meher would become Vice President of Finance. These three founders recruited colony members Victor Daescu (Colony Chancellor), Thuy-Mi Le (Colony VP of Professional Activities), Sessa Dasari (Colony VP of Finance/VP of Scholarships and Awards), and previous colony members Cesar Segura Gonzalez, Sindhu Senthilkumar, Ekin Bukulmez, and Nandini Singh. Together, these ten members, through weekly meetings, established basic rules and procedures for the colony and an idea of how to proceed with recruitment in the Spring 2017 semester.

Though we had lofty plans for the Texas-Dallas Colony, we began to have issues in our first semester with commitment from some of the members as co-founder Mariam Allahrakha would leave for personal reasons and Cesar Gonzalez would resign based on time commitment. Nevertheless, the colony members persisted.

First Recruiting Impacts

Through word-of-mouth recruitment, the lure of entertaining recruitment events and in-person class visitations, the Texas-Dallas Colony would expand to a total of 19 members after the first recruiting cycle, where 10 members would remain with the colony at the time of petitioning.

These members--- Jessica Saywell (VP of Alumni Relations), Rutvick Velaga (VP of Chapter Operations), Charles Hooper, Kristin Harris, and Sneha Chaturvedi—would be instrumental in the initial formation and recruitment of colony members and the initial reputation of the Texas-Dallas Colony. At this point in the colony's life, there was no technical difference between the officers and general members as President Molinar strived to have all members work together as a team to further the colony's progress. As the colony would hold weekly meetings on Sunday evenings, and officer meetings on Fridays, the members would attempt to schedule and set up professional, community service events and foster brotherhood through social events. These initial members would be key in building a sense of comradery amongst the members through team outings competing against Alpha Kappa Psi and intramural sports. The colony also worked with the Student Organization Center to obtain recognition as an on-campus organization, but was denied six months after filing for recognition for not being an "all-inclusive organization [based on majors]", leading to the search for other organizational recognition methods. For the colony, despite best efforts and intentions, the issues progressing with absent officers and members progressed, leading to the problem of high turnover rates for the first year.

Second Semester Improvements

In preparation of the second semester, the officers and members planned a new recruitment cycle, with a strong focus on professional events with VP Thuy-Mi Le taking over as the Professional Activities officer. Going into this new round of recruitment, the returning membership was as enthusiastic as ever and looked forward to bringing in a new recruitment class. President Molinar absent in the semester due to an internship and SVP Vallabhaneni absent due to study abroad opportunities, the colony was left with the search for a new interim President. VP of Finance Nandini Singh became interim President for a few weeks before ultimately resigning the temporary position due to the time commitment. In light of these difficulties, Chancellor Victor Daescu became interim President and, along with his committed remaining officer, established a crucial and successful recruitment cycle bringing membership to over 30 members.

Additionally, following the establishment of Social, Fundraising, Community Service, and Professional Development committees within the colony, the members would all breakout into their respective colonies to propose ideas and plans for future events. The Fundraising Committee began the first fundraising events toward the end of the second semester. Following the departure of VP Bukulmez, Kiran Roshanali would become the Vice President of Community Service. During this campaign, the success of the Texas-Dallas Colony would be cemented through the many professional activities, such as on-campus guest speakers and workshops, and the influx of community service opportunities in the latter half of the semester throughout their 18 events in the semester. With minimal officers on hand, especially following the departure of VP Senthilkumar, the membership of the colony became greatly dedicated to the success

of the colony and strove to further its progress in the next, and potentially final, semester as a colony.

Petitioning Semester

Following the success maintained by Interim-President Daescu and VP's Dasari, Le, Roshanali, and Saywell, the entire colony was excited at the prospect of chartering and becoming an official chapter of Delta Sigma Pi. With the return of SVP Vallabhaneni, a delayed return of President Molinar due to personal reasons, the resignation of VP Singh, and Rutvick Velaga becoming the new Vice President of Community Service, the colony would for the first time have a fully-functional and committed leadership. After the attrition of a few members, and a new recruiting cycle addition of six new members, leading to a total of thirty-five colony members. VP Velaga began the search for sponsorship through the Jindal School of Management and, following a series of difficulties, was able to start the process to become a JSOM Sponsored Organization with the help of Chapter Advisor Troutman. Additionally, following the establishment of Social, Fundraising, Community Service, and Professional Development committees within the colony, the members would all breakout into their respective colonies to propose ideas and plans for future events. In particular, the Fundraising Committee began the first fundraising events toward the end of the second semester. and working Despite high rates of turnover for the colony, especially with the loss of five original members and officers, the colony looked forward to the potential future as a chapter and the legacy the colony members could leave behind as an example for other students.

Professional Activity Events

March 22, 2017: Professional Event – Fireside Marketing Site Visit

At this event, our members visited Fireside Marketing and learned about Marketing and Advertising at an agency. Workshop

October 11, 2017: Professional Speaker – Charlie Kenney

Charlie Kenney, alum of DSP and HR business partner spoke to our group about effective resume writing. After the presentation, he personally critiqued each of our members' resumes and gave them pointers.

October 27, 2017: Professional Speaker – Charlie Hazzard

Charlie Hazzard is a professor at UT Dallas with several awards for excellence in teaching. He is a retired Executive Vice President of Oxychem and a presentation about being an effective leader – a presentation he normally reserves for Masters students.

November 5, 2017: Professional Speaker – Matt Polze

Matt Polze is the program director for the Davidson Management Honors Program at UT Dallas. He gave an inspiring speech on pursuing goals and life as a story. His presentation sparked a lot of conversation in our group and many students noted they were positively affected by his words.

November 30, 2017: Professional Event – Internship Panel

Many of our members are underclassmen who have not yet held an internship. We found it would be useful to bring in upperclassmen outside of DSP with extensive internship and job search experience to hold a panel and answer our members' questions about anything and everything in the interview and internship process. This was an incredibly helpful event but low attendance so we wanted to do it again.

December 3, 2017: Professional Speaker – Erica Tyler

Erica Tyler is a Campus Recruiting Lead at Ryan LLC. She visited UT Dallas to give our members a presentation on general professionalism and interview etiquette as well as provide information about internship opportunities at Ryan.

January 28, 2018: Professional Event – Internship Panel 2.0

We redid the internship panel from last semester with double the number of panelists, this time getting triple the attendance. Our members asked so many questions and got such valuable insight on the interview process at major companies like AT&T, Grant Thornton and Texas Instruments.

February 2, 2018: Professional Event – Ryan LLC Site Visit

Following the successful guest speaker event by Ryan LLC's campus recruiter, we visited their campus to learn more and develop a strong relationship. It was a 2-hour interactive site visit including a tour, jeopardy game, and employee panel.

February 18, 2018: Professional Event – Professional Head Shot

Workshop

To prepare for our petition to charter, as well as boost our members' LinkedIn profiles, we had a head shot session. A photographer came into our meeting with a studio backdrop set and members loved their photos!

Community Service Events

March 4, 2017- Ronald McDonald House

With three members attending the LEAD Provincial Conference in Houston, the colony contributed food and supplies via Amazon to the Ronald McDonald House on behalf of all of the members.

April 14, 2017- Food Pantry

Ekin Bukulmez took a few colony members to a local food pantry to try to organize the food donations into their respective locations within the pantry and also help the staff with whatever assistance they might need in moving large and heavy boxes/donations of items.

November 28, 2017: North Texas Food Bank


January 22, 2018: Recruitment Event – Game Night


Graduation Statistics Breakdown by Majors (Including Double Majors)






