IV. LESSONS LEARNED

The past year and a half was a testament to the importance of succession planning. We learned the hard way what can happen when a Regional Vice President opts not to run for re-election and only one person runs as successor. One region in this province experienced a major struggle with their RVP throughout most of the last academic year, and the RVP in question stepped down from the role at the start of this academic year. Although an election was held, and the region is now in better shape, it was almost December before they had a new RVP in place. Many of the chapters in this region stated that they wished they had more than one option at Grand Chapter Congress (2015). Going into the next Congress, I will work to ensure that any RVP not planning to run again has at least two candidates identified to run as their successor, and I will do the same for my own position.

V. BEST PRACTICES

The practice that has worked best (at least for me) is the utilization of a group chat for the leadership team, as I tend to operate on a different schedule than the RVPs. This has allowed them to ask questions of the group instead of bringing each question directly to me, so that if I'm unable to respond someone else on the team can give advice/direction. It has also helped that the team is made up of RVPs of varying levels of experience, which means that someone in the group is likely to have experienced the issue being discussed in the past. I plan to recommend this system to my successor in August.

VI. HIGHLIGHTS

I have been fortunate to have some really great Regional Vice Presidents on my team. From September through November, I had to take on the additional role of Interim Pacific Coast Regional Vice President, and the other RVPs did a great job of handling anything their regions threw their way during this time.

Report of the Desert Mountain Regional Vice President

SUMMARY

Epsilon Upsilon (NMSU) This has been a rough semester for them. The Board offered Receivership at the semester's beginning as a result of many issues. I believe much of this is due to a lack of "proper" officer transitions over the last few years and a lack of direct alumni help in the area. I had a great visit though with the chapter at the beginning of the semester with their DD and Receiver to go over CMP, operations, effective communications, fundraising, etc, followed up by a visit in November with the PVP. I am hopeful for a much more productive Spring semester than Fall – the chapter needs to be it in order to continue.

<u>Gamma Iota (UNM)</u> Gamma Iota has grown in numbers and strength in the last year. At times though, there have been observations of a lack of professionalism and brotherhood despite guidance from leadership for those things to cease. The chapter needs to hold brothers more accountable for their roles to continue their success.

<u>Gamma Omega (ASU)</u> The chapter is fundamentally sounded whose recruitment is largely successful and always strives to meet the requirements for their events each semester. The chapter in general also has good, open communication. A warning letter was sent to Gamma Omega for the pledge program as there were traditions that had to be eliminated. The EC was very open to making said changes. The challenge will be moving forward and making sure the traditions do not return and the high-quality pledges turn into high-quality brothers.

Gamma Phi (UTEP) The chapter has done very well this semester as a follow-up from a tremendous 2015-16 school year. I was most proud of their provincial award win for Most-Improved Collegiate Chapter. As it stands now, they have a great mix of new and experienced brothers leading the chapter. The task will be for their leaders to effectively communicate with the non-exec brothers.

<u>Gamma Psi (U of A)</u> Gamma Psi is also fundamentally sound with strong and successful recruitment. They also have a great relationship within the college of business as they were tasked with organizing another career fair in the fall in addition to the spring showcase they already manage and organize. Myself and their DD have challenged them to improve their alumni relations, as that area has been somewhat lacking for a few years.

Zeta Omega (NAU) The chapter has grown exponentially in numbers in the past few semesters, but that has not translated to a high % turning out for the required events. The chapter is in a positive transition stage, moving away from creating lines between "old" and "new" members. They appear eager and open to initiate changes/suggestions made by national leaders, especially in regards to pledge education. There are many development and fundraising opportunities ahead for them.

<u>Alumni Chapters</u> Both EPSC and PTAC have enthusiastic brothers to plan and attend events, consistency and variety are keys for both; big achievement was PTAC winning a national award at Denver LEAD; alumni still meet consistently in Albuquerque & I have offered my help to get chapter refranchised
